Knights, Coyotes Seek Share Of NWC Title in Season Finale

Two early season high-flying football teams meet this afternoon in a last ditch effort to snag a share of the elusive 1969 Northwest Conference football title after two frustrating weekends for both teams.

Coach Roy Carlson's Lutes ripped off five victories in their first six games of the season, and College of Idaho grabbed five straight wins, but both have now gone three weeks without a victory. At one time it was PLU and College of Idaho at the top of the conference heap; now Linfield, Lewis and Clark and Whitman share the title with the winner of today's game destined to make the mixed-up 1969 race a four-way tie.

The Coyotes started downhill two weeks ago with a loss to Lewis and Clark in Portland before being stopped by Linfield last weekend in Caldwell. The Lutes have been upset also, first by Whitman in a high scoring tilt at Walla Walla, and last weekend by underdog Willamette.

So it should be fireworks this afternoon as both teams attempt to salvage a respectable year.

The Coyotes feature the top passer in the conference in senior quarterback Lon Troxel, but their main rushing threat is All-Conference halfback Joe Glaisyer. Troxel has a trio of fine receivers in Cisco Limbago, Tony English and Rob Waters and a dangerous return specialist in Everett Carolina.

Coach Roy Carlson will be depending on running back Dave Halstead, Dan Pritchard and Hans Lindstrom for the bulk of his attack. The Lute rushing offense is tops in the conference and broke the school rushing record last week.

In sophomore quarterback Jim Hadland, Carlson also has a passing threat. Hadland, in his first varsity year, has accounted for almost 1,200 yards in total offense, only the third player in PLU history to exceed 1,000 yards in a season.

This year's Lutes have also surpassed the school's season total offense mark, and need only 210 total yards today to exceed the 3,000 mark. On defense the Lutes are led by the defensive secondary of Tim Chandler, Doug Jansen and Jack Irion, who have accounted for 18 of PLU's 21 interceptions this season. They are one shy of a team record and five away from the Northwest Conference mark.

This afternoon's Homecoming halftime show will feature a series of activities in line with the theme "Mythical Marathon." The Homecoming mascot, Mergetroy the Trojan horse, and a group of valiant chariot racers will be on hand.





DOUG JANSEN, Senior Defensive Halfback No. 33



One of the fastest and most versatile members of PLU's football team is defensive halfback Doug Jansen, a four-year letterman.

A high school star at Sumner, Doug came to PLU as an offensive end and defensive back. He settled at the defensive halfback slot his freshman year and has been there ever since, but in addition has filled in at times as a split end and flanker.

During his four year career he has intercepted 16 enemy passes for a team that has snared 82 interceptions over the past four years, and has continually been high in team defensive statistics. He has started every game during his four years at PLU.

This year opposing teams have shunned the left side of the field, which has been manned by three four year lettermen including Jansen. Neil Bryant is at defensive end and Skip Miller plays corner line-backer, and the three have made yardage tough for opponents all season.



Jansen has fine speed, good hands and is a strong open field tackler. He earned All-Northwest Conference honorable mention last year and was named to the District I NAIA second team.

Married last summer, Doug makes his home in Puyallup. Upon graduation he plans to teach and coach at the high school level.





Lute All-America Candidates Anchor Offense and Defense

Two PLU seniors often mentioned as possible 1969
NAIA All-American candidates this season will be anchoring the Lute Offensive and defensive squads in PLU's grid finale this afternoon against College of Idaho.
Rick Johnson, 265-pound offensive tackle and an honorable mention All American last year, has been one of the prime reasons for the Lutes' record breaking offensive show this year. On defense, 180-pound safety Tim Chandler has led the Lutes all season in tackles assists and dler has led the Lutes all season in tackles, assists and interceptions.

Johnson has been plagued by injuries most of the season, but has seen yeoman's action in every game to date. The Lutes need only 210 yards total offense Saturday to reach the 3,000 yard mark, 500 yards more than the former school record, and much of the credit must go to the foregious blocking of Johnson and the vertex of fensive the ferocious blocking of Johnson and the veteran offensive

PLU also set a school rushing record Saturday and lead the conference in that category for the second consecutive year.

Rick, a commercial fisherman during the off-season, is completing his third year of varsity football. He came out of nowhere last year to earn selection on all regional post

season teams and mention on the All-American lists.

Chandler's inspired defensive play helped keep the Lutes at the top of the NWC defensive lists much of the season. Beginning with the fourth game of the 1968 season, Chandler grabbed 13 interceptions in 12 ball games, with one stretch of nine games in which he pilfered at least one pass. At present he is tied for the conference interception lead with seven.

In addition to his work in the secondary, he has consistently moved into the line to help stop the running game, recording 53 tackles in the process. He and teammate Jock Irion lead the Lutes with 107 and 109 defensive points respectively.

Chandler also came out of nowhere, turning out for collegiate football for the first time last season. He had originally intended to play basketball at PLU, but was convinced in his junior year that he had the ability to make the Lute football squad.

Johnson hails from Gig Harbor, while Chandler comes from Greeley, Colo.


