Season Notes (A) – January 7, 2014 – Vancouver Island Raiders named former linebacker Brian Ridgeway their new head coach

(B) - March 20, 2014 – Westshore Rebels announced the hiring of co-head coaches Tom Fong and Andrew Axhorn. Both coaches replace 2013 interm coach Tim Kearsse. Fong subsequently resigned in mid-June. Sheldon Halliman was named co-head coach

(C) - April 4, 2014 – At the annual B.C. lions Orange Helmets Awards the following former BCFC coaches were honoured for their time involved in football in B.C. Dave Easley former coach of Renfrew Trojans, Pete Ohler former coach with the Meralomas and Ranji Mattu, former Vancouver Blue Bomber coach were honoured with Pioneer Awards.
The Bob Ackles Lifetime Achievement Award was presented to former Abbotsford Air Force Head Coach Jerry Mulliss.

(D) – September 17, 2014 – Linebacker J.T. Fernandez of the Okanagan Sun died of an apparent suicide

Season Notes (A) – March 5, 2013 – Former Vancouver Island Raiders quarterback Jordan Yantz was named recipient of the 2012 Wally Buono Award.

(B) – At the AGM on March 23, the Chilliwack Huskers requested and were granted a name change back to their original name the Valley Huskers commencing with the 2013 season

(C) – Friday April 19, at the Orange Helmet Awards ceremony, former Abbotsford Air Force Head Coach Bill MacGregor was recognized with a Lifetime Achievement Award. As well, former BCFC President Hans Finken and former Vancouver Meralomas Head Coach Ed Murray were honoured with Orange Helmet Pioneer Awards

(D) – July 6, Westshore Rebels Head Coach Scott Mennie, citing personal reasons, stepped down as Westshore's Head Coach.

(E) – July 13, the Westshore Rebels named Tim Kearse as Head Coach. Kearse had been the Rebels Offensive Coordinator in 1998-00.

(F) – July 21, Westshore Rebels President Roger Wade stepped down due to business pressure. Vice President Elise Pastro assumed the role of interim President

(G) – Prior to the season, Langley Rams head coach Jeff Alamolhoda stepped down as Head Coach and took the position of General Manager. Ted Kirby was named Head Coach

(H) – August 7, the CJFL levied a \$3000.00 fine against the Okanagan Sun for Tampering. The Sun had registered a player who was on the Hamilton Hurricanes 2012 protected list.

(I) – August 12, the BCFC levied a fine of \$500.00 and a game forfeiture against the Okanagan Sun for playing an ineligible player. The ruling stems from the same rule violation that the CJFL levied against the Sun. The forfeited game was to the Valley Huskers who were awarded the win by a 1 to 0 score

(J) – On August 17, Matt Blokker, head coach of the Vancouver Island Raiders won his 84 game as head coach in a 56 to 3 win over the Valley Huskers. His 84 wins makes him the winningest coach in BCFC history. Matt broke the previous record of 83 that was held by former Surrey Rams / Tri-City Bulldogs head coach Nick Kawaza.

(K) – On September 14, the British Columbia Football Hall of Fame announced the 2013 Inductees. From the BCFC were the 1982 Renfrew Trojans football club who were inducted in the team category. In the Athlete category, former Vancouver Meralomas quarterback (1971-1973) Dan Smith was inducted and in the Builders category former Vancouver Meralomas player and Abbotsford Air Force Head Coach Bill MacGregor was inducted.

- (L) – November 12, Tyson St. James head coach of the Valley Huskers resigned to spend more time with his family. The Huskers named Adam Smith their new head coach.
- (M) – November 17, Langley Rams announced that Jeff Alamolhoda will be returning as head coach of the team. Interim head coach Ted Kirby remained as an assistant coach
- (N) – November 21, 2013 former Okanagan Sun head coach Brock Aynsley (1982-1984) was inducted into the Central Okanagan Sports Hall of Fame.

Season Notes – (A) – Vancouver Island Raiders after replacing head coach Matt Blokker after four games in 2007, re-named him head coach for the 2008 season.

(B) – Abbotsford Air Force was denied their application for playing status on January 12, 2008. They required 75% of the vote and of the 14 eligible votes they secured only two. The Air Force decided not to opt for non-playing status and under BCFC rules and regulations the Air Force were expelled from the league. The BCFC played 2008 season with seven teams.

(C) – Bob Lindsay long time President of the Sun stepped down in March. He was replaced by Les Weiss

(D) – At the B.C. Lions Orange Helmet Awards ceremony, the 1947 Vancouver Blue Bombers team was honoured with a Pioneers Award. As well former Burnaby Spartans Head Coach (1958-59) Frank Smith was honoured with a Lifetime Achievement Award

(E) – Josh Plamondon President of the Rams stepped down in May and was replaced by Brian Carrigan

- (F) – Don Barker resigned his involvement in the BCFC Operating Committee as well as his position of Game Commissioner. He stayed on as a member of the Board of Directors. Don's game commish duties were split between Nick Kawaza and Paul Shortt
- (G) – Vancouver Trojans forfeited their first game of the season to the Chilliwack Huskers for using an uncertified coach. BCFC Rules stipulated that all coaches must meet minimum CJFL Certification requirements. The Trojans had a coach who did not. The BCFC teams added to the rule if a team is found to have an uncertified coach participating the team would forfeit any game in which he participated. The score of the original game was 15-13 for the Trojans. The forfeited score was registered as a 1-0 win for the Huskers. The game statistics remained as originally recorded.
- (H) – The Okanagan Sun had to move their home games up two hours beginning with the August 16 game when the lights at the Apple Bowl were hit by lightning thus.
- (I) – After Week Five, Paul Shortt, Nick Kawaza, Bickey Nadasen, Judith Tucker and Karen Shortt resigned from the BCFC. Due to the on-going debate over the forfeiture of the Vancouver Trojans game in Week One, the Trojans along with the Rebels continued to debate the issue. The Trojans also asked that the members of the Rules and Discipline Committee be removed. A member of the Trojans issued a statement to the CJFL indicating that the ruling of the forfeiture was racially motivated. In light of these false allegations and foreseeing that the cooperation level of the teams involved would diminish, the resignations were submitted. Vice President Jack Covey assumed the president position for the remainder of the year.
- (J) – Janson Towers, a running back with the Okanagan Sun was killed in a motorcycle accident on his way home from practice on October 10. The accident happened the night before the Okanagan / South Surrey playoff game.
- (K) – Tyler Stephens of the Okanagan Sun was arrested and charged on October 23 for committing nine sexual assaults on women in the Rutland area.
- (L) – Okanagan Sun head coach Jay Christensen was let go as head coach of the Okanagan Sun following their Cullen Cup loss to the Vancouver Island Raiders. Jay had been head coach for seven seasons and compiled 59 wins, 10 losses and one tie. Jay won Cullen Cups in 2002 and 2004. Former Sun player and high school coach Peter McCall was named Sun's new head coach
