TONIGHT'S GAME

The U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team faces the Olympic Athletes from Russia tonight in the third and final preliminary round games for both teams at the XXIII Olympic Winter Games. Team USA is the visiting team, will wear its white jersey and occupy the right bench (from the player's perspective looking onto the ice). Today's game will be televised on NBCSN and streamed live at NBCOlympics.com.

THE LATEST

LINEUP TONIGHT

Ryan Zapolski will get the call in goal tonight for Team USA. Zapolski has played the first two games for the U.S. in the Olympic tournament and picked up his first ever Olympic win yesterday with 21 saves in a 2-1 victory over Slovakia. He made 22 saves in a 3-2 overtime loss to Slovenia in his Olympic debut on Feb. 14. Zapolski plays for Jokerit of the KHL and leads the league in shutouts with nine. He played NCAA Division I college hockey at Mercyhurst College in Erie, Pa. Goaltender Brandon Maxwell, defenseman Will Borgen, and forward Jim Slater will not dress tonight.

LOOKING TO WIN GROUP

The U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team looks to win its group for the third straight Olympic Winter Games and earn a bye directly to the quarterfinals. In 2014, the U.S. beat Slovakia (7-1), Russia (3-2, SO), and Slovenia (5-1) to win its group, while in 2010, the U.S. downed Switzerland (3-1), Norway (6-1) and Canada (5-3) to earn the bye. A U.S. win in any fashion tonight against Russia will secure the bye for Team USA.

ALL-TIME VS. OAR (RUSSIA) IN THE OLYMPICS

The U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team is 1-1-0-2-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) all-time against OAR (Russia) at the Olympics. The teams last met in the preliminary round of the last Games in 2014, with the U.S. earning a 3-2 shootout win. T.J. Oshie scored four times in a dramatic eight-round shootout to help propel the U.S. to victory.

TWO-GOAL PERFORMANCES

Ryan Donato's two-goal performance yesterday marked the seventh time a U.S. men's player has scored two or more goals in a single Olympic game since 2006. The others are below.

U.S.-RUSSIA IN DEUTSCHLAND CUP

The U.S. and Russia faced off in the Deutschland Cup on Nov. 11, 2017, in Augsburg, Germany, with Russia gaining a 5-2 victory. The U.S. had a 32-25 edge in shots on goal, but Russia used three straight power play goals after a 2-0 U.S. lead to help propel it to victory. Of the 22 players in the lineup tonight for Team USA, 10 dressed in the game vs. Russia in the Deutschland Cup. Russia's Olympic roster contains four members of the team that the U.S. faced in the Deutschland Cup.

GIONTA PARENTS HERE

After originally not intending to attend the Olympics, Brian Gionta's wife Harvest sensed his parents -- Sam and Penny -- were having having second thoughts after watching game one on TV. She went into action to see how quickly she could arrange flights, accommodations, and tickets and after all was in place, she called them and told them of the arrangements. Brian had no idea they were coming until they were in the air and on their way. They went from Rochester, N.Y., to Chicago and onto Seoul and arrived here in Gangneung just in time for yesterday's 12:10 p.m. game against Slovakia. They are here for the duration of the Games.

HEARTWARMING

U.S. defenseman **James Wisniewski**, who has 552 NHL regular season games on his resume, has had four ACL knee surgeries -- three on his right knee and one on his left. At 33, prior to knowing he might have the

chance to play in the Olympics, he considered retiring. But with the Olympics a possibility, he wanted to give it a shot and has spent the year in Germany playing for Kassel. His Olympic dream has become reality and on the ice following yesterday's win vs. Slovakia, he got to share a special moment with his daughter Jamie when he skated over to the glass



and wished her a happy (5th) birthday and told her he loved her. His wife, mom and dad, little sister and other daughter were there at the glass too.

