TUDAY'S GAME

Today is the first meeting between the U.S. and Finland at the 2018 Four Nations Cup. The game will take place at 1 p.m. (ET) at SaskTel Centre in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, Canada. Today's game will be streamed live on HockeyTV.com. Follow the updates on Twitter @USAHockey and join the conversation by using #FourNations. The two teams last met in the semifinals at the 2018 Olympic Winter Games when the U.S. defeated the Fins, 5-0. Dani Cameranesi (Plymouth, Minn.) led the way for Team USA with two goals and an assist while Maddie Rooney (Andover, Minn.) made 14 saves on as many shots to advance to the gold-medal game against Canada.

- TALKING POINTS -

USA VS. FINLAND

The U.S. has fared well against Finland in the Four Nations Cup, historically. Over the last 10 tournaments Team USA is 9-1 against Finland, outscoring the Fins by a total of 62-7. The U.S. has recorded six shutout victories over the last decade and scored at least four goals in nine of the 10 contests.

The last meeting between the two teams in the Four Nations Cup was in 2017 in Tampa, Florida, when the U.S. defeated the Fins, 8-2. Twelve different skaters registered points and Emily Pfalzer (Buffalo, N.Y.) recorded a hat trick to secure the victory. Rooney made 11 saves in her first victory of the tournament.

BACK FOR MORE

Sixteen of the 23 skaters on the U.S. Women's National Team roster competed in the 2018 Olympic Winter Games with Team USA. Cayla Barnes (Eastvale, Calif.), Kacey Bellamy (Westfield, Mass.), Hannah Brandt (Vadnais Heights, Minn.), Cameranesi, Kendall Coyne Schofield (Palos Heights, III.), Brianna Decker (Dousman, Wis.), Kali Flanagan (Hudson, N.H.), Megan Keller (Farmington Hills, Mich.), Amanda Kessel (Madison, Wis.), **Hilary Knight** (Sun Valley, Idaho), **Gigi Marvin** (Warroad, Minn.), **Sidney Morin** (Minnetonka, Minn.), **Kelly Pannek** (Plymouth, Minn.), Pfalzer, **Alex Rigsby** (Delafield, Wis.) and Rooney helped lead the U.S. to its second-ever Olympic gold medal.

Cameranesi tied to lead all U.S. skaters with five points (3G-2A) while Coyne Schofield, Knight and Marvin each added two goals of their own in the tournament. Team USA outscored its opponents 17-5 over the five contests played in PyeongChang, South Korea.

INTERNATIONAL SUCCESS

Winning gold at the 2018 Olympic Winter Games in PyeongChang, South Korea, was an incredible moment for the U.S., but not one that came without previous success on the international stage. The gold medal was the second in U.S. women's Olympic history after capturing gold in 1998 in Nagano, Japan. However, Team USA's success at the IIHF Women's World Championships paved the way for the journey to Olympic gold, having won four consecutive gold medals from 2013-17 and winning eight of the last 10 tournaments with an overall record of 40-4-4-2-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) over that span. Along with the success at Women's Worlds, the U.S. has also won four consecutive gold medals at the IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championships.

CORKUM LEADING THE WAY

Bob Corkum (Salisbury, Mass.) is the head coach of the U.S. Women's National Team for the first time at the 2018 Four Nations Cup. He served as an assistant coach for the U.S. Under-22 Women's Select Team for the U-22 Series vs. Canada in Calgary this past August and helped lead the U.S. to a threegame sweep.

Corkum will be joined by assistant coaches Joel Johnson (White Bear Lake, Minn.) and Brian Pothier (New Bedford, Mass.).

2018 FOUR NATIONS CUP

The Four Nations Cup is an annual tournament that has been held in varying forms since 1996. This year marks the 23rd year of the tournament (previously the Three Nations Cup). Games will be held at SaskTel Centre in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, Canada. The United States has competed in the tournament 21 times, having not participated in 2001. Team USA has captured the title eight times (1997, 2003, 2008, 2011-12, 2015-17), finished second 12 times and third in the tournament in 2013. The Americans hold an overall record of 51-5-5-23-2 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) in 86 Three/Four Nations Cup games.

2018 FOUR NATIONS CUP U.S. TEAM STAFF

BOB CORKUM, HEAD COACH



Bob Corkum's appointment to the U-22 select team staff marked his first coaching assignment for a U.S. team since leading the U.S. men into the 2013 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament in Slovakia, where the team finished second.

Corkum, who will serve as the U.S. Women's National Team head coach for the duration of the 2018-19 season, also previously served as an assistant coach for the New York Islanders from 2014-2017. A 12-year NHL veteran, Corkum joined the Islanders organization in July 2013 after spending five seasons as an associate coach at his alma mater, the University of Maine. Among his accomplishments, he helped the Black Bears qualify for the NCAA tournament in 2012.

Corkum's NHL playing career began with the Buffalo Sabres in 1990 after being selected by the Sabres in the 3rd round (47th overall) in the 1986 NHL Draft. The Salisbury, Mass., native also spent time with the Anaheim Ducks, Philadelphia Flyers, Phoenix Coyotes, Los Angeles Kings, New Jersey Devils and Atlanta Thrashers.

Prior to playing in the NHL, Corkum played four years at the University of Maine. As a senior in 1989, he helped lead the Black Bears to a Hockey East championship and a second consecutive Frozen Four appearance.

JOEL JOHNSON, ASSISTANT COACH

Joel Johnson, who recently led the U.S. Under-22 Women's Select Team into the Under-22 Series vs. Canada as head coach alongside Corkum, will make his debut as assistant coach of the U.S. Women's National Team at the 2018 Four Nations Cup. Johnson served as head coach for the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team from 2014-2017, helping the U.S. capture four consecutive gold medals at the IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship.

Now in his 14th season on the University of Minnesota coaching staff, Johnson has helped the Golden Gophers claim six national titles (2000, 2004, 2012, 2013, 2015, and 2016). He previously spent six seasons coaching at Bethel University from 2004-10, including three years as the men's hockey head coach.

BRIAN POTHIER, ASSISTANT COACH

Brian Pothier will be making his debut as a member of the coaching staff for the U.S. Women's National Team, having recently served as a camp coach at both the 2018 USA Hockey Women's National Festival in Lake Placid, N.Y., and the 2018 U.S. Women's National Team Evaluation Camp in Biddeford, Maine.

A former NHL defenseman and U.S. Men's National Team alumnus (2007 IIHF Men's World Championship), Pothier went undrafted in the NHL before signing with the Atlanta Thrashers in his senior year of college. He spent his first year in Orlando with Atlanta's farm team, the Orlando Solar Bears and went on to win both the Turner Cup and Rookie of the Year and American-born Rookie of the Year honors in 2000-2001. Pothier also spent time with the Ottawa Senators, Washington Capitals and Carolina Hurricanes organizations before retiring from hockey in 2012. Pothier now coaches all ages at Pothier Blueline Hockey in Rochester, Mass.
