• **TODAY'S GAME** -- The United States and Slovakia meet for the eighth time today in the world championship with the U.S. holding a slight 3-1-0-2-1 (w-otw-otl-l-t) series advantage. Slovakia defeated the U.S. by a 4-2

count in the preliminary round of last year's world championship on May 7 (see boxscore later in these notes). With a victory today, the U.S. will clinch the top spot in Group H and face the #4 seed of Group H in Thursday's quarterfinals at 1 p.m. local time (6 a.m. ET).

· IN GOAL -- Ben Bishop

(Denver, Colo./Tampa Bay Lightning/University of Maine) is slated to get the start in goal for Team USA today. Bishop has started four games in this year's world championship, with three wins to his credit. He owns a 2.78 goals against average and .875 save percentage.

- OSHIE, GALCHENYUK TO PLAY TODAY -- T.J. Oshie (Warroad, Minn./St. Louis Blues/University of North Dakota) and Alex Galchenyuk (Milwaukee, Wis./Montreal Canadians) will be in the lineup today when the U.S. faces Slovakia. U.S. coach Joe Sacco will settle on his final lineup for the game following warmup.
- QUICK BITS -- The U.S. looks to win Group H with a victory here today. The largest group (in terms of number of teams) in world championship play the U.S. has previously won came in 2000 when, after winning the four-team Group D, the U.S. finished tops in qualifying Group E, which included six teams (USA, Sweden, Russia, Latvia, Switzerland, Belarus). Team USA lost in the quarterfinal that year to Slovakia and finished fifth. In 1995, the U.S. also won the six-team Group B in Stockholm (USA, Finland, Sweden, Czech Republic, Norway, Austria), but lost the quarterfinal game to Canada and finished sixth ... Team USA has won 11 of its last 14 games in the world championship over the past two years here in Helsinki ... David Poile of the U.S. Men's National Team Advisory Group arrived in Helsinki Monday (May 13) morning and is here for the duration of the world championship. Poile and Don Waddell are representing the Group for the second half of the tournament after Brian Burke and Dale Tallon were here for the first part of the event.
- WON 5 OF FIRST 6 -- Team USA has won five of its first six games at the World Championship four times (see previous three times below). Team USA has won six of its first seven games in this event just twice (1939, 2012).

- SMITH LIKES TO FISH -- Craig Smith has a point in all but one game and has assisted on the winning goal in each of the last two games. Competing in his third world championship, Smith enjoys freshwater fishing. He grew up fishing with his dad (Kevin), who got his first boat when he was 22. Ironically, Smith purchased his first boat a year ago at age 22.
- STAT LEADERS -- Paul Stastny, with 4-5--9, is fifth in the world championship in points, tied for second in assists (5) and tied for sixth in goals (4). Stastny is also sixth in faceoff percentage (.611/80-131). Craig Smith (3-4--7) is tied for seventh in the tournament in points, while Justin Faulk is in a two-way tie for the tournament lead in assists (6) and second among defensemen in points (0-6--6). Matt Hunwick is tied for second in plus/minus rating (+7), while Erik Johnson is tied for third (+6) and tied for fifth among defensemen in points (2-2--4).

Gold Medal Game

• THINGS -- The 3-0 win over Germany on Sunday (May 12) marked the first U.S. shutout in the world championship since a 5-0 blanking of host Finland in the preliminary round last year. In that contest, Jimmy Howard made 18 saves ... Paul Stastny is the only U.S. player to have a point in each of the first six games of the world championship ... After falling behind 1-0 in each of its first four games, the U.S. has scored the first goal in its last two contests ... Team USA has clinched a berth in the quarterfinals regardless of the outcome of today's game. Of the 18 years quarterfinals have been played, the U.S. has qualified for the quarterfinal game all but twice (2010, 2003) ... Team USA's defense has 30 percent of its points in the world championship (4-14--18). The U.S. forward core has contributed 19 of Team USA's 23 goals in the tournament and 24 of its 38 assists ... The U.S. has much balance in terms of player ice time in the world championship with only defensemen Justin Faulk averaging better than 20 minutes on ice per game (20:51) ... Stephen Gionta has a goal in each of Team USA's last three games ... The U.S. power play is second in the tournament (.348/8-23), while its penalty killing success (.905/19-21) is fourth best.

