- TONIGHT'S GAME -

The U.S. Men's National Team faces Latvia this afternoon in its fourth preliminary round game of the 2018 IIHF Men's World Championship here in Herning, Denmark. Puck drop is set for 4:15 p.m. local time (10:15 a.m. ET) at the Jyske Bank Boxen and will be televised live in the U.S. exclusively on NHL Network.

Both teams enters today's game with three games played. The United States sits in second place with eight points, 12 goals for and just four goals allowed, the fewest in Group B. Latvia holds fourth place with five points, nine goals for and 10 goals against. The United States enters the 2018 IIHF Men's World Championship seeking its 12th tournament medal and first since

2016, when it claimed a bronze medal. All-time, the U.S. has won gold once (1933), silver four times (1950, 1939, 1934, 1931) and bronze six times (2015, 2013, 2004, 1996, 1952, 1949).

- TALKING POINTS -

THE SERIES VS. LATVIA

This is the 14th world championship meeting between the United States and Latvia. All-time, the U.S. holds a 9-0-0-3-1 record and a 41-27 advantage in goals scored.

A year ago, the two teams met in the preliminary round where the U.S. claimed a 5-3 victory. Five different U.S. players scored, including **Nick Bjugstad** (Blaine, Minn.), **JT Compher** (Northbrook, III.), **Johnny Gaudreau** (Salem, N.J.), **Dylan Larkin** (Waterford, Mich.) and **Andrew Copp** (Ann Arbor, Mich.), who tallied the game-winner with 3:22 to play.

NINE IN 11 FOR BLASHILL, TEAM USA

Entering today's game, the U.S. is now 8-1-0-2 in 11 games under head coach **Jeff Blashill** (Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.). With nine wins in its last 11 tournament games, the U.S. is currently in its best tournament stretch since winning 12 of 14 across the 1931, 1933 and 1934 tournaments. From 1920-1968, there was no World Championship in Olympic years as the Olympic champion was also declared world champion.

FIRST BACK-TO-BACK SHUTOUT WINS SINCE 2011

With wins over Denmark (4-0) and Germany (3-0) both coming by shutouts, the U.S. has now registered back-to-back shutout wins for the first time since the 2010 IIHF Men's World Championship. There, it blanked Kazakhstan, 10-0, and France, 4-0, in the relegation round to finish 13th overall.

Keith Kinkaid (Farmingville, N.Y.), the starter in Team USA's first three games this year, collected both shutouts to push his tournament stats to three wins, a 1.30 goals against average and .955 save percentage while saving 84 of 88 shots.

U.S. PLAYER OF THE GAMES

Through three games, **Keith Kinkaid** (Farmingville, N.Y.), Chris Kreider (Boxford, Mass.) and **Patrick Kane** (Buffalo, N.Y.) have earned U.S. Player of the Game honors. Against Canada (May 4), Kinkaid stopped 40 of 44 shots, including five of Canada's six shootout attempts, to earn a 5-4 shootout win. The next day, Kreider tallied a goal and an assist in Team USA's 4-0 win over host Denmark. On May 7, Kane tallied three points (1-2) to lead the U.S. past Germany, 3-0.

MAY 2, 2011: USA 4, NOR 2: After falling behind by a 2-0 count, the U.S. rallied with a four-goal third period to defeat Norway, 4-2. Current U.S. forward Chris Kreider (Boxford, Mass.) tallied an assist in the game. The U.S. has not lost to Norway since March 9, 1951, where it was shutout, 3-0.

FINLAND



Men's Worlds Series vs. Finland: 62 GP 22-1-2-29-8 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) Of Note: A rematch of Team USA's 2017 MWC quarterfinal, a 2-0 Finland win.

MAY 18, 2017: USA 0, FIN 2: A year ago, Jimmy Howard (Syracuse, N.Y.) made 18 saves as the U.S. outshot Finland, 26-20, but fell, 2-0. The defeat came after the U.S. rallied off six-straight wins, matching a U.S. record in tournamnet play, and snapped a four-game win streak against Fins.

