M3 event coming this January

Join the Minneapolis Afterschool Network Friday January 20th from 9:30am-3:30pm for “M3: Making Meaning with Multiple Data Sets” at the Davis Center Assembly Room located on 1250 W Broadway Avenue.

Making Meaning with Multiple Data Sets (M3) is a process led by a certified facilitator that supports organizations in using 2-4 data sets to intentionally reflect, plan and identify action steps to improve their afterschool programs. The key to this process is the M3 Huddle, a 6-hour session that brings program teams together to intentionally make meaning of their data and plan action steps. Programs should prepare their data before this session. The types of data that work best for M3 include: Quality Practices, Attendance/Participation, Youth Outcomes and Program Experience. MPS Data Dashboard: Community partner organizations and out of school time programs



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Minneapolis Public Schools hopes to make collecting out-of-school-time and community partner organization data easier with its [dashboard](#) including data collected by the MPS Research, Evaluation, Assessment, and Accountability department during the school year.

While many of the organizations included in this dashboard serve students who attend schools outside of the district, REAA can only report on MPS students.

MPS currently collects program rosters through direct REAA submission from community partner organizations, and or obtain them through the Minneapolis Community Education database (OYP), the Minneapolis Afterschool Network database (with program consent), or MPS Extended Learning records. MPS Athletics data is not currently included. In addition, any health-related program services protected by HIPAA are not included.

The data is presented by program type, including:

- Academic Enrichment: STEM, Literacy, Foreign Language
- Arts: Visual and Performing Arts, Music, Dance, Theatre
- Attendance/Truancy Prevention: Be@School
- Leadership: Youth Development
- Mentoring: Small group, 1:1
- Physical Health: Nutrition, Physical Activity
