

Dust-Tex captures 50 and over national

Mandan team wins title for second time

Mandan Dust Tex won the 50 and Over AAA National Championship in Burlington, North Carolina over the Labor Day weekend. It was the second national title in the 50 and Over division in the past

two years

Dust Tex won the same crown in 2008 and finished second in 2006 and 2009.

Dust Tex split two games in pool play leading into the bracket play

but sailed through the bracket division winning four straight games without a loss.

In their first game in bracket play, Dust Tex beat Milford, Connecticutt 12 to 6 and then handled Cedar Lake, Indiana 23 to 10 before winning twice against Concord, North Carolina 26 to 9 and 21 to 5 to grab the National title.

Dust Tex choose to compete in the East Division of the 50 and Over group due to a small number of teams entered in the West Division held in Topeka, Kansas.

Six members of the Dust Tex team were named to the All American squad at the conclusion of the

tournament. They include pitcher Gordy Smith, Catcher Ron Geffre, infielder Steve Harrington, shortstop Tim Michelsen, and outfielders Tim Krahler and Dennis Wolff. Michelsen was named tournament Most Valuable Player and Wolff captured the batting championship.

Fargo Sperle Masonry claims second in 35 and over national tournament

North Dakota's Division I slow pitch state champion Fargo Sperle Masonry spent the weekend of September 9 and 10 in Decatur, Alabama where the team captured second place in 35 and Over National Tournament. The tournament featured teams and individuals from around the country who have played on the USA National Slow Pitch team for the ESPN Border Battle with Canada. Many of the players in this tourney are regarded as the best slow pitch players in the same today

Sperle opened the tournament with a 14 to 10 win over a team

from Salem, Indiana and followed with a decisive win over a local team from Decatur 20 to 5. In their third game, they defeated a team from Smyhna, Georgia 13 to 6 before losing to the Homewood, Alabama Fence Brokers 19 to 6. Sperle came back to again beat the team from Georgia in a battle of big bats 29 to 25 before losing the final to Fence Brokers again 28 to 8.

Kelly Wrangham, Bob Piatz, and Perry Piatz were all named to the All Tournament Team and Wrangham was declared the batting champion with a hefty .850

Fargo women win Northern National Agassiz Underground goes 4 and 0 for title

Fargo's Agassiz Underground followed up their state tournament title by dominating the eight team field to claim the Northern National Women's Class C championship. North Dakota placed teams in the first three spots of this national event played in Minot over the Labor Day weekend.

Agassiz won it's opener 10 to 2 over Learning Curve from Iowa and followed up with a 17 to 2 drubbing of Burnt Creek Club from Bismarck. In the unbeaten clash, Agassiz won a slugfest over Moritz Sports of Bismarck 21 to 16 to reach the championship game. Moritz came back through the loser's bracket to gain another shot at the Fargoans but to no avail as Agassiz put up 13 runs in the first half of the first inning and rolled to a 22 to 3 win for the title.

Moritz had advanced to the unbeaten game with wins over Dayle Veches of Monticello, Minnesota 14 to 4 and Saunder's of Minot 20 to 6. After their loss in the unbeaten game, Moritz came back against Tharaldson's of Fargo 12 to 3.

Agassiz placed five players on the All Tournament team including home run champion Kelsey Proel and batting champion Nicole Nelson. Jesse White was named as an infielder along with Jill Devries while Sarah Brutlag earned honors as an outfielder.

Runner-up Moritz Sports placed three on the All Tournament team with Julie Yantzer, Angelena Mexicano and Andrea Brunskell earning the honors.

Tharaldson's of Fargo which finished in third place landed three players on the All Tournament team with Lindsey Spoonland, DaLee Wilkinson and Lynn Larson being named to the team.

I had the pleasure of being the ASA Rep at the E/Rec Men's Northern National Slow Pitch Tournament in Bismarck over Labor Day weekend. Bismarck hosted 55 teams in this event which is the largest participation in the country for the E/Rec since its inception. Congratulations to Tournament Director Tim Kuntz, his staff, and the many volunteers who worked very hard to make this National Tournament a tremendous success.