BILL ZITO, GENERAL MANAGER • Milwaukee, Wis. • Assistant GM, Columbus Blue Jackets Bill Zito is serving as a general manager on a U.S. men's national team for the first time. Zito, who also holds the role of general manager for the AHL's Cleveland Monsters, is a member of USA Hockey's international council and previously served on the management staff for the 2015 U.S. Men's National Team that claimed a bronze medal at the 2015 IIHF Men's World Championship. Zito joined the Blue Jackets in the summer of 2013 before adding his role with the Monsters two years later. Prior to joining the Blue Jackets organization, Zito spent two decades building Acme World Sports into one of the top hockey agencies in the world by uncovering late-round or undrafted, lesser-known players, as well as the top picks.

JEFF BLASHILL, HEAD COACH • Sault Ste. Marie, Mich. • Detroit Red Wings Head Coach (3rd Season) Jeff Blashill, who guided the 2017 U.S. Men's National Team to a 6-0-0-2 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record, in his international head coaching debut, is serving as head coach of the 2018 U.S. Men's National Team. This is the fifth time Blashill will be behind a U.S. bench. Previously, he was a goaltending coach for the 2009 U.S. National Junior Team and an assistant coach for both the U.S. Junior Select Team that won the 2009 World Junior A Challenge and the U.S. Under-18 Men's Select Team that earned second place at the 2006 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament. A former USHL and NCAA head coach, Blashill joined Detroit after three seasons with its AHL affiliate, the Grand Rapids Griffins, where he led the program to its first Calder Cup championship in the 17-year history of the franchise in 2012-13.

DAN BYLSMA, ASSISTANT COACH • Grand Haven, Mich. • 2014 U.S. Olympic Head Coach • 2009 Stanley Cup Champion Dan Bylsma is representing the U.S. as a coach for the third time. The head coach of the 2014 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team in Sochi, Russia, Bylsma most recently served as an assistant coach for the bronze medal-winning 2015 U.S. Men's National Team. Bylsma, who won the Stanley Cup in his first season as head coach of the Pittsburgh Penguins, currently ranks first all-time among Pittsburgh bench bosses with 252 wins he accumulated during his six seasons with the organization. He also served two seasons (2015-17) as head coach of the NHL's Buffalo Sabres.

DON GRANATO, ASSISTANT COACH • Downers Grove, III. • Chicago Blackhawks Assistant Coach (1st Season) Don Granato is an assistant coach on a U.S. Men's National Team for the second time after fulfilling the same capacity in 2014. He has significant experience on the international stage, having led the U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team to gold (2015) and silver (2013) medal finishes at the IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship as head coach, while also serving as an assistant for the 2015 U.S. National Junior Team. Granato was a head coach at USA Hockey National Team Development Program from 2011-17, guiding the U.S. to five other international titles.

SETH APPERT, ASSISTANT COACH • Cottage Grove, Mich. • Head Coach, USA Hockey's NTDP (1st Season) Seth Appert returns as an assistant coach for Blashill and the U.S. Men's National Team for the second straight year. The head coach of the U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team that earned silver at the 2018 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship on April 29, Appert was an assistant coach for last year's gold medal-winning 2017 U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team. His other USA Hockey coaching experience includes two stints as head coach (2008, 2011) and one as assistant coach (2007) of the U.S. Under-18 Men's Select Team that competed in the Ivan Hlinka Memorial Cup.

TEAM USA TIDBITS

U.S. MEN'S NATIONAL TEAM ADVISORY GROUP

The staff and players of the 2018 U.S. Men's National Team are selected by **Bill Zito** (Columbus Blue Jackets), general manager of the 2018 U.S. Men's National Team, along with members of the U.S. Men's National Team Advisory Group that includes Stan Bowman (Chicago Blackhawks), David Poile (Nashville Predators), Ray Shero (New Jersey Devils), Dale Tallon (Florida Panthers), and Jeff Gorton (New York Rangers). USA Hockey's international council, chaired by Gavin Regan (Potsdam, N.Y.), has oversight responsibilities for all U.S. national teams.

