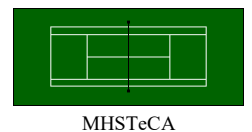

Distinguished Service Award

Pam Moore

Athletics was never in the cards for Pamela Moore as a potential career choice when she was a high school student at Royal Oak Kimball High School, which today is Royal Oak High School. Now one of the more decorated people in her field, Moore, Royal Oak High School's assistant athletic director, has been recognized for her work during 37 years in the athletic department as the 2023 Michigan High School Coaches Association MHSCA "Jack Johnson Distinguished Service Award."

The Awards name's sake Coach Jack Johnson was a Past President of the MHSCA and was our 3rd Executive Director. Jack was a teacher, coach & athletic director at Dearborn high school. Coach Jack Johnson's devoted service to interscholastic athletics was extensive. He coaches 5 state championship swim teams, served as the Swim coaches association treasure, was a President of the Michigan Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association, and Conference Committee organizer for 34 years. A model for all people working with our state's student athletes and for sports



Pam is a graduate of Royal Oak Kimball High School, where she played tennis for the Knights. Mrs. Moore has spent her entire career in Athletics. Starting as a co-op student at 16 years old under Royal Oak athletics pioneer Chuck Jones, Moore didn't see a future for her in athletics. That was until Jones asked her to join the staff full-time. "He saw something in me that I didn't see in myself, and I'm really glad he did," Moore said.

She has worked alongside 9 different colleagues all of which have depended on her for guidance and support. One of those colleagues, Royal Oak Athletic Director Brian Gordon, who has worked alongside Moore since joining the Royal Oak faculty in 1990, said Moore is one of a kind in her field.

"There's greatness that comes with people in the world of athletics: Jordan, Magic, LeBron...and then there's Pam Moore," Gordon stated in a press release. "People know Pam across the region, and even the state."

As Moore continues her day-to-day work for Royal Oak Schools, there's one thing that's for certain. Royal Oak athletics can't be discussed without mentioning Moore and her impact on the district.

Pam Moore's honor as the Michigan High School Coaches Association Jack Johnson Distinguished Service Award is only one of many career accolades, she has been honored by the The Oakland County Athletic Director of the Year, and Special Appreciation award.

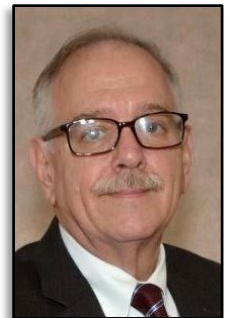
Pam has been married to her husband Kevin for 32 years.

Tom Rashid

Every student who has played high school sports in the state of Michigan over the past 33 years has been impacted by Tom Rashid work. His work was his passion, and he worked until just days before his passing. Tom died in East Lansing surrounded by loved ones on December 3, 2021, after a battle with cancer.

A product of Catholic Education, Tom attended St. Alphonsus Catholic School in Dearborn, where his love for educational athletics began. He graduated from St. Al's in 1976. He went on to obtain his bachelor's degree with a major in history and a minor in physical education from Eastern Michigan University and his master's degree in urban education from the University of Michigan-Dearborn.

While he was still in college, Tom accepted a position at St. Alphonsus, serving as athletic director for nearly a decade and then moving on to Riverview Gabriel Richard as athletic director, for a total of twelve years in schools. He then went on to the Detroit Catholic League, where he was director for fifteen years, and moved onto the Michigan High School Athletic Association where he worked until just days before the cancer caused his body to shut down.



Mr. John "Jack" Roberts retired Executive Director of the MHSAA said of Tom "Most remarkable of all was Tom's ability to turn an adversary into an ally. He could have a knock-down, drag-out argument with a person one day, and by the next day, and for years to come, that person was Tom's greatest advocate and admirer."

He served as the MHSAA's administrator of boys lacrosse for its entirety as an MHSAA-sponsored sport, beginning in 2005, and also oversaw the MHSAA's Charles E. Forsythe, Allen W. Bush and Vern L. Norris awards programs. Tom was a longtime participant, presenter, and MC of the Michigan High School Athletic Administrators Association.

Tom has received many honors and accolades; He received national recognition in 1999 when he was presented with the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association's State Award of Merit. In 2001, Rashid was honored with the MHSAA's Allen W. Bush Award, which recognizes noteworthy behind-the-scenes support to interscholastic athletics. In 2003, Rashid received Athletic Director of the Year awards from the MIAAA and National High School Athletic Coaches Association, and he also received an NFHS Citation that year.

