The trend towards a (1)-4-2-3-1 team structure is becoming a regular feature at UEFA's youth age tournaments, meaning the lone striker has become a common sight. This has implications for UEFA Champions League and Senior International football.





Is European football developing a sufficient number of strikers to guarantee a supply of 'predators'?

Or is the modern day coach being pushed towards a strikerless formation simply because there is a shortage of strikers?





After watching the Barcelona attacking trio of Lionel Messi, Luis Suárez and Neymar (122 goals between them during the season) in action at the Berlin Final, the UEFA chief technical officer Ioan Lupescu, renewed debate by remarking "The reliance on South American strikers is becoming a problem in Europe." Seven of the ten leading scorers in the 2014/2015 Champions League were South American

The Role of the Lone Striker

- Show in front but especially in behind the defence
- A link player in attacking play
- A wall or target in and around the "18"
- Avoid being marked by CH's
- Or alternatively engage and distract the CH's





The Role of the Lone Striker

- A provider for others in scoring range
- Be in a scoring area
- GOAL SCORER





What are the

attributes /requirements

of the single striker?





- Tactical
- Technical
- Physical
- Mental





Tactical Attributes

- Blind side running to disappear and reappear later
- Timing of runs
- Choice of run
- Set up tight markers before losing them
- Speed/direction change on the run
- Understanding others' movement (aligning with no. 10)
- Understand moving of defenders for others to exploit





Technical Requirements

- First touch (including on the move at speed)
- Hold and protect the ball
- Escape front and rear pressure
- Use of body strength
- Running with the ball and keeping control
- Create for others including on the move at speed





Technical Requirements

- Clever quick feet in tight situations
- Decisive/correct finishing technique
 - (faints, swerve, placement, 'dink' over GK)
- Scoring in 1v1 with GK
- Scoring from distance, under pressure and on the run
- Instant scoring (1/2 touch)





Technical Practise

- Body work to retain the ball when under pressure
- Running with the ball
- Receiving the ball on the run at speed going towards goal
- Specific calculated runs to elude defenders
- Passing under pressure from behind (varied distances and disguised)





Technical Practise

- Lay of passes (minimal touches)
- Combination plays in approach situation
- Short range passing in and around the box
- Chest and head work when passing
- Long range striking at goal 25/30 yards
- Striking at goal with minimal touches off diagonal and spin type runs





Technical Practise

- Deceiving opponents before and in striking at goal
- Evading marking players
- Pressing opponents in possession
- Showing direction to and containing opponents in possession





Physical Attributes

- Speed
- Acceleration
- Agility
- Body Strength
- Feet Speed (with and without the ball)





Physical Attributes

- Change of speed + direction instantly
- Spring
- Ability to change 'stride'
 - -length, rate + direction
- Ability to adjust body to ball height, bounce, flight, on the move at speed





Mental Attributes / Requirements

- Courage
- Concentration
- Confidence
- Anticipation
- Game intelligence
- Awareness
- Determination
- Guile
- Composure





Ideal No. 9

- Rarely receives with back to goal, but can!
- Stretches opponent's back line both ways
- Always searching for the diagonal or through pass
- Attacks the back of opposition's defences
- Understands the effects of movements
- Can play with others and create
- Efficient 1v1
- Has pace, acceleration, agility and body strength
- Scores at around .75 goals per game/ 1 goal per 1.5 games?













Strikers Movements


Ball side movements


Far side movements


Around the penalty box


























AROUND THE PENALTY BOX - CF 9 drops off A to receive pass 1 from MF 6. MF 9 sets pass 2 for MF 8 to play pass 3 for "third man run" C by MF 6. CF 9 should spin B into box.
