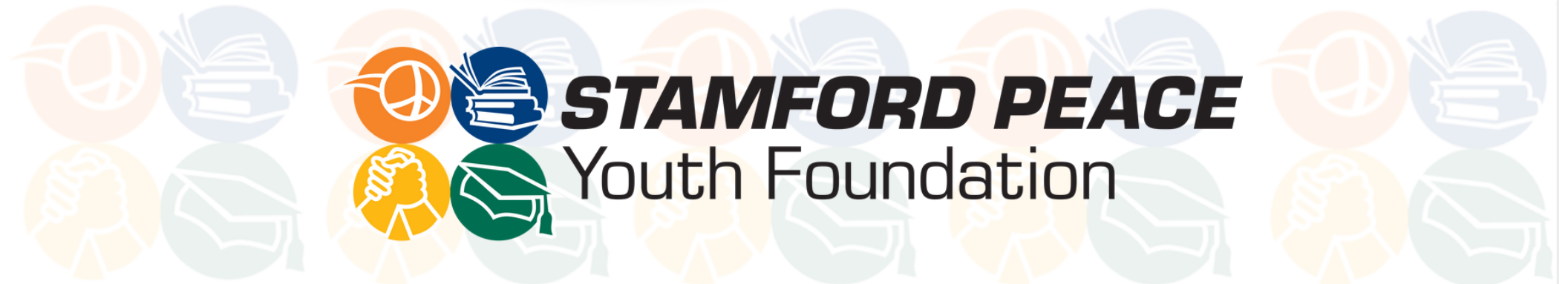

Dear Friends,

When I left Wall Street in 2007, I had a dream of dedicating myself to local youth development work, sharing my own good fortune with those whom by their birthright might not have been as blessed. Founding Stamford Peace Youth Foundation as a vehicle through which to use basketball as a tool of positive influence, I sought to combine my love of the game and deep belief that education could unleash a brighter future for our City's youth.

What began in 2008 as mentoring young people through basketball, with the creation of Stamford Peace's Beyond Limits Academic Program in 2013 has become a full-service academic support operation serving hundreds of lower-income youth within our community. Today while basketball remains an important component of what Stamford Peace does, it is our Beyond Limits Academics arm that is most moving the needle in the fight to close the opportunity and achievement gaps that continue to confront lower-income young people (including those of color and first-generation Americans). In fact, in the aftermath of the nationwide pandemic, Beyond Limits' work has never been in greater need or demand.

Initially, Beyond Limits was employed as a tool to support student-athletes participating in our PEACE Basketball programs. However, in the ensuing seven years since its founding, we have grown Beyond Limits considerably and today support even more non-athlete students locally than we do athletes. Through Beyond Limits, we provide high-quality, easily accessible, and affordable academic support services primarily for middle and high school students from lower income families in our community. Our cornerstone offerings include academic tutoring (in math and science), informal mentoring, academic advocacy, and enrichment activities, during the year and throughout the summer months. In this respect, we seek to offset the educational "arms race" that exists today, in which more affluent families have and take full advantage of any and all academic supports, enrichment opportunities and community service avenues available to them in order to get and stay ahead of the pack.

At the same time, our basketball programs continue to lead and flourish. We continue to run Stamford's cornerstone youth basketball leagues, including what used to be under the auspices and financially supported by our City. We also run a series of outdoor leagues in the community which, especially during the pandemic, played a key role in keeping young people engaged and healthy. All told, PEACE Basketball works with nearly 1,000 young people annually, in addition to the more than 200 young people engaged academically through Beyond Limits.

Needless to say, while challenges abound we will continue do our fair share – with your help – to make a difference in our City and the lives of our young people across the socio-economic spectrum. Thank you for your ongoing support of all things "PEACE."

Stamford Peace was founded by long-time Stamford community member, Brian Kriftcher, following a successful 20-year career in financial services. At the age of 40, Brian retired from business with the objective of devoting his full-time energies to his “calling” for coaching, teaching and community development. In 2008, Brian and fellow coach and Stamford community member, Lenwood Latta, developed Stamford Peace as a direct response to what they perceived was a systemic problem in which relatively low academic priorities and inadequate support were preventing too many local student-athletes from achieving their full potential. From a single team of 9-10 year-old boys in 2008, Stamford Peace has grown to more than 1,200 young people today across a variety of basketball and academic support programs, with lower income families receiving substantial financial assistance and subsidies in order to participate in our programs.

Stamford Peace is dedicated to the philosophy that “basketball is a privilege,” representing a reward for consistent effort and achievement in children’s core responsibilities in the classroom, in the community, and at home. We use a unique combination of sports, education and mentoring as our primary gateways to help young people reach their full potential and create a more just and equitable world. Our year-round work is supported by two key pillars: **PEACE Basketball** and our **Beyond Limits Academic Program**.





