2022 IIHF WOMEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

The U.S. Women's National Team is one of 10 teams competing at the International Ice Hockey Federation Women's World Championship from August 25 - Sept. 4, 2022 in Herning and Frederikshavn Denmark.

The tournament features ten teams divided into two groups of five. Team USA is competing in Group A alongside, Canada, Finland, Switzerland and Japan. Group B includes Czechia, Sweden, Germany, Hungary and Denmark. Each group will play a single round-robin series before the playoff round.

All five teams from Group A and the top three teams from Group B advance to the playoff rounds. Winners of the quarterfinals advance. The two semifinal winners will play in the gold medal game, while the two semifinal losers will play for bronze.

WOMEN'S WORLDS SUCCESS

The U.S. has earned gold or silver in every IIHF Women's World Championship since the inception of the event in 1990. The U.S. has made the title game in all 20 tournaments staged.

LAST TIME OUT

After falling behind 2-0, the U.S. netted five unanswered goals to beat rival Canada, 5-2, and close out the preliminary round with a perfect 4-0 record. Knotted at two heading into the third, forward Lacey Eden roofed a shot from the circle to give Team USA a lead they would not relinquish. The U.S. outshot Canada 33-28 as 11 players recorded a point. Goaltender Nicole Hensley made 26 shots in the win. It marked the first victory over Canada at an international tournament since a 3-2 prelim win at the 2019 Women's Worlds.

QUICK SHOTS

TODAY'S MATCHUP

Today's matchup against Hungary marks the quarterfinal meeting for the two teams after closing out the preliminary round with a 5-2 victory over Canada on Tuesday. The U.S. enters the playoff round as the top seed after finishing the preliminary round with a 4-0 record. It marks the seventh time since 2010 that Team USA has run the table in the prelims.

AGAINST HUNGARY...

Today marks the first-ever Women's World Championship meeting between the two teams. The U.S. and Hungary have only ever met once on the international stage, on March 24, 2014 at the 2014 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship. The U.S. won the preliminary-round game, 7-0. Current national team members Jincy Dunne, Abby Roque and Megan Keller all contributed to the victory.

IN THE QUARTERFINALS..

Team USA holds a perfect 2-0 record in quarterfinal competition at Women's Worlds. The U.S. first played in a quarterfinal game back in 2019, having earned a bye to the semifinals each year prior. The tournament format changed in 2019, with the U.S. playing quarterfinal games each

Forward Hilary Knight (Sun Valley, Idaho) currently sits second all-time in career WWC points with 85, having passed Jayna Hefford with a three-point effort against Switzerland. She is one away from tying and two from breaking the all-time WWC point record.

Teammate Brianna Decker broke the record during the 2021 WWC.

Seven of the tournament's top scoring leaders hail from Team USA. Taylor Heise leads the tournament with nine points (2G, 7A), with Kendall Coyne Schofield (1G, 7A) is second with eight points. Amanda Kessel (3G, 4A) and Alex Carpenter (2G, 5A) are tied with seven points, as Hannah Bilka (2G, 4A), Savannah Harmon (1G, 5A) and Megan Keller (1G, 5A) have six points.

POWERING UPThe U.S. leads the tournament in power play efficency and ranks second in penalty kill. Team USA has scored on the extra-skater opportunity at a 38.9 percent clip (7 of 18) and have killed off 90 percent of opponents power-play chances, yielding only one goal.

TEAM USA AT A GLANCE

ROSTER BREAKDOWN

The 2022 U.S. Women's National team features 23 players, including 18 returners from the silver medal-winning 2022 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team. Three players, **Hannah Bilka** (Coppell, Texas), **Taylor Heise** (Lake City, Minn.) and **Rory Guilday** (Chanhassen, Minn.), will all represent Team USA as members of the U.S. Women's National Team for the first time in Denmark.

