TODAY'S GAME

The U.S. Men's National Team faces Czechia today in quarterfinal action of the 2023 IIHF Men's World Championship in Tampere, Finland. The game will air live on NHL Network in the U.S. The U.S. won Group A with victories in all seven of its preliminary round games, while Czechia finished fourth in Group B with four wins and three losses, including one in overtime.

THE SERIES VS. CZECHIA

The U.S. and Czechia will meet for the 19th time here today in the world championship. The U.S. is 6-2-1-8-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) in the previous 18 contests between the two teams. In their last meeting, the Czechs gained an 8-4 win over the U.S. in the bronze medal game of last year's world championship. See game-by-game breakdown of series later in these notes.

QUARTERFINAL HISTORY

The U.S. has advanced to the quarterfinals of the world championship for the 12th straight time. Team USA is 8-3-3-11 (W-OTW-OTL-L) in 25 previous quarterfinal appearances and has won five of its last seven quarterfinal contests. Quarterfinal games have been played in the tournament since 1992 (with the exception of 1997, 1998 and 1999) and the U.S. has qualified all but twice.

LINEUP TODAY

Mikey Eyssimont, **Ronnie Attard** and **Drew Comness** will not dress today. Eyssimont was suspended for one game by the IIHF disciplinary panel for a kneeing penalty that happened early in Team USA's game against Sweden on Tuesday (May 23).

RANDOM BITS

The U.S. is the home team today, will wear its white jerseys and occupy the right bench ... Defenseman **Dylan Samberg**, who scored the game-winning three-on-three overtime goal against Sweden on Tuesday (May 23) said he hadn't played three-on-three since he was a very young kid playing on the pond ... **T.J. Tynan** enters play today with nine assists, which is tied with **Seth Jones** (2014) as the third best total ever in a world championship for a U.S. player. Tynan trails only **Craig Smith** (2013) and **Max Pacioretty** (2012) with 10 and **Patrick Kane** (2018) with 12 ... The U.S. had a 45-minute skate early yesterday afternoon in preparation for today's quarterfinal contest.

THINGS

Team USA had to move hotels in Tampere yesterday, packing up and checking out at 11 a.m. The U.S. got into its new hotel just after 3 o'clock ... The U.S. has scored 34 goals to lead all teams in the world championship and allowed just eight, which is second to Sweden with seven ... Team USA won Group A with wins in all seven preliminary round games. The eight goals allowed by the U.S. in Group play is the fewest ever it has allowed ... The U.S. and Czechia are tied for the third fewest minor penalties in the tournament with 17, trailing only Finland (14) and Austria (16) ... **T.J. Tynan** is tied for second in the men's worlds with 10 points and is second in the tournament in assists with 9. He has a five-game point streak in progress ... **Cutter Gauthier** is second with six goals in the world championship ... The U.S. has the top five players in the world championship in +/-, with **Nick Perbix** and **Cutter Gauthier** tied for the top spot at +10 ... **Rocco Grimaldi** (4-5--9) is tied for third in the men's worlds in points ... **Scott Perunovich** has 1-5--6 and is tied for fifth among defenseman in points, while **Lane Hutson** (2-3--5) is tied for sixth ... The U.S. is looking to advance to the semifinals for fourth time in the last five men's worlds ... U.S. trainer **Stan Wong** and his family operate the Oriental Chow Mein Company in Fall River, Massachusetts, a company founded by Wong's grandfather in 1926. The factory produces chow mein for local restaurants and has one boxed product -- Hoo-Mee Chow Mein -- that is found in supermarkets ... U.S. netminder **Casey DeSmith** started playing disc golf about seven years ago and brought his 24-disc bag with him on the trip to the world championship. He has played a couple times here in Tampere on off days, including once with teammate **Mikey Eyssimont** and once with his wife, Mollie ... USA Hockey president **Mike Trimboli** and vice president **Dwayne Dillinger** are here in Tampere for the remainder of the world championship and are attending the IIHF Annual Congress that started today.

