TONIGHT'S GAME

The U.S. Men's National Team faces Canada this afternoon to open tournament play at the 2018 IIHF Men's World Championship here in Herning, Denmark. Puck drop is set for 4:15 p.m. local time (10:15 a.m. ET) at the Jyske Bank Boxen and will be televised live in the U.S. exclusively on NHL Network.

The U.S. and Canada have met 44 times previously in a Men's World Championship, including twice at the 2016 event in St. Petersburg, Russia. Canada leads the series by a 39-1-3-1-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) margin in the event.

The United States enters the 2018 IIHF Men's World Championship seeking its 12th tournament medal and first since 2016, when it claimed a bronze medal. All-time, the U.S. has won gold once (1933), silver four times (1950, 1939, 1934, 1931) and bronze six times (2015, 2013, 2004, 1996, 1952, 1949).

TALKING POINTS

THE SERIES VS. CANADA

The two teams last met in 2016, where the U.S. fell to Canada, 4-3, in the semifinal round. After falling, 2-0, the U.S. received goals from **Auston Matthews** (Scottsdale, Ariz.), **David Warsofsky** (Marshfield, Mass.) and **Tyler Motte** (St. Clair, Mich.) to take a 3-2 lead before Canada scored twice to claim the 4-3 win. Current U.S. netminder **Keith Kinkaid** (Farmingville, N.Y.) made 26 saves in the game.

KANE, MURPHY & LARKIN LEADING TEAM USA

On April 9, USA Hockey announced that **Patrick Kane** (Buffalo, N.Y.) will serve as captain for the 2018 U.S. Men's National Team. A three-time Stanley Cup champion with the Chicago Blackhawks who has twice represented the U.S. in the Olympic Winter Games (2010, 2014), including helping Team USA to a silver medal in 2010, Kane is skating in his second IIHF Men's World Championship (2008) and seventh international event.

Ahead of its exhibition game on Tuesday, May 1, it was also announced that **Connor Murphy** (Dublin, Ohio) and **Dylan Larkin** (Waterford, Mich.) will serve as alternate captains. A year ago, Murphy was captain of Team USA while Larkin served as an alternate captain. The two were part of the 2015 U.S. Men's National Team that earned a bronze medal at the 2015 IIHF Men's World Championship in Ostrava and Prague, Czech Republic.

DETROIT'S JEFF BLASHILL RETURNS AS U.S. HEAD COACH

Jeff Blashill (Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.), who recently completed his third season as head coach of the NHL's Detroit Red Wings, is serving as head coach of the U.S. Men's National Team for the second consecutive year. A year ago, Blashill guided the U.S. Men's National Team to a fifth-place finish in his international head coaching debut at the 2017 IIHF Men's World Championship in Cologne, Germany, and Paris, France.

REMEMBERING JIM JOHANNSON

Prior to today's game, the IIHF will recognize **Jim Johansson**, assistant executive director of USA Hockey and general manager of the 2018 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team, who passed away in his sleep at his home in Colorado Springs on Jan. 21. Johansson, born March 10, 1964, in Rochester, Minn., had a life-long career in hockey and was one of the most accomplished and respected people in the sport. Johansson's time with USA Hockey included 34 gold, 19 silver and 11 bronze medals; the launching and implementation of the highly acclaimed American Development Model; and securing USA Hockey Arena in Plymouth, Mich. as a home for all U.S. teams to utilize. He had served on 18 consecutive U.S. Men's National Teams (1999-2017).

THINGS WORTH MENTIONING

Team USA has finished in the top five of an IIHF Men's World Championship four of the last five years ... The U.S. roster currently sits at 23 ... Team USA arrived April 29 ... **Alex DeBrincat** joined Team USA on May 1 and **Blake Coleman** arrived on May 2 ... **Patrick Kane** is captain while **Connor Murphy** and **Dylan Larkin** are alternate captains ... Five U.S. players are making their international debuts ... **Jeff Blashill** is head coach for the second straight year ... Last year, Team USA skated to a fifth place finish with a 6-0-0-2 (W-OTW-OTL-L) mark after tying a U.S. record with six consecutive wins in the preliminary round en route to finishing atop Group A ... Last night, the U.S. National Under-17 Team edged the Youngstown Phantoms, 10-6, to even its USHL Eastern Conference Final series, 1-1. Game three is tonight at 7:05 p.m. ET. TEAM USA IIHF MWC HISTORY AT A GLANCE

Entering the 2018 IIHF Men's World Championship, the United States holds a 194-12-8-203-35 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) all-time record in world championship play. The U.S. has won a total of 11 medals in the event, winning gold once (1933); silver four times (1950, 1939, 1934, 1931) and bronze six times (2015, 2013, 2004, 1996, 1952, 1949).

