

Ontario Soccer continues to lead the way in ensuring that the player development pathway provides growth opportunities for players, coaches, match officials and administrators from the grassroots all the way to the most competitive levels.

Coaching and Match Official training and instruction continue to receive a high priority at Ontario Soccer. Just as grassroots soccer is and will always be the foundation of our game, our volunteers have always been and will always be the backbone of our organization.



There is still plenty of work to be done. Every sports organization faces opportunities and in order for us to succeed we need to become more efficient and effective. We all want to grow the game and develop our players, coaches, match officials and administrators so they can achieve their potential, whatever that may be. So as we undertake organizational modernization and look at a new board structure with new roles and responsibilities it is vital that we be unified and continue to build trust and mutual respect.

I speak often about the importance of working together. Healthy debate is always essential but at the end of the day, it is being unified that will make us stronger. Let's move forward together to make the soccer experience all that it can and should be for everyone involved.

2016 was a very active and engaging year in what was the first full year of planning and/or implementing a number of key initiatives from the new 2016-2018 Strategic Plan of the organization. Thanks to the leadership and commitment from all our key stakeholders, including the very hard work of our staff and volunteers serving on our various operational committees. Collectively we are managing for today and building for the future.



Guided by our Board-approved Strategic Plan and supported by our annual operational plan, we are progressing to bring soccer into the

21st Century with more current, relevant and innovative programming to best support our large participant and membership base. For some, embracing change has not been easy, to others it has been welcomed with excitement and interest. Ontario Soccer is perceived across Canada as leaders of the game. Our province is the engine of our national governing body. While we are far from being fully satisfied on all our programming to date, we are progressing with both a vision and a plan to lead the game forward while in alignment with our national governing body.

I challenge all of us to work collaboratively and constructively. We must remember, no organization within the structure of amateur soccer owns the game. We are merely service providers to those who matter most, the players.

The future of soccer in Ontario looks very bright. We have the people, resources and ability to innovate so we can continue to be leaders in Canada.

This 2016 Operations report provides an overall summary of key initiatives and activities that have taken place over the year. I wish to thank the Executive Committee and the Board of Directors for your support and patience as we navigate through change. I wish to also acknowledge the talent and fine work of the full-time staff at Ontario Soccer, the Districts and the Clubs and Academies that support the game day to day.

In 2016, Ontario Soccer Coaching Development continued to deliver clinics and training across the province. Nearly 400 Coaches attended, 2 Provincial B and 10 Canada Soccer C License courses. Courses took place in various Districts around the province, from Ottawa to Waterloo.

Over the course of the year, over 3,000 Community Coaches were certified in NCCP Community Courses run in 14 different Districts around the province.

Female Mentorship Workshops.

The Female Mentorship Program is designed to train senior female Coaches, who in turn will act as educators and mentors to other female Coaches who wish to further develop and progress their coaching careers. The mentorship program is part of a holistic support system approach to enabling promising Coaches across the province to reach their full coaching potential in the sport. Three workshops were held with over 100 female Coaches in attendance, helping to progress 10 of them into the Provincial B Licence program.

Other courses delivered included:

- Ontario Soccer Coach Developer Training
- Goalkeeper Diploma Course for 30 Coaches
- National B Licence prep course for 30 Ontario Coaches that have been selected to take the Canada Soccer National B Licence Part 2 course.
- Ontario Soccer Technical Director Diploma Course for 60 participants
- Online learning platform provided by Academy Soccer Coach, which were accessed by nearly 400 users
- FIFA 11 plus training for 30 instructors
- Fundamental Movement Skills/Prep Course for 30 instructors









The 2016 Ontario Soccer Summit reached new heights with a new venue, bigger audiences and broader offerings. Coaches, Match Officials and Administrators convened at Guelph University for 2 ½ days of elite learning sessions. Expanding on its previous format, the 2016 Ontario Soccer Summit offered development opportunities for Match Officials & Administrators in addition to the nearly 250 coach participants. 550 guests attended various educational classroom sessions as well as practical field sessions. Notable subject matter experts such as Dr. Steve Norris (Former CSO of the Canadian Winter Sport Institute), Anne Merklinger (CEO of Own the Podium), Ian Barker, Nigel Best, Carol-Anne Chenard, and many more inspired attendees to strive for their best with the interest of developing soccer and its athletes at heart.







The 2016 Player Development initiatives have contributed to the continued success of the organization's Long Term Player Development philosophy. Constant creation of resources in a variety of media, the delivery of coaching workshops, and parent and board member education sessions, continue to engage the various forms of our membership of the many improvements being made in the delivery of the youth game.

