2023 IIHF U18 WOMEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

The U.S. U18 Women's World Championship Team is one of eight teams competing at the International Ice Hockey Federation Under-18 Women's World Championship from January 8-15, 2023 in Östersund, Sweden.

The tournament features eight teams divided into two groups of four. Team USA is competing in Group A alongside, Canada, Finland and Sweden. Group B includes Czechia, Switzerland, Japan and Slovakia. Each group will play a single round-robin series before the playoff round.

All four teams from Group A and the top two teams from Group B advance to the playoff rounds. The top two teams in Group A receive a quarterfinal bye. The two semifinal winners will play in the gold medal game, while the two semifinal losers will play for bronze.

U18 WWC SUCCESS

The U.S. has earned gold or silver in every IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship since the inception of the event in 2008.

LAST TIME OUT

Despite a 32-save performance from goaltender **Annelies Bergmann**, the U.S. fell in its final preliminary-round game, 3-1, to Canada. It marked the first preliminary loss since 2020 and just the third all-time loss for Team USA. **Joy Dunne** tallied the U.S.' lone goal in the second off a face-off win. Even with the loss, Team USA still earned a bye into the semifinals.

QUICK SHOTS

TODAY'S MATCHUP

Today's meeting marks the semifinal-round game for Team USA at the IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship and the second match-up of the tournament against Sweden. The U.S. finished preliminary-round play with a record of 2-0-0-1, earning a quarterfinal bye to the semifinal round.

LAST TIME AGAINST SWEDEN

The U.S. last met Sweden on Jan. 8, in the first game of the preliminary-round play at this year's championship. Team USA won the game, by a tally of 6-3. **Maggie Scannell** recorded two points (1G, 1A) as a three-goal third pushed the U.S. on top.

ALL-TIME VS. SWEDEN

In 15 all-time meetings, the U.S. hold a 14-1-0-0 record against Sweden at the IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship, outscoring Sweden 88-14 in the process. Team USA has faced Sweden three times in the semifinals, holding a perfect 3-0 record.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Through three games, Team USA's special teams have been some of the best throughout the tournament. The U.S.' power play ranks first in the championship, converting at a 43 percent clip (6-14), while its penalty kill is holding opponents off the scoreboard 93 percent (1-14) of the time. The lone power play goal was yielded against Sweden.

A VETERAN PRESENCE

The seven returning players from the 2022 team, Annelies Bergmann, Cassie Hall, Molly Jordan, Ava Lindsay, Finley McCarthy, Maggie Scannell and Josie St. Martin, have been responsible for 53 percent of all goal scoring and 66 percent of minutes played in net.

SCORING EFFICIENTLY

The U.S. is scoring on nearly 16 percent of its shots, the highest percentage of the tournament. Of the 94 shots on goal Team USA has registered, 15 have found its way to the back of the net.

WELL-ROUNDED OFFENSE

Offensive contributions for the U.S. are happening up and down the lineup, as 11 different players have registered multiple points through two games thusfar. Of those 11, **Finley McCarthy**, **Joy Dunne**, **Samantha Taber** and **Maggie Scannell** have multiple goals.

IN THE SEMIFINALS...

Team USA boasts a perfect 14-0 all-time record in the semifinal round of the Under-18 Women's World Championship. The U.S. has advanced to the gold medal game in every U18 WWC competed.

TEAM USA AT A GLANCE

ROSTER BREAKDOWN

The 2023 U.S. Under-18 Women's World Championship roster is comprised of 23 players, including seven returners from the silver medal-winning team that competed at the 2022 IIHF Women's World Championship in Madison, Wis., in June 2022. Of the 23, 16 are newcomers representing the U.S. for the first time at a U18 WWC, with the roster comprising of three goaltenders, seven defenders and 13 forwards.

AYE AYE CAPTAINS

Joy Dunne (O'Fallon, Mo.) is the captain of Team USA for the 2023 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship. **Molly Jordan** (Berlin, Conn.) and **Maggie Scannell** (Wynantskill, N.Y.) will serve as alternate captains.