WHEN WINNING GROUP

The U.S. won its Group for the fourth time since the current world championship format was established in 2012, with the other times coming in 2015, 2017, and 2021. The U.S. is 2-1 in quarterfinals when winning its group and has gone on to bronze medals 2021 and 2015.

CAMP IN MUNICH

Team USA conducted a short training camp in Munich, arriving on May 6 and concluding time there with an exhibition game vs. Germany on May 9 in which the U.S. prevailed by a 6-3 count. **Drew O'Connor** (2G, 1A) led four players with at least two points. **Casey DeSmith** played the first 32:19 in net and did not allow a goal on 19 shots, while **Cal Petersen** finished the contest and made five saves. The two teams shared a plane to Tampere which arrived the afternoon of May 10. Part of Team USA's visit to Munich included a trip to the world-famous Hofbrauhaus beer hall where team captain **Nick Bonino** had the unique honor of tapping a new keg.

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP IN FINLAND

Team USA is 25-5-0-30-4 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) all-time in the men's world championship in games played in Finland as of the start of the 2023 world championship. The last time Team USA played in Finland was a year ago when it went 4-2-0-4 (W-OTW-OTL-L) and advanced to the semifinals before ultimately finishing fourth.

A PERBIX TRIBUTE TO THE GOLDEN BEAR

Jack Nicklaus is one of the most legendary figures in golf. Nicknamed "The Golden Bear," Nicklaus retired in 2005 after recording a record 18 major golf championships and 117 overall titles in professional tournaments. Jay Perbix, the father of U.S. defenseman **Nick Perbix**, is a big fan of The Golden Bear and thus the reason for the legal spelling of his son Nick's first name --- Nicklaus. Nick's younger brother is named Jack. Both Jay and Jack Perbix arrived here in Tampere Thursday (May 18) and are here for the duration of the world championship



THE NAMING OF STICKS

Team USA forward **Rocco Grimaldi** started a fun tradition of naming his sticks five or six years ago as he remembers. He tries to make sure he doesn't use names of people he knows and goes through the alphabet from A to Z with boys names and then the same with girls names, and then does it in reverse, starting from Z. He surmises he's been up and down the alphabet four times since beginning the tradition. Grimaldi cites Trudy as a great stick and one he scored four goals with in a 7-1 win over Detroit back in 2021 when he was playing

for the NHL's Nashville Predators. Oswald, a stick he used playing for San Diego in the AHL, has recorded the most goals. Grimaldi says Romeo was his worst stick, breaking just shortly after starting to use it. "How ironic is it that Romeo, who broke hearts, broke right away," quipped Grimaldi. Erica and Fiona are the latest sticks in Grimaldi's arsenal and got their start during Team USA's camp in Munich.

BROTHERS TUCH

Team USA's 7-1 victory over Hungary on May 14 included a goal by both alternate captain **Alex Tuch** and his brother **Luke Tuch**.



Brothers Tuch scored Team USA's first (Alex) and last (Luke) goals of the contest. It is the first time the two -- separated by approximately six years in age -- have ever played on the same

team. The Tuch brothers sat down for a feature with Infront Sports & Media May 16 at Nokia Arena that will be available to broadcasters worldwide.

WHO KNEW

The first-ever McDonald's restaurant in Finland opened in Tampere, Finland, in December of 1984. The 1985 IIHF World Junior Championship -- which began in late December of 1984 and finished in early January 1985 -- was played in Finland that year with games in Helsinki, Turku, Espoo and Vantaa. Team USA was based in Helsinki. Art Berglund, who led USA Hockey's international hockey program back in those days, caught wind of the new McDonald's and canceled practice one day so the players and staff could make the journey from Helsinki to Tampere to try out the American icon. Media learned of the adventure and were present to capture the visit. Team USA also visited a Finnish glass factory on its way back to Helsinki. The 1985 U.S. National Junior Team featured U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame players Brian Leetch, Mike Richter and Craig Janney.

