

Youth Hockey Association 101...or....What is USAH and Mid Am and What Do They Do?


- The Mid Am District is one of 12 Districts in USA Hockey and it administers the affairs of USA Hockey within the district.

Registration



- +All players, coaches, and volunteers need to register with USA Hockey
- + Link to Registration: Website <u>www.midamhockey.com</u> under USA Hockey tab
- Fees: 6 and younger \$20, 7 and 8 year olds \$55, 9 thru 12 year olds \$66, 13 thru 18 year olds \$75, Coaches \$51 (Mid Am Affiliate fee \$5), Volunteers are free...
- +All associations must have a Registrar who is responsible for administering the USA Hockey Registry portal which manages association player, coach and volunteer data and USA Hockey approved rosters.
- + All members need to be registered with USA Hockey, complete a background screen, and complete Safe Sport training <u>prior to participation</u> in any USA Hockey activity.
 - + Note: Youth players who are born in 2006 or earlier must complete Safe Sport training.

Background Screening



- Who needs to be screened?
 - All coaches, all volunteers who have periodic contact with minors and or persons of any age with intellectual impairment
- When do they need to be screened?
 - Every other year (prior to participation)
- O How do they get screened?
 - Website <u>www.midamhockey.com</u> under the SSS tab
- All teams should have a link from their association registrar to check their roster. What does it mean if someone is Redlined on a roster?
 - Screen is not complete, and the member is ineligible for participation

Safe Sport



- Safe Sport is designed to protect our members (players, coaches, referees and other volunteers who are registered members). We do not have jurisdiction over non members or their actions (fans, parents (Spectator Behavior Policy)).
- Safe Sport training must be renewed every year. Your expiration date is based on when you completed your training last year.
- These are some of the offenses we handle ... Sexual misconduct or child abuse, physical misconduct, emotional misconduct, bullying, threats, harassment, hazing, one on one interaction policies, locker room policy, and electronic communications policy.
- Cases can be handled at different levels. Sexual Misconduct or Child Abuse <u>must be</u> reported to the Center for Safe Sport and the local police department (can result in a Summary Suspension). Any other cases can be reported to the USAH Safe Sport site and can also be reported to your local Safe Sport representative and the Mid Am Safe Sport Coordinator.
 - Some of these cases may take a year or more to resolve

Safe Sport



- Investigations are handled at different levels ...
 - <u>Center for Safe Sport</u> if they take the case (most cases are returned to Mid Am to handle)
 - Mid Am Coordinator or designated volunteers or local association Safe Sport Coordinators. If the investigation shows there is a possible violation of Safe Sport policies it will be resolved via an agreement with the parties involved or there will be a hearing with a 3 person panel to decide. Hearing can be held at the district level, state level or can be handled by the local association which must follow the USA Hockey By-Law 10 procedure.
- Billeting (All Billeted players must have a Billeting Form returned to Mid Am)
 - Billeting Family Form: This Form must be completed for all billeted players
 - OBilleting Form must be completed and returned to Lori Billings, Mid Am District Administrator administrator@midamhockey.com
- OLocker Room Monitors (must be noted (circled) on score sheet for every game)
 - ○All teams must have a locker monitor at all times when youth members are in the locker room.
 - Locker Room Monitors can be a coach, manager, or willing volunteer and must be listed on team's official roster
 - All monitors must have current Safe Sport Training and a Background Screening
 - Teams with Co-ed locker rooms must have a monitor for each locker room

Coaching



- All coaches must, PRIOR to any participation in any USA Hockey activity (Redlined):
 - Register with USA Hockey as a Coach,
 - © Complete the Age Specific Module for the appropriate age level,
 - Complete a Background Screen, and
 - Complete Safe Sport Training
- After the above is met, the Coach has till December 31st to attend the appropriate Coaching Education Clinic
- There are 5 levels of Coaching Education in USA Hockey
 - Level 1 is the first Coaching Education Clinic for any first time coach
 - Second year a coach must complete Level 2 (unless coaching at 8U only or Disabled Athletes)
 - Third year a coach must complete Level 3
 - Fourth year a coach must complete Level 4
- If a coach stops coaching and their CEP expires, they will always pick up at the next level where they left off in the Coaching Education Program

Referees



- ÚSA Hockey appoints only one Referee-in-Chief per District
 - The USA Hockey Mid Am District Referee-in-Chief is Jim Weaver in McMurray, PA
 - Mr. Weaver appoints Local Supervisors of Officials throughout the District to assist him in carrying out his duties and responsibilities and to provide a local presence in the hockey community and for officials.
- USA Hockey Referee Section is responsible for registering, training, and certifying referees. All referees are required to register, attend a seminar, complete online modules and pass a rules exam every season.
- Teams or Associations are responsible for scheduling Officials for their games, typically through a local or league assignor. We request that games are scheduled together with the same age groups to assist the scheduling process and allow more opportunities for new and younger officials to work games, especially with a mentor or shadow for their first few games.