2018 U.S. MEN'S NATIONAL TEAM OPPONENT BREAKDOWN



Men's Worlds Series vs. Canada: 44 GP 1-3-1-39-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T)
Of Note: Canada earned a silver medal last year, falling to Sweden in a shootout.
MAY 21, 2016: USA 3, CAN 4: In a 2016 semifinal meeting, **Auston Matthews** (Scottsdale, Ariz.), **David Warsofsky** (Marshfield, Mass.) and **Tyler Motte** (St. Clair, Mich.) each scored and **Keith Kinkaid** (Farmingville, N.Y.) made 26 saves but the U.S. ultimately fell to Canada, 4-3.



Men's Worlds Series vs. Denmark: 6 GP 4-0-1-1-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T)
Of Note: Denmark is hosting the IIHF Men's World Championship for the first time.
MAY 7, 2017: USA 7, DEN 2: Clayton Keller (St. Louis, Mo.) netted a hat trick and **Anders Lee** (Edina, Minn.) scored twice to lead the U.S. over Denmark, 7-2, a year ago. In six all-time meetings, the U.S. has outscored the Danes, 22-12, while claiming four wins.



Men's Worlds Series vs. Germany: 16 GP 8-0-1-4-3 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T)
Of Note: Germany enters the tournament as the 2018 Olympic silver medalist
MAY 5, 2017: USA 1, GER 2: Connor Murphy (Dublin, Ohio) scored and **Jimmy Howard** (Syracuse, N.Y.) made 25 saves, but the U.S. fell to Germany, 2-1, in last year's tournament-opening game. Over its last 10 meetings, the U.S. holds an 4-0-1-2-2 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) record.



Men's Worlds Series vs. Latvia: 13 GP 9-0-0-3-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T)
Of Note: U.S. forwards Dylan Larkin & Johnny Gaudreau scored in last year's win
MAY 13, 2017: USA 5, LAT 3: A year ago, five different U.S. players scored, including and **Nick Bjugstad** (Blaine, Minn.), **JT Compher** (Northbrook, Ill.), **Johnny Gaudreau** (Salem, N.J.), **Dylan Larkin** (Waterford, Mich.) and **Andrew Copp** (Ann Arbor, Mich.), who tallied the game-winner with 3:22 to play.



Men's Worlds Series vs. Korea: 0 GP 0-0-0-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T)
Of Note: This will mark the first-ever meeting in an IIHF Men's World Championship
The first-ever meeting in an IIHF Men's World Championship, Korea served as host of the 2018 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games where the U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team and U.S. Paralympic Sled Hockey Team both won gold, marking the first time two U.S. teams won gold in ice hockey.



Men's Worlds Series vs. Norway: 18 GP 17-0-0-1-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T)
Of Note: This is the first meeting between the two teams since 2011, a 4-2 U.S. win
MAY 2, 2011: USA 4, NOR 2: After falling behind by a 2-0 count, the U.S. rallied with a four-goal third period to defeat Norway, 4-2. Current U.S. forward **Chris Kreider** (Boxford, Mass.) tallied an assist in the game. The U.S. has not lost to Norway since March 9, 1951, where it was shutout, 3-0.



Men's Worlds Series vs. Finland: 62 GP 22-1-2-29-8 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T)
Of Note: A rematch of Team USA's 2017 MWC quarterfinal, a 2-0 Finland win.
MAY 18, 2017: USA 0, FIN 2: A year ago, **Jimmy Howard** (Syracuse, N.Y.) made 18 saves as the U.S. outshot Finland, 26-20, but fell, 2-0. The defeat came after the U.S. rallied off six-straight wins, matching a U.S. record in tournament play, and snapped a four-game win streak against Fins.

The U.S. is 2-6 in eight previous semifinal games in the IIHF World Championship. The IIHF has used various formats over its history, including round robin, double round robin and round-robin medal play among the most common. The world championship has included semifinal games in most years since 1992.

Total Bronze Medals: 7
Last BMG: L, 2-7 vs. Russia (2016)
The U.S. is 4-3 in seven previous bronze-medal games in the IIHF Men's World Championship. The IIHF has used various formats over its history, including round robin, double round robin and round-robin medal play among the most common.