He was named to the Detroit Catholic High School League Hall of Fame in 2002 and Michigan High School Lacrosse Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2017. He also received the MIAAA's Special Recognition Award in 2017 for his continued service to the school sports community.

Tom Rashid is now honored with the 2023 Michigan High School Coaches Association Jack Johnson Distinguished Service Award.

**2023****Daniel Barry—Hall of Fame****2023**

Daniel Barry has coached ice hockey for twenty-five years. He began his coaching career as a varsity assistant at Grosse Pointe Woods, University Liggett High School, from 1991-1996. From 1996-1997 he was the varsity assistant coach at Notre Dame-Harper Woods. Dan returned to University Liggett High School as the varsity head coach from 1997-2002. Then in 2002, he was hired as the varsity head coach at De La Salle -Warren, where he coached for the next fourteen years. Dan's teams earned four Metro League Conference Championships (one as varsity assistant coach), six MHSAA Regional Championships, two Catholic League Championships (2008, 2010), four Final Four appearances, and two Michigan Interscholastic Hockey League Championships. Dan's teams accumulated over 300 wins, and while head varsity coach at De La Salle, his career win-loss record was 227-114-10.

Coach Barry was known for his "positive and engaging personality and his overall excellent supervision of the teams under his command." Because of this he has been the recipient of many honors and recognitions over the years. He has been named the Metro League Coach of the Year three times, the Catholic League Coach of the Year two times, the Michigan High School Hockey Coaches Association (MHSACA) Coach of the Year three times and the MHSAA Coach of the year one time. In 2018 Dan had the honor of being inducted into the MHSACA Hall of Fame.

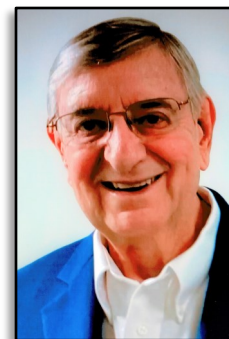
Dan has supported his sport and community through his participation in several associations. He has served as the MHSACA Secretary for two years, Second Vice President for two years, First Vice President for two years, President for two years, and was President of the Metro League for one year. He also worked with the Salvation Army for five years, promoting hockey for inner city kids.

**2023****David Brinks—Hall of Fame****2023**

Dave Brinks has been a diving coach for thirty-eight years and still counting! He began his coaching career as the head varsity boys diving coach at Grandville High School in 1985 and continues as head coach there. These teams have produced twenty Conference Champions, ten Regional Champions, and fifteen All-State divers. During the same time span he also acted as the head varsity boys diving coach at Ottawa Hills High School for two years (1988-1990). These teams produced two City Champions. For the next ten years (1990 -2000) he was the head varsity girls diving coach at Forest Hills High School. These teams produced ten Conference Champions, five Regional Champions and nine All-State divers. From 2017 to the present Dave has also been the head varsity girls diving coach at Hudsonville High School. These teams have produced eight Conference Champions, five Regional Champions and ten All-State divers.

Coach Brinks is well respected by his peers, community and students athletes and has been recognized for his commitment to his sport and student athletes. He was a National High School Athletic Coaches Association (NHSACA) Coach of the Year Finalist in 2018, the Michigan Interscholastic Swim Coaches Association (MISCA) Bruce Harlan Award Recipient in 2015, the MHSAA Coach of the Year five times, was inducted into the MISCA Hall of Fame in 2015 and the Forest Hill High School Hall of Fame in 2018. He is known by his peers for being "firm, but fair and always there for the program and the kids."

Dave has been an active member of the MISCA for twenty-eight years and the National Interscholastic Swim Coaches Association (NISCA) for three years. He has also served on the judging panel for All-America Diving.