AYE AYE CAPTAINS

Kendall Coyne Schofield (Palos Heights, III.) is the captain of Team USA for the 2022 IIHF Women's World Championship. Hilary Knight (Sun Valley, Idaho) and Lee Stecklein (Roseville, Minn.) will serve as alternate captains.

BEHIND THE BENCH

John Wroblewski is serving as head coach of the 2022 U.S. Women's National Team for the first time, after serving as head coach of the USA Hockey National Team Development Program from 2016-20. Shelley Looney, head women's hockey coach for Lindenwood and Josh Sciba, head women's hockey coach for Union, will both serve as assistant coaches. Alli Altman is serving as the goalie coach.

WWC Series vs. Finland: 19-1-1-0-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T)

LAST WWC MEETING: AUGUST 27, 2022 • USA 6, FIN 1: Amanda Kessel (Madison, Wis.) recorded four points (two goals, two assists) as Team USA topped Finland, 6-1, in the second preliminary game of the 2022 Women's World Championship. Defender Jincy Dunne (O'Fallon, Mo.) recorded her first goal as a member of the U.S. Women's National Team during the win. The U.S. outshot Finland 72-16, with Maddie Rooney (Andover, Minn.) making 15 saves.

JAPAN



WWC Series vs. Japan: 4-0-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L)

LAST WWC MEETING: AUGUST 25, 2022 • USA 10, JPN 0: Nine different players tallied goals, while 15 players had at least a point in the U.S.' 10-0 victory. Forward Taylor Heise recorded five assists in her U.S. Women's National Team debut, while Alex Carpenter (2G, 1A), Amanda Kessel (1G, 2A) and Kendall Coyne Schofield (3A) all recorded a three-point game. The U.S. outshot Japan 62-6, holding Japan shotless in the middle period. Nicole Hensley recorded the shutout in net, stopping all six shots faced.

WWC Series vs. Canada: 12-4-6-9 (W-OTW-OTL-L)

LAST WWC MEETING: AUGUST 30, 2022 • USA 5, CAN 2: After falling behind 2-0, the U.S. netted five unanswered goals to beat rival Canada, 5-2. Knotted at two heading into the third, forward **Lacey Eden** (Annapolis, Md.) roofed a shot from the circle to give Team USA a lead they would not relinquish. The U.S. outshot Canada 33-28 as 11 players recorded a point. Goaltender **Nicole Hensley** (Lakewood, Colo.) made 26 shots in the win.

U.S. All-Time in WWC Quarterfinals: 2-0 (W-L)

Of Note: The U.S. never played in a quarterfinal contest at an IIHF Women's World Championship event, having earned a bye to the seminifal round in all previous competitions, until the field expanded in 2019. Team USA is a perfect 2-0 in quarterfinals since. With 10 teams in this year's tournament, all eight teams that advanced out of the preliminary rounds will play in the quarterfinals.

U.S. All-Time in WWC Semifinals: 15-0-0-1-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) **Of Note:** The U.S. has only fallen once in the semifinal round of the WWC and that was against Canada on April 10, 2009. Despite a 33-save effort by Molly Schaus, the U.S. was edged by its porthern rival 2-1. Because the U.S. had already

was against Canada on Ápril 10, 2009. Despite a 33-save effort by Molly Schaus, the U.S. was edged by its northern rival, 2-1. Because the U.S. had already earned a bid into the gold-medal game, the loss did not eliminate the team. Team USA went on to claim gold against Canada two days later, winning 4-1.

Of Note: The U.S. has faced Canada in 19 of the last 20 medal games they have played in, having played for gold in every WWC in history. In 2019, the U.S. faced Finland for gold, winning that game 2-1 in a shootout. Team USA has won gold nine times, including eight of the last 10 Women's Worlds.