MURPHY'S FIFTH STRAIGHT MEN'S WORLDS

U.S. defenseman and alternate captain Connor Murphy (Dublin, Ohio) is skating in his fifth straight world championship. Only three other players in U.S. history have skated in five straight men's world championships, including Eric Weinrich (6 straight, 1997-2002), Darby Hendrickson (6 straight, 1996-2001) and Adam Hall (2003-07). A year ago, Murphy served as captain for the 2017 U.S. Men's National Team.

IIHF SOCIAL MEDIA FUN

Following practice today, former Boston College teammates and 2010 NCAA National Champions Cam Atkinson (Riverside, Conn.) and Chris Kreider (Boxford, Mass.) played NHL Threes in a best-of-three series. Additionally, 2016 U.S. National Junior Team bronze medalists Sonny Milano (Massapequa, N.Y.) and Colin White (Hanover, Mass.) played foosball. Both competitions were filmed by the IIHF social teams and will be published online in the coming days.

ROOMMATE TIES

Amongst Team USA's roommate duos are a number of combinations with ties to current or former teams. For example, New Jersey Devils teammates Keith Kinkaid (Farmingville, N.Y.) and Blake Coleman (Plano, Texas) are paired together, as are fellow Devils Brian Gibbons (Braintree, Mass.) and Will Butcher (Sun Prairie, Wis.) Additionally, 2012 Boston College National Championship teammates Johnny Gaudreau (Salem, N.J.) and Chris Kreider (Boxford, Mass.) are sharing a room as are 2017 U.S. National Junior Team gold medalists **Tage Thompson** (Milford, Conn.) and **Colin White** (Hanover, Mass.).

USHL, NAHL CHAMPIONS ON TEAM USA ROSTER

While the USHL's Clark Cup Final and NAHL's Robertson Cup Final are set to begin this Friday, five members of Team USA were part of championship-winning clubs in USA Hockey's junior hockey leagues.

Four players claimed a USHL Clark Cup championship. including Johnny Gaudreau (Dubuque Fighting Saints, 2011) Alec Martinez (Cedar Rapids RoughRiders, 2005) and 2010 Clark Cup Championship teammates Anders Lee and Nick Jensen. Additionally, Keith Kinkaid won the NAHL's 2009 Robertson Cup with the St. Louis Bandits.

The USHL's Clark Cup will come down to a best-of-five championship series starting Friday and continuing as long as May 23, if necessary. The NAHL's Robertson Cup takes the four divisional champions to Fogerty Ice Arena in Blaine, Minn., Friday through Monday for two best-of-three semifinal series and a one-game championship game on the final day.

With an average of 25.5 entering this year's tournament, the 2018 U.S. Men's National Team is Team USA's oldest since 2013, when that squad held an average age of 25.8. Over the last 15 years, the 2018 team ranks as Team USA's fourth oldest after the 2005 (28.1), 2004 (27.6) and 2013 (25.8). Both the 2004 and 2013 went on to claim bronze medals.

KANE, MURPHY & LARKIN LEADING TEAM USA

On April 9, USA Hockey announced that Patrick Kane (Buffalo, N.Y.) will serve as captain for the 2018 U.S. Men's National Team. A three-time Stanley Cup champion with the Chicago Blackhawks who has twice represented the U.S. in the Olympic Winter Games (2010, 2014), including helping Team USA to a silver medal in 2010, Kane is skating in his second IIHF Men's World Championship (2008) and seventh international event.

Ahead of its exhibition game on Tuesday, May 1, it was also announced that Connor Murphy (Dublin, Ohio) and Dylan Larkin (Waterford, Mich.) will serve as alternate captains. A year ago, Murphy was captain of Team USA while Larkin served as an alternate captain. The two were part of the 2015 U.S. Men's National Team that earned a bronze medal at the 2015 IIHF Men's World Championship.