The U.S. was attempting to win its first three games in the world championship for the first time since 1997. Paul Stastny was named the U.S. Player of the Game.

RISTO TALVIO is Team USA's host for the 2013 IIHF World Championship. From Rauma, Finland, a town of about 40,000 people, Risto is a security officer at a nuclear power plant. He has been Team USA's host for all major international events in Finland at all levels since 1984, when Helsinki hosted the IIHF World Junior Championship. In addition, USA Hockey brought him to Grand Forks, North Dakota, to assist with the 2005 IIHF World Junior Championship and he was one of two hosts for Team USA at the 2006 Olympic Winter Games in Torino, Italy. Risto's father, Paul, incidentally, was Team USA's host for the 1965 IIHF World Championship in Tampere.

• THINGS -- Team USA's roster includes two Hobey Baker Memorial Award recipients as the top player in NCAA Division I men's ice hockey, including **Drew**



LeBlanc (2013/St. Cloud State) and **Matt Carle** (2006/Denver) ... Team USA alternate captains **Nate Thompson** and **Matt Carle** grew up together playing youth hockey in Anchorage, Alaska. The two are both current members of the NHL's Tampa Bay Lightning.

• STUART FAMILY IS A HOCKEY FAMILY -- Dr. Michael Stuart is the team doctor for the 2013 U.S. Men's National Team and also the chief medical officer for USA Hockey. Stuart, who is the vice chair for

orthopedic surgery and the co-director of the Sports Medicine Center at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., has four children, all high-level hockey players. Stuart's daughter Cristin played NCAA Division I hockey at Boston College. She's getting married this summer to Nate Thompson of the 2013 U.S. Men's National Team. Additionally, Stuart's sons Mike, Colin and Mark and all played NCAA Division I hockey at Colorado College and have all played in the NHL. Mark Stuart, who currently is an alternate captain of the Winnipeg Jets, was the captain of the U.S. gold-medal squad at the 2004 IIHF World Junior Championship and also helped the U.S. to a gold medal at the 2002 IIHF U18 Men's World Championship as an alternate captain. Mark Stuart has also played in two men's world championships.

• COACHING STAFF -- Joe Sacco is the head coach of the 2013 U.S. Men's National Team for the first time. Sacco served as an assistant coach for the U.S. Men's National Team at both the 2009 and 2010 IIHF Men's World Championship. As a player, Sacco skated with Team USA at the 1992 Olympic Winter Games and six IIHF Men's World Championships. Tim Army, an assistant coach for the Colorado Avalanche, is serving as an assistant coach for the U.S. Men's National Team for the third time (1994, 1996). He also served as an assistant with the U.S. World Cup Team in 2004. Danton Cole, currently the head coach for the U.S. National Under-17 Team with USA Hockey's National Team Development Program, is also serving as an assistant coach for the first time. Cole was the head



coach of Team USA at the 2012 IIHF Men's Under-18 World Championship in Brno, Czech Republic, where he guided the squad to a perfect 6-0-0-0 record and the gold medal. **Phil Housley** is serving as an assistant coach for the U.S. Men's National Team for the second time. He was on the U.S. bench at the 2011 IIHF Men's World Championship in Bratislava and Kosice, Slovakia. Earlier this year, Housley was the head coach of the U.S. National Junior Team that won the gold medal at the 2013 IIHF

World Junior Championship. In September 2012, Housley was one of two head coaches for the inaugural CCM/USA Hockey All-American Prospects Game in Buffalo, N.Y.

