TACKLING THE TIGERS

The U.S. National Under-18 Team's matchup with Princeton University on Saturday night will be the fifth alltime meeting. The U18s are 2-2 all-time against the Tiger. Their last matchup came last season when Clayton Keller tallied twice and Trent Frederic and Keenan Suthers added goals in a 4-1 victory on Dec. 12 at Hobey Baker Rink in Princeton, N.J. Jake Oettinger made 18 saves in the win for Team USA. The two teams first played on Oct. 26, 2002 when the Tigers earned a 3-1 victory over Team USA. The U18s have outscored the Tigers, 12-11, all-time in the series.

The Tigers have yet to play a game this season, but will square off with Michigan State University in East Lansing, Michigan on Friday night before making the trip to USA Hockey Arena on Saturday. Last season the Tigers were 5-23-3 overall and 3-16-3 in ECAC play. Max Veronneau, the Tigers leading goal scorer from a year ago, returns to lead the Tigers offense. Senior goaltender Colton Phinney, who appeared in 30 games for the Tigers last year, returns as the starting goaltender.

NTDP/PRINCETON PLAYER HISTORY

Prior to the 2016-17 season, the National Team Development Program had sent one player on to the Princeton University.

Matt Maglione, who played for the NTDP from 1999-2000 appeared in 115 games for the Tigers from 2000-2004 and registered 15 goals and 46 points in his collegiate career. At this time, no current NTDP player has committed to Princeton University.

NCAA OPPONENTS

The U.S. National Under-18 Team will skate in 17 NCAA games this season, including 12 tilts with Division I squads. This weekend concludes a challenging seven-game schedule in October alone, which included five teams ranked in the most recent USA Today / USA Hockey Magazine Men's College Hockey Poll.

Team USA picked up their first victory against an NCAA opponent last Saturday night when Michael Pastujov (Bradenton, Fla.) scored with 32 seconds remaining in regulation to break a 1-1 tie with the second-ranked University of Minnesota Duluth at AMSOIL Arena in Duluth, Minnesota. Brady Tkachuk (St. Louis, Mo.) scored a short-handed goal in the second period to tie the game. **Dylan St. Cyr** (Northville, Mich.) made 32 saves en route to picking up his third win of the season.

Prior to their win over the Bulldogs, Team USA traveled to Madison to take on the University of Wisconsin at the Kohl Center on Friday night. Despite a late comeback attempt, the U18s lost 4-3. **Jacob Tortora** (Victor, N.Y.) tallied two goals in the game while **Tommy Miller** (West Bloomfield, Mich.) added two assists. **Dylan St. Cyr** (Northville, Mich.) made 24 saves on 28 shots.

Prior to their matchup with the Badgers, the U18s traveled to Maricucci Arena to take on the University of Minnesota on Friday, Oct. 14. They fell to the eighthranked Golden Gophers, 9-0. Other games this month included a 5-2 loss to Harvard University (Oct. 8), a 8-2 loss to secondranked Boston University (Oct. 6) and a 5-1 loss to the University of Notre Dame.

Princeton is one of two teams that will skate against the Under-18 Team at USA Hockey Arena. Arizona State University will visit for a pair of matchups on Feb. 24 and 25.

5 NATIONS

The U.S. Under-18 National Team will compete in the Under-18 Five Nations Tournament at USA Hockey Arena in Plymouth, Michigan, from Nov. 1-5. They welcome the top under-18 players from the Czech Republic, Finland, Sweden and Switzerland during the four day tournament. Each team will compete in four games, with points awarded for wins (3), overtime wins (2) and overtime losses (1). The first-place team will be determined based on final point standings. The U.S. has finished first at this event seven times (2013-14, 2010-11, 2009-10, 2008-09, 2007-08, 2005-06 and 1999-2000).

WORLD UNDER-17 HOCKEY CHALLENGE

The U.S. National Under-17 team will travel to Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario this week and next week to compete in the 2016 World Under-17 Hockey Challenge. This is the first international competition for this group as they will take on three different Canadian teams (Canada Red, Canada White and Canada Black), as well as teams from Finland, Russia, and Sweden.

The U.S. roster includes 20 full-time members of the 2016-17 U.S. National Under-17 Team, part of USA Hockey's National Team Development Program based in Plymouth, Michigan, and two players from the Lincoln Stars and Dubuque Fighting Saints of the United States Hockey League, respectively.

The U.S. has played in five of the last seven title matches in this event, and has earned first place four times (2001, 2002, 2010, January 2014). Team USA had nine consecutive top-three finishes, stretching from 2006-14 (no event was held in 2007).