Referees



- Aulé 502 REFEREE -The Referee shall have general supervision of the game and their decision shall be final in all matters occurring before, during or after the game and in doing so shall have full authority over all participants (Including players, coaches, off-ice officials, and spectators).
- The referee may not change their decision, or that of any other official after the resumption of play following the rendering of the original decision, including after the game. Clerical errors on the scoresheet may be changed (for instance the referee assessed a game misconduct, but the scorekeeper incorrectly entered only a misconduct, or a player with four penalties was missed during the game).

Playing Rule Violations

- A Referee's decision is final and is not appealable (Rule 502 (a))
- All Match Penalties are addressed by the Affiliate (Mid Am) Discipline Committee
 - The Discipline Committee after review may make an offer to the offending player
 - The player may accept the offer or ask for a hearing
 - The Discipline Committee may elect to not make an offer and allow the incident to proceed to a Mid Am hearing or delegate the hearing to the local authority
 - Only a hearing decision may be appealed (no on ice calls may be appealed)
- Progressive Penalties (Rule 411 and Rule 615 (f))
 - These penalties are not appealable
- Both Match Penalties and Progressive penalties will be communicated to the player's parents emailed and a copy will be emailed to the local association and/or league

Discipline Non-Playing Rule Violations



(Code of Conduct, Association or League Rule Violations)

Non-Playing Rule Discipline Violations

- No USA Hockey member can be suspended without first having a hearing (exceptions Summary Suspensions and Playing Rules Violations/Match Offers)
- Hearing vs Meeting (A Meeting is investigative whether to proceed to a hearing)
 - Impartial investigator- disinterested to the outcome and responsible to finding of facts
- The Hearing Discipline Procedure must include all of the following anytime a member is sanctioned or suspended:
 - Member must be given NOTICE of the violation prior to the hearing (email)
 - Member must be given a 7 DAY NOTICE (email) of the hearing unless waived and documented
 - Member must have the opportunity to review all evidence
 - The hearing committee must be made up of at least 3 IMPARTIAL MEMBERS who have not been involved in the investigation of the incident
 - Decisions must be COMMUNICATED IN WRITING (email) within 5 business days
 - Instructions must be provided of how to appeal the decision, which must be appealed within 14 days of the decision notification

Discipline Non-Playing Rule Violations



(Code of Conduct, Association or League Rule Violations)

Spectator Behavior Policy

- All Associations must develop a Spectator Behavior Policy which is approved by the affiliate. These policies must be submitted
 to the Mid Am Administrator by December 31, 2023. Only revised or new policies need submitted in subsequent years.
 - The Policy must be enforceable by the local association
 - Recommended Suspension
 - First Offense a suspension from all events involving the Association for a minimum of fourteen (14) days to a maximum of thirty (30) days;
 - Second Offense a suspension from all events involving the Association for a minimum of thirty (30) days to a maximum of one hundred twenty (120) days
 - Third Offense
 - Third Offense a suspension from all events until a decision has been rendered from an USA Hockey Affiliate hearing.
 - If the local association fails to address the incident, the incident will be addressed by the league and or Mid Am Affiliate which may include local association sanctions.
 - Recommended that officials who are younger than 18 years of age wear a green arm band which can be provided by their local association.

High School Hockey



- School based hockey programs between 9th and 12th grades
- High School students on these hockey teams must be:
 - Full-time students
 - In Grades 9-12
 - Under 20 years of age before December 31st of the current playing season
 - Eligibility begins in freshman year (9th grade)
 - Not to exceed eight (8) consecutive semesters
- The High School Section was approved for its first National Championship in 2010. This National Championship today includes four divisions:
- Division I (pure teams)
- Division II (combined teams)
- Prep School teams
- Girls' teams
 - All 4 of these Divisions are State based teams, representing their State

Girls Hockey



- Having a dedicated contact for girls playing in your organization will have many benefits such as: assistance with funding for all female events; assisting female players along whatever path their hockey playing takes them to forming all female teams.
- You don't have to have all girls' teams to be a proponent of Girls' Ice Hockey
 - Having things such as a girls' locker room is a must
 - Set aside dates and check with your Mid Am Girls' representative for programs specific to attract more girls to your organization
 - Look to have female role models in your rink/organization. Coaches and officials are growing among the female ranks
- Girls' Ice Hockey is the <u>fastest growing youth sport in the country</u>.

