Anoka Hockey 2018-2019 Goals

Mega - continue

Justin Johnson, founder of MEGA Goaltending, held an hour long classroom training session followed by an hour long on ice training session for Anoka coaches.

23 hours of on ice instruction held on Sunday nights.

54 hours of in practice instruction. 37 hours as a single team during that hour, 17 hours with two teams during that hour. These in practice sessions were held during December and January.

103 hours of Goalie Center instruction. The Goalie Center is located at the Super Rink above rink 6.

Mite / All Levels

Keep inspiring - Mite Jamboree, We had outdoor ice at Wilson for A-C, M-Thurs, starting Jan. 1.

6 intermediate nets were purchased

We need more committed coaches

Power Skating Coaches (continued with Mira)

Invite High School players to watch youth

Increase relationship with Arena Board- We have attend meetings, live barn option. Water fill stations have presented and upgrade lighting. Guest wifi is now available to everyone.

Girls- U10's joined newly developed b2 league helping girls develop at their skill level.

Mite Program - Brian Pender & Jason Jensen

The 2018-2019 season was another successful one for the Mite program. We ended the year with a total of 152 skaters that participated this year, which is down 12 skaters from the previous year's total of 164. This decrease was in part due to the Co-op needing players (7-8) and an early move up to squirts. With this in consideration, our numbers are holding at a steady level as compared to the last 3-4 years. AAHA mite program continues to follow USA Hockey's American Development Model (ADM). The Anoka Mite program officially began skating on 9/14/18 and officially ended on 3/7/19.

Our total program hours went from approx. 250 hours last year for the season, to approx. 240 hours this year. This is in part to having 4 additional traveling teams in the association/co-op, which yielded a greater demand for ice, allowing less to be allocated for the mite program. Even with this decrease in ice allocation, each levels ice appearance hours for the season remained on par with prior years.

Some new initiatives that we implemented for this season included the following:

A/B mite participation in D10 ¾ ice mite league. Anoka had to donate 9 hours of ice for participation in this league.

Continuous outdoor ice reservation (Jan.-March) through a partnership with Anoka Parks & Rec. This provided outdoor ice to be scheduled Monday-Thursday from 5:00-8:00pm at Wilson Elementary south rink. The ice was split between the A/B/C level teams.

Purchase 6 new intermediate sized nets for C/D level mite games. (\$2000) Thank you AAHA board for supporting this purchase!

U8 Sunday fun-day participation. (mini jamboree game format)

I would like to thank the Anoka Mite Jamboree Committee for putting together such a great event. The Mite Jamboree committee consisted of Brian Pender, Jason Jensen, Michele Roof, Deanna Hanks, Mike Hanson, Nicole Urmann and Amy McCulloch. This event could not have been possible without all their time and efforts!!

I would like to send special thanks to Jason Jensen (Mite Coordinator/administrator) for his endless work throughout the season both on and off the ice. Thanks also goes out to Stephanie Reichow (registration and mite books), Renee Voltin (ice scheduler), AAIA staff, and the entire AAHA Board of Directors for all their time and effort that they give to our program.

I also would like to thank all the players, parents, managers, and volunteers for all the time and effort that you have put in this year. I especially want to thank all our Mite coaches! Your time and commitment to help our young skaters develop skills and lessons needed for the game is greatly appreciated.

Player Development – Mike McCauley

SUMMER PROGRAM

We continued our partnership with the Hockey Development Company who worked hand in hand with the Boys and Girls High School staffs to offer a quality / low cost option for on and off ice summer training. We hope to see a greater participation this year. You can register online now at https://www.hockeydevelopmentcompany.com. AAHA players receive a \$100 discount of the registration price.

FALL PRE SKATE

Before Tryouts we scheduled on-ice pre-skate for all travel level players. This was facilitated and ran by our "top Level" coaches.

DRYLAND

We continued our relationship with Acceleration NW to run our players through treadmill and plyometric dryland training. This season we tried moving a portion of the schedule to before tryouts. Anoka players were allowed to sign up for up to 5 - 1 hour sessions with the Acceleration trainers in the month of September before tryouts began. Families were able to use Signupgenius to find times that worked best for their family's schedule to use these sessions. Close 70% of the total open sessions were used.

After tryouts, all traveling teams were scheduled for 3 sessions of treadmill & plyo's with their team. These sessions were loaded heavily into the preseason and most teams had completed their sessions by November 1st. A & B Mite teams were also given 3 sessions with their team that were completed the before Thanksgiving.

During the season, coaches could use Signupgenius to reserve the dryland room for their team as their team's schedule allowed.

IN SEASON TRAINING

The Girls teams partnered with Mira Jalouso for 8-10 skills sessions that were well received by players and parents. This season, we tried something new for our PeeWee and Bantam players by scheduling practices that were run by the Boy's High School staff. The High School staff was very happy with the turnout and effort by all players during these sessions.

END OF SEASON

This season we tried a new program for our Squirt teams once the District tournament was completed. We took all of the Squirt players from our five team and divided them as equally as possible into 8 teams of 7-8 skaters and a goalie. The teams were named after the 8 D-III colleges and universities that Anoka alumni are currently playing for. The teams then played a full schedule of 25 minute, cross ice 3v3 games against each other where scores and standings were kept. On the final day, all teams participated in a playoff for the "Tornado Cup". The games were all very competitive with most games finishing with less than a 2 goal differential and all of the players worked hard and had a good time.

Tryouts – Bill Hoppenrath

As we close out the 2018-2019 Association hockey season, I would like to reflect on another great tryout session. I would like to thank and recognize the countless volunteers, tryout evaluators, past and present board members, ancillary members, and all the rest of the AAHA community.