BILL ZITO, GENERAL MANAGER • Milwaukee, Wis. • Assistant GM, Columbus Blue Jackets
 Bill Zito is serving as a general manager on a U.S. men's national team for the first time. Zito, who also holds the role of general manager for the AHL's Cleveland Monsters, is a member of USA Hockey's international council and previously served on the management staff for the 2015 U.S. Men's National Team that claimed a bronze medal at the 2015 IIHF Men's World Championship. Zito joined the Blue Jackets in the summer of 2013 before adding his role with the Monsters two years later. Prior to joining the Blue Jackets organization, Zito spent two decades building Acme World Sports into one of the top hockey agencies in the world by uncovering late-round or undrafted, lesser-known players, as well as the top picks.

JEFF BLASHILL, HEAD COACH • Sault Ste. Marie, Mich. • Detroit Red Wings Head Coach (3rd Season)
 Jeff Blashill, who guided the 2017 U.S. Men's National Team to a 6-0-0-2 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record, in his international head coaching debut, is serving as head coach of the 2018 U.S. Men's National Team. This is the fifth time Blashill will be behind a U.S. bench. Previously, he was a goaltending coach for the 2009 U.S. National Junior Team and an assistant coach for both the U.S. Junior Select Team that won the 2009 World Junior A Challenge and the U.S. Under-18 Men's Select Team that earned second place at the 2006 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament. A former USHL and NCAA head coach, Blashill joined Detroit after three seasons with its AHL affiliate, the Grand Rapids Griffins, where he led the program to its first Calder Cup championship in the 17-year history of the franchise in 2012-13.

DAN BYLSMA, ASSISTANT COACH • Grand Haven, Mich. • 2014 U.S. Olympic Head Coach • 2009 Stanley Cup Champion
 Dan Bylsma is representing the U.S. as a coach for the third time. The head coach of the 2014 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team in Sochi, Russia, Bylsma most recently served as an assistant coach for the bronze medal-winning 2015 U.S. Men's National Team. Bylsma, who won the Stanley Cup in his first season as head coach of the Pittsburgh Penguins, currently ranks first all-time among Pittsburgh bench bosses with 252 wins he accumulated during his six seasons with the organization. He also served two seasons (2015-17) as head coach of the NHL's Buffalo Sabres.

DON GRANATO, ASSISTANT COACH • Downers Grove, Ill. • Chicago Blackhawks Assistant Coach (1st Season)
 Don Granato is an assistant coach on a U.S. Men's National Team for the second time after fulfilling the same capacity in 2014. Granato was a head coach at USA Hockey National Team Development Program from 2011-17, guiding the U.S. to five other international titles.

SETH APPERT, ASSISTANT COACH • Cottage Grove, Mich. • Head Coach, USA Hockey's NTDP (1st Season)
 Seth Appert returns as an assistant coach for Blashill and the U.S. Men's National Team for the second straight year. The head coach of the U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team that earned silver at the 2018 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship on April 29, Appert was an assistant coach for last year's gold medal-winning 2017 U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team. His other USA Hockey coaching experience includes two stints as head coach (2008, 2011) and one as assistant coach (2007) of the U.S. Under-18 Men's Select Team that competed in the Ivan Hlinka Memorial Cup.

TEAM USA TIDBITS

MAY 1 RECAP: USA 3, DENMARK 2 (EXHIBITION)

Will Butcher (Sun Prairie, Wis.) collected a goal and two assists as the 2018 U.S. Men's National Team earned a 3-2 victory over Denmark in its lone exhibition game ahead of the 2018 IIHF Men's World Championship. **Dylan Larkin** (Waterford, Mich.) tallied the eventual game-winning goal with **Patrick Kane** (Buffalo, N.Y.) and Butcher tallying assists. **Cam Atkinson** (Riverside, Conn.), who scored Team USA's second goal off a deflection, was named the U.S. Player of the Game.

"This was a good team win in a fun atmosphere," said Jeff Blashill, head coach of the 2018 U.S. Men's National Team. "We were able to play different line combinations and evaluate some of our special teams play, which was great. What's important going forward is that we continue to build our game."

TRIO OF 2015 BRONZE MEDALISTS HEADLINE RETURNEES

Three players on Team USA helped the United States to a bronze medal at the 2015 IIHF Men's World Championship, including forwards **Dylan Larkin** (Waterford, Mich.) and **Anders Lee** (Edina, Minn.) and defenseman **Connor Murphy** (Dublin, Ohio).