TIDBITS

Ryan Donato scored two power play goals yesterday to help propel the U.S. to a 2-1 win over Slovakia. Donato and his father Ted, who played for Team USA in the 1992 Olympic Winter Games, are the only father-son tandem to both score a goal in the Olympics for the U.S. There are four total father-son combos that have played for the U.S. in Olympic men's ice hockey history, also including Bob (1980), Bill (1960) and Dave Christian (1980), Ryan Suter (2010, 2014) and Ed (1956) and Gary Sampson (1984) ... Following last night's game, Abby and Ellie Johannson, the wife and daughter of U.S. general manager Jim Johannson, were presented with the game puck in the team's lockerroom. Jim Johannson unexpectedly passed away at the age of 53 in the early morning hours of Jan. 21, 2018, at this home in Colorado Springs, Colo. In addition, John Johannson, brother of Jim Johannson, was on hand to present the U.S. player of the game award to Ryan Donato ... After losing its first game and winning its second in an Olympic tournament, the U.S. is 3-3-0 in its third game ... Ryan Donato is the first player with Harvard roots to score a goal in the Olympics for the U.S. men since Ted Drury tallied on Feb. 26, 1994, in a 4-3 loss to Germany ... **Ryan Donato** is Team USA's leading point getter with 2-1--3. His father, Ted, co-led the 1992 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team in points with 4-3-7 with Marty Mclinnis (5-2--7) and Tim Sweeney (3-4--7). ... Wisniewski is the fourth member of the gold medal-winning 2004 U.S. National Junior Team to play in the Olympics. That 2004 team was the very first group to win the gold medal in the IIHF World Junior Championship. Other Olympians from that team are Ryan Suter, Zach Parise and Ryan Kesler ... The U.S. National Under-18 Team rallied from a 3-0 deficit to beat Russia, 5-4, Friday night at the Five Nations Tournament being hosted by the U.S. in Plymouth, Michigan. The U.S. can win the event with a victory tomorrow against Finland.

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TIDBITS FROM PREVIOUS GAME NOTES

Brian O'Neill and Jordan Greenway scored in their Olympic debut Wednesday (Feb. 14) vs. Slovenia. The last players previously to score in their first Olympic game came in 2010 when Ryan Malone, Bobby Ryan and David Backes tallied in their first ever Olympic game -- a 3-1 win over Switzerland on Feb. 16 ... Of the 22 players that dressed for Wednesday's (Feb. 14) game vs. Slovenia, all but Brian Gionta were making their Olympic debut. In addition, John McCarthy played his first-ever game for a U.S. national team at any level. ... Jordan Greenway celebrated his 21st birthday on Friday (Feb. 16) in South Korea ... Team USA has a large contingent of family and friends here in South Korea. Chad Billins, Jonathon Blum and Noah Welch each have 10 guests. For five players



Blum, Chris Bourque, Chad Kolarik, David Leggio, Bobby Sanguinetti -- both their wife and child(ren) are here, along with others in some cases ... Team USA is tied with Slovenia as the second oldest in the tournament in average age at 30, trailing only Canada at 31. Teams range in average age from 27 to 31. Further, the U.S. is tied as the

shortest team in the tournament at 1.82 meters and 11th in average weight at 190 pounds. Slovakia is the tallest (1.87) and heaviest (201) of any team in the tournament on average ... Five U.S. players arrived in Gangneung the evening of Feb. 7, while 17 others arrived the evening of Feb. 8. **Brian** Gionta, Bobby Sanguinetti and Ryan Bourque had travel delays and didn't arrive until just after Team USA's practice on Feb. 9 concluded ... The U.S. had six practices before its first game on Feb. 14 vs. Slovenia. The first practice included all but the three players above, with the other practices including all 25 rostered players ... Captain Brian Gionta was in studio with NBCSN's Liam McHugh the morning of Feb. 13. Gionta, Noah Welch, Jim Slater and Bobby Butler visited NBC's Today Show that night, including an on-air session with Al Roker. The foursome also took a photo with Olympic gold medalist Chloe Kim ... Anne Thompson from NBC Nightly News sat down in stands at Gangneung Hockey Centre following practice on Saturday (Feb. 10) with Broc Little, Marc Arcobello and Brian O'Neill to talk about their roots at Yale University. She also spoke to U.S. assistant coach Keith Allain, who is the head coach at Yale. The piece is expected to air in the U.S. on Feb. 16 ... The 2018 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team is the third oldest in the nation's history with an average age of 29.96. A complete list of average age by team is found elsewhere in these notes ... Boston University, which leads all NCAA programs with four players on the Team USA roster, held an athletic department watch party Team USA's opening game vs. Slovenia. The same happened at USA Hockey's national headquarters in Colorado Springs, Colo. ... Many players have taken the opportunity to get out and watch other Olympic events ... Brian Gionta scored 425 in a Yahtzee game here in South Korea against David Leggio and Jim Slater, a score that included two Yahtzees It is believed that Chris Bourque (U.S.)/Ray Bourque (Canada) and Paul Stastny (U.S.)/Peter Stastny (Czechoslovakia/Slovakia) are the only two father-son combos who have played in the men's ice hockey tournament in the Olympics representing different countries.

