JUNE 2015 //

Every year, the Ontario Minor Hockey Association hosts an Annual General Meeting to discuss the past year's accomplishments, issues and initiatives with delegates from across the province. The event also featured the Parade of Champions, OMHA Consumer Show and Golf Tournament.

JULY 2015 //

The winner of the 2015 OMHA Matt Duchene Shootout Challenge was Cody Thomas from Bracebridge, who played with the South Muskoka Bears Pee wee BB team. Cody scored a time of 7.24 seconds, defeating NHL superstar Duchene's time of 9.06 seconds.

AUGUST 2015 //

The OMHA Development Seminar unofficially begins efforts in the field, and OMHA personnel are gathered to share best practices, update on the newest sport technical information available, and depart the event energized to support our Membership.

The OMHA delivered over 200 clinics for over 8,600 Coaches and Referees this past season who were seeking to certify or re-certify their credentials.

13,000 Coaches, trainers and referees continue to certify or re-certify their credentials in the off-season.

SEPTEMBER 2015 //

Referee Schools in Windsor, Guelph and Trenton provided new officials with an opportunity to acquire officiating skills and rule knowledge while completing OMHA and Hockey Canada certification requirements.



The OMHA Events Team Presented by National Sports and Pro Hockey Life hit the road to begin their season 20,000km journey across the OMHA attending 27 special events.

OCTOBER 2015 //

One of the most exciting times of the year as the OMHA regular season officially gets underway. Hundreds of teams in Ontario kick off their journey to #RedHats and players begin to see their hard work in practice develop on the ice.

NOVEMBER 2015 //

This year, 368 Novice hockey teams received up to \$500 in funding from Dodge Caravan Kids Team Sponsorship Program while 45 Atom hockey teams from across the OMHA received \$500 in funding from the CHRGD Rink Rats Team Sponsorship Program.



New this season, 44 Pee wee and Bantam teams took part in the Froster Active Kids Team Sponsorship Program and received \$500 each.

DECEMBER 2015 //

Defenceman Travis Dermott, a grad from York-Simcoe Express, was named to Team Canada's World Juniors team. He recorded two assists in five games.

The OMHA Minor Midget Showcase powered by Under Armour featured 13 teams from the Eastern AAA League. 10 South Central AAA teams competed in a similar event later in January.

Christmas break is always a busy time for tournaments in the hockey calendar. Over 1,900 tournaments were hosted across the OMHA in 2016-16 including 75 hosted in the week between Christmas and New Years.

JANUARY 2016 //

The OMHA proudly launched a Respect in Hockey video in a continuation of its efforts to promote fairness, integrity and mutual respect in minor hockey. The video quickly gained over 20,000 views online and praise from around the hockey community.



FEBRUARY 2016



The CHRGD Rink Rats Hockey Festival took place in Newmarket. The event featured 32 atom house and local league teams competing in a big tournament setting.



Three players from the OMHA were members of Hockey Canada's team for the Winter Youth Olympic Games in Lillehammer, Norway. Defenceman Dennis Busby (Barrie Jr. Colts) and forwards Aidan Dudas (North Central Predators) and Connor Roberts (Grey-Bruce Highlanders) earned silver medals. Both forwards finished in the top 10 in scoring.

In partnership with Respect in Sport, the second OMHA Essay Contest was launched. Those who submitted entries were required to explain what lessons they have learned from hockey.

MARCH 2016



All across the province Playdowns series wrapped up. A total of 95 champions were crown across every division on the road to #RedHats.

The York-Simcoe Express captured the OHL Cup for the second time in team history. The Express were the first team from the OMHA to win the championship since the Oakville Rangers in 2013.

APRIL 2016

The OMHA Hockey Festival Presented by Maple Lodge Farms took place in Whitby. This tournament featured 80 House and Local league teams in the Tyke, Novice, Atom and Pee wee age groups.



The Ontario Hockey Federation produced Champions at the A/AA/AAA levels of Atom, Pee wee, Bantam, Midget, and Juvenile divisions. Three OMHA teams left the championships with a gold medal: Riverside Rangers (Atom A), Grimsby Kings (Bantam A) and the Barrie Jr. Colts (Bantam AA).