The trio, along with forward **Johnny Gaudreau** (Salem, N.J.), all skated for 2018 U.S. Men's National Team head coach Jeff Blashill at last year's IIHF Men's World Championship.

Additionally, goaltender **Keith Kinkaid** (Farmingville, N.Y.) and forwards **Cam Atkinson** (Riverside, Conn.), **Chris Kreider** (Boxford, Mass.) and captain **Patrick Kane** have all skated for a U.S. Men's National Team previously.

INTERNATIONAL WINNING PEDIGREES

Fourteen U.S. players have skated for a U.S. national team previously and have combined to win 24 medals in IIHF World Championship play.

Among the medalists are 10 IIHF gold medalists, including defensemen **Will Butcher** (2012 MU18), **Quinn Hughes** (2017 MU18) and **Connor Murphy** (2013 WJC, 2011 MU18) and forwards **Johnny Gaudreau** (2013 WJC), **Patrick Kane** (2006 MU18), **Chris Kreider** (2010 WJC), **Dylan Larkin** (2014 MU18), **Sonny Milano** (2014 MU18), **Tage Thompson** (2017 WJC) and **Colin White** (2017 WJC, 2015 MU18).

FIVE POISED FOR INTERNATIONAL DEBUTS

Five players, including goaltenders **Scott Darling** (Lemont, Ill.) and **Charlie Lindgren** (Lakeville, Minn.); defenseman and **Jordan Oesterle** (Dearborn Heights, Mich.) and forwards **Blake Coleman** (Plano, Texas) and **Brian Gibbons** (Braintree, Mass.) will be making their international debuts at the 2018 IIHF Men's World Championship. Additionally, defensemen **Nick Jensen** (St. Paul, Minn.), **Alec Martinez** (Rochester Hills, Mich.) and **Neal Pionk** (Hermantown, Minn.) as well as forward **Derek Ryan** (Spokane, Wash.) will be skating in an IIHF tournament for the first time after previously skating on U.S. select teams.

ZITO TABBED GENERAL MANAGER OF TEAM USA

Bill Zito (Milwaukee, Wis.), assistant general manager of the NHL's Columbus Blue Jackets, is serving as general manager for the U.S. Men's National Team for the first time. Zito, who also holds the role of general manager for the AHL's Cleveland Monsters, is a member of USA Hockey's international council and previously served on the management staff for the 2015 U.S. Men's National Team that claimed a bronze medal at the 2015 IIHF Men's World Championship.



U.S. COACHING & SUPPORT STAFF

Blashill is joined behind the U.S. bench by assistant coaches **Dan Bylsma** (Grand Haven, Mich.), **Don Granato** (Downers Grove, Ill.) and **Seth Appert** (Cottage Grove, Minn.). All three have previously served on a U.S. coaching staff.

Additional staff members on this year's U.S. Men's National Team include team leader **Bob Webster** (Littleton, Colo.), video coordinator **Adam Nightingale** (Cheboygan, Mich.) and director of hockey operations **Kevin McLaughlin** (Colorado Springs, Colo.) While Webster and Nightingale were members of Team USA a year ago, this is the first U.S. Men's National Team for McLaughlin, who works for USA Hockey full-time as its senior director of hockey development.

Team USA's support staff includes athletic trainers **Dave Zeis** (Buffalo, N.Y.) and **Stan Wong** (Boca Raton, Fla.); equipment managers **Scott Aldrich** (Colorado Springs, Colo.) and **Mark DePasquale** (Chicago, Ill.); team physician **Dr. Charles Popkin** (Medina, Minn.); and communications manager **Jon Gomez** (Colorado Springs, Colo.).

FOUR STANLEY CUP CHAMPIONS

Four players on Team USA have claimed a Stanley Cup. Since 2009, a current member of the 2018 U.S. Men's National Team has been on six of the last eight Stanley Cup-winning teams.

Assistant coach **Dan Bylsma**, in his NHL head coaching debut, led the Pittsburgh Penguins to Stanley Cup in 2009. The following year, **Patrick Kane** helped the Chicago Blackhawks to its first of three Stanley Cup championships (2010, 2013, 2015). His performance in 2013 saw him earn the Conn Smythe Trophy as MVP of the Playoffs. Joining Kane on the 2015 Stanley Cup-winning squad was goaltender and Lemont, Ill., native **Scott Darling**. Additionally, **Alec Martinez** helped the Los Angeles Kings claim its first Stanley Cup win in its franchise history in 2012 before helping the Kings win the Cup again in 2014.