2023**Bob Bruder—Hall of Fame****2023**

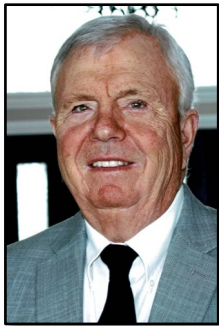
Bob Bruder has accumulated forty-four seasons of coaching over thirty-five years. He began coaching in 1966 in Memphis, Michigan as an assistant varsity football coach, JV baseball coach, and head varsity boys basketball coach. In 1968 he became the head JV football coach in Fenton and coached for the next fifteen years. In 1978 he also became the head varsity boys' basketball coach in Fenton and coached for the next twenty-one years. His final coaching stop was at Lake Leelanau St Mary's as the head boys' varsity basketball coach from 2013-2015. While serving as the Fenton High School head varsity boys basketball coach, Bob's teams earned sixteen league titles, nine district titles, one regional title and one quarter final appearance. His overall win loss record was 370-170 a school record.

Over the course of his career Coach Bruder was honored by his community and his peers. Bob was selected as the Regional Coach of the Year in 1990, and was inducted into the Fenton High School Athletic Hall of Fame in 2011. Two of Coach Bruder's athletes excelled at the collegiate level. John Gilbert went on to play at Lake Superior State University, and Dave Hintz went on to play for Oakland University. At the end of every season Coach Bruder presented a plaque to every senior that said, "You made us proud!"

2023**Sarah Eubanks—Hall of Fame****2023**

Sarah Eubanks enters the MHSCA Hall of Fame having coached swimming and diving for sixty seasons over the last thirty-six years and still counting! She began her coaching career at Avondale High School as the head varsity girls swim-dive coach from 1987-1988. From 1989-1992 she served as assistant varsity girls swim-dive coach at Rochester Adams moving, to the head coaching position from 1993-1994. During the same time period (1988-1991) Sarah also worked as the assistant varsity boys swim coach for Birmingham Groves. She moved on to Plymouth Canton as the varsity girls swim-dive coach from 1995-1998. In 2000 Sarah became the head varsity girls swim-dive coach at Tecumseh High School and remained there until 2014. She also served as the assistant boys varsity swim-dive coach at Tecumseh High School from 2007-2008, and the head coed swim-dive coach at Tecumseh Middle School from 2004-2015. In 2015 she became the head varsity girls swim-dive coach at Dundee High School and continues in that position. From 2016-2017 she was the assistant varsity boys swim-dive coach at Dundee High School, taking on the head varsity boys coaching position in 2018 and continues in that position. Her girls swim and dive teams have won fifteen Southern Michigan Independent Swim League Conference (SMISL) titles (three at Rochester Adams, eight at Tecumseh HS, four at Dundee HS), were Monroe County Champions (Dundee) in 2019 and had five Top 10 Team finishes. Her girls swim and dive career win-loss record is 100-27. Her boys swim and dive teams have won four SMISL Conference titles (three at Dundee, one at Birmingham Adams), were Monroe County Champions (Dundee) in 2012 and 2022, and had five Top 10 Team Finishes. Her boys swim and dive career win-loss record is 53-15. Sarah has coached seventy-nine MHSAA All State Individuals (boys and girls), three MHSAA Individual Runners Up and four MHSAA Individual State Champions.

Coach Eubanks, known for her "great passion for her sport", has been recognized and honored for her accomplishments throughout her career. She has been named the Monroe County Coach of the year three times, the SMISL Coach of the Year five times while at Tecumseh, six times as the girls coach at Dundee, and three times as the boys coach at Dundee. And in 2002 she was named the Zone 4 Coach of the year. Sarah also attended the 2016 Olympic trials with two athletes and had twelve athletes who went on to compete at the collegiate level.

Mike Falter—Hall of Fame

2023

Mike Falter has coached student athletes for thirty-four seasons in five different sports at Yale High School. He began his career in coaching as the head varsity golf coach in 1972. From 1973-1975 he was the assistant varsity and JV football coach, then Mike returned to the head varsity golf coach position from 1976-1988. From 1972-1973 Mike also took on the 7th grade basketball coaching position. During the same time period Mike started coaching the JV baseball team at Yale and coached from 1972-1975. Then in 1976 Mike became the head varsity baseball coach and remained in that position until 1985. From 2001-2004 he was the assistant varsity track coach for both girls and boys at Yale High School. The varsity boys track team won one MHSAA State Title and the varsity girls track team won one MHSAA State Title. Mike’s varsity golf teams earned four Conference Titles and had a win loss record of 140-97. The 1987-1988 golf teams had an overall record of 38-2. His varsity baseball teams had four Conference Titles and one District Championship. The 1977 varsity baseball team set the school record of 28 wins 4 losses, earned the final team ranking of #1 in the state MHSBCA, and is a Yale Hall of Fame Team. His 1984-1985 baseball team went undefeated in the conference for two years 28-0, 48-7 overall. His baseball teams had an overall win loss record of 203-57. Four of Mike’s student athletes were selected to the MHSBCA All State First Team; Jim Ryan, Dave Henry, Dan Keegan and Jeff Wiley. Jeff Wiley was scouted for baseball while at St Clair County Community College and was eventually drafted by the New York Yankees.