HARTMAN AND MOTTE COMBINE FOR FIRST NHL POINTS

Ryan Hartman, who played for the NTDP from 2010-12, recorded his first NHL goal for the Chicago Blackhawks on Wednesday, Oct. 12 in a 5-2 loss to the St. Louis Blues. He was assisted on the play by another NTDP alum, Tyler Motte, who played for the NTDP from 2011-13. The duo recorded their first points of their career in their rookie seasons for the Blackhawks. Hartman was drafted in the first round and Motte in the fourth round by the Blackhawks in the 2013 NHL Entry Draft.

TKACHUK AND WERENSKI SCORE FIRST NHL GOALS

Matthew Tkachuk, who played for the NTDP from 2013-15, recorded his first NHL goal for the Calgary Flames on Tuesday, Oct. 18 in a 4-3 win against the Buffalo Sabres. Tkachuk was drafted sixth overall by the Flames in the 2016 NHL Entry Draft. His younger brother, **Brady Tkachuk**, currently plays for the Under-18 team, and his father, Keith Tkachuk is a U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Inductee who played 19 seasons in the NHL and is one of only four Americanborn players to score 500 career NHL goals.

Zach Werenski, who skated for the NTDP during the 2013-14 season, tallied his first NHL goal for the Columbus Blue Jackets on Oct. 15 in their 3-2 loss to San Jose. The University of Michigan product was drafted by the Blue Jackets eighth overall in the 2015 National Hockey League Entry Draft.

MATTHEWS SETS DEBUT RECORD

Auston Matthews, who played for the NTDP from 2013-15, recorded four goals in his NHL debut for the Toronto Maple Leafs on Wednesday, Oct. 12 against the Ottawa Senators. This marks the most goals scored by a player making his debut in NHL history. Hewasawarded the NHL's Second Star of the Week for his opening night performance.

59 ALUMS ON OPENING NIGHT ROSTERS

A total of 59 NTDP alumni were named to NHL opening night rosters across the league. These alums are spread across 21 different NHL rosters.

NTDP COACHES' COLLEGE PATHS

All four coaches on the U.S. National Under-18Teamstaffhaveties to Division I college hockey programs. Head coach **John Wroblewski**, a "pioneer" on the inaugural roster of the NTDP started in 1997, skated for Team USA for two seasons (1997-99) before suiting up for the University of Notre Dame.

A four-year letterwinner with the Irish (1999-2003), Wroblewski captained two squads over his tenure, served as alternate captain during his senior year and was the winner of the Notre Dame Monogram Club's Most Valuable Player Award. He was also recognized as the Irish nominee for the college hockey Humanitarian Award and the CCHA's Mike and Marian Ilitch Community Service Award. Wroblewski graduated with a degree in finance from Notre Dame.

Assistant coach **Nick Fohr**, in his sixth season with the NTDP, has seen his career transition from undergraduate assistant coach at Miami University (2002-03) to assistant coach at the University of Nebraska Omaha (2007-10), where he also served as director of hockey operations from 2004-07 and 2010-11. Prior to his coaching days, Fohr played four seasons with the University of Nebraska Omaha Mavericks (1998-2002), where he majored in exercise science.

Intern assistant coach **Greg Moore** is another returning NTDP player who skated with the U.S. National Under-17 and Under-18 Teams (2000-02). Following his NTDP career, Moore laced his skates up for the University of Maine men's hockey program (2002-06). Moore was selected as team captain during his senior season, was a top-10 finalist for the Hobey Baker Memorial Award and earned the Hockey East First Team and All-American First Team honors.

Kevin Reiter, now in his fourth season as goaltending coach at the NTDP, was a four-year letterwinner with the University of Alaska Anchorage. He earned a degree in management and economics before obtaining his

masters of business administration at the University of Winchester in England.

NHL CENTRAL SCOUTING

Eighteen players on the U.S. National Under-18 Team were named to the NHL Central Scouting's preliminary players to watch list, released last week. Seven of those players were listed as "B" prospects, indicating potential second or third round picks in the upcoming 2017 NHL Entry Draft. The other 11 NTDP players received "C" ratings, indicating fourth, fifth and sixth round candidates.

COLLEGE BOUND

Twenty of the 23 players on the U.S. National Under-18 Team are currently committed to NCAA Division I college hockey programs. University of Michigan leads the way with four commits, followed by Boston College, Boston University and University of Wisconsin with three each. University of Minnesota and University of Notre Dame have two commits apiece, while Michigan State University, Penn State University and University of North Dakota each have one member of the U18s committed.