The annual Ontario Hockey League draft saw 86 players from the OMHA selected including five in the first round.

MAY 2016

The OMHA was well represented in the OHL Gold Cup tournament icing two competitive teams. The eight-team tournament brings together the best minor midget players from across all hockey organizations in the province to compete.

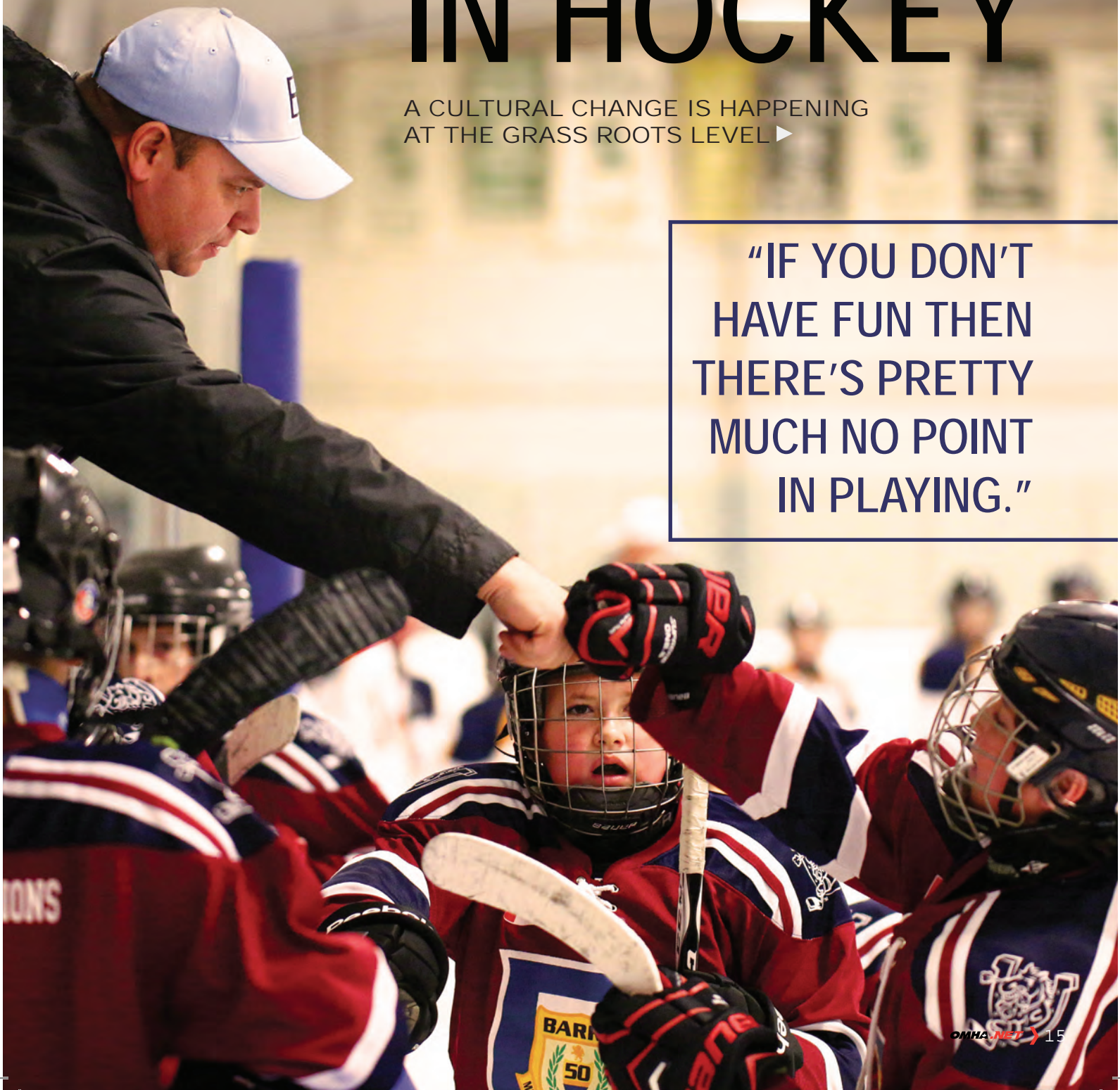

HOCKEY IS A DEFINING PASSION IN CANADA — AS MUCH A PART OF THE NATIONAL IDENTITY AS THE ANTHEM OR THE MAPLE LEAF.