Coach Falter is well respected by his peers and has been recognized on many occasions for his accomplishments. He was named Blue-water Coach of the Year six times – three times for varsity baseball, and three times for varsity golf. He was named League Coach of the Year for varsity baseball four times, and five times for varsity golf. In 1977 and 1985 Mike was named the MHSBCA Coach of the Year. In 2011 Mike was inducted into the Yale High School Hall of Fame as a coach and contributor.

According to Coach Falter “It is not how you start, but how you finish. Keep working to improve every day.” Mike is respected by his peers for his “focused efforts towards the betterment of the students and athletes.” He has done this by acting as a MHSAA registered official for thirty years, served on the officials assignment committee, became a Certified Athletic Administrator, has been a member of the MHSBCA for ten years, is a lifetime member of the MHSCA, was league president, served as the district athletic director for Yale High School for ten plus years, served as the head baseball coach at St Clair County Community College for three years, and was the Friend of Youth Award Yale Recipient Caro Meet of Champions.

Gregg Golden—Hall of Fame

2023

Gregg Golden joins this year’s class of MHSCA Hall of Fame inductees having coached track and cross country for fifty-seven seasons. He began coaching as the assistant coach for boys and girls track at Annapolis High School – Dearborn in 1990 and became the co-head coach there from 1991-1993. Then in 1996 Gregg became the head coach for the girls and boys track team and the head coach for the girls and boys cross country team at Regina High School. He continues in those positions today. Under his leadership the Regina High School track teams have won one Conference Title and six Regional Championships. The Regina High School cross country teams have won seven Conference Titles, one District Title, eight Regional Championships, and were the Macomb County Cross Country Overall Champions in 2011. His teams have been awarded the Catholic High School League Mark Carpenter Good Sportsmanship Award in 23 of the past 24 seasons! Gregg has coach thirty one MHSAA All State Individuals and one MHSAA Individual State Champion. Several of his student athletes have continued to compete at the collegiate level including; Gina Valgoi – Loyola Chicago, Cassie Bloch – Loyola Chicago, Elizabeth Bloch – Michigan Tech, and Grace Zdankiewicz – Xavier University.

Coach Golden has “become something of an icon” in his community and has been recognized many times for his contributions to his sport and his positive impact on his student athletes. He was named the Macomb County Track and Field Division 2-3-4 Coach of the Year two times, and the Macomb County Cross Country Division 2-3-4 Coach of the Year eight times. He was inducted into the Catholic High School League Hall of Fame in 2012, the Macomb County Athletic Directors Association Hall of Fame in 2019 and the Regina High School Hall of Fame in 2023.

2023**Phil Hora—Hall of Fame****2023**

Phil Hora enjoyed an enormously successful multi-sport coaching career that spanned thirty seasons all at Stockbridge High School. He began his coaching career at Stockbridge as the JV football coach from 1964-1969. During that time he also became the head track coach from 1965-1968 and coached the JV basketball team during the 1966 season. Phil became the head varsity basketball coach in 1967 and remained until 1989. (Except for the 1982-83 season when his wife was ill.) Under his leadership the Stockbridge High School varsity boys basketball teams were extremely successful earning ten Ingham County Conference Titles, nine Ingham County District Championships, five MHSAA Regional Championships, won three Quarter Finals, and were MHSAA State Runners Up in 1971. His overall win loss record was 354-117; a 75.2% winning percentage! Phil had two MHSAA All State Individuals; Greg Basore-All State, and Jesse Campbell-2 time All State, and 2 time All American.

Throughout his career Coach Hora has received many recognitions and awards. He was named the Ingham County Coach of the Year seven times, the Lansing State Journal Regional Coach of the year in 1976, was under the Basketball Coaches of Michigan (BCAM) consideration for Coach of the Year in 1977, was the Detroit Free Press Class C Coach of the Year in 1971, and the Detroit New Class C Coach of the Year in 1971. Phil also received BCAM recognition for 300 wins in 1986.

