TODAY'S GAME

The U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team enters elimination round play today at the 2019 International Ice Hockey Federation Under-18 Women's World Championship with a semifinal matchup against Finland at the Obihiro Forest Ice Arena in Obihiro, Japan. Puck drop is slated for 1 p.m. local time/11 p.m. ET (Jan. 11). Tonight's game will be live streamed on IIHF.com. Live game updates will also be provided on Twitter @USAHockey using the hashtag #U18WWC.

TALKING POINTS

THE SERIES VS. FINLAND

The U.S. holds a 1-0-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record against Finland all-time in IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship play. The two teams last met on Mar. 29, 2010 in the preliminary of the 2010 tournament, where the U.S. earned a 5-0 victory. Two-time Olympian and 2018 Olympic gold medal winner **Kendall Coyne** tallied two goals in the game, while another 2018 gold medalist, **Alex Rigsby**, recorded a 13-save shutout.

SEEKING FIVE STRAIGHT GOLDS

Team USA enters the tournament seeking its fifth consecutive gold medal at the IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship, having won gold at the 2018 competition in Dmitrov, Russia, 2017 in Zlin & Prerov, Czech Republic, 2016 in St. Catharines, Ontario, and 2015 in Buffalo, New York. The U.S. also claimed gold at the 2011, 2009 and 2008 competitions.

REPEAT PERFORMERS

The roster features nine players that helped the U.S. earn gold at last year's IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship in Dmitrov, Russia, including **Hannah Bilka**, **Hadley Hartmetz**, **Katy Knoll**, **Abbey Murphy**, **Maggie Nicholson**, **Casey O'Brien**, **Dominique Petrie**, **Sydney Shearen** and **Makenna Webster**. Forward Webster led the team at last year's tournament with two game-winning goals and nine points. A two-time world champion having won gold at both the 2017 and 2018 Under-18 Women's World Championship tournaments, Petrie is the lone U.S. player in pursuit of her third straight gold medal.

GAME THREE RECAP

Lacey Eden scored the game-winning goal and **Skylar Vetter** recorded a 17-save shutout as Team USA defeated Sweden, 2-0, in its final preliminary round game of the 2019 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship.

"Tonight was a great win against a quality opponent and I'm really proud of the way our group is progressing," said **Maura Crowell**, head coach of the 2019 U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team. "We'll enjoy this win tonight before turning our attention to preparing for Saturday's semifinal starting tomorrow."

LEADERSHIP GROUP

Petrie is serving as team captain alongside alternate captain Knoll. Both players were part of the gold medal-winning 2018 squad, while Petrie also helped the 2017 U.S. team earn gold in Zlin and Prerov, Czech Republic. Crowell commented: "Both Dominique and Katy are valued members of our women's under-18 program. They have experience succeeding at the highest level and, most importantly, both of them are respected by their teammates and the staff."

COMING TOGETHER

The 23-player roster includes 12 forwards, eight defenders and three goaltenders that represent 15 different states. Minnesota leads the pack with five representatives, followed by New York (4) and Michigan (2). In addition, Alaska, California, Connecticut, Illinois, Maryland, Massachusetts, Missouri, New Hampshire, New Jersey, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Texas each have one.

NEW FACES IN NEW PLACES

Fourteen members of Team USA will make their IIHF world championship debut this month, including four that will don a USA sweater for the first time in international competition. Those are **Hannah Hogenson**, **Kate Monihan**, **Mallory Uihlein** and **Audrey Wethington**.

BEHIND THE BENCH

Crowell, head coach of the University of Minnesota Duluth women's team, is serving as head coach of the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team for the first time after having served as associate coach in 2017-18 and assistant coach in 2015-16. In both previous seasons, Team USA has taken home gold medals from the IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship. Crowell has additional experience with USA Hockey, having also coached at a pair of USA Hockey Women's National Festivals, and during the 2018, 2017 and 2015 Under-18 Series against Canada. Joining her as assistant coaches will be **Josh Sciba**, head women's ice hockey coach at Union College, and **Brianna Decker**, member of the gold medal-winning 2018 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team.

TEAM BUILDING

The 23-player roster for the 2019 U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team was unveiled on December 14. The team held a pre-tournament camp from Dec. 28-Jan. 2 in Los Angeles in preparation for the tournament. Team USA flew to Japan on Jan. 2 and held four practices in Obihiro before opening the competition.

RECAPPING LAST YEAR

The U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team captured an unprecedented fourth consecutive gold medal at the 2018 International Ice Hockey Federation Under-18 Women's World Championship in Dmitrov, Russia. Team USA earned the top seed from Group A after topping Sweden in overtime, 2-1, Russia 5-3 and Canada, 6-2. In the semifinal round, the U.S. rallied from a two-goal deficit in the final period to top Canada in a shootout, 4-3. In a rematch against Sweden for gold, Team USA scored six goals in the second period en route to a 9-3 victory. Gracie Ostertag was named Best Defenseman and Taylor Heise was named Best Forward. In addition, Heise and Webster were selected to the Tournament Media All-Star Team while Heise was also named Tournament MVP.