- U.S. SUCCESS IN INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION -- The United States has had great success in international competition this season, beginning with a gold medal at the 2013 IIHF World Junior Championship. The U.S. also won gold at the 2013 IIHF Women's World Championship and has silver medals in the 2013 IIHF U18 Men's and Women's World Championships and the 2013 IPC Sled Hockey World Championship. The U.S. is seeking to medal in the IIHF Men's World Championship for the first time since 2004 (bronze).
- MANAGEMENT TEAM -- The 2013 U.S. Men's National Team is under the direction of the U.S. Men's National Team Advisory Group, including NHL general managers Stan Bowman (Chicago), Paul Holmgren (Philadelphia), Dean Lombardi (Los Angeles), David Poile (Nashville), Ray Shero (Pittsburgh) and Dale Tallon (Florida); Anaheim Ducks pro scout Brian Burke; Pittsburgh Penguins pro scout Don Waddell; and Jim Johannson, USA Hockey's assistant executive director for hockey operations. The U.S. Men's National Team Advisory Group was formed in February of 2007 to assist USA Hockey with the selection of players and staff of U.S. Men's National Teams, including the Olympic Team.

- TIDBITS FROM PREVIOUS GAME NOTES -- Jacob Trouba beats Alex Galchenyuk by two weeks as the youngest player for Team USA. Both are 19 years old with Trouba born Feb. 26, 1994, and Galchenyuk on Feb. 12, 1994. David Moss, at 31, is the elder statesman of the U.S. team ... Team USA's average age is 24.8. Team USA's forwards average 6-0, 195 (25.4 years old) while its defensemen are 6-1, 206 (24.5 years old) and goaltenders 6-4, 204 (23.0 years old) ... Art Berglund, a member of the IIHF and U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame, arrived May 11 and is here for the duration of the event. Berglund, now retired, was a long-time employee of USA Hockey and headed international administration ... Overall, all but three of Team USA's 25 rostered players have competed in an IIHF World Championship at the U18, U20 or senior level, including the Olympic Winter Games. The only exceptions are netminder Cal Heeter and forwards Drew LeBlanc and Bobby Butler ... Twenty-two of the 25 members of Team USA played U.S. college hockey. The University of Michigan leads the way with four players that are a part of Team USA, while the University of Denver has three representatives and the University of Minnesota Duluth, University of Minnesota, University of North Dakota and University of Wisconsin each have two ... Bob Webster is the team leader for the United States for the ninth straight year. Webster had served as Team USA's equipment manager in 15 previous World Championships (1979, 82, 86, 87, 89-96, 2002, 03, 04) ... Team USA's roster includes nine players who have been part of USA Hockey's highly acclaimed National Team Development Program. The group includes forwards Stephen Gionta (2000-02) and Danny Kristo (2006-08); defensemen Matt Carle (2000-02), Justin Faulk (2008-10), Matt Hunwick (2001-03), Erik Johnson (2004-06), Jacob Trouba (2010-12) and Jamie McBain (2004-06); and goaltender John Gibson (2009-11) ... The U.S. won six of its eight games here in Helsinki at last year's IIHF Men's World Championship, however, settled for a seventh-place finish. Team USA won six of its first seven games for only the second time in the history of the event (1939), its .750 winning percentage was its best in the tournament since 1949, and its six total wins were the most in this event in a single year since 1990 ... Team USA has a youthful team in terms of experience at the IIHF Men's World Championship. Of its 25-man roster, 13 players are making their debut in this event. Only **T.J. Oshie** (2009, 2010), **Craig** Smith (2011, 2012) and Paul Stastny (2007, 2012) have played in multiple IIHF Men's World Championships, while the remaining nine players have competed in one previous men's world championship. That said, only netminder Cal Heeter and forwards Drew LeBlanc and Bobby Butler have not played in an international competition at some level for the United States ... Drew LeBlanc has had a whirlwind month. He was in Pittsburgh, Pa., in early April playing in the NCAA Men's Frozen Four where his St. Cloud State team lost in the national semifinals