We featured a variety of athletes for this award wrapping up the spring sports season, including:

Beth Wood (pictured) of Mineral Point played a big part in leading the Pointers to their first ever WIAA State Softball title. Wood allowed only 1 earned run, struck out 3 while also going 3-for-4 at the plate to help the Pointers to the Division 3 state title with a 7-2 victory

over Kenosha St. Joseph. In state semifinals, Beth scattered eight hits, tallied five strikeouts and didn't allow an earned run. The Pointers won the game, 2-1, over Pacelli, last year's D3 champ. She was a WFSCA Second Team All-State selection. Wood received 1,694 of the 4,385 votes cast, edging out Westosha Central's Sarah Fonk.

The Ozaukee girls soccer program is one of the best in Wisconsin, with six appearances in the state tournament. In June, the Warriors claimed a fourth Division 3 state title behind a strong performance from senior Katie Bares. She scored two goals and assisted on another in the Warriors' 3-1 victory over The Prairie School to win the Divsion 3 Soccer State Championship. Of the 3,665 votes that were cast in that week's poll, Bares received 1,263. Matt Byars of Lodi baseball finished second in the voting with 986 votes.

As the season goes along you can look for athletes from all the sports on our site to be included in the Army National Guard Athlete of the Week nominations. Whether they posted a record-breaking statistical performance, came through in the clutch when their team needed it, or exemplified impressive character on the field of competition, if an athlete has excelled, they will be considered for nomination.





- 1. Jaden Gault, Monona Grove, 6'7" 310, OL Gault has been a standout for three years, earning First Team All-State last season before committing to Wisconsin.
- 2. Craig Evans, Sun Prairie, 6'3" 305, DL A dominating player with an incredible blend of size, power, and agility, Evans has offers from dozens of colleges but is committed to Wisconsin after an All-State junior season.
- 3. George Panos, Arrowhead, 6'5" 294, OL The son of former Wisconsin standout and NFL veteran Joe Panos, George was a First Team All-Conference and WFCA All-State selection and is committed to Wisconsin.
- 4. Billy Hirschfeld, Arrowhead, 6'6" 266, DL A First Team All-State selection last year, Hirschfeld recorded 7 tackles and a sack in the D1 title game before committing to Wisconsin in May.
- 5. Dominic Cizauskas, Mukwonago, 6'1" 245, LB One of the most physically gifted multi-sport athletes in the state, Cizauskas committed to Wisconsin after a strong showing at the Badgers' camp this sum-
- **6. Gaelin Elmore, Somerset, 6'5" 236, TE** The top tight end prospect in Wisconsin in several years, Elmore is a dominating blocker and outstanding receiver. He is committed to Minnesota over offers from Wisconsin and Nebraska.
- 7. Conor Sheehy, Marquette, 6'4" 265, DL Committed to Wisconsin over an offer from Michigan, Sheehy earned First Team All-State recognition after recording 20 tackles for loss and 8 sacks last season.
- 8. Austin Roberts, Rice Lake, 6'3" 226, LB He was a First Team All-State selection by the WFCA after recording 152 tackles and 7 sacks as a junior and gave a commitment to Illinois over the summer.
- 9. Sam Seonbuchner, Arrowhead, 6'2" 215, LB An Iowa State com-

- mit, Seonbuchner is an athletic playmaker at the linebacker spot on a loaded Arrowhead defense.
- 10. Alec Kocour, Catholic Memorial, 6'1" 182, DB A First Team All-State choice as a junior, he recorded 107 tackles, 12 interception, and scored three defensive touchdowns for the Division 3 state champion Crusaders.
- 11. Marcus Collins, Madison La Follette, 6'4" 210, DB/ATH Committed to Pitt as an H-back, Collins is a standout on the defensive side of the ball where his size and athletic ability allow him to make plays all over the field.
- 12. Max Scharping, Green Bay Southwest, 6'6" 260, OL Scharping is still growing into his frame and has plenty of room to add good weight, but was a First Team All-Conference choice and has committed to Northern Illinois.
- 13. Beau Benzschawel, Grafton, 6'6" 250, TE/DL A traditional inline tight end with ideal size, Benzschawel displays soft hands in the passing game and can engulf defenders as a blocker.
- 14. Luke Rasmussen, Brookfield Central, 6'7" 252, OL Blessed with ideal size for the position, Rasmussen shows outstanding mobility and athleticism. He's garnered more than a dozen scholarship offers so far.
- 15. Jacob Maxwell, Greendale, 6'7" 277, OL Maxwell really burst onto the scene in the off-season, making positive impressions at several camps and combines before committing to Northern Illinois.
- 16. Kory Kodanko, West De Pere, 6'6" 320, OL Kodanko is a dominating run blocker, engulfing defenders and blowing them off the ball. He committed to Iowa State earlier this year.
- 17. Sean McGuire, Franklin, 6'3" 205, QB McGuire enters 2013 as a three-year starter for the Sabers, earning First Team All-Conference recognition last season after throwing for 1396 yards and 13 TDs.

