M3 supports program improvement across city

The Minneapolis Afterschool Network held its "M3: Making Meaning with Multiple Data Sets" training Friday January 20th at the Davis Center to a group of youth work professionals. M3 was provided with the support of the Minneapolis Health Department, Minneapolis Community Ed and Ignite Afterschool.



The session was held in an effort to strategically accomplish YCB's Call to Action Goal 3: All Minneapolis young people have access to safe, quality opportunities to learn outside of the classroom. Based on immediate feedback, participating youth serving organizations plan to make significant strides in recognizing gaps and opportunities in their recruitment, program quality, and engagement of youth and parents.