BEHIND THE BENCH

Katie Lachapelle head coach of the Holy Cross women's ice hockey team, is serving as head coach of the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team for the second time, after coaching the 2022 team. Liz Keady Norton, head coach for Dartmouth, Lindsay Berman, assistant coach for Northeastern and three-time Olympian, Brianna Decker, will serve as assistant coaches. Sanya Sandahl, assistant coach at Augsburg will be the goalie coach.

FINLAND



Series vs. Finland: 5-0-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L)

Of Note: Team USA has won five straight appearances against Finland.

JAN. 9, 2023: USA 8, FIN 1: Maggie Scannell (3G, 2A) tallied five points, as the U.S. converted on 3-of-4 power-play opportunities en route to a seven-goal victory in the second game of the 2023 IIHF U18 WWC.

SWEDEN



Series vs. Sweden: 14-1-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) **Of Note:** U.S. wins 14th straight against Sweden.

JAN. 8, 2023: USA 6, SWE 3: Maggie Scannell (Wynantskill, N.Y.) tallied a goal and an assist, as Team USA tallied three goals in the third period to pull ahead of Sweden, 6-3, in the opening game of the 2023 IIHF U18 WWC.

CANADA



Series vs. Canada: 8-5-4-5 (W-OTW-OTL-L)

Of Note: The U.S. fell to Canada, 3-1, in the final preliminary-round game.

JAN. 11, 2023: USA 1, CAN 3: Despite a 32-save performance by **Annelies Bergmann**, the U.S. fell to Canada, 3-1. The loss marked the first preliminary-round loss for Team USA since 2020.

U.S. All-Time in U18WWC Quarterfinals: 0-0 (W-L)

Of Note: The U.S. has never played in a quarterfinal contest in IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship history, having earned a BYE to the semifinal round in all 15 of the Under-18 Women's World Championship tournaments.

SEMIFINALS



U.S. All-Time in U18WWC Semifinals: 14-0 (W-L)

Of Note: Team USA has advanced to the semifinal round in all 14 U18 WWCs competed. The U.S. has won all 14 semifinal contests it has played at the competition, topping the Czech Republic six times, Sweden three times, Russia twice and Canada, Finland, Germany each once.

MEDAL GAMES



U.S. All-Time in U18WWC Gold Medal Games: 8-6 (W-L)

Of Note: Team USA and Canada have faced off for gold in 13 of the 14 previous U18WWCs, with the U.S. holding a 7-6 advantage in those contests. Six of those contests have gone into overtime (2020, 2019, 2016, 2013, 2010, 2008), with the U.S. winning three.

SECOND GO AROUND

Seven players return from the 2022 edition of the U.S. Under-18 Women's World Championship Team. Annelies Bergmann, Finley McCarthy, Josie St. Martin, Ava Lindsay, Maggie Scannell, Molly Jordan and Cassie Hall all played an integral part in bringing home silver at the 2022 tournament in Madison, Wis.

NEW KIDS ON THE BLOCK

16 of the 23 players on the roster are making their IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship debut at the 2023 tournament. Layla Hemp, Danielle Strom, Gabby Kim, Cailin Mumm, Rose Dwyer, Megan Healy, Ellah Hause, Elly Klepinger, Allie Lalonde, Lindzi Avar, Kendra Distad, Lucia DiGirolamo, Samantha Taber, Bella Fanale, Joy Dunne and Peyton Compton are all making their U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team

ELEVEN STATES REPRESENTED

Players on this year's team hail from 11 different states from all around the country. Minnesota leads the way with nine natives, while California, Massachusetts, Michigan and New York all boast two players. Connecticut, Florida, Missouri, Montana, Pennsylvania and Vermont all have one representative on the team.

SISTER, SISTER

Three players on the 2023 team are guided by their older sisters who all competed on earlier editions of the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team. Captain Joy Dunne, whose older sister is 2022 Olympian Jincy Dunne, competed in three U18 WWC in 2013, 2014 and 2015. Defender Rose Dwyer, is the younger sister of Grace Dwyer, who represented the U.S. in 2022. Goaltender Layla Hemp is the younger sister of Peyton Hemp, who was on the 2020 squad.