NTDP ROOTS

Five members of the U.S. Olympic squad played at USA Hockey's National Team Development Program in Ann Arbor, Mich., including Jordan Greenway, Chad Kolarik, Brandon Maxwell, Ryan Stoa and Troy Terry.

FAMILY AFFAIR

Ryan Donato's father, Ted, was a member of the 1992 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team and Chris Bourque's father, Ray, played for Canada at the 1998 Winter Olympics. Matt Gilroy's father-in-law, John Taft, served as captain for Team USA at the 1976 Olympic Winter Games.

NHL EXPERIENCE

Fifteen of the 25 players on this year's U.S. Olympic Men's Team have played in the NHL, combining for 3,083 games. That group is led by captain Brian Gionta, who has 1,006 games of experience across 15 seasons. The others include Jim Slater (584), James Wisniewski (552), Matt Gilroy (225), Mark Arcobello (139), Bobby Butler (130), Jonathon Blum (110), John McCarthy (88), Noah Welch (75), Chris Bourque (51), Bobby Sanguinetti (45), Ryan Stoa (40), Brian O'Neill (22), Chad Billins (10) and Chad Kolarik (6).

SEAN BRAZIEL

Sean Braziel, a retired lieutenant colonel in the U.S. Marine Corps, is the team leader for the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team. In his career, Braziel deployed to more than 27 countries and served in 13 separate combat deployments. In his final position during his 22 years of active service, he was the deputy commander for Marine Corps Intelligence Activity, in Quantico, Virginia-the 1,200 person civilian and military Service Intelligence Center.

JOHANNSON PRESENCE

U.S. general manager Jim Johannson passed away unexpectedly in the early morning hours on Jan. 21, 2018, at his home in Colorado Springs, Colo., at the age of 53. Johannson's wife Abby and their two-year-old daughter Ellie are here for the Games as is Johannson's brother John. There is a locker stall dedicated to Johannson in the team's dressing room and all members of Team USA have JJ T-shirts and coins. Other remembrances include a patch inside both the practice and game jerseys and JJ pins.



CAPTAIN AMERICA

Brian Gionta is captain of the 2018 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team. Gionta, who played for Team USA at the 2016 Olympic Winter Games in Torino, Italy, has skated in 1,006 career NHL regular-season contests. The U.S. has three alternate captains in defensemen Matt Gilroy and Noah Welch and forward Jim Slater. Two of the three will serve as alternates for each game, with Gilroy and Welch serving the role for tonight's game.

Team USA massage therapist **Peewee Willmann**, who has been part of the support staff of U.S. teams since 2009, will re-join rock group Depeche Mode on its tour following the Olympics. It is Willmann's first foray into being a massage therapist for a music group.

2018 OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES

The U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team is one of 12 teams competing at the 2018 PyeongChang Winter Olympic Games.

The tournament features 12 teams divided into three groups of four. Team USA is competing in Group B alongside Russia, Slovakia and Slovenia. Group A includes Canada, Czech Republic, South Korea and Switzerland while Group C includes Finland, Germany, Norway and Sweden.