For some spectators at hockey games, it's hard to realize the impact words have until you hear what kind of reaction it creates from the children themselves.

"It just made me feel really bad inside. I don't want them to yell at me anymore."

Watching your child play hockey is an exciting and stressful time. It's easy for parents to get overwhelmed with different emotions as the passion from the ice travels all the way through the stands. However, no matter what happens during the game, there still must be Respect.

Slowly, a cultural change is happening at the grass roots level. At the beginning of last season, the OMHA distributed ‘Respect in Hockey’ signage to every member association to display in their

All Team Officials, On-Ice Volunteers, On-Ice Officials and Parents were required to take the appropriate ‘Respect’ education. These programs encourage positive sport behaviours and create a standard of respectful conduct for all stakeholders.

HOCKEY TRULY IS AN INTERNATIONAL GAME

Despite the distances and some varying nuances, the game is still played with a goalie on each side and a puck, no matter what sheet of ice you play on.

This past holiday break, the Pickering Panthers Bantam AA team carried on a tradition that has lasted for 25 years in the Pickering Hockey Association. The players packed their bags and crossed the ocean to play a nine game tournament across four countries in Europe over a two week span, combining their love for the sport with the vacation of a lifetime.

The team worked with an agency to establish an itinerary for the trip that included games in Switzerland, Germany and Austria. Both an outdoor game and the gold medal game took place in the Czech Republic.

When the team wasn't on the ice, they took the time to explore some famous landmarks. In Prague, the Panthers toured the Karlstejn Castle, the Charles Bridge and Wenceslas Square. When in Salzburg, Austria, the team hit the slopes for a day of skiing and snowboarding and also saw the famous Bad Dumberg Salt Mine. Combined with city tours in Zurich and Munich, the Panthers certainly took full advantage of their time in Europe.

Spending 14 days together in an unfamiliar place means that all of the new sights and sounds will become a shared experience. Peter Wieser, an assistant coach with the Panthers, said that the bus trips only brought the team closer.



“Patience, compromise and supporting each other off and on the ice became extremely important to maintain team harmony,” said Wieser.

Team trust has also improved to create a better unit on the ice. Players have made stronger bonds with other members of the team.

Playing hockey in Europe means playing on a bigger ice surface and Wieser noticed some differences in the style of play that his team was facing.

“Teams rarely would give up the puck regardless of the zone, neutral or opposition zone. If they didn't have a play, they would constantly re-group and through motion create opportunity for crisp, high-tempo break out plays as a unit versus individuals that enabled scoring chances.”

That emphasis on puck possession started to be echoed by his own players, who began to manage the puck better by playing a similar style.

“Our forwards were in motion much more frequently, defencemen were carrying the puck more aggressively and forcing the opposition to make decisions that opened up opportunity elsewhere on the ice.”

Yet no matter where the game is played, examples of sportsmanship still stretch across the globe. Teams from other countries began cheering for each other and a group from Slovakia began waving Canadian flags to support the Panthers. Some players would exchange sticks and jerseys, proving that sportsmanship knows no borders.

Fundraising for the trip began two years ago and featured events like golf tournaments, dances and fantasy sports pools.

Wieser recommends using a reputable tour company when planning a trip and to reach out to other teams that have previously done this experience. Create a fundraising committee and have a plan of events. Give yourself plenty of time when organizing all of the details.

“Gain consensus on the core components of the trip and fundraising initiatives, create guiding principles early in the process, publish them and stick to the plan,” said Wieser. “The host teams are extremely excited to play Canadians and want to share in the experience as much as you do, embrace it, consider billeting for one evening for the players to truly experience the culture of the environment in which you are visiting.”
