## Principal's Letter Matt Biggar

We are pleased to be in the final semester of our 4-year modernization project. Given that this is also my fourth year at Burlingame High School, I am truly looking forward to campus life beyond construction. That being said, Kitchell Construction Management has done an excellent job keeping our project on track and minimizing disruptions to our students and staff. The renovations to the Main Building will be completed this spring, and the building will be ready for students and staff for the start of next school year. We will soon be scheduling a ceremony for the grand reopening of our Main Building in the early Fall.

Our decision to pilot the seven period day this year has provided our students with many new options including a number of new elective and academic support courses. On March 9<sup>th</sup>, our district's school board approved funding for a seven period day at all schools starting next year. We are in the fortunate position of having piloted the seven period day

this year and will be building on our year of experience.

International Week in March was a great success. We celebrated the diversity of our student body through a student speaker panel, an international music game show, a fashion show, a food faire, a thought provoking guest speaker and even our very own BHS world cup soccer tournament. Thanks to our teachers, Alicia Gorgani, Steve Mills, David Kimura and our wonderful student leaders in Human Relations Commission, Leadership/ASB and Student Impact Team who planned such a great week.

We successfully completed our school self-study process with positive and constructive feedback from the accreditation committee that visited our school in early March. The committee visited all of our classrooms and met with staff, parents, students and community members in a variety of meetings during their four-day visit. The committee will submit their report to the commission that oversees accreditation in the western region of our country. The commission will make the final determination of the length of our next accreditation term, which we will then share widely with our school community.


In closing, I would like to share with you the list of school wide strengths that the accreditation committee shared with us at the conclusion of their visit.

#### Howard Stern Class of 1932 Remembered

**Don Rones** '34 sent an article about **Howard Stern** '32 that was clipped from a 1942 newspaper. The headline reads: "Gen. Marshall Lauds S.M. Boy as Air Hero". The article continues: "First Lieut. Howard L. Stern, 26-year old San Mateo flying officer who was killed in action October 11 in the Southwest Pacific, died a hero's death in a battle with Japanese planes over Guadalcanal, during which he brought down at least one enemy craft. An eyewitness account of Lieut. Stern's gallant action was given

to a friend of the family by a fellow flyer in Honolulu. Lieut. Stern was one of several American flyers who took off from Henderson Field on Guadalcanal to intercept a formation of Japanese bombers intent on bombing the American Solomons stronghold the day of October 11. In the ensuing battle Lieut. Stern was credited with shooting down a Nipponese bomber, and possibly a Zero fighter. One of the Japanese fighters escorting the bombers then got on the tail of Lieut. Stern's fighter and set it afire. Stern, flying at low altitude, bailed out. He was not high enough for the parachute to break his fall, however, and the American pilot was killed when he struck the water. A crash boat put out from Guadalcanal Island and recovered his body. He was buried in a soldier's grave on Guadalcanal. Lieut. Stern had been in the Southwest Pacific area for nine months previous to his last action. His name was included in the war department's official casualty list of 145 United States soldiers and officers who were killed in action or died of wounds. He was a former San Mateo Junior College and Burlingame High School star athlete, and was a member of the army air force officers' reserve when called to active duty." (Note: Howard Stern was inducted into the BHS Athletic Hall of Fame on May 25, 2002. While at BHS, he was an allaround athlete, president of the Block "B" Society and earned a total of 12 Block B's. He starred in basketball, tennis, golf, track and baseball.)

#### **BHS Alumni Scholarship**

Our 2005 BHS Alumni Scholarship was presented to Eric Anderson Showen '05 who is the son of Mark **Showen** '73. To apply for this scholarship, the student must be the son, daughter, or grandchild of a BHS Alum. Eric wrote to us: "Thank you for honoring me with your scholarship. I am very grateful to receive some financial assistance for my college education, and I feel fortunate to have been selected amongst a number of worthy candidates for your scholarship. The benevolence of the Alumni Association is characteristic of the kindness and generosity I have observed.

#### **Boys State**

Two students from Burlingame High School, Douglas Bojack and Alec Bottrell, will be attending this year's session of Boys State held on the campus of California State University in Sacramento from June 17 - 24. The BHS Alumni Association and a trust fund set up by Burlingame American Legion Post 163 are sponsoring them.

The California Golden Boys State Program is now in its 69th consecutive year. Boys who attend are juniors in their respective schools. They will spend a week being educated in the duties, rights responsibilities of American Citizenship. While in Sacramento they will be separated into individual cities and political parties. They will run for various offices and propose their own laws, rules and regulations. The highest office attainable is Boys State Governor. Those in charge of the program are known as Counselors. They are men doctors. lawyers (including businessmen) who by experience know the structure and functions of City, County and State Government. At the conclusion of the program two boys will be selected to attend Boys Nation, a similar program on a national level held in Arlington, Virginia.