- **18.** Drew Patterson, Sussex Hamilton, 6'0" **190**, RB He was the Greater Metro Offensive Player of the Year after rushing for 1969 yards with 26 TDs, with offers from several D1 schools.
- 19. Matt Seitz, Arrowhead, 6'2" 215, LB The Warhawks leading tackler with 99 stops last year, Seitz anchors the middle and has multiple Division 1 college offers heading into his senior season.
- 20. Rickey Neal, Jr., Racine Horlick, 6'3"
 195, QB/ATH Neal ran for more than 1200 yards and 13 scores last year as his athletic ability has drawn attention from numerous colleges as a wide receiver or defensive back as well.
- 21. Isaiah Lesure, Mount Horeb/Barneveld, 6'2" 170, WR Lesure is an explosive athlete that has good size and length as well, and does a nice job going up to get the ball at its highest point. He's picked up offers from North Dakota State and North Dakota.
- 22. Hudson Walton, Cedarburg, 6'1" 193, RB/LB A four-year varsity player, he's combined for more than 2400 yards and 29 touchdowns the last two seasons. He has an offer from North Dakota, and some schools like him at linebacker.
- **23.** Ricky Finco, Arrowhead, 5'9" 160, WR Finco was a playmaker all season for the Division 1 champs, catching 43 passes for 1015 yards and 12 touchdowns on his way to First Team All-Conference recognition.
- 24. Jonathan Carson, Messmer, 6'3" 230, TE/DE A bit raw, Carson has loads of potential, with a commitment to Central Michigan. Last year he caught 27 passes for 734 yards and 8 touchdowns.
- **25.** Andy Fidler, Port Washington, 6'6" 270, OL He has good size and the ability to hold the point of attack on both offense and defense, and has offers from North Dakota, Bowling Green, and Fordham so far.
- 26. Brandon Hines, Homestead, 6'1"
 275, DL Hines possesses good size and strength for the position and has shown the ability to be a disruptive force in offensive backfields. He's got offers from North Dakota and South Dakota.
- **27. Daurice Fountain, Madison Memorial, 6'2" 185, WR** A state champion in the hurdles and long jump, Fountain has loads of athletic potential and a good frame, so it's no wonder D1 schools have come calling.
- **28.** Thor Riemer, Osceola, 6'5" 275, OL He was a First Team All-Conference pick a year ago for the Chieftains. Riemer has an offer from Northern Colorado currently.
- 29. Russell Chambers, Milwaukee Riverside, 6'5" 220, OL/DE The City Conference Lineman of the Year, Chambers earned an offer from and committed to Northern Illinois as a defensive end.

- 30. James Nachtigal, Fort Atkinson, 6'2"
 205, WR/ATH A Unanimous First Team
 All-Conference selection as a wide receiver
 last season, Nachtigal caught 47 passes for
 675 yards and 2 touchdowns and could
 wind up at several positions at the next

- **31.** Aubrey Johnson, Madison West, 6'3" **220**, TE Johnson has a rare blend of size, strength, and athletic ability in his 6-3, 225 pound frame. A First Team All-Conference pick, he has D1 offers from North Dakota and Northern Colorado.
- 32. Alex Romenesko, Arrowhead, 6'0" 185, DB A leg injury before the season started will cost him his senior year, but Romenesko has an offer from South Dakota State.
- 33. DeMario Harris, Brookfield Central, 5"11" 202, RB Harris is already a two-time First Team All-Conference selection in the strong Greater Metro heading into his senior season, rushing for more than 2100 yards and 27 touchdowns the last two years.
- **34.** David Kornack, Edgar, 6'5" 245, TE/DE Kornack is an ideal in-line tight end prospect, where his size allows him to engulf defenders as a blocker. He displays good hands and an ability to get behind defenders in the passing game.
- **35. Aaron Fischer, Sun Prairie, 5'11" 230, FB** One of the top fullback prospects to come out of the state in some time, Fischer is a versatile lead blocker that is also adept at catching the ball out of the backfield.
- **36.** Adam Stiner, Verona, 6'5" **265**, OL Stiner plays guard in the Wildcats offense and is asked to trap, pull, and move quite often, things he does quite well. He got an offer from North Dakota back in June.
- **37. Ben Fischer, Crivitz, 6'1" 200, RB/LB** He has good size at 6'1", 200 pounds and ran an impressive 4.63 40-yard dash earlier this spring. He averaged more than 180 yards per game last season.





