TODAY'S GAME

The U.S. Men's National Team takes on Hungary here today in its second of seven preliminary round games of the 2023 IIHF Men's World Championship in Tampere, Finland. The game will air live on NHL Network in the U.S.

THE SERIES VS. HUNGARY

The U.S. and Hungary meet for just the third time ever in the IIHF Men's World Championship with the U.S. having won the previous two meetings. In the last outing between the two teams -- which came on May 13, 2016, in St. Petersburg, Russia, Nick Foligno had two goals and an assist to lead Team USA to a 5-1 victory Brock Nelson landed in the late morning and played in the game, which had a 4:15 p.m. faceoff. Goaltender Keith Kincaid picked up his first-ever win in a Team USA jersey with seven stops. Team USA set a U.S. single game record for fewest shots allowed in a game at the world championship with eight. The only other meeting between the two teams was back in 1939, with the U.S. earning a 3-0 victory on Feb. 7.

GAME ONE REWIND

The U.S. is coming off a 4-1 win over host and defending gold-medalist Finland on Friday (May 12) to open play in the world championship (see boxscore later in these notes). Finland had earned wins in six of the last seven outings between the two teams headed into the contest, including a pair of victories in last year's world championship. Veterans **Alex Tuch** (21:28) and **Nick Bonino** (21:19) led the U.S. in ice time and were joined by **Nick Perbix** (20:25) in the 20-plus minutes club for the contest. Tuch, who had a pair of goals, led the U.S. with eight shots on goal, with **Matt Coronato** (6) and **Cutter Gauthier** (5) next on the list. Bonino won 13-of-21 faceoffs for a .619 success rate. The U.S. outshot Finland 29-14 over the final two periods and 38-24 for the game.

LOOKING TO WIN FIRST TWO

The U.S. is seeking to win its first two games of an IIIHF Men's World Championship for the 27th time. It accomplished the feat in last year's tournament (4-1 vs. LAT; 3-2 OT vs. AUT) and previous to that it was in 2018. The U.S. had a stretch of winning its first two games in 10 of 11 years between 2005-15 (2010 only exception).

LINEUP TODAY

The U.S. is without **Sammy Walker**, who suffered a tournamentending injury in Friday's (May 12) game against Finland. Forward **Luke Tuch** is dressing in his place. Goaltender **Drew Commesso** will not dress today.

TEAM USA HOST

Risto Talvio, who works full-time as a security officer at a nuclear power plant in Eurajoki, Finland, is Team USA's host for the world championship. Talvio has served as team host for U.S. teams in all international tournaments in Finland since 1984, including last year at the IIHF Men's World Championship here in Tampere.



RANDOM SHORTS

Team USA had an upbeat practice yesterday early afternoon at the tournament practice arena part of the Nokia Arena facility ... The players enjoyed a team outing yesterday afternoon at Kuuma, a popular sauna in Tampere ... Forward Sean Farrell, who is working on finishing his degree at Harvard University, took his three-hour economics final at the team hotel last night. USA Hockey's John Vanbiesbrouck served as the proctor of the exam ... The U.S. is the home team today, will wear its "third" blue jerseys and occupy the left bench ... The U.S. has 19 players on its roster who have played in at least one NHL game. The highest drafted player on the U.S. roster is **Cutter Gauthier**, who was the fifth overall pick in the 2022 NHL Draft. Matt Coronato was the 13th pick of the 2021 NHL Draft by Calgary, while Alex Tuch was taken 18th overall by Minnesota in the 2014 NHL Draft ... The U.S. has medaled in every IIHF world championship conducted this season, including gold in the IIHF Women's World and Under-18 Men's World Championships. and bronze in the IIHF World Junior and Under-18 Women's World Championships ... U.S. goaltending coach Thomas Speer and assistant coach Ryan Warsofsky are expected to "faceoff" in a basketball one-on-one challenge any day ... Team USA is playing in game one of its first of two back-to-backs today. It will face Germany tomorrow at 4:20 p.m. The U.S. will also play back-to-back May 20-21 vs. Denmark and France.

LEADERSHIP

Nick Bonino is the captain of Team USA. Having won a pair of Stanley Cup titles with the Pittsburgh Penguins, Bonino has also helped the U.S. Men's National Team to bronze medal finishes in the world championship in both 2018 and 2015. Alex Tuch and Conor Garland are serving as alternate captains. Tuch is making his first men's worlds appearance and helped the U.S. to gold at the 2014 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship. Garland is playing at the men's worlds for the second time having been a part of the bronze medal-winning 2021 U.S. Men's National Team.

CAMP IN MUNICH

Team USA conducted a short training camp in Munich, arriving on May 6 and concluding time there with an exhibition game vs. Germany on May 9 in which the U.S. prevailed by a 6-3 count. **Drew O'Connor** (2G, 1A) led four players with at least two points. **Casey DeSmith** played the first 32:19 in net and did not allow a goal on 19 shots, while **Cal Petersen** finished the contest and made five saves. The two teams shared a plane to Tampere which arrived the afternoon of May 10. Part of Team USA's visit to Munich included a trip to the world-famous Hofrauhaus beer hall where team captain **Nick Bonino** had the unique honor of tapping a new keg.