We had two teams crowned as National Champions from North Dakota in 2010. Dustex of Mandan won the Men's Senior 50 AAA Slow Pitch National Tournament in Burlington, North Carolina, and Fargo Agassiz Underground won the Women's C Northern National Slow Pitch Tournament held in Minot. Congratulations to both teams and sponsors for reaching this milestone.

North Dakota sent 45 teams to ASA National Tournaments in 2010. A large part of this participation was for the E/Rec MSP held in Bismarck. It is great to see teams take advantage of participating in these National Championships when they are so close to home.

The JO GFP State Tournament's had the largest participation ever this year in West Fargo. The plan is to rotate these tournaments east/ west every other year. Bismarck will host these events in 2011. JO Commissioner Bill Butterfield and his assistants Pat Johnson of West Fargo and Brian Neuhardt of Bismarck worked very hard this past year to develop this program and are seeing great success. Great job guy's and thanks for all your work. We look forward to a bright future in the GFP program in North Dakota

The ASA Equipment Committee has been working the last couple of years on a potential new ball certification. The committee asked ball manufacturers for their input as to specifications for a prototype softball. Through field testing in game like conditions, as well as lab testing, the Equipment Committee found very positive results of this prototype ball and will propose an additional ball certification at the ASA National Council meeting this November. The proposed rule change to allow an additional certification for slow pitch effective 2011 will have the following specifications.

• COR to be a maximum of .52 • Compression to be a maximum • Weight to be a minimum of 6.250 oz

• Size to be minimum of 11.875

The Equipment Committee has seen positive effects in testing this ball as to reduced batted ball speed (BBS) resulting in increased reaction time, the ball being less affected by extreme temperature conditions, as well as reduced impact force on the body from a batted or thrown ball. This proposal must be approved by 60% of the voting members at the annual council meeting to be approved for ASA play in 2011.

In early November I will be traveling to Shreveport for the annual ASA National Council Meeting. We will be discussing many issues regarding rules and legislation for all aspects of the game, as ASA is the National Governing Body of Softball in the United States. Mandan will be bidding on National Tournaments this year and we wish them much success.

Lastly I would like to recognize a friend of softball in North Dakota for many years. Kathy Stefonek, of Jamestown has been the NDASA Tournament Coordinator, Executive Board Member, Asst. JO Slow Pitch Commissioner, and a key member of the NDASA program for as long as I can remember. Kathy is

I did have the opportunity to be the Umpire in Chief at the Women's Northern National Class C and Class D tournaments in Minot over Labor Day and enjoyed some excellent play and watched some great North Dakota teams win the first three places in the Class C Division. We were disappointed at the low turnout of teams with only eight signed up for the Class C and eleven for the Class D but everything went very well and I think the teams had a good experience as did the eight umpires assigned

to the tournament.

I was glad to get the assignment in Minot as I was feeling a bit out of everything with no responsibilities except for my own games I worked each week. It's been a while since I didn't have to think about scheduling and evaluating umpires and while it's kind of a relief it's also a bit of a let down after all the years supervising umpires.

Next year I probably won't have the chance to do that since we don't have as many National tournaments in the Northern Region in 2011. This past season we had a Northern National in Bismarck the same weekend we had the tournament in Minot and we also had a Northern National in Rochester the same weekend so I got a shot at being a UIC.

2010 was a good year for North Dakota softball with the women's class C state champion Agassiz Underground of Fargo winning the Northern National Crown in Minot over two other North Dakota teams, Moritz Sports from Bismarck and Tharaldson Enterprises of Fargo. In addition, Dust Tex on Mandan captured the Men's 50 and Over AAA title in Burlington, North

Carolina. It was their second title in three years wrapped around two second place finishes.

West Fargo VFW was the runner up in the E/Rec Northern National in Bismarck where 55 teams competed for the title and Sperle Masonry of Fargo claimed second place in the 35 and Over National tournament held in Decatur, Alabama. Several North Dakota players, both men and women, were named to All American teams or All Tournament teams.