2019 IIHF U18 WOMEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

The International Ice Hockey Federation Under-18 Women's World Championship is in its 12th year after the inaugural tournament was held in Calgary in 2008. Subsequently, the event was held in Fussen, Germany, in 2009, Chicago in 2010, Stockholm, Sweden, in 2011, Zlin, Czech Republic, in 2012, Heinola, Finland, in 2013, Budapest, Hungary, in 2014, Buffalo, New York, in 2015, St. Catharines, Ontario, in 2016, Zlin & Prerov, Czech Republic in 2017, and Dmitrov, Russia, in 2018. The U.S. and Canada have met in the gold-medal game in 10 out of 11 of the previous competitions, but 2018 marked the first time a North American team met a non-North American team in the final when the U.S. defeated Sweden, 9-3, to claim the top prize.

The tournament features eight teams divided into two groups. Group A consists of the United States, Canada, Russia and Sweden, while Group B features the Czech Republic, Finland, Japan and Switzerland. After a round-robin series in each group, the four teams from Group A and the best two teams from Group B advance. The two top-seeded teams from Group A will receive a quarterfinal round bye thus moving automatically to the semifinals. The winner of each Semi-Final game will move onto the gold-medal game, while the losers will play in the bronze-medal game.

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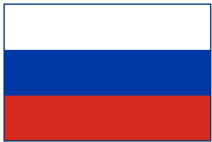

JAN. 7, 2019: USA 3, CAN 2: Abbey Murphy scored two goals, including the game winner and was named U.S. Player of the Game in Team USA's 3-2 victory over Canada in this year's preliminary round.

SWEDEN



Series vs. Sweden: 11-1-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L)

Of Note: The U.S. remained undefeated against Sweden with a win on Wednesday.

JAN. 9, 2019: USA 2, SWE 0: Lacey Eden scored the game-winning goal for the U.S. and Skylar Vetter recorded her first shutout of the tournament. Vetter was also named U.S. Player of the Game after earning her third consecutive victory at the tournament.

U.S. All-Time in U18WWC Quarterfinals: 0-0 (W-L)

Of Note: The U.S. has never played in a quarterfinal contest in IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship history, having earned a bye to the semifinal round in all 11 of the previous competitions.

SEMIFINALS



U.S. All-Time in U18WWC Semifinals: 11-0 (W-L)

Of Note: The U.S. has won all 11 semifinal contests it has played at the competition, topping the Czech Republic six times, Sweden twice and Canada, Germany and Russia each once. This year's tournament will be the first time the U.S. and Finland have met in the semifinals.

MEDAL GAMES



U.S. All-Time in U18WWC Gold Medal Games: 7-4 (W-L)

Of Note: The U.S. faced off against Sweden in last year's gold-medal game, marking the first time the tournament finale did not feature a USA-Canada match-up. In 2019, the U.S. is looking to become the first country to win five consecutive gold medals at the IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship.

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2019 U.S. UNDER-18 WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM COACHES

MAURA CROWELL, HEAD COACH

On May 16, 2018, USA Hockey announced that Maura Crowell (Mansfield, Mass.), head coach of the University of Minnesota Duluth women's ice hockey team, would serve as head coach of the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team for the 2018-19 season. Crowell is serving as head coach of the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team for the first time in her career, after having served as associate coach in 2017-18 and assistant coach in 2015-16. In both previous seasons, Team USA has taken home gold medals from the IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship. Crowell has additional experience with USA Hockey, having also coached at a pair of USA Hockey Women's National Festivals, and during the 2017 and 2015 Under-18 Series against Canada. Crowell completed her third season as head coach at the University of Minnesota Duluth in 2017-18. She led the Bulldogs back into the NCAA playoffs during the 2016-17 season, its first tournament appearance since 2011. For her efforts that season, Crowell was recognized as the USCHO Division I Women's Coach of the Year, CCM/AHCA Division I Women's Ice Hockey Coach of the Year and WCHA Coach of the Year. Prior to joining the Bulldogs, Crowell spent five years with Harvard University in various coaching capacities. Crowell joined the Crimson after a five-year stint as head coach of the women's ice hockey team at UMass Boston, where she was named the 2009-10 Eastern College Athletic Conference East Women's Ice Hockey Coach of the Year. Crowell played collegiately at Colgate University.



BRIANNA DECKER, ASSISTANT COACH

Decker is making her debut as a member of the coaching staff for the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team, having recently helped the 2018 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team to a gold medal at the PyeongChang Olympic Winter Games in February. Decker has previous coaching experience with USA Hockey having served as a coach at various Central District camps since 2012 and during USA Hockey Girls Under-18 Select Player Development Camps. Additionally, Decker has served as an assistant coach with the Madison Capitals and at various other camps since graduating from the University of Wisconsin in 2014. A two-time Olympian (2018-gold, 2014-silver), five-time International Ice Hockey Federation Women's World Championship gold medalist (2013-17, 2011) and two-time Bob Allen Women's Player of the Year Award recipient (2017, 2015), Decker will focus on player mentoring and development as coach while remaining an active player in the USA Hockey women's program.



