



Recreational activities abound, but it's the people who make the difference.




With the seemingly endless schedule of events, festivals and attractions, Siren gives the feeling of big-town excitement wrapped in a small-town package. From far and wide, visitors come for the annual spring Lilac Festival, the annual Fourth of July festivities and parade, fall art exhibits and holiday boutique shopping.

Always in touch with what's hot...and cool, Siren's civic leaders have invested significantly in a new state-of-the-art skateboard park for youth to push their athletic abilities to the max while engaging in fun, wholesome activities.

Each year Siren plays host to several regional youth hockey and baseball tournaments at the local baseball fields and new indoor ice arena. After a hard day of play, there is so much to see and do in the area making it a fun family vacation break in addition to sports competition.



Thousands of visitors each year test their endurance by biking and hiking the Gandy Dancer Regional Trail that cuts through the western edge of Siren. Gandy Dancer is a nickname given to the 1800s railroad track workers who used tools from Chicago's Gandy Tool Company. Their rhythmic songs and chants gave the appearance of an unusual dance routine as their hammers and shovels flew while laying tracks in the rail bed which now serves as the trail.







Long-time residents, many who left to see the world in their youth only to return to the beautiful, small-town community that is Siren, are now the shopkeepers and merchants who give this peaceful burgh its charm and welcoming atmosphere. They love their town and want to share its special qualities with tourists and visitors from near and far.

On June 18, 2001, an F3 tornado devastated parts of Siren. However, the resiliency, determination, community spirit and support of its hardy citizenry have resulted in a remarkable restoration and rebirth in just a few short years.

A memorial to the community is located

at Crooked Lake Park in the heart of Siren. When you

visit Siren, you can actually feel the strength and unity that has made this place what it is today.

Lilac Festival

Lilac Festival is the first celebration of spring when all the lilacs (after which the city is named) are in bloom. Breathe in the rich floral scent wafting through the air on light, warm breezes. Special food items with Scandinavian influence are available at local food purveyors all around town, including a Swedish pancake breakfast and bake sale. Take in the Art Show at the Siren Ice Arena, along with the perennial plant show and sale sponsored by the Siren Area Garden Club. Cap off the weekend with the "Swing into Spring" Big Cup golf tournament at Siren National Golf Course.

Fourth of July Celebration

Fourth of July Celebration is an all-time favorite for young and old. 


Spend a day hiking the Gandy Dancer Recreational Trail. Learn about the area's interesting past during a visit to historic sites like Forts Folle Avoine. Catch a glimpse of elusive birds and wildlife at the Crex Meadows Nature Preserve. Enjoy 18 leisurely holes at Siren National Golf Course. Rent a boat at one of numerous bait and boat rental shops to catch "the big one" that will keep you in fish tales for years, or float the day away on a pontoon while watching beautiful scenery pass you by. Tell ghost tales and roast marshmallows over a fire at one of several area campgrounds.

Get refreshed at several local taverns, restaurants and fine dining establishments. Movie buffs can see the latest first-run films at the four-screen movie theater or take the family for a fun round of mini golf. Hotel and lodging accommodations are conveniently located throughout the city and are reasonably priced. For those traveling from greater distances, the Burnett County Airport is located just outside of town.










Cross-country skiing and snowshoeing fans will enjoy the quiet, pristine beauty of a fresh snowfall in the woods. Numerous trails are located in and around Siren.

Ice fishing houses dot the frozen landscape on lakes all around Siren, keeping anglers in a year-round supply of fish tales. Test your skill by participating in the annual Lions ice fishing contest.

Snowmobilers delight at the first sign of powder. Hundreds of miles of groomed trails are found in and around Siren. The annual Kitty Kat race on Crooked Lake is a family favorite, along with the Snow-Cross competition held each year. And, of course, the Gandy Dancer Recreational Trail is the perfect place to spend a warm sledding day. Afterwards, sledders can prop their feet up by a warm, cozy fire at one of the area's lodges.

Siren National Golf Course is a true delight offering 7,000 yards of challenge (par 72) on one of the most beautiful courses in the Upper Midwest. This championship course has 18 unique and secluded holes, in addition to a driving range, practice greens and bunker.

Baseball and softball tournaments are a weekly pastime throughout the summer as Siren plays host to regional teams. Players and their families will have no problem finding a place to stay. Following a long day of slugging and base running, athletes can take a cool dip in the hotel or lodge pool or in one of the four lakes located right in town.

Participate in the numerous festivals and events scheduled frequently throughout the summer months such as the annual Fourth of July Celebration and SummerFest in August.

