COVID-19 Recovery Phase Guidance to Safety at DCFA Summer Camps



This document has been created to provide clear direction on the necessary steps our club is taking to manage our camp site as safely as possible for our families this summer during our summer camps. The goal is to create a safe and healthy environment for our coaches and campers by making the necessary adjustments to help limit the risk of exposure to COVID-19 and implement these safety measures in everything we do as suggested by the CDC, the ACA, and the Maryland Department of Health and Hygiene.

IMPORTANT HIGHLIGHTS OF OUR PLAN:

NO sick camper or staff member may attend camp.

- ◆ Staggered, contact-free camper drop-off and pick-ups
- ◆ A limited number of campers for each week
- ◆ A maximum of ten campers per counselor, not to exceed groups of 10 players per group
- ◆ We recommend that parents and legal guardians of high-risk campers consult with their child's medical provider to assess their risk and determine if camp attendance is acceptable. It is up to each parent/guardian to supply a face covering or mask should they prefer their child wear one when appropriate. Staff will wear face coverings during activities when maintaining physical distancing is not feasible. (Lunch and snack breaks)
- ◆ Camp activities will be utilizing only outdoor spaces except on Full Day Camps where we may use the gym
- ◆ Staff and campers must bring their own water (extra water)
- ◆ All staff will be prepared to follow the new CDC protocols and safety procedures.

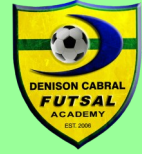

Masks and face coverings are not required for outdoor activities when practicing social and physical distancing measures. Until the current restrictions are lifted, our staff will wear face coverings when required and where appropriate according to CDC guidelines. It is up to the parent should they prefer that their child wear a mask when appropriate. The parent will need to supply the child's mask or face covering.



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Outbreak Management Plan

As part of the current mandate, camps are required to have an outbreak management plan. The plan will be required to be updated to include information on COVID-19 and the control measures to follow when dealing with a suspected case of COVID-19. DCFA control measures on suspected cases of COVID-19 include:

- ◆ If our camp location is required to be closed because of an outbreak, the Health Department will give the directive to the facility and parents will be notified.
- ◆ If exclusion or isolation is required, measures are in place to inform parents/guardians and staff of the situation and of how important this control measure is. Proper exclusion/isolation is one of the most important and effective measures in controlling the spread of disease to others. Parental and staff cooperation is critical. Pick-up is to occur within an hour of notification. Parents must be aware that this is an expectation.
- ◆ Symptomatic children must be immediately separated from others in a supervised area until they can go home. Where possible, anyone providing care to an ill child should maintain 6-feet of social distance.
- ◆ It would be important that the group of combined children/staff the symptomatic child was in, not mix with the rest of the camp population until the 'suspect case' is assessed.
- ◆ If a 6-foot distance cannot be maintained from an ill child, if circumstances allow, the child should wear a community mask that DCFA will provide.
- ◆ Ill staff must immediately isolate from others and wear a community mask until they are able to leave the facility.
- ◆ Hygiene and respiratory etiquette must be practiced while the ill child or staff is waiting to be picked up.
- ◆ Required temperature checks for staff and children upon arrival and repeat temperature checks at least every five hours thereafter. DCFA staff will take at least 1 temperature reading each camp day and/or as required by CDC guidelines. At arrival and again in the early afternoon if necessary and recommended by CDC for both campers and staff. All readings will be documented throughout the week.
- ◆ Environmental cleaning and disinfection of the isolation area must be conducted once the ill child/staff has left the facility/site.
- ◆ If an outbreak is confirmed, post appropriate notices for parents/guardians at all entrances to the facility/field to ensure that disease information is available for staff and parents/guardians if needed or requested. All families will be notified immediately should this be the case.