The national council meeting of the Amateur Softball Association will be held in Shreveport, Louisiana from November 6 thru 10. The North Dakota delegation will consist of state commissioner Jim Hanley of Grand Forks, state president Dick Gulmon of Valley City and state umpire in chief Mike Wolf. I will go along as an interested spectator and hopefully I can help Mandan land a national tournament bid for 2012. National tournaments are bid and awarded two years in advance to allow cities time to properly prepare for these popular events. Bismarck will host the Men's Class C Northern National in 2011.

Enjoy the off season and I hope to see many of you around the diamonds next season.



I wish to thank all of the people who spent much extra time to see that the season was so successful. I would have to go on and on in listing each so I thank you all who gave so much—players, officers, fans, etc. I do have a special thank you to Tharaldson Enterprises who have been so faithful each year in providing the state, regional, and national trophies for NDASA.

One special person, who is ending her time as JO Executive Board Member, Kathy Stefonek, is going to be missed in the future. Kathy has put in many hours working with

I extend a special welcome to the new inductees to NDASA's Hall of Fame. They are Chris Assel, Doug Berg, Jack Jones, Mike Lyman, Kyle Magnuson and Rose Kreitinger. It was a very special day for these people, shown by the number of people in attendance.

Congratulations to Bismarck and Minot who hosted national tournaments this fall. These tournaments were successfully run which was reflected in the exit surveys.

Participation in NDASA activities were about the same as last year. About 1600 adult teams were registered with JO slow pitch teams at 440. JO fast pitch girls softball registered about 900 individuals this year an increase of about 250 girls.

The GFP program is constantly growing. All registration in GFP is done individually. This program has grown from zero registrations two years ago to where it is today. Anticipation is that this program will grow next year when registration of the GFP High School League will be available in late winter. Registrations of this league did not occur this year due to problems with the registration system which has now been repaired. Registration in 2011 will be the same for GFP. Three people have been very helpful in registering and getting this program off the ground—Bill Butterfield, new JO GFP Commissioner, Brian Neuhardt and Pat Johnson. Without these three, our program would not have been so successful. In fact, the state tournament in West Fargo registered 31 teams with expectation of more involvement in 2011. The 2011 state tournament will be held in Bismarck. This includes all levels of play.

Many umpires had the opportunity to work national tournaments this past year. Lyle Rader of Wahpeton worked the Major MFP Tournament in South Bend, Indiana and Craig Hahn of Grand Forks worked the JO GFP Gold 18U Tournament in Oklahoma City. These are the top tournaments of ASA. Congratulations to each of you, but also to the many others who also worked nationals.



Ump Chat

As usual, the season went by way too quickly. Even though we go into October with Fall leagues, it is hard to believe that our season is over. We have to utilize the window of opportunity to play softball in ND and it seemed as though everyone enjoyed the season and we made it through without any major issues.

We recently finished hosting another successful national soft-ball tournament in North Dakota. Bismarck was host to the Men's E Northern Territory National Tournament. Fifty-five teams competed in the tournament and a team from Iowa won the national champion-ship over the West Fargo VFW team. North Dakota teams did very well competing against teams from Minnesota, Iowa, Nebraska, and South Dakota

I was very fortunate to serve as the Umpire-In-Chief for this national tournament. Terry O'Clair served as the Umpire Coordinator and Rich Skorheim from Huron, SD, was the assistant UIC. We had a great crew of eighteen umpires who worked this tournament. It was also a great learning experience for the umpires as twelve of the eighteen umpires were umpiring in their first national tournament.

I had worked out trade arrangements with other regions around the country and in addition to the umpires I selected from North Dakota, we had umpires from Nebraska, South Dakota, Montana, Michigan, and Idaho. Along with our selection of quality ND umpires, the UIC's from the other states did a great job in sending quality umpires to Bismarck. Dick Gulmon served as the ASA Representative and his knowledge and experience are always so valuable in helping make the tournament run smoothly. We are hoping Bismarck will receive an excellent rating on their tourna-

In order to effectively evaluate the abilities of a crew of eighteen umpires in addition to Rich Skorheim and myself heading the evaluation process, I decided to enlist the services of some experienced umpires to assist me in this process. I chose North Dakota Deputy UIC's Allan Ziemann and Elliott Gerhardt from Bismarck and Tim Watts and Tommy Borucki from Lincoln, NE

to assist me in the evaluation process. All of these individuals have earned their "Elite Umpire" status with ASA which lends a lot of credibility to the evaluation process.