Dear Friends,

As Co-Founder of the Beyond Limits Academic Program, a venture that began over seven years ago with my good friend and Stamford Peace Founder, Brian Kriftcher, it is truly my pleasure to draft this annual message – a cathartic experience indeed after a disconcerting and tragic year worldwide.

Over a tumultuous 12 months, we sought out the silver lining and valuable lessons were learned. Our core on-site peer-to-peer tutoring had to cease somewhat abruptly and by last April we successfully transitioned to a new remote tutoring model with individual and small group (called “Remote Teams”) options. Since that time, **one article after another from leading publications nationwide have touted the benefits of high-dosage tutoring**, including some remote models. We learned how quickly we can pivot and the benefits of a virtual option and will continue to offer remote tutoring alongside the resumption of our on-site model.

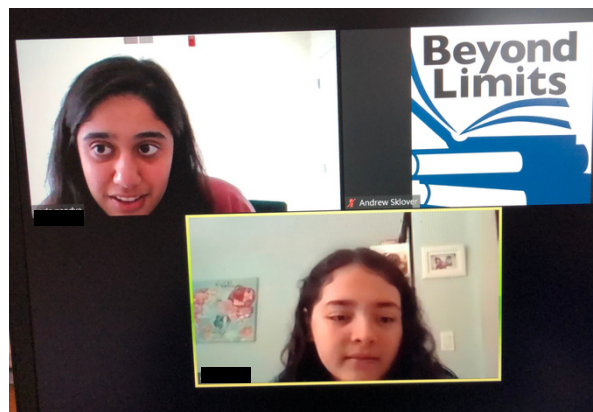

While we pay our tutors, **we only hire students who genuinely grasp our mission and want to support other students by being effective tutors and positive role models.** Their stipends, for the most part, are merely their icing on the cake.

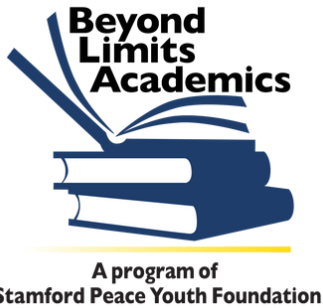
Our nationwide roster of committed young adults – a BL alumni network – is growing. Some of our tutors are now in the workforce after tutoring with us since high school and, in many cases, throughout college. Tutors typically include their BL experience on their resumes, frequently request recommendation letters or permission to use us as a job reference. Collectively, our tutees and tutors give us great faith in our country's future despite these challenging times.

Beyond focusing only on the tip of the iceberg, we recognize and are as committed as ever to addressing that which is below sea level. We appreciate the support of all our funders as we strive with event greater determination and zeal to address the opportunity gap, which plagues so many.

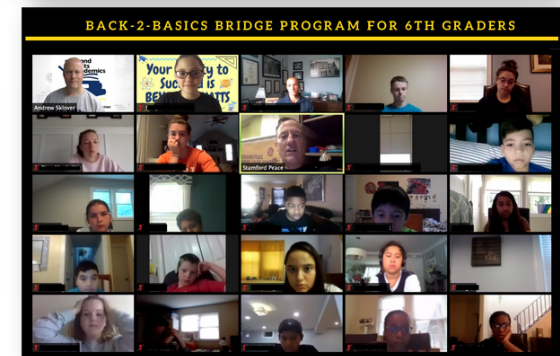
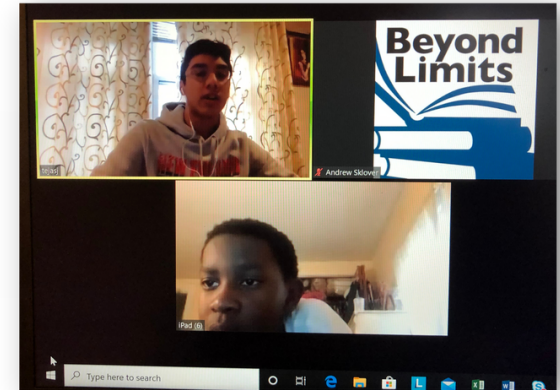


Established in 2013 by Andrew Sklover and Brian Kriftcher initially as a tool to support student-athletes, our Beyond Limits Academic Program has grown considerably and today supports over 200 students, many of whom are not involved with our basketball activities.

Beyond Limits provides high-level, affordable academic supports primarily for middle and high school students from lower income families, with a goal of instilling academic confidence. Our cornerstone offerings include:

- one-on-one academic tutoring in math and science, conducted by local high school juniors, seniors and college students;
- enrichment programming (including computer coding classes, writing workshops; college planning workshops, time management and organizational skills workshops, and more);
- summer programming (including ongoing tutoring; 1-week middle and high school preparatory academies designed to help orient incoming 6th & 9th graders; and Summer Math Academies);
- informal peer mentoring; and
- educational advocacy.