MONTANA MINDSET

Forward Finley McCarthy is from Whitefish, Monata and is the only player on the 2023 U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team from the state on Montana. She is the first-ever player on a U.S. Under-18 Women's World Championship Team to be from 'The Treasure State' and also represented the U.S. at last year's U18 WWC as well.

FLORIDA FORWARD

Forward **Pevton Compton** hails from Stanford, Fla., a suburb of Orlando. Compton is the only player on the roster from Florida and just the second U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team member ever to be from Florida. Brittany Bugalski was on the 2015 team and was from Lake Worth, Fla.

COLLEGE CONNECTION

18 of 23 players are publicly committed to play collegiate hockey, with most entering school in the fall of 2023 or fall of 2024. Three players are committed to University of Minnesota and University of Wisconsin, while Boston College, Cornell University, Northeastern University, Ohio State University, Princeton University and University of St. Thomas all have two commitments each on the roster.

WOMEN'S WORLDS ALUMNI

A total of 17 players on the 2022 U.S. Women's National Team, the most recent edition, represented the U.S. at an IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship, including Cayla Barnes, Hannah Bilka, Hannah Brandt, Alex Carpenter, Jesse Compher, Kendall Coyne Schofield, Jincy Dunne, Lacey Eden, Rory Guilday, Caroline Harvey, Taylor Heise, Megan Keller, Amanda Kessel, Abby Roque, Kelly Pannek, Lee Stecklein, and Grace Zumwinkle. Eden, Guilday and Harvey were most recently on the U18 team in 2020.

ELEVEN YOUTH HOCKEY PROGRAMS REPRESENTED

A total of 11 different youth hockey programs, from around the country, have players on this year's team. Selects Academy (N.Y.) leads with seven players, Minnetonka High School (Minn.) has five players and Shattuck-St. Mary's (Minn.) has three players. Andover High School (Minn.), East Coast Wizards (Mass.), Hill Murray High School (Minn.), Little Ceasars (Mich.), Maple Grove High School (Minn.), Oakland Jr. Grizzlies (Mich.), Stillwater High School (Minn.) and St. Louis Lady Blues (Mo.) have one player on the team.

MINNESOTA MADE

A total of 12 players have ties to the state of Minnesota. Nine grew up in the state, while another three have played their high school hockey in the state.

SELECTS ACADEMY

A total seven players currently attend Bishop Kearney Selects Academy in Rochester, N.Y. Selects Academy is the most represented youth hockey program on the roster as Molly Jordan, Rose Dwyer, Megan Healy, Finley McCarthy, Lucia DiGirolamo, Bella Fanale and Peyton Compton all play at the Selects Academy.

PLAYER, NOW COACH

Assistant coach Brianna Decker was a member of the gold medal-winning Under-18 Women's World Championship teams in both 2008 and 2009. She tallied 16 career points (11G, 5A) in 10 games over two years. She is now serving as an assistant coach for the third time after being behind the bench for the 2019 team and the gold-medal winning 2020 squad.

AROUND USA HOCKEY

2023 BIOSTEEL ALL-AMERICAN GAME

The 2023 BioSteel All-American Game is returning to Plymouth, Mich. on Jan. 16 at USA Hockey Arena. Puck drop is set for 4 p.m. ET and can be viewed live on NHL Network. The game, in its 10th year, features the top American-born prospects eligible for the upcoming NHL Draft. The annual event, which began in 2012, has seen 215 players that have gone on to be drafted, including 46 first round picks.

2022-23 RIVALRY SERIES

The 2022-23 Rivalry Series, featuring the women's national teams from the U.S. and Canada, will conclude with its final two games in February in a to be announced location in Canada. The U.S. currently leads the series three games to two.