Of the approximately 950 boys in attendance, 19 are from San Mateo County. Richard Dunbar, a 1949 graduate of Burlingame High School, is the San Mateo County Boys State Chairman.

#### BURLINGAME HIGH

For the first time in history, the varsity girls volleyball team made the semifinals in the Central Coast Section (CCS). The team's only defeat in the league was the team's first match against Mills on September 22. The girls redeemed themselves however by challenging Mills again and ending up with the victory. The close and intense game brought winning success and earned them their spot at first place.

After a gratifying season, the girls continued to CCS with a first place spot in the Ocean Division League. The Panthers won their first round of CCS against the Harbor High Pirates. The opposing team offered challenges and won the first game. The Panthers came back winning the second game 25-22, and did the same in the third match. Seniors,

Arianne Torres, with 4 blocks and 10 kills, and Leilani Martin with 11 kills, helped to defeat their opponent as well.

The Panthers beat Branham and moved to the semifinals. Unfortunately, the girls lost Presentation High School of San Jose, which stopped them from continuing on to the finals of CCS.

Burlingame Panther athletes held their ground in league play this year, despite the loss of several key players to last year's graduating class. Panther football ended their year with a 6-5 record, qualifying for the CCS playoffs. The determined team suffered an unfortunate loss to top-seeded Los Gatos in the first round, ending their gratifying season. The highlight of the year was the 24-23 win over San Mateo in the 78<sup>th</sup> annual Little-Big game. Senior Vince Riggio played a huge role for Burlingame on both sides of the ball. Riggio returned a punt for an 85-yard TD return, as well as kicking a 25-yard field goal. Junior Drew Campbell threw a touchdown pass to Rodney Hampton, giving Burlingame a 24-0 lead at halftime.

In the second half, the Burlingame offense ran only 7 plays. In the fourth quarter. San Mateo ran the ball into the end zone on the opening drive, recovered an onside kick, and recovered a fumble, leading to two more Bearcat touchdowns, making it a 24-21 game.

With just over a minute left and San Mateo charging toward the potential game winning touchdown, Riggio came through in the clutch, intercepting the ball in the endzone.

Winter brought the end of football and the beginning of the highly anticipated basketball season. Varsity boys' basketball finished 10-0 in league, clinching a playoff spot for CCS. However, in their second CCS game, after defeating Soquel 60-37, the team suffered a disappointing loss to Saint Ignatius, ending their spectacular season. Led by seniors Casey Sturan, Troy Kalbhenn and Vince Riggio, the team was their accomplishments, proud

Edward Sorensen '37: At the time of the bombing of Pearl Harbor (December 7, 1941), Edward was working as a civilian employee of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in Honolulu, living with his wife Ruth – at Hickam Army Air Base. Ed and Ruth each returned to San Francisco on an original Pan-American

Clipper; and Edward soon enlisted in the Navy. After World War II he worked in the Bay Area. He became a licensed mechanical engineer and worked for 27 years for Kaiser Engineers, engaged in the design of hydro-electrical power plants. For 18 of those years he worked overseas: in London, England; in Ghana and Ivory Coast; and (for 8 years) in Brazil. Edward and Ruth now live in Issaquah, WA, near one of their daughters. They have two daughters, five grandchildren, and five greatgrandchildren. They enjoy the freedom of retirement and traveling with their children.

Margaret Sorensen Burke '39 says: After graduating from BHS, I attended California School of Fine Arts (now called San Francisco Art Institute) in San Francisco and also Art Students League in New York. Following that, I worked in advertising and for publications in San Francisco, and then, for two years, in New York City, where I was assistant art director of an advertising agency. I returned to CA to marry Donald Burke, an engineer and fourth generation Californian. We made our home in Belmont, CA. When in my mid-thirties, I returned to school - to Stanford University, where I received bachelors and masters degrees. I then obtained a graduate fellowship for study in Scandinavia; and my husband and I lived for two years in Copenhagen, Denmark. Upon our return to the U.S., I became a Ph.D. student at the University of California, Berkeley – while also working as an architectural illustrator and at other art jobs. In time, I received a doctorate in Medieval Art/Architecture at U.C. Berkeley. Thereafter, a major project for me was for the DeYoung Museum in San Francisco: I was director of a study to determine whether it was feasible to reconstruct any part of a 13th century Spanish monastery (whose stones the museum owned) after the stones had been virtually destroyed by five fires. I found that only one of the major buildings could be reconstructed. The museum director and city fathers were enthusiastic, but no money was ever voted for the reconstruction. That one building is now being rebuilt at a monastery in northern California. Though I am now retired. I continue working on this project – writing on the history of the 13<sup>th</sup> century Spanish Monastery. I now live in Portola Valley,

CA, after living 50 years in Belmont; but Burlingame is still "home" for me!

Earl F. Schmidt, Jr. '39 passed away on December 29, 2005. Earl was a Scout Master who taught thousands of boys to be leaders during his 20 years as a professional Boy Scout. 