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TEAM TIDBITS

2022 U.S. OLYMPIC TEAM RETURNEES

The 2022 U.S. Women's National Team returns 18 players from the 2022 U.S. Olympic Women's Hockey Team that won silver in Beijing this last February. Those returners include, Cayla Barnes, Hannah Brandt, Alex Carpenter, Kendall Coyne Schofield, Jesse Compher, Juncy Dunne, Savannah Harmon, Caroline Harvey, Nicole Hensley, Megan Keller, Amanda Kessel, Hilary Knight, Kelly Pannek, Maddie Rooney, Abby Roque, Hayley Scamurra, Lee Stecklein and Grace Zumwinkle.

2021 WOMEN'S WORLDS RETURNEES

In total, 17 of the 18 returning members from the 2022 U.S. Olympic Team (all but Hannah Brandt), in addition to **Lacey Eden** and **Aerin Frankel**, were on the most recent edition of the Women's Worlds Team. That team competed last August at the 2021 IIHF Women's World Championship in Calgary, taking home silver following a 3-2 overtime loss to Canada in the gold medal game.

WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM NEWCOMERS

Hannah Bilka, Taylor Heise and Rory Guilday were named to the U.S. Women's National Team for the first time and are making their U.S. Women's National Team debuts in Denmark.

LONE STAR STATE OF MIND

Forward Hannah Bilka is just the second U.S. Women's National Team player ever from the state of Texas and the first one in almost 30 years. The Coppell, Texas, native is second only to Ellen Weinberg of Dallas, Texas, who represented the United States at the 1992 IIHF Women's World Championship in Finland.

12TH TIME IS A CHARM

Forward Hilary Knight is appearing in her record 12th IIHF Women's World Championship, the most in both IIHF and USA Hockey history. Knight has led Team USA to gold eight times (2008, 2009, 2011, 2013, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2019) and silver three times (2007, 2012, 2021).

9TH APPEARANCE FOR COYNE SCHOFIELD

Forward **Kendall Coyne Schofield** is playing in her ninth IIHF Women's World Championship, tying Cammi Granato, Julie Chu and Kacey Bellamy for third-most in USA Hockey history.

COLLEGE CONNECTION

All 23 athletes on the Team USA roster have competed or are currently competing as women's hockey student-athletes at a U.S. college or university. The University of Minnesota tops the list with six athletes, the University of Wisconsin boasts five, while Boston College and Northeastern University have four and three, respectively. Clarkson University, Cornell University, Lindenwood University, Ohio State University and University of Minnesota Duluth all have one athlete. Nine different schools have representation on the team.

PATTY KAZMAIER MEMORIAL AWARD HONOREES

Five members of the team have been honored with the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, bestowed annually to the best women's player in NCAA Division I college hockey: Taylor Heise (2022), Aerin Frankel (2021), Kendall Coyne Schofield (2016), Alex Carpenter (2015) and Amanda Kessel (2013).

U18 WOMEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP ALUMNI

A total of 17 players on the 2022 U.S. Women's National Team represented the U.S. at an IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship, including Cayla Barnes, Hannah Bilka, Hannah Brandt, Alex Carpenter, Jesse Compher, Kendall Coyne Schofield, Jincy Dunne, Lacey Eden, Rory Guilday, Caroline Harvey, Taylor Heise, Megan Keller, Amanda Kessel, Abby Roque, Kelly Pannek, Lee Stecklein, and Grace Zumwinkle. Eden, Guilday and Harvey were most recently on the U18 team in 2020.

A total of seven players were raised in the state of Minnesota: Hannah Brandt, Rory Guilday, Taylor Heise, Kelly Pannek, Maddie Rooney, Lee Stecklein, and Grace Zumwinkle. Six attended the University of Minnesota, Hannah Brandt, Taylor Heise, Amanda Kessel, Kelly Pannek, Lee Stecklein, and Grace Zumwinkle. and one attended the University of Minnesota, Duluth, Maddie Rooney.

The roster featured 2022 Olympian **Abbey Murphy** (Evergreen Park, III.) and 2021 U.S. Women's National Team members Natalie Buchbinder and Britta Curl.