INTERNATIONAL WINNING PEDIGREES

Fourteen U.S. players have skated for a U.S. national team previously and have combined to win 24 medals in IIHF World

Championship play.

Among the medalists are 10 IIHF gold medalists, including defensemen Will Butcher (2012 MU18), Quinn Hughes (2017 MU18) and Connor Murphy (2013 WJC, 2011 MU18) and forwards Johnny Gaudreau (2013 WJC), Patrick Kane (2006 MU18), Chris Kreider (2010 WJC), Dylan Larkin (2014 MU18), Sonny Milano (2014 MU18), Tage Thompson (2017 WJC) and Colin White (2017 WJC, 2015 MU18).

FIVE MAKING INTERNATIONAL DEBUTS

Five players, including goaltenders Scott Darling (Lemont, Ill.) and Charlie Lindgren (Lakeville, Minn.); defenseman and Jordan Oesterle (Dearborn Heights, Mich.) and forwards Blake Coleman (Plano, Texas) and Brian Gibbons (Braintree, Mass.) are competing in their international debuts at the 2018 IIHF Men's World Championship. Additionally, defensemen **Nick** Jensen (St. Paul, Minn.), Alec Martinez (Rochester Hills, Mich.) and Neal Pionk (Hermantown, Minn.) as well as forward Derek Ryan (Spokane, Wash.) are skating in an IIHF tournament for the first time after previously skating on U.S. select teams.

U.S. SUPPORT STAFF

Additional staff members on this year's U.S. Men's National Team include team leader Bob Webster (Littleton, Colo.), video coordinator Adam Nightingale (Cheboygan, Mich.) and director of hockey operations Kevin McLaughlin (Colorado Springs, Colo.) While Webster and Nightingale were members of Team USA a year ago, this is the first U.S. Men's National Team for McLaughlin, who works for USA Hockey full-time as its senior director of hockey development.

Team USA's support staff includes athletic trainers Dave Zeis (Buffalo, N.Y.) and Stan Wong (Boca Raton, Fla.); equipment managers Scott Aldrich (Colorado Springs, Colo.) and Mark **DePasquale** (Chicago, III.); team physician **Dr. Charles Popkin** (Medina, Minn.); and communications manager **Jon Gomez** (Colorado Springs, Colo.).

REMEMBERING JIM JOHANNSON

Prior to Team USA's tournament-opening game against Canada, the IIHF recognized Jim Johannson, assistant executive director of USA Hockey and general manager of the 2018 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team, who passed away in his sleep at his home in Colorado Springs on Jan. 21. Johannson, born March 10, 1964, in Rochester, Minn., had a life-long career in hockey and was one of the most accomplished and respected people in the sport. Johannson's time with USA Hockey included 34 gold, 19 silver and 11 bronze medals; the launching and implementation of the highly acclaimed American Development Model; and securing USA Hockey Arena in Plymouth, Mich. as a home for all U.S. teams to utilize. He had served on 18 consecutive U.S. Men's National Teams (1999-2017).

TEAM USA TIDBITS -

FOUR STANLEY CUP CHAMPIONS

Four players on Team USA have claimed a Stanley Cup. Since 2009, a current member of the 2018 U.S. Men's National Team has been on six of the last eight Stanley Cup-winning teams.

Assistant coach **Dan Bylsma**, in his NHL head coaching debut, led the Pittsburgh Penguins to Stanley Cup in 2009. The following year, **Patrick Kane** helped the Chicago Blackhawks to its first of three Stanley Cup championships (2010, 2013, 2015). His performance in 2013 saw him earn the Conn Smythe Trophy as MVP of the Playoffs. Joining Kane on the 2015 Stanley Cupwinning squad was goaltender and Lemont, Ill., native **Scott Darling**. Additionally, **Alec Martinez** helped the Los Angeles Kings claim its first Stanley Cup win in its franchise history in 2012 before helping the Kings win the Cup again in 2014.

