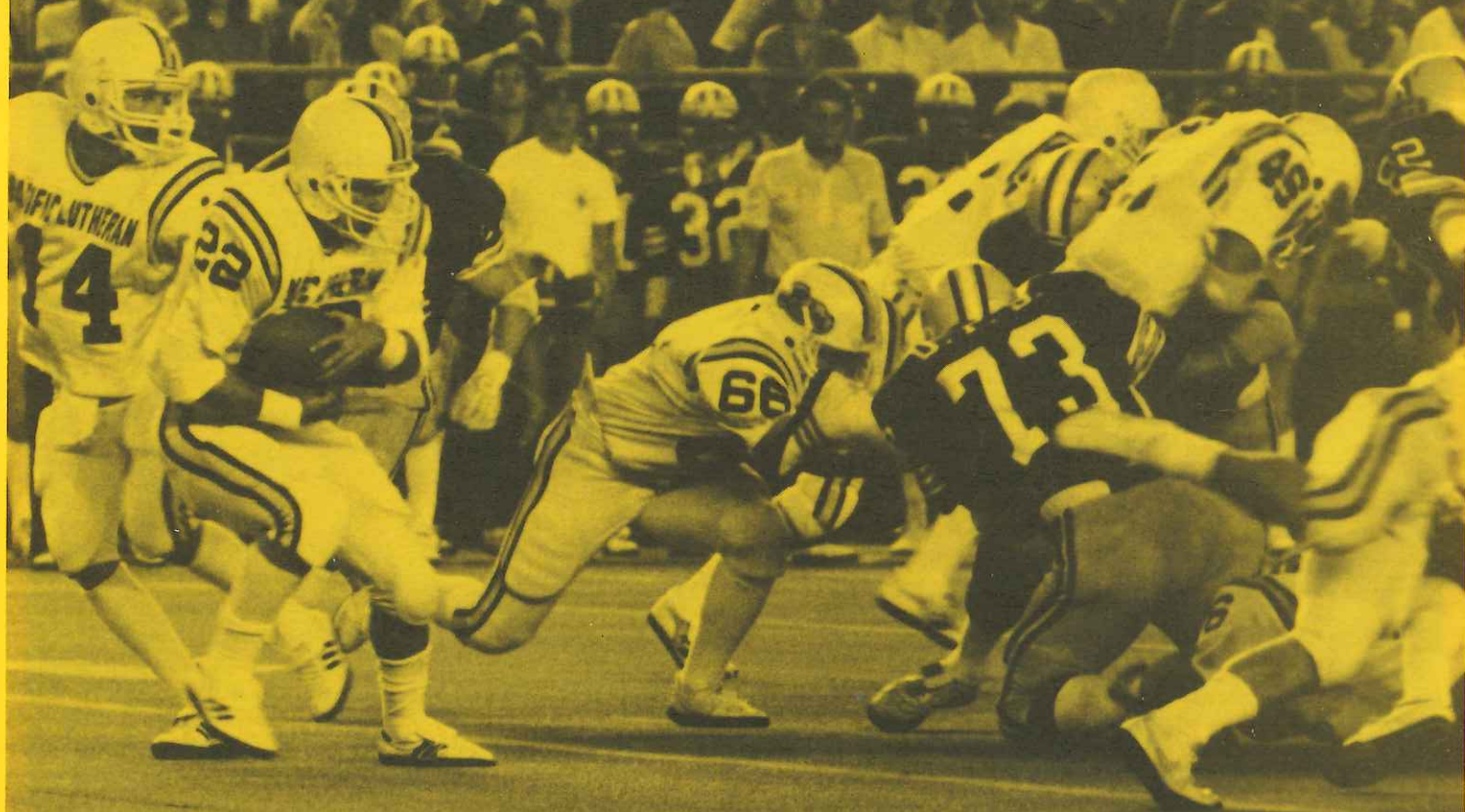

Today's game kicks off the NAIA Division II championship series with the winner aspiring for the national title won last year by Linfield OR in a dramatic 32-22 come-from-behind victory before a sell-out crowd in McMinnville, Oregon.

The two teams participating here today earned this distinction by their rankings in the final regular-season poll conducted by the NAIA. Division II playoff games are also being contested at three other sites today with all winners moving on to the semifinal round on December 7. Those two winners will meet in the 16th Annual Division II championship game on December 14.