Fishing, fishing and more fishing. Wake up before the sun and head out to your favorite lake and bring home a walleye dinner before noon.

Spend endless summer days boating, water skiing and tubing on area lakes. You

won't want to miss the annual WaterCross Competitions where snowmobilers actually take their passion to the open water. For something peaceful, wind your way in a canoe or kayak down one of several rivers that meander around Siren



After setting up camp in one of the area's fine campgrounds, set out hiking on the 98-mile Gandy Dancer Trail that runs right through Siren, or explore the nearby Amsterdam Slough Wildlife Area or Crex Meadow Wildlife Area. Many people pack their bikes and ride the trails, as well.

Step back into time to learn about one of the first industries in the area - fur trading. Forts Folle Avoine Historical Park is managed by the Burnett County Historical Society and has an array of educational exhibits offering insights into the fur trade lifestyle, as well as providing extensive information on the Native Americans tribes who lived in the area at the time, and still reside in Burnett County today.

After enjoying a hearty breakfast at one of the many local favorites, avid shoppers can find an abundance of unique retailers and boutiques throughout the city.

Say cheese. A trip to Siren just wouldn't be complete without stopping in for a sampling of prize-winning, world-famous cheese at the Burnett Dairy Cheese Factory.



water, water, everywhere!

Wisconsin has over 15,000 inland lakes, 43,000 miles of rivers, and 650 miles of Great Lakes shoreline. The Village of Siren alone is bordered by four lakes - Crooked Lake, Clear Lake, Kapes Lake and Larson

> Lake. Each has a distinct personality and topography, but they all have one thing in common; people love the natural beauty, abundance of fish, wildlife and fun to be had in and around their individual shores. In addition, within a 15-mile radius of Siren there are more than 350 lakes. many offering convenient public water access to visiting boaters.

Shrieks of excitement and shouts of delight are just a small part of the active water recreation fun in Siren.

> Wake boarding, tubing and good old water skiing are key ingredients to a day of fun in the summer sun.

Watercross, the sport where snowmobiles skip across open water, was invented in Burnett County near Siren.



Competitors and spectators from around the world stay in and around Siren for the annual World Championship Watercross Race.

Winter Waterskip, a February variation, finds spectators cheering on daring snowmobilers who skip their machines over open channels, risking a dunk in freezing waters.

Several rivers and streams are also integral to the aquatic landscape in and around Siren. Avid kayakers and canoe enthusiasts enjoy the invigorating and challenging rapids and falls that converge in the area. Challenging currents near Clam Falls guarentee an adrenaline rush.

Fish Tales in the Making - Don't Let The Big One Get Away!!

For nearly half a century Big Mike's Pro Sports Shop has been a can't-miss landmark for local and visiting anglers alike. Among so many others, this authentic "up north bait shop...and a whole lot more" is the place to be for an inside scoop on where the big ones are biting and what's happening in and around the lake region.

Have you heard ...

Each year, the St. Croix Band of Chippewa harvests tons of natural wild rice from lakes in the Siren vicinity as part of an annual celebration.



Major sports personalities find their way to Siren regularly to broadcast outdoor fishing and wildlife programs. That's because Siren area lakes are ranked nationally as some of the best places to catch many of America's favorite species. Bass, walleye, trout, crappie, bluegill, perch, pike and sturgeon – the list goes on.

Lifelong memories are made in Siren. Just picture this – father and son, grandpa and granddaugher, best buddies from grade school – each dropping the first hook of the season over the bow, anxiously awaiting the first bobber to plunge beneath the surface.

Crooked Lake Fishing Pier, adjacent to the boat landing, picnic grounds and beach area, is a favorite fishing hole for all ages. Stop by and drop a line any time and chances are you'll strike up an engaging conversation with locals and visitors who share a common passion for fishing and the beauty of the surrounding scenery.

It is suggested that visitors familiarize themselves with various boating registration and safety tips, fishing regulations that control licensing, seasonal openings, quantity and size limitations, and other requirements from the State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources at www.dnr.wi.gov.

Maybe someday you, too, can post your angling victory in the National Fresh Water Fishing Hall of Fame!

Wild rice harvesting is a regional event among local Native Americans. Dating back to traditional seasonal rituals, the St. Croix Band of Chippewa Indians (whose tribal headquarters is located in the nearby Community of Sand Lake), makes the annual harvest of wild rice a sight to behold. Locals and visitors gather on the shoreline to watch harvesting crews rhythmically beat and swipe the rice stems into boats. Wild rice, especially the naturally grown and harvested variety, is a widely sought-after delicacy.