STANLEY CUP GAME-WINNING GOALS

Two players on the 2018 U.S. Men's National Team have scored Stanley Cup-clinching goals. In 2010, forward **Patrick Kane**'s goal 4:06 into overtime gave the Chicago Blackhawks its first Stanley Cup since 1961 with a 4-3 Game 6 win over the Philadelphia Flyers. Four years later, defenseman **Alec Martinez** scored with 5:17 remaining in double overtime of Game 5 to give the Los Angeles Kings a 3-2 victory over fellow U.S. forward **Chris Kreider** (Boxford, Mass.) and the New York Rangers for its second Stanley Cup in three years (2012).

U.S. COACHING STAFF HOLD COLLEGE ROOTS

While 18 of the 23 U.S. players may hail from the college ranks, so does all four members of Team USA's coaching staff. Head coach **Jeff Blashill** (Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.) skated four seasons (1994-98) at Ferris State University, including two seasons with U.S. assistant coach **Seth Appert** (Cottage Grove, Minn.), who also played goaltender from 1992-96. Additionally, **Dan Bylsma** (Grand Haven, Mich.) played four years (1988-1992) for Bowling Green State University while **Don Granato** (Downers Grove, Ill.) skated four seasons (1987-91) for the late Jeff Sauer, a 2014 U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame inductee, at the University of Wisconsin. In 1990, Granato and the Badgers claimed an NCAA National Championship with a 7-3 win over Colgate.

COLLEGE REUNIONS

The 2018 U.S. Men's National Team has a number of players from the same college skating together. In total, 18 of the 23 players representing Team USA come from 11 different NCAA schools. Boston College leads all school with five players - Cam Atkinson (2008-11), Chris Kreider (2009-12), Johnny Gaudreau (2011-14), Brian Gibbons (2007-11) and Colin White (2015-17). Three schools each have two players on Team USA, as Charlie Lindgren (2013-16) and Nick Jensen (2010-13 both skated at St. Cloud State University; Dylan Larkin (2014-15) and Quinn Hughes (2017-18) played at the University of Michigan and both Alec Martinez (2005-08) and Blake Coleman (2011-15) played at Miami University (Ohio). Additionally, Jeff Blashill and Seth Appert were teammates at Ferris State University where they both were goaltenders.

TEAM USA TIES TO 2018 MU18 SILVER MEDAL WINNERS

On April 29, the 2018 U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team earned a silver medal at the 2018 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship. The team was coached by 2018 U.S. Men's National Team assistant coach **Seth Appert** (Cottage Grove, Minn.) and included forward **Jack Hughes** (Orlando, Fla.), brother of 2018 U.S. Men's National Team defenseman **Quinn Hughes** (Orlando, Fla.). A year ago, Quinn helped the U.S. win gold at the 2017 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship.

Quinn's brother, Jack, finished the tournament with five goals and seven assists for 12 points, which led all tournament skaters and saw him earn Tournament MVP and Best Forward honors.