Mary Nutter, volleyball and softball coach at Pittsburg State University, Pittsburg, Kansas, is serving as president of the NAIA Coaches Association for 1985-86. A subsidiary of the NAIA, the NAIAC includes more than 3,000 men's and women's coaches and is charged with responsibility for carrying on a program beneficial to the coaches of the Association.

NAIAC provides coaches in all sports with a strong voice in establishing rules and standards in each sport. The All-America Awards program is the responsibility of the Awards Committee, which is represented by the officers of the NAIAC.



Dr. Wayne Dannehl, Director of Athletics at the University of Wisconsin-Parkside, Kenosha, is representing the NAIA National Executive Committee for the Division II football championship series.

Dannehl is serving as fourth vice-president of the NAIA for the 1985-86 academic year.

All NAIA championship meets, games and tournaments are under the direct supervision and control of the NAIA National Executive Committee.

The 10-person National Executive Committee is the governing body elected by the membership of the NAIA at the Annual Meeting of the organization. The National Committee hires the Executive Director, who conducts the business of the organization from national headquarters in Kansas City, Missouri.

The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) is a completely autonomous association, currently administering programs of intercollegiate athletics to over 500 fully-accredited colleges and universities of moderate enrollment. The fundamental tenet of the NAIA is that intercollegiate athletics is an integral part of the total educational program of the institution. This belief is strongly reflected in the governing documents, activities and organizational structure of the Association.

HISTORY AND PURPOSE

Established in 1940 as the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball (NAIB), the NAIA emanated from a "National Small College Basketball Tournament" inaugurated in 1937 in Kansas City, Missouri. The conversion of the NAIB to the NAIA came in 1952 when the organization expanded beyond basketball and added national championship events in golf, outdoor track and field and tennis. Football, cross country, baseball and swimming were added to the championship event calendar in 1956, and wrestling (1958), soccer (1959), bowling (1962-78), gymnastics (1964), indoor track and field (1966), ice hockey (1968-84) and volleyball (1969- 80) were later additions.

Of major significance to the NAIA, was the establishment of the women's division within the Association on August 1, 1980. The NAIA decision to offer competitive opportunities and championships in women's athletics was passed by the membership following two years of study and proposals by an ad hoc committee on the implementation of a women's division in the NAIA. Currently, the Association conducts ten championship event programs for women in the sports of basketball, cross country, gymnastics, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, softball (fast pitch), soccer, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The initial purpose of the NAIA — to provide national championship athletic opportunities to institutions below the so-called "major" level — has indeed been well served. The Association clearly outlines its own responsibilities and those of its members: a sound athletics program, administered and controlled by those responsible for the administration of the institution. This means direct supervision in caliber of competition, financing of the program and taking steps to assure that financial assistance is made available only through the institution and under the same general policies as aid to all students. In short, the basic premise is that the athletics program is a basic component of the overall educational process and not an entity apart.

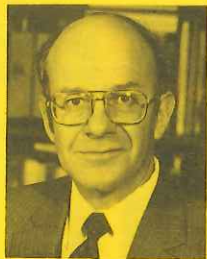

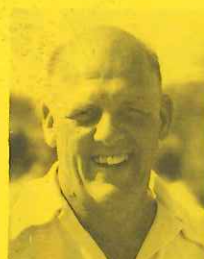


WILLIAM O. RIEKE
PRESIDENT

A man who graduated summa cum laude from Pacific Lutheran in 1953 and was awarded its highest alumni honor, Distinguished Alumnus, in 1970, returned to his alma mater as its eleventh president in August, 1975.

A University of Washington Medical School honors graduate (1958), he served for 17 years as a teacher and administrator within the field of medicine. He was one of the pioneers in organ transplant research. PLU's new state-of-the-art Rieke Science Center is named in his honor.

As an active member of the community, Dr. Rieke serves in many capacities on both standing and ad hoc committees. He retains associations in the medical profession and is a respected leader among private and public educators.



FROSTY WESTERING
HEAD COACH

It's an anomaly that one of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes' most eloquent and ebullient spokesmen should have his name linked to an X-rated product.

