Head Coach Phil Housley

Phil Housley is serving as the head coach of the U.S. National Junior Team for the first time. Previously, he held assistant coaching positions for the 2007 and 2011 U.S. National Junior Teams that received bronze medals. Additionally,

Housley was an assistant coach for the 2011 U.S. Men's National Team.

A seven-time member of the U.S. Men's National Team (1982, 1986, 1989, 1996, 2000, 2001, 2003), Housley earned a silver medal with the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games. In 1996 helped Team USA to a first-place finish at the World Cup of Hockey. He made his Team USA debut at the 1982 IIHF World Junior Championship.

Housley spent 21 seasons in the NHL (1982-2003) and has the highest career point total (1,232) by an American defenseman. He is a member of the IIHF and U.S. Hockey Halls of Fame.

A native of South St. Paul, Minn., Housley is in his ninth season as the head coach of the Stillwater (Minn.) High School boys' ice hockey team.

TODAY'S GAME

The United States is the fifth and final team in Group B to begin the 2013 International Ice Hockey Federation World Junior Championship. Against Germany, Team USA boasts an all-time record of 7-0-1-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L), having won the last two meetings in 2009 and 2011.

Germany lost its opening game of the tournament to Canada, 9-3, on Wednesday (Dec. 26). Germany earned a promotion into the 2013 IIHF World Junior Championship as a result of winning the 2012 Division I Group A title.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS

The U.S. National Junior Team has won its last five IIHF World Junior Championship-opening games. A year ago, **Charlie Coyle** notched a hat trick and **Jason Zucker** had a goal and two assists in an 11-3 win vs. Denmark. In addition, Team USA has won eight of its last nine tournament openers.

CAPTAIN AMERICA

Defenseman **Jake McCabe** is wearing the captain's 'C' for Team USA. Joining McCabe as alternate captains are **Cole Bardreau**, **Seth Jones**, **J.T. Miller** and **Jacob Trouba**. The alternate captains will be split into two pairs, with Jones and Miller wearing an 'A' when the U.S. wears its white jerseys and Bardreau and Trouba doing so in the blue jerseys.

McCabe is in his second season at the University of Wisconsin. He is the third Wisconsin Badger in the last four years to lead the U.S. National Junior Team. **Derek Stepan** captained the U.S. to a gold medal in 2010, while **John Ramage** helped the U.S. to a bronze medal in 2011 in Buffalo, N.Y.

WELCOME BACK

Team USA returns three players from the 2012 IIHF World Junior Championship. Forward **J.T. Miller** played in all six games last year, registering two goals and two assists. Defenseman **Jacob Trouba** was the youngest player on Team USA in 2012. He collected two assists and was Team USA's Player of the Game vs. Canada on Dec. 31, 2011. Goaltender **John Gibson** made one start last year, making 23 saves on 27 shots in a loss to Finland.

GOLD MEDAL PEDIGREE

The United States has won the last four IIHF Men's Under-18 World Championships. Twelve players on the 2013 U.S. National Junior Team roster have won gold medals at those events, including four players who have won twice; **Tyler Biggs** and **Rocco Grimaldi** did so in 2010 and 2011, while **Seth Jones** and **Jacob Trouba** equaled the feat in 2011 and 2012. The other gold medalists in 2011 were **Cole Bardreau**, **John Gibson**, **Jake McCabe**, **J.T. Miller**, **Connor Murphy** and **Blake Pietila**. In 2012, **Riley Barber** and **Ryan Hartman** also stood atop the medal stand.

In 2011, Gibson was named best goalie of the tournament by the directorate.

LEAGUE LEADERS

A number of U.S. players are prominent scorers in their respective leagues.

John Gaudreau (Boston College) is tied for seventh in NCAA hockey with 23 points. His 11 goals are tied for third in the college ranks. **Blake Pietila** (Michigan Tech University) has 10 goals in 17 games, which is tied for seventh in the NCAA. **Riley Barber** (Miami University) is the top point-getter among rookies in the NCAA with eight goals and 22 points in 18 games.

Leading the way is **Alex Galchenyuk** (Sarnia Sting), whose 27 goals in 33 games are tied for first in the Ontario Hockey League. **Vince Trocheck** (Saginaw Spirit) is fifth on the OHL points list with 50 (24-26) in 35 games. **Seth Jones** (Portland Winterhawks) has 28 points (8-20) to rank fifth among Western Hockey League defensemen and second for WHL rookies.

Goalie **John Gibson** (Kitchener Rangers) is tied for fifth in the OHL in both goals against average (2.33) and save percentage (.929). Also in the OHL, **Garret Sparks** (Guelph Storm) has a league-best 950 saves and four shutouts.

TEAM BUILDING

Twelve of the 22 players on the U.S. National Junior Team preliminary roster were members of the U.S. National Team Development Program. Additionally, **Sean Kuraly** and **Mario Lucia** played brief stints with the NTDP during their junior careers.

The list of past NTDP members includes forwards **Riley Barber** (2011-12), **Cole Bardreau** (2009-11), **Tyler Biggs** (2009-11), **Rocco Grimaldi** (2009-11), **Ryan Hartman** (2010-12), **Blake Pietila** (2009-11), **J.T. Miller** (2009-11); defensemen **Seth Jones**, **Jake McCabe** (2009-11), **Connor Murphy** (2009-11), **Jacob Trouba** (2010-12); and goaltender **John Gibson** (2009-11).

On his family's hockey passion ...

"My dad (David) had a rink in the backyard, so I started playing at around two or three years old. He was my coach growing up. My older brother, Andrew (25), also still plays hockey for the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, an NCAA Division III school. My brother has always been my biggest role model. He's a forward and I'm defenseman. I'm the player I am because of my dad and my brother."

On his favorite college and pro players ...

"I was always a Ryan Suter fan because he's a Wisconsin boy and I liked his style of play. Another favorite player of mine is Jake Dowell. He's from Eau Claire, played for the U.S. National Team Development Program, played at Wisconsin and also played for the U.S. National Junior Team (note: Dowell skated for Team USA in 2004 and 2005, winning a gold medal in 2004). He contacted me on Twitter (@McCabe19) recently. He told me, 'congratulations, it's going to fly by, keep doing what you're doing. If they named you captain it means you're doing something right, so don't change that.' I thought it was pretty cool that he took time to do that."

On his best hockey moment so far...

"Winning the (2011 IIHF Men's World U18 World Championship) for sure. I remember winning the semifinal and final in overtime. Tyler Biggs scored the game-winner in the semi and Connor Murphy did it in the gold medal game (note: Murphy is McCabe's current defensive partner on Team USA). Being with those guys for two years, there was no better way to end it than by winning gold. It was awesome."

On the defensemen he has been paired with at the University of Wisconsin...

"Last year I played with Justin Schultz and John Ramage. This year I've been playing with Frankie Simonelli."

- **Connor Murphy's** dad, Gord, played 14 seasons in the NHL and is on the coaching staff of the Florida Panthers

- **Blake Pietila** has a brother, Chad, and cousin, Aaron, playing alongside him at Michigan Tech. His uncle, Jim Storm, also played for the Dallas Stars.

- **Jim Vesey's** father, Jim, played at Merrimack College and also in the NHL.
