Sectional #1

Safe Pick:

Hayward/Spooner: After making the program's first state tournament appearance in 2012, the Hayward/Spooner co-op took it a step further in 2013 to claim the state championship. To repeat, the Hurricanes will have to navigate arguably the toughest sectional in the state, with 3 teams in the top 7 of the latest STAK Rankings, 5 in the top 12, and none below 21. Hayward/Spooner has been successful despite not only losing players to graduation from last year, but junior hockey as well. Other Favorites: Hudson, St. Croix Valley,.

Sleeper:

Superior: The Spartans are just 5-9 as of late January, but have faced the second toughest schedule in the state so far this year, with numerous games against teams from Minnesota. After making four straight state tournament appearances from 2003 to 2006, the Spartans haven't been back to Madison. Others To Watch: New Richmond, WSFLG.

The Storm are on top of the STAK Rankings by a good margin, but do have two losses to Hayward/Superior on the ledger already this season. Freshman sensation Nicole Unsworth leads the state in scoring with 78 points in just 19 games, while Nina Anderson and Rose Revolinski are in the top six as well. Netminder Jaime Hathaway is a returning All-State selection and one of the best in the state. Other Favorites: Bay Area, Appleton United.

Sleeper:

Fox Cities: Battling it out night in and night out during conference play in the Eastern Shores, the Fox Cities co-op is certainly well-tested. They're just 4th in the league right now, behind three other teams in their sectional, but they certainly could make some noise in the playoffs. Others To Watch: Fond du Lac.

MISS HOCKEY CONTENDERS

Lisa Fowle, G, Central Wisconsin – An Honorable Mention All-State selection last season for the Storm, Fowle has played almost every minute in goal for the team. She's allowed just 13 goals in 19 outings for a 0.69 goals against average, and sports a .941 save percentage and 9 shutouts this season as the team is again a favorite to get to Madison.

Theresa Knutson, F, Onalaska – Knutson led the state in goals and points her first three years, and is second in both categories this season. The Hilltoppers are again one of the top teams in the state, and Knutson has at least one goal in every game through the end of January. She's scored 6 goals on two different occasions this year, and has at least a hat trick in 11 contests.

Wendy Roberts, F, WSFLG – Roberts was a First Team All-State selection by the Wisconsin Girls Hockey Coaches Association last year, and figures to repeat in that capacity in 2014. Currently third in the state in both goals and points, she's helped the small school co-op to a 10-6-2 record on the year.

Mackenzie Torpy, G, Stoughton – With a couple weeks to go in the season the Stoughton co-op is in a logjam atop the Badger Conference, and Torpy is a big reason they are in a position to challenge for a league title. While the offense has struggled at times, she's been rock-solid, with a .955 save percentage, 1.32 goals against average, and 7 shutouts through the end of January.

Nicole Unsworth, F, University School – Unsworth may be the most impressive freshman from any winter sport in the entire state. She leads all girls hockey players in both goals (52) and points (78) through late January, and has scored at least five goals on five separate occasions this year. The high-flying Wildcats are 15-2-2 and atop the STAK Rankings.

Safe Pick:

Hudson: Normally you can pencil in Superior as the safe pick to come out of this sectional, as after all, the Spartans have made a record 35 state tournament appearances, and represented this sectional 11 of the past 12 years. However, Hudson appears poised to make its first appearance in Madison since winning it all in 2004. The Raiders are 12-1-2 through the late part of January, posting some impressive scoring numbers this year. A matchup against Superior in early February could determine who grabs the #1 seed out of this group. Other Favorites: Superior.

Sleepers:

New Richmond: The Tigers are on top of the Middle Border Conference heading to the homestretch of the regular season. New Richmond has wins over Superior and Somerset already this year, but has been blown out in two games against sectional favorite Hudson. Others to Watch: Somerset, Menomonie.

Eau Claire Memorial: The defending state champions remain a strong favorite to come out of this grouping, just as they have the last four years. The Old Abes can bring plenty of scoring to the table with Jacob Bresser, Charley Graaskamp, Chuck Bennis, and Dylan Ross, all of whom have at least 20 points this year through late January. Bresser currently leads the state in goals scored. They've certainly played a challenging schedule, with games against not only teams from northern Wisconsin, but also some of the best in the southern part of the state and out of state. Sleepers:

Rice Lake: The Warriors have struggled to find a groove this season, with no winning streak over two games but no losing streak over two games either. What Rice Lake has done is give Eau Claire Memorial its only Big River Conference loss of the season so far. The team has generated a bit more offense this season than last year's group, but the defense is still a work in progress, with five games of five or more goals allowed. Matt Berkovitz, D, Ashwaubenon – Berkovitz committed to Wisconsin during his sophomore year, and chose to stay with the Jaguars instead of heading to Juniors. An outstanding defender with good puck skills, he's accounted for 7 goals and 21 assists from his left defense spot.

Bryan Botcher, G, University School – USM's offense has struggled at times, but the Wildcats can always turn to Botcher in goal to keep them in games. In fact, all three of the team's losses so far were in one-goal games. Botcher is turning back shots at a .941 clip with a minuscule 1.33 goals against average.

Jacob Bresser, F, Eau Claire Memorial – Bresser, who scored a pair of goals in last year's state title game victory over Verona, has been one of the state's top offensive players all season as a senior. As of late January, he leads the state with 38 goals while adding 17 assists.

Brett Gruber, F, Notre Dame – The Tritons are flush with talent once again and have several players who could push for postseason honors. Gruber, a First Team All-State choice last year, has been magnificent once again, with 30 goals and 25 assists in the team's first 20 games.