Due to the long walk distance to get from their regular locker rooms to the ice at the Jyske Bank Boxen, the IIHF provides golf cart shuttles for each team's goaltenders ... Team USA returns its top three point scorers from a year ago in Johnny Gaudreau (Salem, N.J.), Dylan Larkin (Waterford, Mich.) and Anders Lee (Edina, Minn.). Gaudreau had 11 points (6-5), Larkin tallied 10 (2-8) and Lee added eight (5-3) ... Dylan Larkin (Waterford, Mich.), Anders Lee (Edina, Minn.) and Connor Murphy (Dublin, Ohio) won a bronze medal with Team USA at the 2015 IIHF Men's World Championship which had Dan Bylsma (Grand Haven, Mich.) as an assistant coach ... Five U.S. players skated at Boston College, including Cam Atkinson (Riverside, Conn.), Brian Gibbons (Braintree, Mass.), Chris Kreider (Boxford, Mass.), Johnny Gaudreau (Salem, N.J.) and Colin White (Hanover, Mass.). Both Gibbons (2008, 2010) and Kreider (2010, 2012) left Boston College as two-time NCAA champions while Atkinson (2010) and Gaudreau (2012) were each part of NCAA title-winning Eagle squads as well ... Four players on Team USA made their NHL debuts this season, including Will Butcher (New Jersey Devils), Neal Pionk (New York Rangers), Tage Thompson (St. Louis Blues) and Colin White (Ottawa Senators) ... Seventeen players on the 2018 U.S. Men's National Team spent time in the United States Hockey League, the only Tier I junior league in the United States ... Four players are former USA Hockey award winners, including College Player of the Year recipients Will Butcher (2017) and Johnny Gaudreau (2014) and Dave Tyler Junior Player of the Year recipients Will Butcher (2013) ... Blake Geoffrion (Brentwood, Tenn.), who skated with U.S. captain Patrick Kane (Buffalo, N.Y.) on Team USA's gold medal-winning 2006 U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team and bronze medal-winning 2007 U



2018 IIHF UNDER-18 MEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

The U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team earned a silver medal at the 2018 IIHF Under-18 Men's National Championship in Chelyabinsk & Magnitogorsk, Russia.

After falling to Canada, 6-4, to open preliminary round play, the U.S. topped Switzerland, 8-5, before falling to Sweden, 3-1. In the team's final preliminary round game, it blanked Belarus, 8-0, to earn a quarterfinal meeting agains Russia. With a 5-1 quarterfinal victory over the host nation, the U.S. edged the Czech Republic, 4-1, to earn a spot in its tournament-record 14th gold medal game. There, the U.S. overcame a two-goal deficit to even the score before Finland scored in the third period to claim a 3-2 win.

Seth Appert served as head coach and was joined by assistant coaches Nick Fohr, Mason Graddock, Rand Pecknold and Thomas Speer. The 2018 event was Appert's second consecutive with the U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team after serving as an assistant on last year's gold medal-winning squad.

USA HOCKEY SELECTS 21 TO JOIN USA HOCKEY'S NTDP

On May 4, USA Hockey announced 11 forwards, eight defensemen and two goaltenders that have been selected to join USA Hockey's National Team Development Program in Plymouth, Mich. The 21 players from the 2002 birth year will compete for the U.S. National Under-17 Team for the 2018-19 season. The Under-17 Team will play in the United States Hockey League, the only Tier I junior hockey league in the United States, as well as select competition against teams in the North American Hockey League and Minnesota Elite League. It will also compete in three international tournaments, including the 2018 World Under-17 Hockey Challenge, 2018 Four Nations Tournament and 2019 Five Nations Tournament.

USA HOCKEY'S NTDP BOUNCED FROM USHL CLARK CUP PLAYOFFS

Erik Middendorf (Scottsdale, Ariz.) scored the lone goal for USA Hockey's National Team Development Program Under-17 Team in a 5-1 loss against the Youngstown Phantoms in Game 4 of the United States Hockey League's Clark Cup Eastern Conference Final on May 5 at Covelli Centre. The loss gave Youngstown its series-clinching win to advance to the USHL's Clark Cup Final as

the U17s finished its season with a record of 42-18-0-1.
This was the first time since since 2011-12 that the NTDP competed in the USHL's Clark Cup Playoffs. The 2017-18 Eastern Conference regular-season champions, the NTDP earned a first-round playoff bye before meeting the Chicago Steel in the semifinals where it claimed the series, 3-1.

CHRIS CHELIOS NAMED TO 11HF HALL OF FAME CLASS OF 2018

Last December, Chris Chelios (Downers Grove, III.) was named to the International Ice Hockey Federation Hall of Fame Class of 2018 that will be inducted on the final week of the 2018 IIHF Men's World Championship. Chelios will become the 23rd American to be enshrined into the IIHF Hall of Fame.

