For many years, Spring Baseball teams had the number of games that could be played capped at 14, then 16, then 20. Today it is 26. Summer baseball teams could play an unlimited amount of games for many years. It was not unusual for some teams to play more than 50 games. The WIAA ended summer baseball with games capped at 30 in 2018.

Coaches with suns in front of their names spent at least a major portion of their careers coaching summer ball.

Viroqua's Pete Swanson, a WBCA Hall of Famer and skipper for the Blackhawks, died suddenly last summer. The entire fraternity of baseball coaches and friends of high school baseball grieved the loss of a great coach and a better man. Hall of Famers that left coaching last year were Dave Bahr (Lake Country Lutheran), Bob Gawlitta (Wisconsin Rapids), Tony Gerharz (Oshkosh West), Tim Pooch (Green Lake), Brad Sauve (St. Croix Central), and Joe Waite (Cumberland). Other experienced coaches hanging it up were Dan Jonas (Ripon), Justin Hruby (Medford), John Berns (Southern Door), Brad Giesregen (Drummond), Tom Wozniak (Milwaukee King), Rich Padron (Hustisford-Dodgeland), Chad Janetzke (Martin Luther), Joel Kramer (Fox Valley Lutheran), and Aaron Schepps (Oakfield).