Caleb Schroer, Wisconsin Rapids – The senior forward leads the state in scoring through the end of January, accounting for 34 goals and 36 assists as his 70 points are ten more than anyone else. He's had at least 4 points in 13 of the team's first 17 games as they are off to a 16-1 start to the season.


Safe Pick: University School of Milwaukee: Sectional #8 doesn't

TRIPLE PLAY THREAT

The Triple Play Triple Threat of the Week is an honor given on WisSports. net to the top senior boys and girls three-sport athletes in the state. It is sponsored by the local community telephone companies of Wisconsin.

At the end of the school year, those awarded with the weekly honor will be eligible for the Pat Richter Award, which will go out to the top boys and girls three-sport athlete of the season.

Hugh V. "Pat" Richter is one of Wisconsin's most-storied student-athletes

in state history. He was a three-sport athlete at Madison East High School, competing in football, basketball and baseball. He went on to star at the University of Wisconsin in all three sports as well, but is best remembered for his exploits on the football field.

Richter was a two-time All-American selection in football as an end. He also earned All-Big Ten Conference honors as a first baseman. Richter led the NCAA in receiving as a junior and set a Rose Bowl record with 11 catches for 163 yards in the 1963 game against top-

ranked USC. He was a first-round draft pick by Washington in 1963 and went on to play eight seasons in the NFL.

Richter would later serve with distinction as the Athletic Director at Wisconsin for 14 years. His number 88 is retired at UW and a bronze statue of him rests outside Camp Randall Stadium. He was indicted into the College Football of Fame in 1997.

Below are some of the athletes profiled for the Triple Play Triple Threat honor this year.

TANNER ARNOLD, TURTLE LAKE

National Honor Society, Class Secretary, 3.6 GPA...that's an impressive resume for Turtle Lake senior Tanner Arnold. It's even more impressive when you consider the time he's put in and success he's had in athletics. On the gridiron, he combined for more than 4000 yards and 39 touchdown passes during the last two years as the team's starting quarterback. He's averaging nearly 20 points per game in basketball as the leading scorer in the Lakeland-Central. And in the spring he'll shoot for a third straight First Team All-Conference selection in baseball. He plans to study physical therapy in college while hopefully competing in football or baseball.



MAT'T FERRIS, XAVIER

Prior to his senior year Ferris may have been known more on the state scene for his exploits on the basketball court for the Hawks, but an incredible football campaign put him on the map not only in the state but nationally. He threw for a state-record 8 touchdowns in a 64-14 win over Ripon in mid-September, but that was just a preview of what was to come. He finished the year with 50 touchdown passes and 3949 passing yards, both new state records as he claimed every state Player of the Year award. This winter, Ferris is the leading scorer for the Hawks basketball team that is in the hunt for a league title. He'll be a four-year letterwinner in baseball as well. "Going into high school, I was unsure that I'd play all three sports," he said. "So the best advice I got from a coach would be to stick with the sports and I'm certainly glad I did."



JENNY LINDNER, NEILLSVILLE

There are some players who just have "it" – that indefinable quality that goes beyond physical ability and allows them to be successful no matter what they are doing. Jenny Lindner certainly has the "It" Factor. In four season on the team's varsity basketball team, the Warriors have gone a combined 81-2 as of early February, winning the Division 4 state title in 2012, finishing 2nd in D3 last year, and currently occupying the top spot in the WisSports.net Division 3 Coaches Poll. Lindner is a lock to be a WBCA All-State selection for the fourth straight year and a contender for the Miss Basketball award. A four-year varsity performer as well, she earned First Team All-Conference the last three years. Oh by the way, she's a four-year varsity softball player that was a First Team all-league pick last season after batting .486. She'll head to UW-Milwaukee next year to play her college basketball.



JESSICA LINDSTROM, SUPERIOR

You'd have a hard time keeping track of all the Player of the Year awards won by Lindstrom in her career, but with a set of basketball and softball awards yet to come, she's already won a total of seven area Player of the Year awards by the Superior Telegram, plus several other statewide laurels. In volleyball, she was a First Team All-Conference selection three times for head coach Brenda Pluntz. In softball she hit .586 with 7 home runs as an All-Conference selection. She's made her biggest statewide splash in basketball though, earning First Team All-State honors from the AP after helping the Spartans to the Division 1 semi-finals last year. She's already the school's leading scorer with more than 1700 points as the girls hoops team has been in the top five of the coaches poll all year.

ZANDER NEUVILLE, WAUPACA

"The best advice I have received came from Coach Koronkiewicz," Neuville said back in mid-September. "He told me to always work hard because sooner or later, you will have an opportunity to step up and be a difference maker for your team." That opportunity was this year for Neuville, who went from a Second Team All-Conference junior year to garnering First Team All-State recognition as a senior for the Comets football team. He's carried the momentum to hoops, where is currently averaging more than 18 points per game on the hardwood. This spring he'll lace up the baseball cleats where he'll try to improve upon last year's Second Team All-Conference selection.



RENEE SLADEK, MERRILL

Sladek will end her high school career as a four-time varsity letterwinner in volleyball, basketball, and track & field. A unanimous First Team All-Conference selection the last three years in volleyball, she was a team captain the last two seasons. She's best known for her exploits on the basketball court though, where she was First Team All-Conference as a sophomore and junior and well on her way to that designation as a senior also. Approaching 1000 points for her carer, she'll continue her basketball journey at Northern Illinois next year. That's not before she takes another shot at the state track and field meet though. She placed sixth in the discus at the 2011 meet and also qualified in the shot put. As a freshman, she won indoor and outdoor high jump titles in the Wisconsin Valley Conference and also was part of the conferencewinning 4x100 meter relay team.