Being on the cutting edge of children's development through the vehicle of sport leads the program to continually stay abreast of innovative educational practices and emerging trends. Continuous research and communication with experts around the country and internationally allows our team to propose and implement the latest development programs and philosophies. Most of all, Ontario Soccer Player Development keeps soccer fun for all.



Our programming activities in 2016 included:

- 600+ attendees learning at Ontario Soccer Grassroots Coaching Clinics & Workshops
- 1,600 + viewers of Ontario Soccer Player Development Webinars (covering topics such as Fast-Tracking and Player Development, I'm a Grassroots Soccer Parent, and Creating the Best Environment)
- 80+ OPDL License Holder Grassroots visits
- 52 stage-specific session plans created for coaches working with Active Start, Fundamentals, and Learn to Train development stage players.
- 6 in-depth coaching resources created including: Fast Tracking and Player Development, Incorporating Physical Literacy in Grassroots Programming, and How does the Inclusive Programming model work in your Club?
- 18 Grassroots Practice videos created with 7.300+ views
- 500+ students and teachers reached through 7 school clinics & festivals
- 280+ C License and 60+ B License Coaches trained in tandem with the Coaching Development Department
- Many other presentations for Districts, Universities, Leagues, Coaching Conferences, Clubs and more!



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The province's Match Officials continue to improve with the average mark on Registration Exam rising from 65% in 2013 to 84% in 2016. Overall Fitness levels also improved resulting in higher grades.

Scouting at OPDL Venues in 2016 resulted in 15 new and aspiring Match Officials being invited to the 2017 Elite Training Camp.

The program also saw some important initiatives come to fruition, including a partnership with MLSE on a Match Officials Appreciation Day at BMO Field, which over 500 match officials attended; this coincided with the introduction of a Recognition and Awards program for match officials.

A strong relationship has been formed with University of Ontario Institute of Technology (UOIT) in regard to creating a research relationship with Dr. Lori Livingston, Dr. Susan Forbes and Dr. Nick Wattie to further assist in Long Term Officials Development implementation.

Additional Activities:

- Elite Match Officials Camp OUA, OCAA and League1 75 provincial and regional Match Officials
- Surveys to returning, non-returning and first year match officials
- 5th Official initiative at League1 Ontario competition introducing newer officials to the higher level games
- Delivered 7 Mentor Accreditation courses, including Train the Trainer and since, accredited over 500 mentors with this new program
- Instructor Re-Accreditation on largest number of FIFA amendments in decades
- Created an on-line Laws of the Game amendment module to deliver the multiple law changes across the province

The program itself visited 15 of 21 Districts in 2016, conducting over 75 events and meetings. The main concentration towards the end of 2016 was the Focus Groups, District Referee Coordinator and Committee meetings prepared for the introduction of the Long Term Officials Development initiative (LTOD).






In 2020, Ontario Soccer Match Officials Development aims to have Long Term Officials Development program launched in its full capacity.

- Number of Entry Level Courses 2016: 139 scheduled
- Number of Small Sided Courses 2016: 83 scheduled
- Provincial Upgrading Program (PUG): 50% success rate in those who entered PUG 2015 season (6 of 12)
- Regional Upgrading Program (RUG): 100% success rate in those who entered Pre-RUG 2015 Season (13 of 13). 6 decided mid-season to self-remove from program
- Assessor Re-Accreditation: 7 courses
- Futsal Entry Level: 5 courses
- Futsal Refresher: 1 course

The Match Officials program continued to provide guidance and development to over 9,500 Match Officials in Ontario, with a 10%+ increase in retention rate over the last 6 years. The concentration in the early and late parts of 2016 was the Long Term Officials Development program.

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Provincial Player Identification.

In 2016, the High Performance Staff detected over 800 potential Provincial Players from the Ontario Player Development League (OPDL) and Talent on Location Days (TOLD). From those detected, 540 players participated in the Provincial Screening Competition in November. Of those 540 players, 300 were further selected for continued screening with the Provincial Projects in 2017. This was across the U13, U14, and U15 age groups for girls and boys. In 2016 TFC Academy had selected 4 male athletes across multiple age groups from OPDL Clubs.

The Provincial Program will focus on player screening, talent identification and benchmarking of players through competition. The U14, U15, and U16 Provincial Projects ran from January to April. It involved one weekend of three player screening sessions, per month (January, February, March) and one preparation weekend and one inter-Provincial Teams competition (Quebec-Ontario Series) in April.

The Quebec-Ontario Series pitted Ontario's talent against strong Provincial competition from our easterly neighbours. The 6 teams that were fielded in the U14, U15 and U16 age groups played with opportunity of being scouted by National Team staff on site. In 2017 within the U15 Female age category, British Columbia Provincial Program was an addition to the competition.

National Player Identification.