STANLEY CUP GAME-WINNING GOALS

Two players on the 2018 U.S. Men's National Team have scored Stanley Cup-clinching goals. In 2010, forward **Patrick Kane**'s goal 4:06 into overtime gave the Chicago Blackhawks its first Stanley Cup since 1961 with a 4-3 Game 6 win over the Philadelphia Flyers. Four years later, defenseman **Alec Martinez** scored with 5:17 remaining in double overtime of Game 5 to give the Los Angeles Kings a 3-2 victory over fellow U.S. forward **Chris Kreider** (Boxford, Mass.) and the New York Rangers for its second Stanley Cup in three years (2012).

FOUR NHL ROOKIES ON TEAM USA

Four players on Team USA made their NHL debuts this season. **Will Butcher** (Sun Prairie, Wis.) registered 44 points in 81 games for the New Jersey Devils while **Neal Pionk** (Hermantown, Minn.), **Tage Thompson** (Milford, Conn.) and **Colin White** (Hanover, Mass.) all split time this season with their respective NHL clubs and their AHL affiliates. Pionk opened the season with the AHL's Hartford Wolf Pack before being called up to the New York Rangers. Thompson started the season with the AHL's San Antonio Rampage before closing the year out with the St. Louis Blues, while White played for both the NHL's Ottawa Senators and AHL's Belleville Senators.

U.S. COACHING STAFF HOLD COLLEGE ROOTS

While 18 of the 23 U.S. players may hail from the college ranks, so does all four members of Team USA's coaching staff. Head coach **Jeff Blashill** (Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.) skated four seasons (1994-98) at Ferris State University, including two seasons with U.S. assistant coach **Seth Appert** (Cottage Grove, Minn.), who also played goaltender from 1992-96. Additionally, **Dan Bylsma** (Grand Haven, Mich.) played four years (1988-1992) for Bowling Green State University while **Don Granato** (Downers Grove, Ill.) skated four seasons (1987-91) for the late Jeff Sauer, a 2014 U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame inductee, at the University of Wisconsin. In 1990, Granato and the Badgers claimed an NCAA National Championship with a 7-3 win over Colgate.

TEAM USA TIDBITS

COLLEGE REUNIONS

The 2018 U.S. Men's National Team has a number of players from the same college skating together. In total, 18 of the 23 players representing Team USA come from 11 different NCAA schools. Boston College leads all school with five players - **Cam Atkinson** (2008-11), **Chris Kreider** (2009-12), **Johnny Gaudreau** (2011-14), **Brian Gibbons** (2007-11) and **Colin White** (2015-17). Three schools each have two players on Team USA, as **Charlie Lindgren** (2013-16) and **Nick Jensen** (2010-13) both skated at St. Cloud State University; **Dylan Larkin** (2014-15) and **Quinn Hughes** (2017-18) played at the University of Michigan and both **Alec Martinez** (2005-08) and **Blake Coleman** (2011-15) played at Miami University (Ohio). Additionally, **Jeff Blashill** and **Seth Appert** were teammates at Ferris State University where they both were goaltenders.

USHL POWERS TEAM USA

Seventeen players on the 2018 U.S. Men's National Team spent time in the United States Hockey League, the only Tier I junior league in the United States. Among the 17 USHL alumni are four Clark Cup champions in **Johnny Gaudreau** (Dubuque Fighting Saints, 2011), **Alec Martinez** (Cedar Rapids RoughRiders, 2005) and Green Bay Gamblers teammates **Anders Lee** and **Nick Jensen** in 2010. Additionally, three players earned playing honors, as **Neal Pionk** was named the 2014-15 USHL Defenseman of the Year; **Anders Lee** was tabbed 2009-10 USHL Rookie of the Year; and **Blake Coleman** earned both the 2010-11 USHL Player of the Year and 2010-11 USHL Forward of the Year awards.

TEAM USA TIES TO 2018 MU18 SILVER MEDAL WINNERS

On April 29, the 2018 U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team earned a silver medal at the 2018 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship. The team was coached by 2018 U.S. Men's National Team assistant coach **Seth Appert** (Cottage Grove, Minn.) and included forward **Jack Hughes** (Orlando, Fla.), brother of 2018 U.S. Men's National Team defenseman **Quinn Hughes** (Orlando, Fla.). A year ago, Quinn helped the U.S. win gold at the 2017 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship.

Quinn's brother, Jack, finished the tournament with 5 goals and 7 assists for 12 points, which led all tournament skaters and saw him earn Tournament MVP and Best Forward honors.