In addition to coaching at Stockbridge High School, Phil worked to support his student athletes and community by serving as a student council advisor, serving as a counselor, serving on school assembly committees, running intramural Saturday basketball – in season for youth and running summer basketball programs for youth. He also “set the standard for up tempo style of play in Southwest Michigan in the 70’s” and wrote an article for “A Coaching Treasure from a Basketball Clinic”.

2023**Brad Jones—Hall of Fame****2023**

Brad Jones' career as a swim and coach spans sixty-five seasons and thirty-four years to date. He started his career as the head varsity boys swim coach at Swartz Creek High School, from 1989-1990. His next position was the head varsity boys and girls swim coach at Flint Southwestern Academy from 1991-1997. Then it was back to Swartz Creek High School as the head varsity boys and girls swim coach from 1997-1999. In 1999 Brad accepted the head varsity boys and girls swim and dive coaches position at Fenton High School and remains in that position today. As head coach at Fenton High School, Brad would have his teams say the team motto before every meet: “I am a member of this team. I commit to it and sacrifice for it because the team, not the individual, is the ultimate champion”. This philosophy has served his teams well. Brad's varsity girls swim team has won nineteen Metro League Conference Titles (2004-2022), and three fourth place finishes at the MHSAA State Meet. His girls swim team career win-loss record is 206-127 and their multi-team event win-loss record for the Girls Metro League Championships is 94-1. The boys varsity swim team at Fenton High School has won twelve Metro League Conference Titles (2012-2023). His boys team career win-loss record is 196-148 and their multi-team event win-loss record for the Boys Metro League Championships is 88-7. Brad has coached fifty-five MHSAA All State Individuals, eleven MHSAA Individual State Champions, and nine MHSAA Individual Runners Up.

Coach Jones is well respected in the swim and diving community and has been honored for his service and achievements on numerous occasions. He has been named the Metro League Swim Coach of the Year seven times- three times as the girls coach and four times as the boys coach, the MISCA Zone Coach of the Year ten times- five times as the girls coach and five times as the boys coach, the MISCA State coach of the Year for girls swimming in 2019 & 2021, and the MHSCA State Coach of the Year for girls swimming in 2019.

Brad has also been an active member of several associations and groups to promote his sport and support his student athletes. He has served as the MISCA Zone 8 Vice President since 2001 and is the liaison of Zone 8 to the MISCA Board, served as the MISCA President from 2018-2020, has served on the MISCA Annual Clinic Committee since 2021, and has served as the National Swim Coaches Association (NISCA) Membership Chairman since 2022.

**2023****Jim Morisette—Hall of Fame****2023**

Jim Morisette has accumulated thirty-nine years of coaching experience in the sport of wrestling to date. His coaching career began in 1984 as the JV wrestling coach at Mt. Clemens High School. In 1985 he became the head varsity wrestling coach at Algonac High School. His teams won 4 League Championships, one Regional Championship, and had an overall win-loss record of 47-1. In 1991 Jim took on the head varsity wrestling coach's position at Anchor Bay High School and continues in that position today. Coach Morisette's mantra "The Team, The Team, The Team" has proved very successful. His teams at Anchor Bay High School have won twenty-three MAC Red Conference Titles, eighteen MHSAA District Championships, four MHSAA Regional Championships and in 2015 made it to the Semi-Finals at the Team State Finals. His overall win-loss record at Anchor Bay is 811-261. His teams have also received four Team Sportsmanship Awards and Three Academic All State Rankings. During the course of his career Jim has coached six MHSAA Individual State Champions, fourteen MHSAA Individual Runners Up and eighty MHSAA All State Wrestlers. Four of his wrestlers went on to compete at the collegiate level; John Burke – National H.S. Runner Up, Robbie Bidlingmaier – All American Olivet, Dan Stevenson – All American Findlay, and Jack Medley Big 10 Michigan.

Throughout his career Jim has received many award and recognitions for his accomplishments. He has been selected the Michigan Wrestling Association Regional Coach of the Year four times, was named Macomb County Coaches Association League Coach of the Year twelve times, and was selected as the Michigan High School Coaches Association Coach of the Year in 2017. In 2020 Coach Morisette was inducted into the Michigan Wrestling Association Hall of Fame.