Disabled Hockey



- Disable section only: Coaching levels do not expire if coaching an adaptive hockey program; coaches are encouraged to proceed to the next coaching level annually but is it not required.
- There is a SafeSport waiver for players who are not able to understand the content, even with a parent/guardian's assistance OR players who do not speak or read English and SafeSport doesn't have a module with that person's language (attached). Send completed form to Don Pino: don.pino@usahockey.org.
- MidAm District supports both a sled hockey development camp for all skill levels annually in Indianapolis, IN. each August; and supports a Special Hockey Invitational each October in Columbus, OH..

Risk Management



- Sanctioned and Approved events USA Hockey Rosters and Organization-approved events (can include off ice activities).
- Tournaments: MUST BE USA Hockey- sanctioned to provide coverage, AAU and non-USA Hockey rostered teams will exclude coverage.
- USAH Insurance Coverage: General Liability, Directors & Officers, Crime, Participant Accident (Excess) are the most common coverages discussed. See your USA Hockey Risk Manager for the Mid-American District for other available coverage.
- Oclaims: For an efficient claims process, it is important to document all activities related to the claim when filing. The organization has exposure and a duty to respond in a timely fashion so that all claims are handled appropriately.
- Ice Contracts: Beware of what you sign to assure USA Hockey coverage matches up to exposure within contract. USA Hockey Risk Manager for Mid-American District can help you understand what you are signing PRIOR to document execution.
- Paid coaches: This presents an "employment" scenario so discussion should be had with USA Hockey Risk Manager for the Mid American District. Workers' Compensation IS NOT a provided membership benefit and something the Association Board of Directors needs to discuss and clarify in the contract with a paid coach.
- Ocanadian Tournaments require Canadian Travel Permit (USA Hockey Registrar for Mid-American District) and must be sanctioned/approved by Hockey Canada. Generally, 5/31 to 8/31 are NOT sanctioned/approved by Hockey Canada so no coverage is applicable. Contact USA Hockey international department to assure your event is sanctioned/approved by Hockey Canada.

USA Hockey National Tournament



- Mid Am manages district and state tournaments in order to send qualifying teams to USA Hockey National Tournaments
 - USA Hockey Tier I Pilot Programs
 - Youth Proposal #1 Allows for a maximum of 22 players (maximum) 20 Skaters) 18u Tier I ONLY
 - Youth Proposal #2 Allows for Tier I Vertical Roster Integration
 - Tier I 150 and older only
 - Youth Proposal #3 Allows for 13 Only Tier I National Championship

HOCKEY / USA Hockey National Tournament



- These tournaments are usually in March and include:
 - South: 13 Only, 14U, 15 Only, 16U, 18U Tier I District-wide, limited to 6 teams
 - Youth: 14U, 16U & 18U Tier II by state, limited to 8 teams
 - Girls/Women: 14U, 16U & 19U Tier I and Tier II, District wide
 - High School as determined by state
 - Note: registering a team for Tier 1 or Tier 2, does not register the team for the District or State tournament. A separate application and entry fee is required.

District Tournament Sites: are awarded to programs in the district for these events upon review of all applications (Deadline June 15th)

Roger Sharrer "Grow Hockey" Award

- The Roger Sharrer "Grow Hockey" Award provides between \$50,000-\$100,000 annually to Mid-Am Associations in order to subsidize initiatives designed to help them grow the game of ice hockey.
- This award assists with 50-75% of the purchase of assorted equipment such as small/ intermediate nets; border patrol and hard rink dividers; sled, mite and goalie equipment. All items are meant exclusively to grow/increase participation in recreational ice hockey for abled and disabled players.
- Associations need to apply by April 25th, with award recipients being announced at the Mid-Am District Annual meeting in June, for the upcoming season.
- The application is sent by email to all Mid-Am Associations and is also available on the district website under the "About Us" tab. Our goal is to increase your program participation!