Ontario continues to provide an average of 50% of the athletes selected for Canadian National Men's, Women's, Para, and Futsal Teams.





The OPDL is a best-in-class program that is one of the province's first standards-based high performance leagues, combining top level competition with performance development training standards. OPDL grew in size and scope in 2016 by 38% involving 104 teams, from 21 License Holder (consisting of Clubs & Private Academies from across the province), who compete over the course of a 20-week long season.

- Satisfaction from parents with OPDL program increased 6% from 2015 and 10% since 2014

League 1 Ontario is recognized as the only pro-am, standardsbased, senior league within Ontario Soccer's High Performance Pathway and plays a critical role in ensuring that the Province's best soccer players achieve their full potential.

Founded in 2014, the league began with a 10 team Men's division, which has now grown to 16 teams, and includes a separate women's division that was established in 2015 and has grown from nine original teams to 11 teams in 2017.

Between the 25 teams there are 675 registered players in the league, with affiliations to Ontario Soccer League and in-house

academy teams adding another 250 players, creating a total of approximately 925 players.

In the men's division in 2016, Vaughan SC won both the League1 Cup and the league championship, while on the women's side, FC London and Vaughan SC split the honours, with FC London winning the league championship and Vaughan SC winning the League1 Cup.

Most importantly, League 1 Ontario continues to show its success by moving players along to professional opportunities as well as US and Canadian University and College leagues. The league has now graduated 70 + male and female players into pro-environments in the last two years alone – something rarely seen across North American soccer. On a National Scale, League 1 Ontario had 49 current and former L10 players suit up for Canada in 2016 alone.

Stakeholder Communication

To further enhance its dialogue with its District and Club members, Ontario Soccer expanded its Information and Action Bulletin system to now directly communicate with Clubs and Academies. The bulletins, which were created to ensure Districts were informed about key developments within Ontario before the larger membership and general soccer public, continues to be sent to the Districts 48 hours in advance and now is sent directly to over 800 Club and Academy contacts around the province.

Over the course of 2016, 67 bulletins, on topics ranging from by-law changes, competition updates, coaching clinics, corporate partnerships and many more were provided to Ontario Soccer's varying levels of membership.



Digital Channels

The weekly e-newsletter, which reaches an average of 30,000 individuals per edition, created an extra 1.5 million touch points over the course of the year between Ontario Soccer and its membership. **Ontariosoccer.net** continues to be the definitive place to acquire the key information you need for soccer in

Ontario. In 2016 the communications team continued to expand its reach and enhance the quality of dialogue via our various digital platforms. Over the course of the year, many new marketing initiatives were introduced to various Ontario Soccer programs and events to improve the general brand of the organization. From introducing a new and more visual format of annual reporting, to creating relevant and novel collateral items for the OPDL, more resources were and will continue to be dedicated to the branding of Ontario Soccer.

At the September 24th Board Meeting, formal approval was received to commence a complete re-brand of the organization, for which preliminary planning started in 2015. This was a direct outcome of Strategic Plan Point #4 - Build Partnerships and #3 - Membership Engagement. As such, the new look would become the face of several other game-changing projects happening at Ontario Soccer, to be launched in 2017 and beyond.

The refreshed look-and-feel will allow Ontario Socceer to communicate with our membership in a more engaging, relevant and inspiring way. With the help of the Brandfire Marketing Group, over 70 individual designs were reviewed until an inspiring, modern yet timeless mark was chosen. During this process, hundreds of members of the community, from players and parents, to volunteers and staff were polled in the selection of the new identity of Ontario Soccer.

The remainder of 2016 saw the beginning of a marathon of branding revitalization work in the lead-up to the long-awaited reveal scheduled for March 1st, 2017.






Ontario Indoor Cup 2016

The Ontario Indoor Cup serves as the provincial championship for small-sided soccer during the Indoor Season. The competition format is round robin preliminary tournaments set up to advance teams to the final 8 teams in each age division. The Final 8 teams are divided into two groups of four that play a round robin tournament format with the top two teams in each group of 4 advancing to the Semi-Finals following by the Finals. The competition is offered in the Under 13, Under 14, Under 16 and Under 18 Boys and Girls age divisions.

Ontario Futsal Cup 2016

The Ontario Futsal Cup is the provincial championship for futsal in the Futsal/Indoor season. This competition began in 2006 with 12 teams. Over the last 10 years, the number of teams has varied, but recently, the sport has seen more growth and interest and the Ontario Futsal Cup is seeing higher levels of competition within the sport. Similar to the Ontario Indoor Cup, the Futsal Cup Final Round consists of a round robin tournament format with top teams advancing to the Cup Finals. The Ontario Futsal Cup in 2016 was offered in the Under 13/14 Boys and Girls divisions as well as the Under 15/16 Boys and Girls divisions and the Men's division. Unfortunately, the interest on the Girls side has not been strong enough to run these divisions. The Ontario Futsal Cup for the youth divisions was held at Durham College in Oshawa.