One of only two male players to represent the United States at four Olympic Winter Games (1984, 1988, 2002, 2006), he also participated in three Canada Cups (1984, 1987, 1991), and two World Cups of Hockey (1996, 2004). He first skated on the interestical decay when the capacitant of the company of the co international stage when he competed on the U.S. National Junior Team at the IIHF World Junior Championship in 1982

Representing his country 10 times internationally, he totaled 23 points (5-18) in 60 games played while helping the U.S. win the inaugural 1996 World Cup of Hockey and captaining Team USA to a silver medal at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games in Salt Lake City.

A three-time Stanley Cup champion, Chelios holds the record for most games played by a defenseman in NHL history (1,651), after completing 26 seasons in the NHL. Since retirement, Chelios most recently served as an assistant coach for the 2018 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team after fulfilling the same role for the 2016 U.S. National Junior Team at the IIHF World Junior Championship, helping them capture a bronze medal.

OTHER U.S. SUCCESS IN INTERNATIONAL PLAY

In addition to its success in IIHF, Olympic and Paralympic play, the United States had a number of other teams find success in international competition.

Last December, two U.S. teams reached the championship game of their respective tournaments. On Dec. 16, the U.S. Junior Select Team reached the championship game of the 2018 World Junior A Challenge in Truro, Nova Scotia, but fell to Canada West, 5-1, to earn second. That second-place finish preceded Team USA's championship at the 2017 World Sled Hockey Challenge in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island. On Nov. 12, the U.S. Women's National Hockey Team topped Canada, 5-1, to claim the 2017 Four Nations Cup at Amalie

Arena in Tampa, Florida. The title was Team USA's third-straight in the event and eighth overall.

The U.S. National Under-17 Team also claimed a pair of international titles. On Dec. 16, the U.S. National Under-17 Team defeated Russia, 2-1, in a shootout in its final game of the 2017 Under-17 Four Nations Tournament to secure first place with an undefeated 2-1-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record. The team also claimed the 2017 World Under-17 Hockey Challenge in Dawson Creek, British Columbia, in early November.

USA HOCKEY SETS 8-AND-UNDER PLAYER PARTICIPATION RECORD

On March 2, USA Hockey announced that Paulina Doughtie from Antioch, Tennessee, became USA Hockey's 115,695th 8-and-Under player in 2017-18, setting a single-season 8U participation record. It marked the third consecutive record-breaking season for USA Hockey in the 8U age classification. Doughtie was introduced to the game in 2017 through USA Hockey's Try Hockey For Free Day and the Little Predators Learn-to-Play program, part of a league-wide initiative developed by the NHL and NHLPA that provides new players with six to eight weeks of beginner instruction and a full set of hockey equipment to keep.

ABOUT USA HOCKEY'S NATIONAL TEAM DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Founded in 1996, USA Hockey's National Team Development Program began operations in Ann Arbor, Michigan, and remained there until the summer of 2015. The full-time program is composed of two squads, the U.S. National Under-18 Team and U.S. National Under-17 teams, which compete in the USHL as well as against international and collegiate competition.

The Under-17 Team competes in the United States Hockey League and also participates in three international events annually. The U.S. National Under-18 Team's schedule includes games against NCAA Division I and III opponents, USHL teams as well as competition in three international tournaments.

ABOUT USA HOCKEY ARENA

USA Hockey Arena, home of USA Hockey's National Team Development Program, is a two-sheet facility with regulation ice (85x200) in the main arena and Olympic-size ice (100x200) for the secondary sheet. Acquired by the USA Hockey Foundation on April 1, 2015, the facility has added 20,000 square feet to the property that included a 9,800-square-foot workout facility, additional offices and a conference center. In total, the facility encompasses 170,000 square feet with the main rink providing 3,504 seats for hockey games and 4,500 seats for other performances and events. Accompanying the facility is the USA Hockey Summer Drive-In, which has three large screens that show first-run double-features seven nights a week, as well as CJ's Brewing Company.
