







2023 NWBA HALL OF FAME CLASS

FINANCIAL REPORT

Note: 2020 results included a massive decrease in USOPC funding \$281,952 as well as membership revenue of \$120,357. USOPC funding included an additional \$36k in COVID Specific funding.

While membership revenue and corporate revenue have mostly rebounded to pre-Covid numbers, it is important to realize that expenses have grown through inflation higher than pre Covid numbers.

Includes Revenue of \$45,572 and \$39,300 in 2021 and 2020 in PPP loans which have both been forgiven.



- 2022 was a year of financial turmoil for the NWBA, while a significant strain on cash flow was anticipated as a direct result of reduced membership and sponsorship revenue in 2021 related to COVID-19, the dramatic increase in travel expenses, and entry fees for our High-Performance teams was nearly double the amount budgeted for our trips in the spring and summer of 2022 culminating with the 2022 America's Cup in Brazil.
- With no new revenue streams, or corporate sponsorships in place, our Board of Directors made the prudent decision to navigate the finale 6 months of 2022, and first 3 months of 2023 without a paid CEO.
- So how can we have year with financial turmoil and still end the year with a \$110k profit? Three items created that reality
 - 1) We went 6 months in 2022 without a paid CEO, saving \$70k in 2022
 - 2) The Hall of Fame Committee raised \$21k more than they spent in 2022
 - 3) We had \$31k of "Angel Donors" for our Women's HP team

If those three things don't happen, our \$110k profit becomes a \$12k loss.



- We had to borrow all of our working capital line capacity of \$150,000 by September 2022. By the end of December, we had paid down the line entirely, and have not had to utilize it since.
- In 2022, we accepted our first Appreciated stock-donations, which allows donors to maximize their giving by donating stock which has increased in value during their ownership. This model allows them to receive the Appreciated (high) stock value as a charitable donation without having to pay any capital gains taxes on the stock donated.
- The creation of the Revenue & Grant Writing Task Force led by Darlene Hunter and Andrea Woodson-Smith, generated immediate returns with a 2-year grant from the Craig H. Neilsen foundation totaling \$200,000, \$100,000 of which was received and benefited cash flow in 2022, and will be reflected as revenue and related expenses in 2023. This grant will primary benefit NWBA members with Traumatic Spinal Cord injuries, consistent with the Neilsen foundation's mission.



- We continue our culture of oversight and accountability
- In 2022 we benefited from \$89k in Special Admin Grants from the USOPC. These grants allow for our Business and Compliance Manager, external Accounting Services (Altruic Advisors), Legal assistance, and some AirBnB VIK
- In 2023, we'll be receiving approximately \$127k in Special Admin Grants from the USOPC covering the same topics as 2022, plus amounts to help offset SportsEngine expenses, Coaches Education, and assistance with our Communications position. All of these things allow us to be safer, more professional, more compliant, and better positioned for the expected growth of our sport.
- We continue to utilize Bill.com and Gusto for payroll to provide separation of controls, efficient processing, and accountability.
- I want to extend the sincere appreciation of our BOD and membership to the countless hours donated by Darlene Hunter and Ryan Martin, both of which added the full-time job duties of leading the NWBA to their already overloaded schedules. Darlene and Ryan's, and Brandon and Tina's continued dedication is what allowed the NWBA to not only make it through 2022, but to make improvements in multiple areas, most of which will be covered in Ryan's upcoming "State of the NWBA".



BY RAIL

Arrive by train at one of three Amtrak stations in the Richmond region, conveniently located in the city of Richmond, in Henrico County, and just off I-95 in the town of Ashland.

Arrivals from the north include Washington, D.C., Baltimore, Philadelphia, New York City, and Boston, with southern arrivals from Raleigh, Charlotte, Columbia, Tampa, and Orlando.

BY AIR

Fly into the GBAC Star accredited Richmond International Airport (RIC) with service from all major carriers and over 200 daily flights. Located just 8 miles from downtown Richmond, RIC also features flights from affordable carriers like JetBlue, Southwest, Allegiant, and Breeze.

BY CAR

Richmond is easily accessible from I-95 and I-64, and located just two hours from Washington, D.C., and two hours from Virginia Beach, the Richmond Region is centrally located and within a day's drive of half of the U.S. population, including major metropolitan areas such as New York City and Atlanta.