The Frosty Westering story is not one of expletives, but of excellence. Now completing his 14th season as Pacific Lutheran head coach, Dr. Westering has accrued numbers that underscore success. NAIA National Coach of the Year in 1983, Frosty has directed five teams to the national playoffs in the past seven years. His 1980 squad captured the NAIA crown. Among active NAIA Division II coaches, he is currently tied for the national lead in career victories.

A full professor in the School of Physical Education, Frosty's academic specialty is motivation and psychology. His Double-Win philosophy was the subject of a national television feature (WTBS) in September.

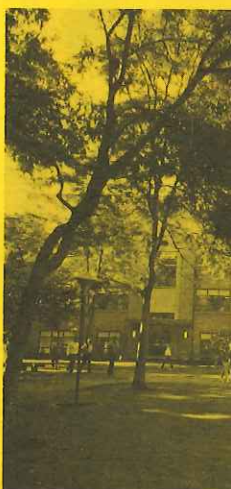


DAVID OLSON
ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

Currently the president of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics, Dr. David Olson is a widely recognized spokesman for amateur sports ideals.

Athletic Director and Dean of the School of Physical Education, Dr. Olson has been a member of the NAIA Executive Committee since 1978. He was one of five U.S. educators invited to the 1984 International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece.

A 1956 graduate of Concordia (MN), where he was a baseball letterman, Dr. Olson earned his Doctorate at the University of Iowa in 1966. Before coming to PLU in 1968, Olson served for eight years as Chairman of Athletics and Physical Education at Wartburg College.

PRESIDENT

Linfield College has grown and prospered during the 10 years Dr. Charles U. Walker has been president. When he arrived, the college had 850 students. This fall, 1,552 students are attending Linfield.

In that 10-year period, the college has joined with the Good Samaritan Hospital and Medical Center in Portland to create the Linfield-Good Samaritan School of Nursing; international study centers have been established in France, Austria, Japan and Costa Rica; the percentage of foreign students on campus has increased dramatically; a new science building has been constructed, and an athletic complex is in the planning stages.

Dr. Walker came to Linfield from Russell Sage College in Troy, New York, where he served as president from 1970-75. Prior to that he was vice president and dean of Hamline University in St. Paul, Minnesota, and dean of men and assistant professor of English at Rockford College, Rockford, Illinois.

He earned his doctorate in education and Latin American Studies from Stanford University, his master's degree from Columbia University and his bachelor's degree from the University of Pittsburgh.



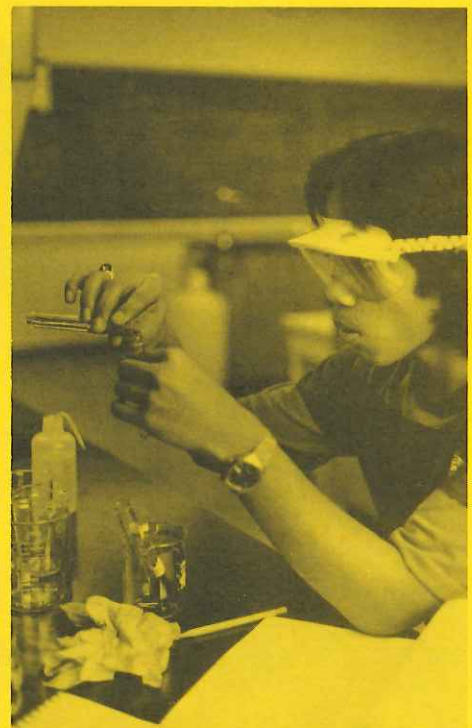
AD RUTSCHMAN
*MEN'S ATHLETIC
DIRECTOR
HEAD COACH*

In his 18-year career as head coach at Linfield, Ad Rutschman's football teams have won 13 conference championships, participated in post-season play nine times and captured two NAIA Division II national titles.

Going into this season, Rutschman was third in winning percentage (.797) and fourth in victories (130) among active Division II coaches. During the past 10 years, Linfield's .832 winning percentage has been the best in the nation.

As a student-athlete at Linfield, Rutschman won 12 varsity letters, four each in football, basketball and baseball. He still holds the college's career records for rushing yardage and rushing attempts.

After spending 13 years as a coach at Hillsboro (Oregon) High School, Rutschman returned to Linfield to become head football coach. He also was baseball coach from 1971-1983, winning a national title in 1971, and he has been athletic director since 1975. He has three times won the Slats Gill Man of the Year award, the most prestigious athletic honor in the state.