STAN WONG

Stan Wong, one of Team USA's two athletic trainers and a beloved figure of players and staff alike, is working his 54th international event for a U.S. hockey team. This year marks his 16th straight men's world championship. He has also served as a trainer for five Olympic teams, 21 national junior squads, 10 Deutschland Cup teams and for Team USA at one Youth Olympic Games and one Winter World University Games. Wong was inducted into the Professional Hockey Athletic Trainers Hall of Fame in June 2015.

WHAT'S IN A NICKNAME

Team USA assistant coach **Derek Lalonde**, who is the head coach of the NHL's Detroit Red Wings, has long had the nickname "Newsy" after Hockey Hall-of-Famer Edouard "Newsy" Lalonde. When the NHL was forming in 1917, "Newsy" Lalonde was the playing-coach and captain of the Montreal Canadiens. As a kid, Lalonde was working in a newsprint plant and that's where the original Newsy landed his nickname. For Derek Lalonde, it was his teammates at SUNY-Cortland, where he was a standout goaltender, who tabbed him "Newsy," a nickname that has carried with him since.

THE NAMING OF STICKS

Team USA forward **Rocco Grimaldi** started a fun tradition of naming his sticks four or five years ago as he remembers. He tries to make sure he doesn't use names of people he knows and goes through the alphabet from A to Z with boys and girls names and then back from Z to A in establishing those names. He surmises he's been up and down the alphabet four times since beginning the tradition. Grimaldi cites Trudy as a great stick and one he scored four goals with in a 7-1 win over Detroit back in 2021 when he was playing for the NHL's Nashville Predators. Oswald, a stick he used playing for San Diego in the AHL, has recorded the most goals. Grimaldi says Romeo was his worst stick, breaking just shortly after starting to use it. "How ironic is it that Romeo, who broke hearts, broke right away," quipped Grimaldi. Erica and Fiona are the latest sticks in Grimaldi's arsenal and got their start during Team USA's camp in Munich. To date, Erica has seen game action, while Fiona has not.

AVERAGE AGE

The 2023 U.S. Men's National Team has an average age of 25.6, the fourth oldest in the last 16 world championships. Below is a look at the average age of Team USA since 2004.

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WHO KNEW

The first-ever McDonald's restaurant in Finland opened in Tampere, Finland, in December of 1984. The 1985 IIHF World Junior Championship – which began in late December of 1984 and finished in early January 1985 – was played in Finland that year with games in Helsinki, Turku, Espoo and Vantaa. Team USA was based in Helsinki. Art Berglund, who led USA Hockey's international hockey program back in those days, caught wind of the new McDonald's and canceled practice one day so the players and staff could make the journey from Helsinki to Tampere to try out the American icon. Media learned of the adventure and were present to capture the visit. Team USA also visited a Finnish glass factory on its way back to Helsinki. The 1985 U.S. National Junior Team featured U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame players Brian Leetch, Mike Richter and Craig Janney.

Doug Hickey, the U.S. Ambassador to Finland, was at Team USA's game vs. Finland on May 12 and presented the U.S. Player of the Game award to goaltender Casey DeSmith after the game ... David Quinn is the head coach of Team USA in the world championship for the second straight year and also guided the 2022 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team ... Team USA arrived in Tampere on the afternoon of May 10, practiced May 11 for just over an hour and played its first game in the men's worlds on May 12 ... **Alex Tuch** celebrated his 27th birthday on May 10 ... Team USA started the world championship with 24 players. Eight have previously been part of a U.S. team in the men's worlds (Bjork, Bonino, Commesso, Farrell, Garland, Mackey, Petersen, Tynan). Five players are making their debut in an IIHF world championship (Attard, DeSmith, Eyssimont, O'Connor, Walker) ... Team USA has finished in the top four of the world championship six times in the last nine years ... Goaltender Casey DeSmith and his wife Mollie are expecting their first child in August ... The U.S. roster includes eight players who played college hockey in the U.S. this season (Commesso, Coronato, Farrell, Gauthier, Hutson, Mazur, Thrun, Luke Tuch).

Of the 24 years quarterfinals have been played, the U.S. has qualified all but twice.

Semifinal Record: Last SF: L. 3-4 vs. Finland (2022) The U.S. is 2-11 in 12 previous semifinal games in the IIHF World Championship. The IIHF has used various formats over its history, including round robin, double-round robin and roundrobin medal play among the most common. The world championship has included semifinal games in most years since 1992.

Bronze Medal Game Record: 6-5 **Total Bronze Medals:** R Last BMG: L, 4-8 vs. Czechia (2022) The U.S. is 6-5 in 10 previous bronze-medal games in the IIHF Men's World Championship. The IIHF has used various formats over its history, including round robin, double round robin and round-robin medal play among the most common. The eight bronze medals the U.S. has won incude those determined by standings and also by a single bronze medal game.