JOSH SCIBA, ASSISTANT COACH

Sciba will be serving as assistant coach for the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team for the first time. He has been a coach annually at USA Hockey Under-18 Girls Player Development Camps for the past 10 years, and recently served as a coach during the 2017 USA Hockey Women's National Festival in Lake Placid, New York. Sciba is currently the head coach of the Union College women's hockey team, a position he has held since 2016. Under his guidance, the Dutchwoman hockey program has shown steady growth. He was named a top-three finalist for the ECAC Coach of the Year in 2017-18. Prior to joining the Union staff, Sciba served as an assistant women's hockey coach at Colgate University from 2012-2016. In his final season with the Raiders, Sciba helped the team to a program-best 22 wins. He also spent four years on the Niagara University women's hockey coaching staff, including three seasons as an assistant coach and one campaign as head coach. Sciba is a 2007 graduate of the University of Notre Dame where he spent four seasons (2003-07) as a member of the Fighting Irish men's program.

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USA HOCKEY HAPPENINGS

U.S. INTERNATIONAL SUCCESS

Since 2010, no other nation has claimed more medals in Olympic, Paralympic and International Ice Hockey Federation play than the United States' 44. Additionally, Team USA's 26 collective gold medals also leads all nations. In total, the last eight years has seen the U.S. claim 26 gold medals, 12 silver medals and six bronze medals.

The 26 gold medals span seven events, including the Olympic Winter Games (2018 - Women), Paralympic Winter Games (2010, 2014, 2018), IIHF Women's World Championship (2011, 2013, 2015-17), IIHF World Junior Championship (2010, 2013, 2017), IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship (2010-15, 2017), IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship (2011, 2015-18) and IPC Para Hockey World Championship (2012, 2015).

U.S. CLAIMS SILVER AT WJC

The U.S. National Junior Team fell to Finland at the IIHF World Junior Championship on Saturday, 3-2, in Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada. Team USA's silver medal.

Sasha Chmelevski and Josh Norris scored and Cayden Primeau turned aside 28 shots in the loss.

Team USA's (5-0-1-1/W-OTW-OTL-L) silver-medal finish continues its unprecedented medal streak in tournament play after winning gold in 2017 and earning bronze-medal finishes in 2016 and 2018. The U.S. now has 12 medals in tournament play, including four gold medals (2004, 2010, 2013, 2017), two silver medals (1997, 2019) and six bronze medals (1986, 1992, 2007, 2011, 2016, 2018).

U.S. JUNIOR SELECT TEAM WINS 2018 WORLD JR A CHALLENGE

On Dec. 16, the U.S. Junior Select Team topped Russia, 2-0, to win the 2018 World Junior A Challenge in Bonnyville, Alberta. The win marks the fifth World Junior A Challenge title for the U.S. as it has now claimed the championship eight times (2008-10, 2012-14, 2016, 2018), finished second once (2017) and third three times (2007, 2011, 2015).

Anthony Noreen (Kearney, Neb.), head coach and general manager of the Tri-City Storm, served as head coach of the U.S. Junior Select Team and was joined by assistant coaches **Mark Abalan** (Sioux City, Iowa), **Shane Fukushima** (Waterloo, Iowa) and **David Wilkie** (Omaha, Neb.). All players on Team USA currently play in the United States Hockey League, the lone Tier I junior league in the U.S.

USA HOCKEY'S NATIONAL TEAM DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Founded in 1996, USA Hockey's National Team Development Program began operations in Ann Arbor, Michigan, and remained there until the summer of 2015. The full-time program is composed of two squads, the U.S. National Under-18 Team and U.S. National Under-17 teams, which compete in the USHL as well as against international and collegiate competition.

The Under-17 Team competes in the United States Hockey League and also participates in three international events annually. The U.S. National Under-18 Team's schedule includes games against NCAA Division I and III opponents, USHL teams as well as competition in three international tournaments.

USA HOCKEY ARENA

USA Hockey Arena, home of USA Hockey's National Team Development Program, is a two-sheet facility with regulation ice (85x200) in the main arena and Olympic-size ice (100x200) for the secondary sheet. Acquired by the USA Hockey Foundation on April 1, 2015, the facility has added 20,000 square feet to the property that included a 9,800-square-foot workout facility, additional offices and a conference center. In total, the facility encompasses 170,000 square feet with the main rink providing 3,504 seats for hockey games and 4,500 seats for other performances and events. Accompanying the facility is the USA Hockey Summer Drive-In, which has three large screens that show first-run double-features seven nights a week, as well as CJ's Brewing Company.