These individuals did a great job! Tommy, Tim, Allan, and Elliott each donated all of their time and expenses to get to Bismarck and worked the entire weekend evaluating umpires, documenting their observations, and then met with the umpires to offer suggestions on ways to improve their umpiring skills and to reinforce them on what they were doing well. When it came time to determine who would be working the final day, the evaluations proved to be invaluable.

Terry O'Clair did a tremendous job taking care of all the arrangements to make sure the umpires had anything and everything they needed. We received several positive comments on the quality of umpiring and it is a compliment of everyone's umpiring abilities and the great job the umpires did. The umpires should all be proud of the efforts they put forth on the field!

I base my assumption that things went well on the number of calls I get from around the state when we have our state tournaments going on. Once again, the calls were virtually non-existent. I have a great crew of Deputy Umpires in Chief around the state that do an excellent job of handling situations that arise during tournaments, not to mention the great job they do handling situations throughout the season. I would like to personally extend my thanks and gratitude to the great job my DUIC's do—thanks to Tom Harty—Jamestown, Rock Healey-Grand Forks, Al Ziemann—Bismarck, Mike Lein—Fargo, Elliott Gerhardt—Bismarck/Dickinson, Naomi Erdahl—Western ND Fastpitch, Randy Olson—West Fargo, Don Daniel—Williston, Mike Nider—Bismarck, Ron Smith—Minot, and Lyle Rader—Eastern ND Fastpitch . I truly believe that the success of our umpiring program is based upon the people I have assisting me—so thank you everyone!!

In early November, I will be attending the ASA Council Meeting in Shreveport, LA. I am really looking forward to being able to see a lot of old friends and get to know many more people involved in ASA. I look forward to attending this council session as a voting member. Mandan will be in Shreveport bidding with the hopes of landing another national tournament for 2012.

2010 ASA Annual Council Meeting

The Amateur Softball Association, the National Governing Body of Softball in the United States, will host its 79th National Council Meeting at the Hilton Shreveport in Shreveport-Bossier, La., November

Council Members can go onto the ASA Portal to download the Proposed Code Change Form, Proposed Rule Change Form and the Proxy Request Form. Only Council Members can submit these forms.

The ASA National Council is comprised of about 300 voting members from all aspects of the sport. The National Council, which consists of ASA Commissioners or Commissioner Emeritus, Executive Director Emeritus, Council Member Emeritus, Regional Player Representatives, At-Large Player Representatives, Regional Junior Olympic Commissioners, Regional Umpires-In-Chief, Allied Members, Elite Athlete Reps, and Past Presidents, are charged with making decisions on legislative changes, rule changes and is solely responsible for awarding National

Championships to host cities across the country.

All changes to the ASA Code and/or Playing rules are made through a legislative process. The first step to enact code legislation is for a member of the ASA Council to submit proposed legislation to amend the ASA Code and/or Playing Rules. All code and playing rule amendments are then voted on by the ASA Council during the meeting.

More than 100 tournaments will be awarded on Tuesday, November 9th, cities across the country. More than 40 different cities will make their pitch to the National Council during its general session on Tuesday. More and more cities are realizing the value of hosting an ASA National Championship and are already preparing for the Shreveport and future meetings.

More than 1,000 people are expected to attend the Annual Trade Show of the 79th Annual Meeting of the Amateur Softball Association. The Trade Show will be held Saturday, November 6. Exhibit hours are 5:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Saturday (5-7 p.m. for council members only). The Trade Show will be held at the Convention Center connected to the Hilton Shreveport.

