The show is Sunday, November 20th, 12:30-2:00.



"Hope For Hannah" gets an edge on support as Anna earns Gold Girl Scout Award

When considering a topic for my Girl Scout Gold Award project I knew I wanted to do something that involved figure skating. I wasn't sure how to involve a great cause with skating until I went back to the beginning. I began skating when I was three years old because a dear family friend named Hannah introduced my sister and I to this fabulous sport. We all skated together in the Roseville Ice Show that year.

Hannah is a caring, funny and incredibly strong person. When Hannah was 16 she was diagnosed with acute Myasthenia Gravis. MG is a chronic autoimmune neuromuscular disorder that is characterized by fluctuating weakness of the voluntary muscle groups and is often difficult to diagnose. I know that most people have no clue what this disease is or how to help those afflicted. My Gold Award project was born, "Hope for Hannah." I teamed up the Roseville Figure Skating Club to hold an educational trade show the same day as the annual club exhibition held in January prior to the Duluth competition. Twenty six skaters participated in the exhibition and several organizations who have helped Hannah in her journey with MG participated in the trade show. The organizations who participated: the Minnesota chapter of the MG Foundation, Make a Wish Foundation, Memorial Blood bank, Be the Match, COTA (Childhood Organ Transplant Association), Beads of Hope, RFSC and the Roseville Skating School. The guest of honor, of course, was Hannah who displayed her huge collection of beads and spoke with many of the skaters and attendees. In addition to the skating exhibition and educational tradeshow I sponsored a blood drive at the Roseville Skating Center in late February.

I am happy to say I completed the requirements and received the Girl Scout Gold Award in May. I would like to thank the RFSC board for their support, the skating center for the use of the space, the skaters who participated, the coaches who always encouraged me and the many organizations who participated. It was a great success.

What has been your most memorable skating moment so far? Definitely when I landed my first double toe!

What are your goals after high school? I looking forward to finding a career path I love, but of course I will continue to skate!

Over the summer, the Board took steps to form a beginner level Synchro team. We identified a coach, monitored open-house style tryouts. We did not have 8 skaters sign up to form a team, which is the minimum numbers required under USFSA rules. We referred those families who expressed interest to Northern Fusion.
