Cedar Mill Little League Tee Ball Rules

Last Revised: March 2023

OBJECTIVES

- Tee Ball is intended to be a skill-building, team-building, and positive learning experience.
- Keeping the game moving and fun is a critical component at this age. ٠

RULES

- 1. There are no outs. Each player keeps swinging until they get a hit. Each hit is considered a single, even if an actual "out" is made. Hitter remains on the base.
- 2. There are no walks or strikeouts. There are no umpires.
- 3. If the ball does not travel 10 feet in fair territory, it's considered a foul ball.
- 4. No leading off. No stealing. No sliding.
- 5. No runners can advance on overthrows.
- 6. Inning is over after the entire line-up bats through once. The final batter is the "home-run hitter"! 🙂
- 7. Defensive players play traditional positions.
 - Infielders (besides the pitcher) should be positioned no more than 3 feet in front of the bases, and out of the base path.
 - Outfielders will typically be positioned just outside the outer edge of the infield where the dirt meets the grass.
 - All players play every inning. If extra players, scatter throughout the outfield.
- 8. Coaches may be on the field coaching players on offense and defense.
- 9. Helmets must be worn at all times while in the dugout on offense. Keep bats on the inside of the backstop, outside of the dugout. Only the batter should have a bat in their hands.
- 10. The Home team occupies the third base line dugout. The Visiting team occupies the first base line, and bats first.
- 11. Game length is as many innings as you can fit into 75 minutes. Do not start a new inning after 75 minutes have passed, but you may complete the previous inning.

TIPS FOR KEEPING THE GAME MOVING

- Batting
 - Getting "squared up" to the plate often takes time. Help kids know where to stand by marking the position of their feet.
 - Use chalk or an inverted spray paint can to mark where their feet should go.
- *Line-up and Batting Order*
 - Before the game, take the time to assign players to a variety of positions throughout the game to learn and develop new skills.
 - Some coaches use a baseball whiteboard and update positions every inning.
 - Encourage a quick transition between half innings; help players know where to go beforehand.
 - Change up the batting order every inning to mix up who goes first and last. Assign a coach to help keep players in order on the bench, and bats out of their hands.
 - Keep individual players' hats, gloves, and helmets together for a quick transition.
 - Some coaches use a set of inexpensive plastic bins/buckets for each player to hold their gear. (This is especially useful with wet/muddy dugouts.)

***Towards the end of the season, and in preparation for the Single-A level, some kids will be ready to hit live pitching from their coach. Discuss this ahead of time amongst opposing coaches, and follow these guidelines:

Coaches should sit or kneel to keep the pitcher at the same level as the batter, keeping the flight of the • ball low. Coaches should be positioned about 30-35 feet away from the plate. After 5 strikes, go back to the tee to keep the game moving along.