Booths will be assigned on a first come, first serve basis, with costs for a booth depending on which category the exhibitor is classified. Future Meetings

The 2011 ASA Annual Council Meeting, which was bid in 2009, was awarded to South Carolina ASA and will be held in Myrtle Beach. In 2010, the location will be decided for the 2012 meeting. Oklahoma City, Okla., which hosts the meeting every 5-years, will host in 2013. Cities interested in hosting the Annual Council Meeting are encouraged to contact their local ASA Association for details.





Plays and Clarifications

As the ASA Championship Season ends, It is a good time to update you on rules and mechanics as they apply to ASA Softball. It is time for all umpires to review the umpire rule book and umpire manual. If you are chosen to umpire a National Championship remember to stay focused, stay hydrated, and have a great time. You should appreciate the opportunity to represent your Local Association, your region, your territory and all of ASA. Remember, you are one of the best trained and prepared umpires in the country. This is one of the reasons why you have been selected to represent ASA in your National Championship. Good Luck and Good Umpiring.

This month's Plays and Clarifications address several items having to do with rules and mechanics. They are as follows:

Rule 3

Equipment.

A question was raised about uniform numbers. 'Is 0 and 00 the same uniform number and would they be allowed as legal numbers on the same team?" Rule 3 Section 6D states that 'an Arabic whole number (0-99) of contrasting color or outlined in contrasting, at least six inches high must be worn and visible on the back of all uniform shirts. No players on the team may wear identical numbers" This rule was changed in 2006 and the wording that I and 01 and 3 and 03 were examples of the same number was removed. This allows for more numbers for players to wear. How-

ever 1 and 01, as well as 3 and 03 are examples of different numbers, and can be worn by members of the same team during the game. This should clarify what numbers are not considered to be the same.

Rule 6

The ASA Council has passed an emergency playing rule change as per the ASA code. Playing Rule 6 Section 3 H (Slow Pitch): The ball must be delivered with perceptible arc and reach a height of at least 6 feet from the ground, while not exceeding a maximum height of 10 feet from the ground. This rule will now have an exception that Senior Slow pitch will play by the old rule of reach a height of at least 6 feet from the ground, while not exceeding a maximum height of 12 feet from the ground.

Rule 7

Batting Fast Pitch.

Play: B2 a slap hitter, is hit by a pitched ball while out in front of the batter's box. In a) that B 1 ducks to try to avoid being hit but is still struck in the head and b) B2 is hit before having the time to avoid being hit by the pitch.

Ruling: In a) If in the umpire's judgment the batter made an attempt to get out of the way, the umpire should award the batter IB. In b) since the batter made no attempt to get out of the way of the pitch this would be a dead ball and keep the batter up to bat.

ASA rules apply to a hit batter in three ways. Rule 7 Section 4H and M applies if the batter swung or prevented the ball from entering the strike zone. This would be a dead ball strike, Rule 8 Section IF: When a pitched ball not swung at nor called a strike touches any part of the batter's person including the hands or clothing. EFFECT: Dead Ball the batter Is entitled to first base without liability to be put out. EXCEPTION: If no attempt is made to avoid being hit, the batter will not be awarded 1B unless it is ball four.

ASA has always said that a pitch can fool a batter and they may not have time to get out of the way. Umpires should use the thought process of the ball does not belong in the box and the benefit of doubt is given to the batter. When the batter is in front of the batter's box the reaction time is decreased and they could be hit with the ball before they have time to react and get out of the way. In this case the umpire should use a similar thought process that the batter does not belong in front of the box and if the reaction time is reduced, the benefit of the doubt should be given to the pitcher.

So apply the rule and use common sense when determining when a batter makes an attempt to keep from getting hit while in the box does not have time to make an attempt or while in the front of the box makes no attempt to keep from being hit. Keep in mind, It will always be a dead hall and a batter will either be awarded 111 or stay at bat with a ball added to the count.

Rule-8 Section 4F

It was the first national championship win for the team which had played in six tournaments this season and won them all, losing only two tournament games all year.

In the first championship game, Des Moines used a four run fifth inning to break a 1 to 1 tie. That five run margin held up and forced another championship game which was all Iowa as they put up six runs in the second inning after sending 12 men to the plate and strung together seven straight hits after two