on April 11. The next night he was named the Hobey Baker Memorial Award winner as the top player in NCAA Division I men's ice hockey and also signed with the Chicago Blackhawks. LeBlanc played two games with the talent-laden Blackhawks and is now here in Helsinki playing in his first IIHF World Championship ... Matt **Hunwick** became a father for the first time on March 1 when he and his wife Adrienne welcomed Henry Richard to the family. Hunwick is the only member of Team USA with a May birthday (May 21) ... Jim Johannson, assistant executive director of USA Hockey, is here in Helsinski and is part of the management team of his 15th men's national team at the world championship. Johannson, a two-time Olympian as a player, works full-time for USA Hockey. He was the general manger of the 2013 U.S. National Junior National Team that captured the gold medal at the IIHF World Junior Championship ... Dr. Michael Stuart, chief medical officer of USA Hockey and the U.S. team doctor for this tournament, spoke to a group of physicians here in Helsinki on May 8 about concussions ... Tony Rossi, vice president of
- USA Hockey and a member of the IIHF Council, arrived on May 7 with his wife Marie and will be here through the remainder of the tournament ... **Don Waddell**, a member of the U.S. Men's National Team Advisory Group, arrived in Helsinki on May 10 and is here for the duration of the tournament. Waddell has a long history with USA Hockey, dating back to playing on the U.S. National Junior Team in 1977.
- LEADERSHIP -- Forward Paul Stastny (St. Louis, Mo./Colorado Avalanche/University of Denver) is the captain of the 2013 U.S. Men's National Team. Stastny, who helped the U.S. capture the silver medal at the 2010 Olympic Winter Games, has played in two previous IIHF Men's World Championships (2007, 2012). Defenseman Matt Carle (Anchorage, Alaska/Tampa Bay Lightning/University of Denver) and forward Nate Thompson (Anchorage, Alaska/Tampa Bay Lightning) are the team's alternate captains. Thompson was an alternate captain for the 2012 U.S. Men's National Team.
- A ST. LOUIS INFLUENCE -- Team USA has four players that played their formative years in the St. Louis, Missouri, area, including forward Paul Stastny, defenseman Chris Butler and goaltenders Cal Heeter and Ben Bishop. While Bishop's hometown is listed as Denver, Colo. (where he was born), Bishop played youth hockey in the St. Louis suburb of Kirkwood.
- COVERAGE -- NBC Sports Network is televising all Team USA games at the 2013 IIHF Men's World Championship, and all four quarterfinal games. Additionally, all Team USA games will be streamed live online through NBC Sports Live Extra.
- **MEDIA GUIDE** -- Team USA's media guide is available for download at USAHockey.com. It will be updated throughout the tournament as Team USA's roster changes.
- TOP DRAFT PICKS -- Team USA's roster features 13 players who were drafted in the first two rounds of the NHL Entry Draft, including Nick Bjugstad (2010/Rd. 1, No. 19/Florida); Matt Carle (2003/Rd. 2, No. 47/San Jose); Justin Faulk (2010/Rd. 2, No. 37/Carolina); Alex Galchenyuk (2012/Rd. 1, No. 3), John Gibson (2011/Rd. 2, No. 39/Anaheim); Erik Johnson (2006/Rd. 1, No.1/St. Louis); Danny Kristo (2008/Rd. 2, No. 56/Montreal); Jamie McBain (2006/Rd. 2, No. 63/Carolina); T.J. Oshie (2005/Rd. 1, No. 25), Aaron Palushaj (2007/Rd. 2, No. 44/St. Louis); Jeff Petry (2006/Rd. 2, No. 46/Edmonton); Paul Stastny (2005/Rd. 2, No. 44/Colorado); and Jacob Trouba (2012/Rd. 1, No. 9/Winnipeg).
- BACK FROM LAST YEAR -- The 2013 U.S. Men's National Team features six players who competed for Team USA a year ago in the IIHF Men's World Championship, including defensemen Chris Butler (St. Louis, Mo./Calgary Flames/Univ. of Denver), Justin Faulk (South St. Paul, Minn./Carolina Hurricanes/Univ. of Minnesota), and Jeff Petry (Ann Arbor, Mich./Edmonton Oilers/Michigan State Univ.) and forwards Craig Smith (Madison, Wis./Nashville Predators/University of Wisconsin), Paul Stastny (St. Louis, Mo./Colorado Avalanche/Univ. of Denver) and Nate Thompson (Anchorage, Alaska/Tampa Bay Lightning). The U.S. lost in the quarterfinals of the 2012 IIHF World Championship and officially finished seventh out of 16 teams at the tournament with a record of 4-2-0-2 (W-OTW-OTL-L).