LEADERSHIP

Nick Bonino is the captain of Team USA. Having won a pair of Stanley Cup titles with the Pittsburgh Penguins, Bonino has also helped the U.S. Men's National Team to bronze medal finishes in the world championship in both 2018 and 2015. **Alex Tuch** and **Conor Garland** are serving as alternate captains. Tuch is making his first men's worlds appearance and helped the U.S. to gold at the 2014 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship. Garland is playing at the men's worlds for the second time having been a part of the bronze medal-winning 2021 U.S. Men's National Team.

TEAM USA HOST

Risto Talvio, who works full-time as a security officer at a nuclear power plant in Eurajoki, Finland, is Team USA's host for the world championship. Talvio has served as team host for U.S. teams in all international tournaments in Finland since 1984, including last year at the IIHF Men's World Championship here in Tampere.

MAY 16 OFF DAY

After three games in four days, the U.S. did not skate on May 16, outside of goaltender **Drew Comness**, **Cal Petersen**, **Luke Tuch** and **Tyler Kleven**, who arrived in Tampere Monday (May 15) afternoon. Players and staff enjoyed a relaxing day with varied activity including saunas, shopping, cards and lounging. One of the unique activities of the day included a game of padel with captain **Nick Bonino** and goaltending coach **Thomas Speer** facing alternate captain **Conor Garland** and assistant coach **Ryan Warsofsky**. Reports from the match were that it was not a good day for the Garland/Warsofsky tandem. Padel is a racket sport typically played in doubles on an enclosed court slightly smaller than a doubles tennis court. Although Padel shares the same scoring system as tennis, the rules, strokes and technique are different. The balls used are similar but with a little less pressure.

FROM PREVIOUS EDITIONS OF GAME NOTES

U.S. players **Sean Farrell** and **Matt Coronato** sat down for an interview with Infront Sports & Media at the team hotel May 22. The two played together at Harvard University the past two seasons and also spent the 2019-20 and 2020-21 campaigns together playing for the USHL's Chicago Steel. The men's world championship marks the first time they've played together for the U.S. on the international stage ... With captain **Nick Bonino** out of the lineup on May 21 against France, Alex Tuch wore the "C," while **T.J. Tynan** joined **Conor Garland** wore the "A" ... Team USA forward **Conor Garland** told a Finnish journalist after practice on May 19 that the coffee in Finland is likely the best he's had anywhere (and his wife Meghan agrees) ... The IIHF Men's World Championship has been staged on U.S. soil just one time -- that in 1962 when the U.S. captured a bronze medal in the tournament ... Forward **Conor Garland** has just one "n" in his first name vs. the more common spelling of Connor. He shares the genesis of "Conor" stems from his parents reading an Irish book when his mom was pregnant and liked a character in the story named Conor ... U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame netminder **John Vanbiesbrouck**, who is part of the management group of the U.S. Men's National Team and works full-time for USA Hockey as assistant executive director overseeing the organization's international program, played 20 years in goal in the NHL. Vanbiesbrouck also played many times internationally for Team USA, including in one Olympics, two Canada Cups, four men's world championships and two world junior championships ... The U.S. has 21 players on its roster who have played in at least one NHL game. The highest drafted player on the U.S. roster is **Cutter Gauthier**, who was the fifth overall pick in the 2022 NHL Draft. **Matt Coronato** was the 13th pick of the 2021 NHL Draft by Calgary, while **Alex Tuch** was taken 18th overall by Minnesota in the 2014 NHL Draft ... The U.S. has medaled in every IIHF world championship conducted this season, including gold in the IIHF Women's World and Under-18 Men's World Championships. and bronze in the IIHF World Junior and Under-18 Women's World Championships ... Forward **Sean Farrell**, who is working on finishing his degree at Harvard University, took his three-hour economics final at the team hotel the evening of May 13. USA Hockey's **John Vanbiesbrouck** served as the proctor of the exam ... **Doug Hickey**, the U.S. Ambassador to Finland, was at Team USA's game vs. Finland on May 12 and presented the U.S. Player of the Game award to goaltender **Casey DeSmith** after the game ... **David Quinn** is the head coach of Team USA in the world championship for the second straight year and also guided the 2022 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team ... Team USA arrived in Tampere on the afternoon of May 10, practiced May 11 for just over an hour and played its first game in the men's worlds on May 12 ... **Alex Tuch** celebrated his 27th birthday on May 10 ... Team USA has eight players who have previously been part of a U.S. team in the men's worlds (Bjork, Bonino, Comness, Farrell, Garland, Mackey, Petersen, Tynan). Six players are making their debut in an IIHF world championship (Attard, Brown, DeSmith, Eyssimont, O'Connor, Walker) ... Team USA has finished in the top four of the world championship six times in the last nine years ... Goaltender **Casey DeSmith** and his wife Mollie are expecting their first child in August ... The U.S. roster includes nine players who played college hockey in the U.S. this season (Comness, Coronato, Farrell, Gauthier, Hutson, Kleven, Mazur, Thrun, Luke Tuch).