Blake Anderson, Auburndale – Anderson is an outstanding multi-sport athlete for the Apaches, including playing a key role on the football team that advanced to the playoffs last year and could be in line for an even bigger season in 2013. In seven conference games last year he led the league with 91 completions and 152 attempts, finishing with 1,268 yards and 14 touchdowns.

Kyle Becker, Pardeeville – The Bulldogs figure to push for the Trailways-Large Conference title this season, and Becker is a very big reason for that. After a solid sophomore season that saw him rush for 742 yards and eight scores, he broke out for 1,607 yards and 17 touchdowns last year. He's already off to a good start in 2013, averaging 175 yards per game.

Kole Dubiel, Whitehall – In his first season as the primary running back last year, Dubiel exploded onto the scene to rush for 1,462 yards and 17 touchdowns while averaging 9.9 yards per carry. A First Team All-Conference pick on offense, he also earned Second Team recognition as a linebacker. In the early going this year, he's averaging better than 130 yards per game and 7.1 yards per carry.

Ike Floyd, Saint Mary's Springs – Floyd has been a big part of two-straight Division 6 champions, rushing for more than 1,700 yards and 34 touchdowns the past two seasons. He did it despite sharing carries with Darin Ward, who put up comparable numbers. With Ward now graduated, Floyd is ready to shine. Floyd is listed at just 5'8", 152 pounds, but you'd be hard-pressed to think of him as small after watching him play. He runs with a reckless abandon and, while he certainly can make defenders miss, he isn't afraid to deliver the blow.

Collin Kennedy, Luther – Kennedy didn't make much of an impact for the Knights last season, but the junior wide receiver has turned into a big-play machine in the first few games of 2013. In a season-opening win over Blair-Taylor, he hauled in seven passes for 241 yards and two scores. He followed it up with a six catch, 196-yard, three touchdown performance in a loss to Cashton. After two weeks, he is more than 120 yards ahead of the next closest person on the receiving yard leader-board.

Sam Koss, Algoma – Koss was a Second Team All-Conference selection last year but has really burst onto the scene in the early part of 2013. In a season-opening win over Sturgeon Bay, he carried the ball 24 times for 107 yards and a touchdown. The Wolves travelled to Southern Door in Week 2, where they posted a 49-28 victory. Koss exploded for numerous big runs, carrying the ball 23 times for 388 yards and four touchdowns.

Aikan Major, Pepin/Alma – Major was a First Team All-Conference selection for the Pepin/Alma co-op last year. A traditional middle linebacker on defense, he uses good athletic ability, size and strength to attack the line of scrimmage, where he is one of the better hitters in the area. Major also carries the ball in the team's offense and some schools are looking at him as a fullback at the next level.

Tyler Sorensen, Stanley-Boyd – Sorensen is part of a Stanley-Boyd offense that returns most of the playmakers from last year's squad that finished second in the highly-competitive Cloverbelt Conference. The Orioles are one of the favorites this year as Sorensen is back after earning First Team All-Conference recognition in 2012 when he passed for nearly 1,200 yards and 12 touchdowns. He's a three-year starter for head coach Jeff Koenig.

Joey Swanson, Northern Elite – Swanson posted a solid junior season, throwing for 656 yards and seven touchdowns while rushing for 1,126 yards and 14 scores. He started 2013 with a bang as he matched his passing touchdown total from last year in the first two games of the new season. His impact on the game doesn't stop on offense, as he also earned First Team All-Conference recognition as a defensive back and punter.

Ethan Young, Black River Falls – One of the state's most prolific passers a year ago, Young had the most yards and touchdowns in 2012 of any returning player. Spearheading the Tigers' high-powered offense last season, he completed 122 of 196 attempts (62.2%) for 2,357 yards and 27 touchdowns as the team advanced to the state semi-finals. Among starting quarterbacks, he was fifth in the state with a passer rating of 133. He's decisive in getting the ball out to his receivers and consistently places the ball where it needs to be.










Dashers look to take next step this season

After finishing as the Division 1 runners-up last year, Divine Savior Holy Angels will look to make the next step this season. The Dashers also reached the state tournament in 2009 and 2011 under current head coach Darrell Frank.

Playing in the Greater Metro and competing against some of the top teams across the state in non-conference matches and tournaments will give the Dashers good competition and preparation to make a deep playoff run once again.

Last season, the Dashers fell to Burlington, the 2011 and 2012 state champs, in straight sets in the title match after defeating Neenah and Merrill to reach the final. DSHA's lone WIAA state title came in 2001 and they hope to add to that list this season.

