Welcome to Day 5 of The Tournament! Action got underway today at 8 am on all three fields. There are six ISC games today and 11 games in the ISC II Division

JB Bombers 3 Cheers The Bombers got out early and by the by the bottom of the fourth held a 10-0 lead on 3 Cheer Pub. The game was a five-inning contest due to the mercy rule. The Bomber got one in the first on a home run by Lenny Josue Villalvaso Pena), added five in the third and four more in the fourth to take the commanding lead. The leading hitters for Ashland included a double and home run by Rogie, a triple by Scott. Urbaneja helped himself out at the plate with three singles while Blane Milhelm had a pair of safeties.

Grande **Prairie** Tin 9. Cup 1 Grande Prairie pitcher Zac Pierce tossed a two hitter at Tin Cup and fanned 2. (I am wondering of Pierce is a grandson or relative of former Canadian National Team Head Coach Dave Pierce from who I purchased a book on pitching and some weighted balls years ago). Grand Prairie collected a dozen hits off three Tin Cup pitchers who collectively fanned just three batters. The leading hitters for Grande Prairie were Nick Potskin with three hits and Brayden

Arcand, Cory Jones, and TravisHead with two hits each.

NY Gremlins 9, Niagara Stompers 1

The New York Gremlins advanced to the final four in the winner's bracket and now has a day off and will play the winner of the Hallman Twins vs AWP Lumberjacks on Thursday night. The Gremlins started quickly with two runs in the top of the first. After allowing a run in he bottom of the second Andrew Kirkpatrick hung some goose eggs on the Stompers in the third and fourth then saw his mates get him five more runs in the top of the fifth and added two more in the sixth. In the first with one out Jerome Raemaki singled and Ben Enoka followed with a double that scored Raemaki. Kirkpatrick went down swinging before Zennon Winters double that sent Enoka home. Nick Mullins led of the fifth for Gremlins with a home run then Roy drew a base on balls. Raemaki then launched a rocket that scored two and a pitching change took place. I have seen him driving one of the vehicles, opening and closing the barriers in the lots to directing traffic near the main gate. He is just one of the amazing volunteers here.

The people of Denmark and the area should be proud of the job they have done throughout the week. It is by far, the smallest community to host this prestigious event. In order for it to happen Darren needed the kind of help he trusted he would get and get it he has. It could only take place in a place as small as Denmark if two things are present. First of all a city close by that offers plenty of hotel/motel rooms and Green Bay is just that. Secondly the small town hosting must be a fastpitch town and Denmark has always been just such a place. Men's fastpitch in Denmark goes back decades as the entire area of the state was always a hotbed. Add to that, the fact the Denmark High School Girl's softball program has been to eight Final Fours in Wisconsin High School action and as recently as 2018. They have won four state championships. There are young kids "pitching in" at all three fields, both boys and girls. The daily 50-50 raffle proceeds will go to the Denmark Youth Baseball/Softball Program.