WHAT'S IN A NICKNAME

Team USA assistant coach **Derek Lalonde**, who is the head coach of the NHL's Detroit Red Wings, has long had the nickname "Newsy" after Hockey Hall-of-Famer Edouard "Newsy" Lalonde. When the NHL was forming in 1917, "Newsy" Lalonde was the playing-coach and captain of the Montreal Canadiens. As a kid, Lalonde was working in a newsprint plant and that's where the original Newsy landed his nickname. For Derek Lalonde, it was his teammates at SUNY-Cortland, where he was a standout goaltender, who tabbed him "Newsy," a nickname that has carried with him since.

GROUP PLAY

The IIHF adopted the current format of the world championship in 2012 with the 16 teams split into two groups of eight teams for preliminary round play with each team playing the other teams in their group for seven preliminary round games. Below is a look at how the U.S. has done in group play each year and its ultimate finish in the tournament. The U.S. has advanced to the tournament quarterfinals in every year in the current tournament format.

HAT TRICK

Cutter Gauthier recorded a hat trick (and also an assist) in Team USA's 9-0 win over France on May 21. The last U.S. player to record a hat trick in the men's worlds was **Clayton Keller** on May 7, 2017, in a 7-2 victory over Denmark.

BROTHERS

Alex and **Luke Tuch** are the first brother tandem to populate a U.S. Men's National Team roster since 2019, when Jack and Quinn Hughes were part of Team USA. Recent brothers to play for the U.S. have also included Kevin/Jimmy Hayes (2014), Chris/Peter Ferraro (2004), Ted/Chris Drury (1998) and Doug/Greg Brown (1989). Doug Brown is the father of **Patrick Brown**, who played his first game in the 2023 IIHF Men's World Championship on Wednesday (May 17). Patrick's Uncle Greg is the current head men's ice hockey coach at Boston College and his uncle John Mara is co-owner of the NFL's New York Giants.

IIHF COACHING SYMPOSIUM

Bob Mancini, assistant executive director of hockey development for USA Hockey, is in Tampere and participated in the IIHF Coaching Symposium, which is held in conjunction with the world championship. Mancini was part of a panel discussion on May 20 on quality coaching in the future. **Flint Doungchak**, the coach-in-chief of USA Hockey's Pacific District, also attended.

STAN WONG

Stan Wong, one of Team USA's two athletic trainers and a beloved figure of players and staff alike, is working his 54th international event for a U.S. hockey team. This year marks his 16th straight men's world championship. He has also served as a trainer for five Olympic teams, 21 national junior squads, 10 Deutschland Cup teams and for Team USA at one Youth Olympic Games and one Winter World University Games. Wong was inducted into the Professional Hockey Athletic Trainers Hall of Fame in June 2015.

TEAM USA'S ALL-TIME MEN'S WORLD MEDALS

The U.S. has won 13 medals in the men's world championship, earning gold once (1933), silver four times (1950, 1939, 1934, 1931) and bronze on eight occasions (2021, 2018, 2015, 2013, 2004, 1996, 1952, 1949). Of Team USA's eight bronze medals, six were claimed by winning bronze-medal games while two came via tournament standings and round-robin play.

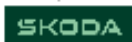