GOLD MEDALIST BLAKE GEOFFRION IN DENMARK

Blake Geoffrion (Brentwood, Tenn.), who helped the U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team to a gold medal in 2006 and the U.S. National Junior Team to a bronze medal in 2007, is here in Herning, Denmark. A product of USA Hockey's National Team Development Program and former teammate of current U.S. captain **Patrick Kane** (Buffalo, N.Y.) on both medal-winning U.S. national teams, Geoffrion played five seasons of professional hockey with the NHL's Montreal Canadiens and Nashville Predators, as well as their AHL affiliates the Milwaukee Admirals (NSH) and Hamilton Bulldogs (MTL). He was the first fourth-generation player in NHL history, after his father Dan, grandfather Bernie and great-grandfather Howie Morenz. Currently, Geoffrion is an assistant general manager for general manager Bill Zito and the AHL's Lake Erie Monsters.

EAGLES PRIDE

Among the 18 players on Team USA to have skated collegiately, five did so as member of Boston College. **Brian Gibbons** joined the Eagles in 2007-08, where he helped them win an NCAA national championship that season. After **Cam Atkinson** became an Eagle the following season, **Chris Kreider** joined the duo in 2009-10, where the Eagles again claimed an NCAA title. **Johnny Gaudreau** then joined Boston College in 2011-12, its first season without Gibbons or Atkinson, where he and Kreider led to the Eagles to its third NCAA title in five seasons. In 2015-16, **Colin White** skated for the Eagles where he was tabbed Hockey East Rookie of the Year.

NHL ROOKIES PACED BY U.S. TALENT

The 2017-18 NHL season saw a number of notable rookie performances, many of which came by U.S. players.

Five of the top 10 point-getters were Americans, as Arizona Coyotes forward **Clayton Keller** (St. Louis, Mo.) finished second with 65, Winnipeg Jets forward **Kyle Connor** (Clinton, Mich.) was fourth with 57, Vancouver Canucks forward **Brock Boeser** (Burnsville, Minn.) was fifth with 55, U.S. forward **Alex DeBrincat** was sixth with 52 and U.S. defenseman **Will Butcher** was 10th with 44.

Additionally, four of the top five NHL rookie goal scorers were Americans, as Connor tallied an NHL rookie-best 31, Boeser was second with 29, DeBrincat finished third with 27 and Keller was fifth with 23.

In terms of assists, Keller was second with 42, Butcher finished third with 39 and Boeser was 10th with 26. Butcher led all NHL rookie defensemen in both assists and points.

All five have skated for the U.S. previously, with Keller and Connor both skating on a U.S. Men's National Team.

AMERICANS FILL NHL LEADER COLUMNS

A number of U.S.-born players finished the 2017-18 NHL season among the league's best performers. Forward **Blake Wheeler** (Plymouth, Minn.) collected an NHL-best 68 assists while U.S. forward **Johnny Gaudreau** ranked seventh with 60. U.S. forward **Anders Lee** led all U.S. players with 40 goals, which was seventh best in the NHL this season. Additionally, with 92 points, **Phil Kessel** (Madison, Wis.) finished seventh in NHL scoring while Wheeler was ninth with 91.

BOESER, KELLER TABBED CALDER TROPHY FINALISTS

On April 22, Burnsville, Minn., native **Brock Boeser** (Vancouver Canucks) and St. Louis, Mo., native **Clayton Keller** (Arizona Coyotes) were tabbed finalists for the Calder Trophy, given to the best rookie in the NHL, along with Matthew Barzal (N.Y. Islanders). It is the second straight year two Americans are among the three finalists, as **Auston Matthews** (Scottsdale, Ariz.) and **Zach Werenski** (Grosse Pointe, Mich.) were finalists a year ago. Matthews went on to receive the award, becoming the first American awarded the honor since Patrick Kane in 2007-08. The winner will be announced at the 2018 NHL Awards in Las Vegas on June 20.

2018 IIHF UNDER-18 MEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

The U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team earned a silver medal at the 2018 IIHF Under-18 Men's National Championship in Chelyabinsk & Magnitogorsk, Russia.

After falling to Canada, 6-4, to open preliminary round play, the U.S. topped Switzerland, 8-5, before falling to Sweden, 3-1. In the team's final preliminary round game, it blanked Belarus, 8-0, to earn a quarterfinal meeting against Russia. With a 5-1 quarterfinal victory over the host nation, the U.S. edged the Czech Republic, 4-1, to earn a spot in its tournament-record 14th gold medal game. There, the U.S. overcame a two-goal deficit to even the score before Finland scored in the third period to claim a 3-2 win.