2022 U.S. UNDER-18 WOMEN'S SELECT TEAM

The 2022 U.S. Under-18 Women's Select Team competed in a three-game series with Canada in Calgary earlier this month (Aug. 17-20). Canada came out on top, winning all three games. The team showcased seven returners from the 2022 U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team that took home silver at the Under-18 Women's World Championships.

2022-23 RIVALRY SERIES

The first U.S. game in the 2022-23 Rivalry Series will take place November 20, at Climate Pledge Arena in Seattle, Wash. The Rivalry Series, which was established by USA Hockey and Hockey Canada in 2018 to showcase the two powerhouse women's hockey programs, will include seven games in 2022-23 with additional dates/locations announced in the coming months.

2022 U.S. WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM STAFF



JOHN WROBLEWSKI, HEAD COACH

John Wroblewski is serving as the head coach of the U.S. Women's National Team for the first time at the 2022 IIHF Women's World Championship.

Wroblewski joins the U.S. Women's National Team following two years (2020-22) as the head coach of the Ontario (Calif.) Reign, the AHL affiliate of the LA Kings, and four seasons (2016-20) as the bench boss of the USA Hockey National Team Development Program.

Over his four years with the NTDP, the program reached its first USHL playoff berth since 2012 and finished top-three in all 12 international tournaments played. He led his team to 33-consecutive international victories from 2016-18, and also oversaw the development of 29 NHL Draft picks, including Jack Hughes, who was selected first overall by the New Jersey Devils in 2019.

At the IIHF level, Wroblewski guided the U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team twice, resulting in a gold in 2017 and bronze in 2019.

The Neenah, Wisconsin, native began his coaching career as an intern assistant coach with the NTDP and was promoted to a full-time assistant coach the following season, a position he held from 2008-10.

Wroblewski, a player on the inaugural NTDP roster in 1997, skated four years with the University of Notre Dame (1999-2003). He went on to play four years (2003-07) professionally with the ECHL's Fresno Falcons, recording 125 points (65-60) in 273 career games

JOSH SCIBA. ASSISTANT COACH

Josh Sciba is making his first appearance on the U.S. Women's National Team staff in 2022, but is no stranger to international hockey.

As an assistant coach, Sciba helped lead the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team to a gold medal at the 2022 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship, after serving in the same capacity for the 2019 U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team. He made his USA Hockey coaching debut in the 2018 Under-18 Series vs. Canada.

Sciba is currently the head coach of the Union College women's ice hockey team, a role he has served in for the past six seasons.

As a player, Sciba was a member of the USA Hockey National Team Development Program from 2001-03, prior to playing four years at the University of Notre Dame.



SHELLEY LOONEY. ASSISTANT COACH

Shelley Looney, a two-time Olympian who helped the U.S. win Olympic gold in 1998, is the head women's ice hockey coach at Lindenwood University where she has served since the 2019-20 campaign. She is making her debut on the coaching staff of a U.S. Women's National Team

Looney served as head coach for the 2019 and 2017 U.S. Women's National University Team, leading the U.S. to a fourth-place finish in 2019 and a third-place showing in 2017. She also was an assistant coach for the 2015 U.S. Women's National University Team.

Looney also served as an assistant coach for the silver medal-winning U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team in 2010, as well as for the 2004 U.S. Under-22 Women's Select Team.

As a player, Looney represented the United States at the 1998 and 2002 Olympic Winter Games, and in eight IIHF Women's World Championships.

ALLI ALTMAN, GOALTENDING COACH

Alli Altmann is serving as the goaltending coach of the U.S. Women's National Team for the second time after also serving on the silver medal-winning staff of the 2021 U.S. Women's National Team that took silver at the Women's World Championship in Calgary.

Altman also guided the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team for four seasons, having served in the goaltending coach role from 2017-22. She guided the U.S. to two golds and two silvers during that time.

Altmann is currently the co-owner and vice president of DEVENIR Goaltenders. She played four seasons for Minnesota State University. recording a career .901 save percentage.