Jim has been very active in his community and local sport associations. He has held the position of Vice President of the Macomb County Wrestling Coaches Association for thirty years and has "not hesitated to have his wrestling team volunteer in local municipality programs," and "volunteered his time for local community festivals and events taking part in countless civic activities."

**2023****Dennis Paquette—Hall of Fame****2023**

Dennis Paquette has coached four different sports at three different levels over seventy four seasons so far. His remarkable coaching career began at Munising High School where he was an assistant varsity football coach for two seasons (1987-1988), the head varsity wrestling coach for two seasons (1987-1989), and the assistant track coach for two seasons (1988-1989). He then moved on to Bangor High School where he was as assistant football coach for nine seasons (1990-1991 and 1994-2000), the assistant varsity wrestling coach for one season (1990), the assistant track coach for twenty seasons (1990-2013), the varsity girls cross country coach for six seasons (2006-2012), and the head varsity wrestling coach for twenty-six seasons (1991-2017). His next coaching stop was at Bloomingdale High School where he was the middle school football coach for two seasons (2013-2014), the assistant track coach for one season (2018), and the head varsity wrestling coach for three seasons (2017-2020). Dennis has just completed his first season as an assistant wrestling coach at Olivet College (2022-2023).

Under his leadership Coach Paquette's wrestling teams worked hard and accomplished great things. With an overall win/loss record of 557/242/5, his teams earned eleven Conference Championships, twenty District Championships, three Regional Championships and had one Final Four finish. He also had three teams receive Academic All-State Honors. In addition Coach Paquette had thirty-five All-State Medalists, three State Champions, one Southwest Michigan Wrestler of the Year, one USA Wrestling Jr. National Champion and multiple All-Americans. Thirty-seven of his wrestlers had 100+ victories. Seven of Coach Paquette's wrestlers have competed at the collegiate level - two as Division 1 wrestlers. Additionally Dennis coached fifteen track MHSAA All State Individuals and one cross country MHSAA All State Individual.

Coach Paquette has been honored on numerous occasions for his accomplishments. He was named Southwest Michigan Wrestling Coach of the Year two times, Red Arrow League Wrestling Coach of the Year four times, Regional Coach of the Year four times, and USA Wrestling Regional Coaching Recognition. In 2022 Dennis was inducted into the Michigan Wrestling Association Hall of Fame.

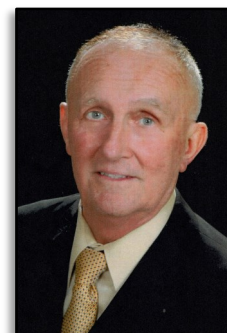

He served as the Coaches Education Director for the Michigan Wrestling Federation (7 years), was Co-Founder of the Southwest-10 Conference, served on the Michigan Wrestling Federation Executive Board (6 years), the MHSAA Rules Committee (7 times), the MHSAA Officials Selection Committee (4 times), served on the USA Wrestling Coaches Manual Committee and at the USA Wrestling Coaches College.

2023**Mike Roach—Hall of Fame****2023**

Michael J. Roach Msgt. USAF Ret. enters the MHSAA Hall of Fame having coached for twenty-two seasons. Mike began his coaching career at Pennfield High School as the head coach of the girls and the boys bowling coach from 2003-2021. He also served as an assistant JV baseball coach at Pennfield High School from 2005-2006. From 2021-2023 he has been the head boys varsity and JV bowling coach at Marshall High School. The “high expectations he demanded of the student-athletes and the overall structure of his program,” made for very successful teams. While Mike was head coach at Pennfield High School the girls varsity bowling team earned two Southwest 8 Conference titles, three Interstate 8 Conference Titles, five MHSAA Regional Championships, were one time MHSAA State Runners Up (2011), and were one time MHSAA State Champions (2013). The Pennfield High School girls varsity bowling win-loss record was 155-60. The Pennfield High School boys varsity bowling team was equally impressive with one Conference Championship, two MHSAA Regional Titles, were one time NHSAA State Runners Up (2016) and were two time MHSAA State Champions (2017, 2018). The Pennfield High School boys varsity bowling win-loss record was 164-83-2. Mike had seven MHSAA All State Individuals, four MHSAA Individual State Champions, and one MHSAA Individual Runners Up. Several of his elite athletes earned special recognition including; James Ruoff – Dream Team Mr. Bowler 2019, Kyle Roach – Dream Team 2004, Loretta Hinds – Dream Team 2013. Three of his student athletes went on to compete at the collegiate level including; Loretta Hinds – Olivet College, James Ruoff – Aquinas College, and Kelsey Kipp – Kellogg Community College.