2023 IIHF WOMEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

The 2023 IIHF Women's World Championship will take place April 5-16 at the CAA Centre in Brampton, Ontario. The U.S. will bring a 23-player roster that will be named following an evaluation camp in March. Team USA will compete in Group A alongside, Canada, Czechia, Switzerland and Japan.

2023 USA HOCKEY PLAYER DEVELOPMENT CAMPS, PRESENTED BY BIOSTEEL Throughout the summer of 2023, USA Hockey will host six different player development camps for both boys and girls as a talent evaluation and development opportunity. The boys camp will remain in Amherst, N.Y., while the girls camp will head to the campus of Miami University in Oxford, Ohio for the first time.

KATIE LACHAPELLE, HEAD COACH

Katie Lachapelle is serving as head coach of the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team for the second time, after leading the team to a silver medal at the 2022 IIHF Under-18 Women'a World Championship in Madison, Wis.

She has been closely involved with the U.S. Women's National Team program since 2013, having served as an assistant coach for the U18 Women's National Team from 2013-17, leading the squad to three golds at the IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship in 2015, 2016 and 2017 and a silver medal in 2014.

Lachapelle also served on the coaching staff of the U.S. Under-22 Women's Select Team on occasions for the U22 Series against Canada, leading the U.S. to a three-game sweep in 2018 and a 2-1 series victory in 2019. She has also served as a coach at numerous national and player development camps over the last decade.

For the last four seasons, Lachapelle has led the Holy Cross Women's Ice Hockey program as head coach. The Lewiston, Maine native has been on staff for five seasons, serving as the team's associate head coach prior to taking over the head seat.

Prior to joining the Crusaders program, Lachapelle was an assistant coach at Boston University (2008-17), Ohio State (2004-08), Niagara (2001-04) and Union (1999-01). She is a Providence College graduate, and four year letterwinner for the Friars.

LINDSAY BERMAN. ASSISTANT COACH

Berman is making her international coaching debut as an assistant coach for the 2023 U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team.

She currently serves as an assistant women's ice hockey coach at her alma mater, Northeastern University, and since her arrival on the coaching staff in 2018, the Huskies have won four consecutive Hockey East championships and advanced to the last two NCAA Frozen Fours.

Prior to her time at Northeastern, she served as head women's ice hockey coach at UMass Boston (2015-18) and was an assistant women's ice hockey coach at both Brown University (2014-15) and UMass Boston (2011-14).

Berman is a 2010 graduate of Northeastern and played four seasons of women's ice hockey for the Huskies.

BRIANNA DECKER. ASSISTANT COACH

Decker is returning to the coaching staff of the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team as an assistant coach after serving in the same role for the gold medal-winning 2020 team and silver medal-winning 2019 team.

The Dousman, Wis., native currently serves as the girls prep associate head coach and special advisor to the Shattuck-St. Mary's Hockey Program, a role she has held since August 2022.

As a player, Decker helped the U.S. to three Olympic medals, including gold in 2018 and silver in 2014 and 2022. She also skated at eight IIHF Women's World Championships (2011, 2012, 2013, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2019, 2021), taking home gold six times.

LIZ KEADY NORTON. ASSISTANT COACH

Liz Keady Norton will serve as an assistant coach for the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team for the first time during the 2023 season.

She is currently in her second season as head coach of the Dartmouth College women's ice hockey team.

Prior to Dartmouth, she spent four seasons (2017-21) with the Boston University women's ice hockey program. She also served as an assistant women's ice hockey coach for two seasons at Harvard University (2015-17) and one year (2014-15) at Union College.

Keady Norton is a 2008 graduate of Princeton University where she was a four-year letter winner in women's ice hockey. She spent the 2005-06 season training with the U.S. Women's National Team during its pre-Olympic tour.

SANYA SANDAHL. GOALTENDING COACH

Sandahl is making her debut as the goaltending coach for the 2023 U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team.

Sandahl is currently an assistant coach at Augsburg University, a role she has held since the 2011 season, primarily assisting with the Auggie goalies.

The Duluth, Minn. native was a four-year letter winner for Cornell, playing in 54 games, with a .885 career save percentage.