The teams will play a round robin within their groups, with eight teams earning byes to the quarterfinal round and four teams playing qualification games to earn quarterfinal spots. The winners of the four quarterfinal contests advance to the semifinals, and the two semifinal winners will square off in the gold-medal game while the two semifinal losers will meet for bronze.

2018 U.S. OLYMPIC MEN'S ICE HOCKEY TEAM STAFF

Jim Johannson, General Manager

Jim Johannson passed away unexpectedly at age 53 on Jan. 21, 2018, at his home in Colorado Springs, Colorado. He was named Team USA's general manager on August 4, 2017, and worked full-time for USA Hockey as assistant executive director of hockey operations. A two-time Olympian as a player (1988, 1992), Johannson has been involved in a management capacity with U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Teams since 2002.

Tony Granato, Head Coach

Tony Granato, the current head coach of the University of Wisconsin men's ice hockey team, is making his Olympic head coaching debut with the 2018 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team. He previously served as an assistant coach of the 2014 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team. Before joining Wisconsin, Granato helped lead the Pittsburgh Penguins to four straight playoff appearances as an assistant coach. Granato played for the U.S. in seven international competitions, including the 1998 Olympic Winter Games in Nagano, Japan.

Keith Allain, Assistant Coach

Keith Allain previously served in the same capacity for the 1992 and 2006 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Teams, the 2005 and 2006 U.S. Men's National Teams and the championship-winning 1996 U.S. World Cup of Hockey Team. Allain is currently the head coach of the men's ice hockey team at Yale University, where he led the team to its first-ever NCAA National Championship in 2013. Allain was an assistant coach of the Washington Capitals from 1993-1997 before becoming the goalie coach for the St. Louis Blues from 1998-2006.

Chris Chelios, Assistant Coach

Chris Chelios is on the coaching staff for an Olympic team for the first time. He previously served as an assistant coach for the 2016 U.S. National Junior Team that earned a bronze medal at the IIHF World Junior Championship in Helsinki, Finland. As a player, Chelios represented the U.S. on 10 different occasions, including four Olympic Winter Games (1984, 1998, 2002, 2006). Elected to the Hockey Hall of Fame in 2013, Chelios spent 26 seasons in the NHL before retiring as the all-time leader in games played by a defensemen in league history with 1,651 appearances.

Ron Rolston, Assistant Coach

Ron Rolston is on the coaching staff for an Olympic team for the first time in 2018. Rolston previously served as the head coach of the U.S. National Development Team from 2004-2011, where he led the team to three gold medals and one silver medal at the IIHF World Under-18 Championship. Most recently, Rolston has spent two seasons with the Arizona Coyotes organization, including one year as head coach to their former AHL affiliate, the Springfield Falcons, in 2015-16.

Scott Young, Assistant Coach

Scott Young is serving as an assistant coach for a U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team for the first time in 2018. Young is currently the director of player development for the Pittsburgh Penguins following three years on the men's hockey staff at his alma mater, Boston University. Young is one of only 12 U.S.-born men's hockey players to compete in three Olympic Winter Games (1988, 1992, 2002). He was inducted into the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Class of 2017 this past December.

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USA HOCKEY HAPPENINGS -

FELLOW U.S. NATIONAL HOCKEY TEAM SUCCESS

Over the last two months, six other U.S. hockey teams have found success in international competition.

On Nov. 12, the U.S. Women's National Hockey Team topped Canada, 5-1, to claim the **2017 Four Nations Cup** at Amalie Arena in Tampa, Florida. The title was Team USA's third-straight in the event and eighth overall.

A month later, the 2017-18 U.S. National Sled Hockey Team edged Canada, 3-2, to claim the **2017 World Sled Hockey Challenge** at McLauchlin Arena in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island. The victory marked an unprecedented fourth-straight title in the event and tournament record sixth title overall.