More than 80% of our tutoring participants are from families eligible to receive free or reduced-price school lunch, for whom access to high-level academic support is otherwise severely limited. Fees/expenses are highly subsidized by Stamford Peace.





Our original effort, PEACE Basketball offers mission-focused basketball programming for boys and girls ages 5-18 years old.

Among our PEACE Basketball offerings are:

- a boys winter house league in which approximately 600 players participate;
- high-level boys' and girls' AAU travel teams;
- summer and vacation day basketball camps;
- summer and fall outdoor leagues;
- a high school Varsity league;
- fall and spring skills clinics;
- one-on-one and small group training; and
- year-round open gym opportunities.

Using high-level basketball instruction, training, and competition, we emphasize the importance of education and other essential life skills to local student-athletes. Among the life lessons taught to participants in are the value of teamwork, discipline, a strong work ethic, personal integrity, sportsmanship and resiliency. The broad pursuit of excellence — on and off the court — is a cornerstone of all PEACE Basketball activities.

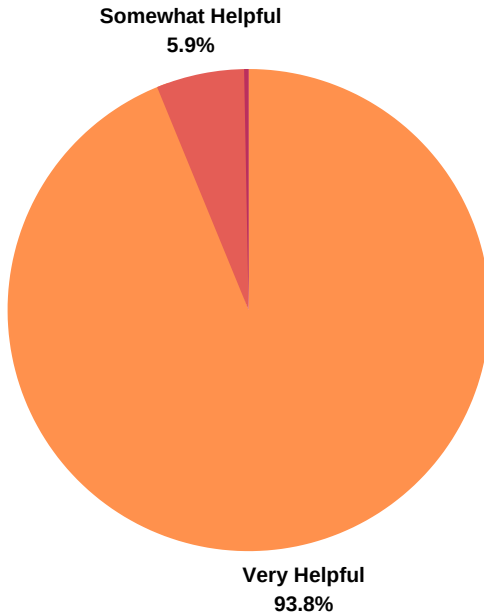

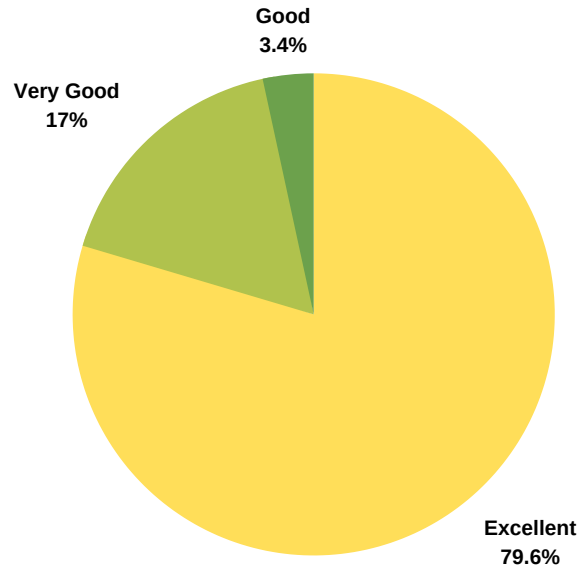


Survey Results from Remote Student Tutoring

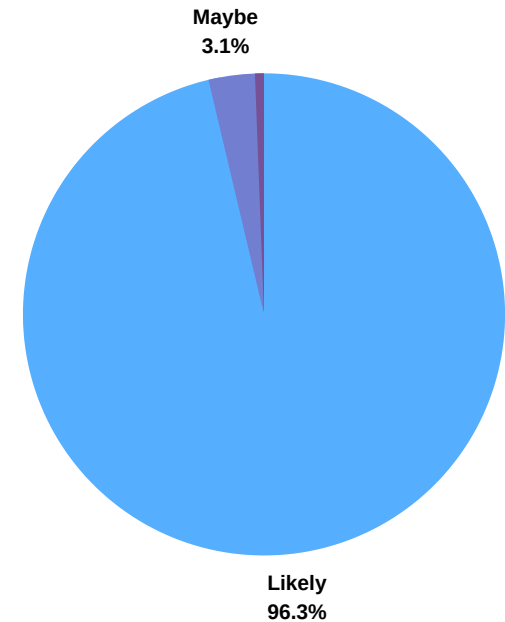
How helpful was your remote tutoring session?

"Everyone [at Beyond Limits] is super nice and friendly."

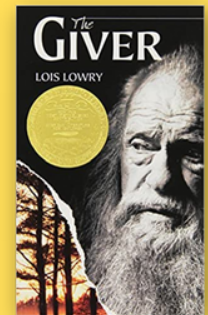
"Mr. Andy is always there when I need help, and it is good to know that someone (outside of my family) cares about me and my family."

"Beyond Limits was there to fill in those gaps; when I got tutored, the information stuck with me and helped me achieve a higher grade in my tests, quizzes, and exams."



After this amazing tutoring session, I was also able to achieve a high grade on my test the next day with only one day of tutoring."