Seth Appert served as head coach and was joined by assistant coaches **Nick Fohr**, **Mason Graddock**, **Rand Pecknold** and **Thomas Speer**. The 2018 event was Appert's second consecutive with the U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team after serving as an assistant on last year's gold medal-winning squad.

2018 PARALYMPIC WINTER GAMES

The 2018 U.S. Paralympic Sled Hockey Team captured an unprecedented third-straight Paralympic gold medal by defeating Canada, 2-1, in overtime. In the gold-medal game, forward **Declan Farmer** scored the tying goal with 37 seconds in regulation and went on to score the game-winning goal 3:30 into overtime. His 11 tournament goals tied a U.S. and Paralympic record for most goals in a single Paralympic Winter games while forward **Brody Roybal** was named Best Forward and Tournament MVP with 17 points (10-7), which tied Farmer's point total (11-6--17).

Guy Gosselin, a two-time U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team member (1988, 1992) who also serves as a regional manager of USA Hockey's American Development Model, served as head coach with **David Hoff**, USA Hockey's Northern Plains District Coach-in-Chief, as an assistant coach. **Dan Brennan**, USA Hockey's director of sled national teams, was the general manager of the 2018 U.S. Paralympic Sled Hockey Team.

2018 IIHF WORLD JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP

The U.S. National Junior Team earned a bronze medal on home ice to give the United States a World Junior Championship in three-straight years for the first time ever. The event took place at the KeyBank Center and HarborCenter in Buffalo, N.Y. and was the sixth World Junior Championship to be played in the United States. It was also the second time Buffalo served as host (2011). The U.S. and Canada made history on Dec. 29, 2017, when the two teams played its preliminary round game outdoors at New Era Field, home of the NFL's Buffalo Bills, in front of a record crowd of 44,592 fans. Never before had an outdoor game been held in IIHF world championship play.

Head coach **Bob Motzko** and his assistants **Greg Brown**, **Grant Potulny**, **Kris Mayotte** and **Steve Miller** reprised their roles from the gold-medal winning 2017 U.S. National Junior Team while **Jim Johansson**, who passed away unexpectedly on Jan. 21, 2018, was the team's general manager.

Forward **Casey Mittelstadt** was tabbed Best Forward and Tournament MVP as he joined forward **Kieffer Bellows** on the Tournament All-Star Team.

USA HOCKEY HAPPENINGS

USA HOCKEY'S NTDP COMPETING IN USHL CLARK CUP PLAYOFFS

Last night, NTDP forward **Owen Lindmark** (Naperville, Ill.) recorded a hat trick and six other players scored goals for USA Hockey's National Team Development Program Under-17 Team in its 10-6 win against the Youngstown Phantoms in game two of the USHL's Eastern Conference Final at USA Hockey Arena. With the win, Team USA ties the series at 1-1 in the Eastern Conference Final, with Game 3 set for tonight night at the Covelli Centre in Youngstown. Puck drop is set for 7:05 p.m. ET and can be seen live on HockeyTV.com.

This is the first time since 2011-12 that the NTDP is competing in the USHL's Clark Cup Playoffs. The 2017-18 Eastern Conference regular-season champions, the NTDP earned a first-round playoff bye before meeting the Chicago Steel in the semifinals where it claimed the series, 3-1.

CHRIS CHELIOS NAMED TO IIHF HALL OF FAME CLASS OF 2018

Last December, **Chris Chelios** (Downers Grove, Ill.) was named to the International Ice Hockey Federation Hall of Fame Class of 2018 that will be inducted on the final week of the 2018 IIHF Men's World Championship. Chelios will become the 23rd American to be enshrined into the IIHF Hall of Fame.

One of only two male players to represent the United States at four Olympic Winter Games (1984, 1988, 2002, 2006), he also participated in three Canada Cups (1984, 1987, 1991), and two World Cups of Hockey (1996, 2004). He first skated on the international stage when he competed on the U.S. National Junior Team at the IIHF World Junior Championship in 1982.

Representing his country 10 times internationally, he totaled 23 points (5-18) in 60 games played while helping the U.S. win the inaugural 1996 World Cup of Hockey and captaining Team USA to a silver medal at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games in Salt Lake City.