In the Men's Ontario Futsal Cup, the champions advance to the Futsal Canadian Championships, which was in its second year in 2016. The winners of the National Championships have an opportunity to advance from there to the CONCACAF Club Championships. The atmosphere at the Men's Ontario Futsal Cup Final was electric as spectators watched the two best teams in Ontario face off at the Vaughan Sportsplex II in Vaughan.

Futsal Canadian Championships

In 2016, Ontario Soccer hosted the Futsal Canadian Championships. The event was held at Durham College in Oshawa, April 9-10, 2016. While the main event of the weekend was the National Futsal Championships, which consisted of a two game series between the Ontario Futsal Champions and the Quebec Futsal Champions, the weekend also featured a Women's Futsal Showcase, a Futsal Referee Clinic, Men's National Team Training and a Coaching Clinic. The events were well attended by many Futsal enthusiasts and Toronto United Futsal claimed the Championship.

Ontario Cup

The purpose of the Ontario Cup is to provide meaningful competition to the Soccer For Life membership and to determine a provincial champion in the Under 13 to Senior age divisions. Some of the objectives of the Ontario Cup include, maximizing participation and competition in the "competitive" Soccer For Life stream of LTPD, identifying provincial representatives for National Championships in specific age divisions, engagement of grassroots soccer in various categories - age, gender, special needs, providing opportunity for teams to participate in a prestigious competition with a rich history and providing an opportunity for teams to play against teams they would not normally play in league competition.

In 2016, 488 teams participated in the Ontario Cup which was an increase of 27 teams over the year before.

Ontario Summer Games

The Ontario Summer Games are a program run by the Ontario Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport. The Games take place every two years. Ontario Soccer has participated in the Summer Games for many years and incorporated the Under 15 division of the Ontario Cup into the Games. As a result, the Ontario Summer Games have served a dual purpose of Summer Games and Provincial Championship.



In 2016, the games were held in Mississauga, Ontario and event took place over four days. The Soccer competition was held at the Hershey Centre with some games played at Iceland.

The Ontario Cup Tournament Winners and regional representatives advance to the Summer Games. The format for the Under 15 Girls and Under 15 Boys Tier 1 divisions was two pools that played a round robin, with the top team in each group advancing to the Cup Final.

Regional League Championships

A Regional League Championship was held at Guelph University, October 1-2, 2016. The winner of each of the Youth Regional Leagues in Ontario participated in this competition to determine the Regional League Champions.

Tournaments

In 2016, 140 tournaments were approved for players 13 years of age and up. Twenty six tournaments took place over the 2015/2016 Indoor season with another 114 being approved during the 2016 outdoor season.

Festivals

In 2016, 192 festivals were approved to operate. Much like tournaments, festivals are assessed and monitored for compliance with the imposed stipulations, to protect the integrity of the LTPD model.

In order to ensure children aged 8-12 across the province are able to find festivals to participate in, whilst competing against similar, or same, aged children, divisions are also offered in the festival format.







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The 29th Annual Centre Circle Awards Reception honouring the Meritorious Award Winners (11 Individual and two Clubs) and one President's Award winner were held on June 11, 2016, 6:00 PM – 8:00 PM at the Sheraton Toronto Airport Hotel and Conference Centre.

The Club Excellence program continued its evolution with an update to its scorecard and continued support from all departments within Ontario Soccer and each District Association. A total of 36 Clubs received a Club Excellence Award in 2016. The Club Development Program visited 42 Clubs at least once throughout the year to meet and discuss a number of topics including Club Excellence applications and the criteria. Club Excellence and the OPDL also worked together to further development the alignment of the two programs.

The alignment will address timelines, application platforms and creating a more efficient process for Clubs and Academies to apply to both programs. Below is a list of all of the Club Excellence Awardees for 2016-2017.

In 2016 the Club Development Program continued to provide assistance to many different Clubs and sport organizations across the province. Support was provided in many different areas, such as administrative, governance and operational guidance, in addition to activation assistance at events, such as the 2016 Ontario Summer Games and the TFC KIA Cup.

Ontario Soccer was successful in obtaining the Enabling Change Grant from the Accessibility Directorate of Ontario. These grant funds will assist in the creation of resources for Club and Academies to use in order to create optimal accessibility within their programming and facilities. Resources to be created in 2017 include workshops, online and printable guides, as well as webinars. These assets will help all levels of Clubs and Academies become more accessible to the public and comply with the Accessibility of Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA).