The U.S. National Under-17 Team also claimed a pair of international titles. On Dec. 16, the U.S. National Under-17 Team defeated Russia, 2-1, in a shootout in its final game of the **2017 Under-17 Four Nations Tournament** to secure first place with an undefeated 2-1-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record. The team also claimed the **2017 World Under-17 Hockey Challenge** in Dawson Creek, British Columbia in early November.

On Dec. 16, the **U.S. Junior Select Team** reached the championship game of the 2018 World Junior A Challenge in Truro, Nova Scotia, but fell to Canada West, 5-1, to earn second.

The **U.S. National Junior Team** earned a bronze medal on Jan. 5, when it topped the Czech Republic, 9-3, to close out the 2018 IIHF World Junior Championship in Buffalo, New York. For the first time ever, Team USA has now earned a medal in three straight years at the event (2017 - gold, 2016 - bronze).

Finally, the 2018 **U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team** won an unprecedented fourth-consecutive gold medal at the IIHF Under-18 Women's National Championship last month in Dmitrov, Russia. After sweeping the preliminary round, the U.S. erased a two-goal deficit in the final period to top Canada in a shootout, 4-3, in the semifinals, before earning a 9-3 victory over Sweden to take home gold.

2018 PARALYMPIC WINTER GAMES

The 2018 Paralympic Winter Games will take place in PyeongChang, South Korea, from March 9-18, 2018. The U.S. Paralympic Sled Hockey Team, which was unveiled on Jan. 1 alongside the Men's and Women's Olympic rosters, will represent the United States in sled hockey.

The United States enters the Paralympic Winter Games as two-time defending Paralympic gold medalists. After going undefeated and unscored upon to claim the gold medal at the 2010 Paralympic Winter Games in Vancouver, British Columbia, Team USA became the first nation to claim back-to-back Paralympic gold medals in sled hockey when it defeated Russia, 1-0, in the gold-medal game of the 2014 Paralympic Winter Games in Sochi, Russia.

THE TIME IS NOW TOUR, PRESENTED BY TOYOTA

The Time is Now Tour, which was completed last December, consisted of a series of games in the U.S. to assist the U.S. Women's National Team in preparation for the 2018 Olympic Winter Games. In total, the U.S. went 4-0-1-2 (W-OTW-OTL-L) as it played four times against Canada (1-0-1-2) and once against both Finland (1-0) and Sweden (1-0). 11TH HOCKEY WEEKEND ACROSS AMERICA

The 11th annual Hockey Weekend Across America will be held March 2-4, 2018. Hockey Weekend Across America will feature a theme for each of the three days, including Wear Your Favorite Hockey Jersey Day on Friday (March 2); Try Hockey Day on Saturday (March 3) and Celebrate Local Hockey Heroes Day on Sunday (March 4). Hockey Weekend Across America was created by USA Hockey in 2008 to engage the hockey community in celebrating the sport of hockey at all levels and exposing the sport to new audiences.

USA HOCKEY'S NATIONAL TEAM DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Founded in 1996, USA Hockey's National Team Development Program began operations in Ann Arbor, Michigan, and remained there until the summer of 2015. The full-time program is composed of two squads, the U.S. National Under-18 Team and U.S. National Under-17 teams, which compete in the USHL as well as against international and collegiate competition.

The Under-17 Team competes in the United States Hockey League and also participates in three international events annually. The U.S. National Under-18 Team's schedule includes games against NCAA Division I and III opponents, contests versus USHL teams as well as competition in three international tournaments.

USA HOCKEY ARENA

USA Hockey Arena, home of USA Hockey's National Team Development Program, is a two-sheet facility with regulation ice (85x200) in the main arena and Olympic-size ice (100x200) for the secondary sheet. Since being acquired by the USA Hockey Foundation on April 1, 2015, the facility has added 20,000 square feet to the property that included adding a 9,800-square-foot workout facility, additional offices and a conference center. In total, the facility encompasses 170,000 square feet with the main rink providing 3,504 seats for hockey games and 4,500 seats for other performances and events.

Accompanying the facility is the USA Hockey Summer Drive-In, which features three large screens that show first-run doublefeatures seven nights a week, as well as CJ's Brewing Company.