A three-time Stanley Cup champion, Chelios holds the record for most games played by a defenseman in NHL history (1,651), after completing 26 seasons in the NHL. Since retirement, Chelios most recently served as an assistant coach for the 2018 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team after fulfilling the same role for the 2016 U.S. National Junior Team at the IIHF World Junior Championship, helping them capture a bronze medal.

CHIPOTLE-USA HOCKEY YOUTH NATIONALS

National champions were crowned across the country at the 2018 Chipotle-USA Hockey Youth, Girls and Women's National Championships last month. As part of USA Hockey Nationals, some 4,000 players competed for American hockey top honors in the sled, youth, girls, high school, adult and women's levels at 13 host sites across the United States. The 2019 USA Hockey National Championships will mark the 70th anniversary of USA Hockey crowning the nation's best in youth hockey, a tradition that dates back to 1949 and the inaugural national championship tournament for players "under the high school age" held at Madison Square Garden in New York City. Last November, USA Hockey announced the host sites for its slate of 2019 USA Hockey National Championships, with each tournament to be contested in March/April 2019. TRY HOCKEY FOR FREE DAYS HELP 24,836 NEW PLAYERS

A total of 24,836 new players were part of USA Hockey's two national Try Hockey For Free Days this season.

The NHL, AHL, ECHL and USHL provided outstanding support to help drive attention to local Try Hockey opportunities. Additionally, several NHL clubs and other leagues supported the initiative by promoting and organizing events of their own. Now in their eighth season, USA Hockey's Try Hockey for Free Days have introduced more than 177,000 children to the sport.

OTHER U.S. SUCCESS IN INTERNATIONAL PLAY

In addition to its success in IIHF, Olympic and Paralympic play, the United States had a number of other teams find success in international competition.

Last December, two U.S. teams reached the championship game of their respective tournaments. On Dec. 16, the U.S. Junior Select Team reached the championship game of the 2018 World Junior A Challenge in Truro, Nova Scotia, but fell to Canada West, 5-1, to earn second. That second-place finish preceded Team USA's championship at the 2017 World Sled Hockey Challenge in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island.

On Nov. 12, the U.S. Women's National Hockey Team topped Canada, 5-1, to claim the 2017 Four Nations Cup at Amalie Arena in Tampa, Florida. The title was Team USA's third-straight in the event and eighth overall.

The U.S. National Under-17 Team also claimed a pair of international titles. On Dec. 16, the U.S. National Under-17 Team defeated Russia, 2-1, in a shootout in its final game of the 2017 Under-17 Four Nations Tournament to secure first place with an undefeated 2-1-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record. The team also claimed the 2017 World Under-17 Hockey Challenge in Dawson Creek, British Columbia, in early November.

USA HOCKEY SETS 8-AND-UNDER PLAYER PARTICIPATION RECORD

On March 2, USA Hockey announced that Paulina Doughtie from Antioch, Tennessee, became USA Hockey's 115,695th 8-and-Under player in 2017-18, setting a single-season 8U participation record. It marked the third consecutive record-breaking season for USA Hockey in the 8U age classification. Doughtie was introduced to the game in 2017 through USA Hockey's Try Hockey For Free Day and the Little Predators Learn-to-Play program, part of a league-wide initiative developed by the NHL and NHLPA that provides new players with six to eight weeks of beginner instruction and a full set of hockey equipment to keep.

ABOUT USA HOCKEY'S NATIONAL TEAM DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Founded in 1996, USA Hockey's National Team Development Program began operations in Ann Arbor, Michigan, and remained there until the summer of 2015. The full-time program is composed of two squads, the U.S. National Under-18 Team and U.S. National Under-17 teams, which compete in the USHL as well as against international and collegiate competition.

The Under-17 Team competes in the United States Hockey League and also participates in three international events annually. The U.S. National Under-18 Team's schedule includes games against NCAA Division I and III opponents, USHL teams as well as competition in three international tournaments.

ABOUT USA HOCKEY ARENA

USA Hockey Arena, home of USA Hockey's National Team Development Program, is a two-sheet facility with regulation ice (85x200) in the main arena and Olympic-size ice (100x200) for the secondary sheet. Acquired by the USA Hockey Foundation on April 1, 2015, the facility has added 20,000 square feet to the property that included a 9,800-square-foot workout facility, additional offices and a conference center. In total, the facility encompasses 170,000 square feet with the main rink providing 3,504 seats for hockey games and 4,500 seats for other performances and events. Accompanying the facility is the USA Hockey Summer Drive-In, which has three large screens that show first-run double-features seven nights a week, as well as CJ's Brewing Company.