Over the years Coach Roach has been honored for his accomplishments and his commitment to his sport and student athletes. He was named the Michigan High School Interscholastic Bowling Coaches Association (MHSIBCA) Coach of the Year in 2011 and 2017, the Detroit Free Press Coach of the Year in 2018, the NFHS Coach of the Year in 2015 and 2019, and in 2014 he was inducted into the MHSIBCA Hall of Fame. Mike is also the only bowling coach to win three of four State Championships in one year (2017), the only bowling coach to win both singles State Championships in one year (2017), and was the first bowling coach to win a State Championship, move up a Division and repeat as State Champions.

Mike has been very active in a number of associations to support his sport. He has been the 2nd Vice President of the MHSIBCA for four years, 1st Vice President for nine years, on the Awards Committee for ten years, chairman of the Awards Committee for nine years, and a member of the Ranking Committee for ten years. He was a USBC Board member from 2013-2015, and a member of the Eagles Bowling League Grievance Committee.

2023**Gary Sharpe—Hall of Fame****2023**

Gary Sharpe has been coaching basketball in the state of Michigan for fifty-six consecutive years and is still actively coaching. He started his coaching career as a sub varsity coach at Dearborn Sacred Heart High School from 1976-1969, taking over as the head varsity basketball coach from 1969-1974. From 1974-1979 he was the head varsity basketball coach at Pontiac Catholic High School. Then Gary moved on to Birmingham Groves High School where he was the head varsity basketball coach for nineteen seasons, from 1979-1998. Detroit CMA was the next stop for him as the head varsity basketball coach from 1998-2001. Gary spent next ten years as the head varsity basketball coach at Royal Oak High School. From 2011-2013 he was the head varsity basketball coach at Waterford Kettering High School. Next for Gary was a sub varsity basketball coaching position at Notre Dame Prep from 2013-2015, and a varsity assistant coaching position at Lake Orion from 2015-2016. He has been a sub varsity coach at Waterford Mott since 2016 and continues to coach there. The basketball teams under his guidance were extremely successful. His teams earned one Conference Title, five MHSAA District Championships, two MHSAA Regional Championships, and had an overall win-loss record of 426-525. Several of Coach Sharpe’s student athletes earned special honors; Anthony Bernard from Pontiac Catholic was an Oakland Press Class C All-State Athlete, Randall Brown from Detroit Cooley was named to the Detroit Free Press Dream, and Kenneth Brown from Detroit Cooley was a Detroit Free Press All-State Athlete.

Coach Sharpe also served as the varsity assistant football coach at Dearborn Sacred Heart from 1967-1969. Later he was the sub varsity football coach for Dearborn Sacred heart from 1972-1973 and the varsity assistant football coach at Detroit Cooley from 1985-1986. He became the head varsity football coach at Detroit Cooley High School for five seasons from 1987-1989 and 1991-1992. His football teams have earned four Conference Titles, and his Detroit Cooley Team was Division Champs in 1991. His overall football win-loss record was 226-19.

Because Gary was “a positive influence on the young men he coached and was respected by not only his team and their parents but also the opposing players and coaches” it is no surprise that he has received many awards and recognitions throughout his career. He was named the Boys Basketball – Birmingham Eccentric Coach of the Year in 1995, the Oakland Press Coach of the Year in 1976, the Metro Suburban League Coach of the Year in 1985, and has received the MHSCA 50+ Longevity Coaching Award.

Bob Veach has accrued sixty seasons of coaching experience over the last thirty-nine years. He started his long career at East Hills Junior High as the 9th grade football coach from 1962-1971. During the same time period he served as the 9th grade baseball coach at East Hills Junior High from 1962-1967. Then in 1968, Bob became the varsity head baseball coach at Lahser High School for the next twenty-three years (1968-1991). He took on the position of assistant football coach at Lahser High School in 1981 and served in that position for the next fifteen years (1981-1996). From 1997-2001 he was the assistant High School Track Coach at Lahser High School and the middle school football coach at West Hills Middle School. Bob's Lahser High School baseball team won their MHSAA District Championship in 1977. His overall win-loss record for his baseball teams was 263-271.