Coffey will be DSHA's go-to player this season. The 6-foot-2 senior finished with 24 kills in three state tournament matches last season. Hohenwalter (5-11, Sr.) also had a productive state tournament last season, compiling 15 kills

"Caitlyn has become stronger than last year and has had a great club season. We are also

looking to her for team leadership, she is tremendously motivated this year to get us to state and win," stated Coach Frank.

The Dashers will also look to get production from four other returning players in senior Emme Granger (DS/L), sophomore Annie Ertz (OH/MB), senior Maggie Ertz (OH/MB), and senior Sami Leach (S/OPP).

Coach Frank also pointed out a few other players who will have prominent roles on the team this season.

"Kelly Berk (6-0, Jr.) in the middle is a dominating player. Sarah Klug, sophomore libero, has all the potential to play this spot in college."

Sophomore Annie Ertz gives DSHA another strong option at outside hitter. The Dashers will also be strong at setter, with three effective ones in Katie Machi (Jr.), Maddie Yoss (So.), and Leach.

DSHA will no doubt have one of the deepest rosters in the state. That is the effect of the work the players put in during the offseason. Coach Frank told WSN that some of his players work with strength and conditioning experts, most play club volleyball, and many attend camps.

Her list of honors included being named First Team All-State, Post Crescent All-Area Player of the Year, and unanimous First Team All-Fox Valley Association. "Haley's greatest strengths are her mental toughness and having an all-around game with no real weaknesses," coach Bruce Moriarty said. Her leadership qualities also make her the player she is. "Haley is as unselfish as they come and a real servant leaders. She consistently focuses on 'we' not 'me'. She shows up early, stays late, offers to help teammates, and the most menial tasks are not below her," added coach Moriarty. Off the court, Haley is involved in Neenah Fellowship of Christian Athletes huddle, she volunteers at Special Olympics and the hospital, she also teaches swimming to younger kids.

Lightning bring varsity experience to volleyball court

Appleton North won their first-ever boys volleyball title last season, going wire to wire as the top-ranked team in the rankings. It was the Lightning's sixth appearance at the state tournament in their 13 years having a program.

Since the WIAA reinstated the boys volleyball tournament in 2000, Appleton North is the lone champion located outside of southeast Wisconsin.

Coach Mike Maass and the Lightning will need to replace nearly the whole team from last year's state championship team. They graduated 11 seniors in all, including five starters and their libero

"Four of those guys had been starting since they were sophomores," said Coach Maass. He did point out that while they lost a number of key players, they won't necessarily be a young team with five seniors and seven juniors.

"We will lack experience in volleyball but these guys know how to compete at the varsity level. Ten of the twelve played basketball for Appleton North last year and a number of those guys also play baseball in the spring."

Coach Maass told WSN that he always wants to be in position to compete for the conference championship and that will remain the same this year despite the loss of 11 seniors.

Mike Lukashewich is the lone returning starter for Appleton North and coach Maass will look to him to take on a larger role this season. He finished with 20 kills and hit 55.9% at the state tournament last season in three matches.



Ian Gerrity is the Lightning's most experienced volleyball player heading into the season and Coach Maass sees big things coming from him this season. "He's a very good athlete, will most likely start at the varsity level in three sports this year (basketball and baseball) which is very rare at a school our size."

Coach Maass will also look to Kody Fiorito and Liam Mahoney to step in to key roles this season. "Kody has some huge shoes to fill in taking over the setting role but I

believe he has a unique skill set that is going to let him excel. Liam has the physical tools to be successful, but is lacking game experience. I hope to see him improve each game."

Appleton North will also get production from Jared Dudley, Austin Nelson, Brian Jones and Josh Moua.

"Dudley is an athletic kid that needs to contribute on the floor for us to be successful. Jared has played varsity basketball since his sophomore year and knows how to compete at the varsity level," said Coach Maass.

Nelson is one of two seniors who have played volleyball all four years; Gerrity is the other.

"Austin has played several positions over the last couple years but now will be counted on to provide blocking and some offense from the right side of the court," added coach


Maass.

Senior outside hitter Joe Coplan earned Second Team All-State honors from the Wisconsin Boys Volleyball Coaches Association and was named First Team All-Greater Metro last season. He finished the season with 302 kills and helped the Hilltoppers to the State Semifinals before falling to eventual State Champion Appleton North. "Joe greatest strength is on the offensive end, he hits a heavy ball on the outside and is set often out of the back row. Joe also has a consistent jump serve that creates havoc on our opponents," coach Eric Sullivan said. Joe stepped into the role as 'the go to guy' last season after losing the entire 2011 state champion team and gained a great deal of leadership through that experience. "This year, Joe's confidence is through the roof. His play alone could speak for itself but he also encourages his teammates and creates positive energy for our team," added coach Sullivan.
