FILLING OUT THE
SCORESHEET

BASIC INFORMATION

1. Enter the name of the Home Team
2. Enter the name of the Visiting Team
3. Enter today's date, division (U8, U10, U12, U14, etc.), game start time, game end time (when game is finished), arena where game is played, and surface (always ICE).
4. Enter your name as Official Scorer.
5. Only enter coaches if not on roster stickers. Coaches will have a coaching card with the information that you need. Head coach of each team must sign the scoresheet prior to the beginning of the game; either you or the officials (#6) will give to the coaches.
6. Provide scoresheet to the officials before the game begins. One or both officials will usually come to the glass at the scorer's table and ask for you to pass the sheet through the hole in the glass. They will return the sheet to you after reviewing (prior to game start).

SCORING

1. Per: Period goal scored (1st, 2nd, 3rd, OT).
2. Clock Time: Check scoreboard and record time in reverse of scoreboard. Examples: goal scored at 6:43 of 12-minute period would be recorded as 5:17; goal scored at 4:15 of 15-minute period would be recorded as 10:45.
3. G: Player # that scored as told by official.
4. Assist: The # of player or players who gave the assist as told by official. A maximum of two players can be awarded an assist.
5. Type:
 - E = even-strength (5-on-5, 4-on-4, etc.)
 - SH = shorthanded (your team has fewer players on ice due to penalty/penalties)
 - PP = power play (your team has more players on ice due to penalty/penalties)
 - EN = empty net (you score when other team has pulled their goalie)
 - EA = extra attacker (you score when you have pulled your goalie)
 - PS = penalty shot (PS are awarded by official, who will make it very clear a PS was awarded).

Once reported by the referee, no changes can be made to player who gets credit for goals and assists without the approval of the on-ice officials.

GOALKEEPING

1. JERSEY NO: Goalies #
2. SHOTS: The number of shots on the goalie by period.

A shot on goal is any shot that enters the net or any shot that would normally have entered the net if not stopped by the goalie. Shots that deflect off the posts or crossbar and stay out of the net ARE NOT counted as shots on goal. A shot on goal must result in either a goal or a save.

Tip: If you are unsure whether a shot should be considered a shot on goal, ask the scoreboard operator or penalty box monitor what they saw. Work as a team as needed.

3. SAVES: The number of shots that did not go into the net.

Under the Home team's Goalkeeping, shots are from the visitors and saves are from Home team. When the home team shoots they are recorded under the visitor's Goalkeeping and their saves are from Visiting team.

Tip: An easy way to track saves is with a simple hashmark system. Make a hash mark on a piece of scratch paper for each shot on goal during the period. Keep a separate line for each period, add them at the end of game and record into the correct box. Record the period and time that each goaltender entered the game after the game has started.

MISC INFO & HELPFUL HINTS

1. Timeouts: If a team takes a timeout, record which team took the timeout, the period, and time the timeout was taken on the bottom of the score sheet.
2. Helpful Hints: Have a scrap piece of paper at the scorekeeper's table to write down the information given to you by the referee. You can then enter the information on the scoresheet after play has resumed and things are not hurried. This paper can also be used to keep saves for the goalkeepers.
3. After the game: The official scoresheet then should be signed by the official scorer in the appropriate place prior to inspection by the on-ice officials. The on-ice officials should cross out all portions of the scoresheet that have not been used. This is done to prevent any information from being added to the scoresheet after the officials have properly signed the document. Once satisfied that the score sheet is accurate and complete, the officials will sign the scoresheet and retain their copy(s) (note: the officials do not always choose to retain a copy. They should and will retain a copy in the event a player was ejected so that info can be reported as needed to the association and/or WAHA).



MISC INFO & HELPFUL HINTS

4. Make sure to provide a copy of scoresheet to visiting team (typically, the team manager but could also be a coach) as well as home team (again, typically the team manager).
5. Questions on game day? Check with a family who has kept score in the past.