In 1989 Coach Veach was named the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association (MHSFCA) Assistant Coach of the year for football. His greatest legacy as a coach is perhaps his influence on his student athletes and mentoring of young coaches. He was "a coach who truly was a role model to all of his athletes. He showed me how to make the game meaningful to students that would never play after high school. He knew the job was not about the Xs and Os. It was about showing kids how to be better people. In that capacity, he was a huge success."

2023**NHSACA Hall of Fame****2023**

Coach Lober has been at three high schools since graduating from Bowling Green University, Michigan State University, and Central Michigan University. However, from 1969 to present he has been at Traverse City Central High School. During that time, he has coached 115 public school teams. In 54 years at Traverse City, his track and feield dual meet record is 367-36-2. He has led teams to 58 straight wins and has coach 27 undefeated dual meet seasons. They also have 21 league titles in 29 years in the conference. Under Lober the Trojans have 11 Regional titles and they were state champions in 1992 in a division that boasts 163 schools.

Athletes for Coach Lober have won 136 individual titles, there have been 12 high school All Americans, 2 national champions, and 53 All-State athletes. He was also the first high school coach Michigan to have a 16' pole vaulter. And speaking of pole vaulting—he has had 44 athletes compete in the event at the state

meet.

In 29 years of coaching cross country he has had 16 top 12 state meet finishes in the large school division. His team has been a state finalist for 22 years of the 28 that he has coached that sport. He has been meet director for track meets for over 45 years and has run a pole vault clinic for 25 years. Coach is a six time Regional Coach of the Year in track and cross country, has been a state Coach of the Year three times, has been inducted into the Michigan High School Coaches Association Hall of Fame, as well as, two other track an field Halls of Fame.

Coach Lober now joins 2023 National High School Athletic Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

2023**NHSACA Hall of Fame****2023**

Coach Larry Seger, a graduate of Middleville-Thornapple Kellogg High, returned to his alma mater after attending Central Michigan University and Michigan State University to coach their tennis teams. He coached the Thornapple Kellogg Trojan Boys' tennis teams from 1969—2007 and 2009. He coached the girls' tennis teams from 1974—2020. He has led the boys' teams' to a record of 364-172-13 while his girls' teams' record is 377-173-17. Those 741 total wins is the most in the history of Michigan High School Tennis.

Coach Seger's boys have won eight conference titles and two regional titles while his girls have won 14 conference championships and three regional titles. Coach had four all-state singles players. He led teams to 52 tournament championships. In the 52 years that he has coached he has led 86 varsity teams. He was the first girls' varsity coach at Thornapple-Kellogg, and he coached them fo 46 years. Coach Seger led teams to

10 undefeated dual seasons.

Coach Seager served on the Michigan High School Tennis Association board of directors for several years in the 1980's. He was named Michigan Coach of the Year in 1984 after numerous Regional Coach of the Year recognitions for both boys and girls.

He was inducted to the Middleville Hall of Fame in 2016 and to the Michigan High School Coaches Hall of Fame in 2022 and now joins the National High School Athletic Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2023.

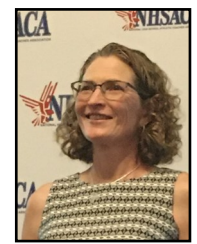

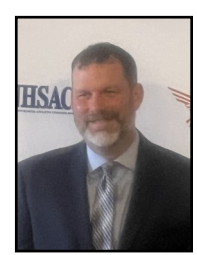

The Hall of Fame is Now Literally a Hall! It has been relocated to the hallway that is the north entrance to the Student Activities Center (SAC), just south of Rose Area. The entrance is just north of the stone sign for the MHSCA Hall of Fame. It features a 60' long mural, showcases, and an electric kiosk, featuring all of the 695 inductees, dating back to 1958. Qualifications for nomination are as follows: 1) one must have served a minimum of twenty (20) years in high school coaching and/or athletic administration; 2) receive two letters of recommendation from administrators and/or fellow coaches; 3) have exemplified service to his/her community, state and affiliated organization; 4) demonstrated coaching excellence.