This marked the third year of the Tryout Engine, automated software system. It is of my belief that this system continues to improve and streamline the tryout process. This system has proven the ability for seamless communication between evaluators, support volunteers and system management. With the Tryout Engine, Anoka has been able to keep our tryouts running smooth, in a timely manner and reduce human input error. Small changes this year were made to the system to avoid excessive randomization. As a result we saw a noticeable drop in players involved with consecutive on ice shifts. As we continue to move forward with this system, we are confident we will have a more consistent and equitable tryout for all players.

I would like to thank all of the tryout evaluators from this past season for their hard work and diligence. I would also like to thank all the countless volunteers who assisted in making this complicated tryout process smooth and efficient. Thank you Kevin Brynes for helping recruit and direct all of the volunteers. A huge thank you goes out to Mike Nagel for continuing to assist in the further implementation of the Tryout Engine software. Also to Mike McCauley for assisting with the tryout process and improving upon an already successful tryout software. Another thank you goes out to Rene Voltin for helping coordinate ice availability for both rinks and for her advice in improving the process. Finally, I would like to thank all other board members and other members of the association for their positive support through this process. With the help of all the individuals involved in the tryout process, the association was able to provide a fair, unbiased, and expedited tryout process.

Fundraising - Jeri Joy

One of the goals of AAHA is to keep participation in hockey affordable for all families who would like to participate.

For the 2018-2019 season, we repeated the raffle fundraising as our primary association fundraiser and placed the buyout option at \$200. This year, we achieved a profit of \$42,721 (Total Receipts \$61,800 -\$14,700 Prizes -\$4379.00 Printing) compared to last year of \$43,506.25 after all payouts. Several families chose to take advantage of the opportunity to pick up more calendars to sell to help with ice costs or other hockey fees—AAHA paid \$1,4000 in fundraising credits to those families that sold extra calendars.

Next year, we plan on continuing with the raffle as the primary mandatory fundraiser. It is our goal to include various ways to offset hockey costs. Any ideas you may have would be welcomed. Communications – Jeri Joy

2018-19 was another successful year of hockey. Thank you to all AAHA members who help to make the year successful. I would also like to give a shout out and a special thanks to all of our coaches who volunteered many hours on and off the ice in order to create a memorable season for our skaters. We couldn't do it without you!

This year was my first year as Communications Director. Sending communications via email and updating the website with the most pertinent information was the main objective.

Volunteers—Kevin Byrnes

This is my 6th year of being the volunteer coordinator. During this past year we saw great support from our members. We had shortages during each tournament this year. It was voted and approved will be increasing to 12 hours and increasing the buyout to \$400.00. These 12 hours could be credited toward any association event such as tryouts, tournaments, registration, mite jamboree, SKATE Program, and other miscellaneous needs. Because of your tremendous support we are able to keep that number manageable.

As in years past, teams that were participating in an Anoka Tournaments were required to volunteer 25 hours toward their particular tournament. In exchange for the 25 hours, tournament fees were reimbursed. I highly recommend that this policy is continued into the future as it helped ensure that we had adequate volunteer coverage for each tournament.

Our members donated over 2000 hours of their time throughout the year to association, this does not include regular season game responsibilities (time clock, books and penalty box) nor does it include the time that our coaches and team managers put in. Many thanks to those folks as they are the ones that teach our kids and keep us parents organized. I would like to thank all the members who volunteered their time throughout the year. It was a real pleasure meeting and working with you.

Recruitment and Retention – Dylan Stenglein

Recruitment is a primary focus for AAHA. In addition to the strategies used in previous years, new strategies were implemented to varying degrees of success to get the word out about Anoka hockey.

One of our biggest successes was our Try Hockey For Free sessions offered in July. The cost of this program was paid for through a grant. Many of these skaters continued on to our Mini-Cyclone and/or Mite program. We had 94 registered skaters for our Mini-Cyclone program and handed out 75+ sets of equipment. We also received equipment from Total Hockey through a grant, as well as a grant from MN Hockey to purchase equipment from Dicks Sporting Goods. I would like to thank Rob Savini for being the on-ice coordinator for our Mini-Cyclone program.

The Anoka Hockey Youth Program is gaining some really good momentum for our upcoming Squirt and Peewee divisions. We will have over 70 Squirts for the next year and over 60 Peewees. These numbers are up over the last several years for Anoka Hockey and seem to be continuously growing every year. One important part of the developing a successful program is increasing the number of Hockey Players and Anoka is starting to gain some really good numbers at those levels. Developing these groups is going to be really important for the program in the next few years. Credit for the numbers increase is attributed to the Mini Cyclones and the Mite Program for getting these kids interested and retaining them in their first few years in the program. We need to make sure and continue to make these player retention and recruitment in the forefront of the initiatives for the next upcoming years.

One of the big successes for the year was the Anoka High School Coaches skating with the Peewees and Bantams once a week. We feel that developing a better relationship with the High School Program will be a great addition for both the Association and the High School Program and look forward to working together with them to develop new initiatives on getting our players ready to play Anoka High School Hockey.

This year was District 10's year to only have 2 teams from the district make it to Regions. This is on a 3-year rotation so for the next 2 years District 10 Teams will have 3 teams go to regions. The 2018 – 2019 Anoka Association didn't send any of our Anoka Youth Teams to the Regional tournament. We had all of our 12 travelling teams make and participate in the District 10 tournament this year. It's great that all of our teams were able to take part in the tournament. A big thank you goes out to all the Anoka Coaches and Managers who dedicate hours upon hours of their free time for Anoka Hockey.
