TONIGHT'S GAME

The U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team plays its final preliminary round game today against Germany at Wukesong Arena. Team USA is the home team and will wear its third jersey. Tonight's game will be televised live on USA Network and streamed at NBCOlympics.com.

TALKING POINTS

COMMESSO TO START

Drew Commesso will get the call in goal tonight for Team USA. The 19-year-old, who is the youngest goaltender ever to play for a U.S. Olympic Team, played the opening game for the U.S. in the Olympic tournament and made 29 saves in an 8-0 victory over China.

AGAINST GERMANY IN THE OLYMPICS

The U.S. and Germany will meet for the 10th time in Olympic history here tonight with Team USA holding an 8-0-0-1-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) advantage. The teams last met in the Games on Feb. 20, 2002, with the U.S. gaining a 5-0 win in the quarterfinals.

LOOKING TO WIN GROUP

With a point tonight, the U.S. will win Group A and earn a bye to the quarterfinals. Since this current Olympic format was established in 2010, the U.S. has won its group twice. The U.S. went 2-1-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) in 2014 with regulation wins over Slovakia (7-1) and Slovenia (5-1) sandwiched by a 3-2 shootout victory over host Russia, which featured the shootout heroics of T.J. Oshie and goaltending of Jonathan Quick. In 2010, the U.S. was 3-0-0-0, earning regulation wins over Switzerland (3-1), Norway (6-1) and Canada (5-3) in preliminary round play.

PLAYOFF SCENARIOS

Bye to QF With A Win Of Any Kind or Overtime Loss

If the U.S. earns a point in tonight's game against Germany -- which can happen with a win (regulation or overtime) or an overtime loss -- it will win Group A and get a bye to the quarterfinals. Group B preliminary round play was completed yesterday with ROC earning the bye to the quarterfinals with seven points. The winner of the Finland-Sweden game today will win Group C.

If the U.S. Loses in Regulation -- Three-Way Tie Likely

If the U.S. loses in regulation and Canada beats China in regulation, there will be a three-way tie atop the Group A standings ... and unless Germany defeats the U.S. by seven or more goals, Canada would win the three-way tiebreaker based on goal differential in the games played against the tied teams. If the U.S. loses in regulation and Canada loses to China, Germany would win Group A by virtue of its head-to-head win over the U.S.

If the U.S. Doesn't Win Group A, It Could Still Earn A Bye to QF

With the U.S. already having six points, if it loses tonight to Germany in regulation, it is still in good position to earn the fourth quarterfinal bye. The biggest wildcard for the U.S. in that scenario is if the Finland-Sweden game goes to overtime, which would result in the losing team earning the fourth QF bye with seven points. If the Finland-Sweden game ends in regulation and the U.S. loses in regulation, there would be a three-way tie between Denmark, the U.S. and the loser of the Finland-Sweden game with six points for the fourth QF bye. The next tiebreaker after points is goal differential, where the U.S. has a big advantage (U.S. +10 heading into play today; Denmark is done with Group play and is +1, Finland is +6 and Sweden +4).

AT THE CANADA GAME

The U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team, which faces Finland in semifinal play tomorrow at 9:10 p.m. at Wukesong Arena, was among those at last night's USA-Canada men's hockey game, as was Olympic snowboarder Shaun White.

TIDBITS

Defenseman Jake Sanderson was injured in the first period last night vs. Canada but finished the game. He will not play tonight and is day-to-day ... Forward Sam Hentges will make his Olympic debut tonight ... The U.S. training staff had to move the entire team operation from National Indoor Stadium to Wukesong Arena for tonight's game. Thanks to help from the great volunteers of the local organizing committee, all went smooth. Following tonight's game, the training staff will move the operation back to the National Indoor Stadium ... Team USA is the highest scoring team in the Olympic tournament entering play today with 12 goals and has also allowed just two goals, the fewest of any team ... The U.S. has killed all six opponent power play attempts through two games, including :31 of a Canadian 5-on-3 power play yesterday ... **Brock Faber** is third in the Olympics in ice time, averaging 23:44/game ... Forward **Matt Knies** has eight shots on goal through two games to lead Team USA. **Ben Meyers** is second (7), with Matty Beniers, Brendan Brisson, Brian O'Neill and **Brian Cooper** third (6) ... A total of 17 different players have contributed points through the first two games ... **Brendan Brisson** has scored both game-winning goals for Team USA ... U.S. head coach David Quinn visited with U.S. Olympic/Paralympic Committee CEO Sarah Hirshland last night following Team USA's victory over Canada ... Andy Miele and Kenny Agostino have spent the season playing on a line together for Torpedo Nizhny Novogorod in the KHL and are doing the same in Beijing. Miele's wife Hilary is due with the couple's second child on March 3 ... Aaron Ness had U.S. Hockey Hall of Famer Aaron Broten as his Bantam coach for two seasons. Ness' wife Samantha gave birth to the couple's first child, son Carter, five months ago ... **Pat Nagle** and his wfie Monica have two kids, Byson (2) and Sloan (10 months) ... **David Warsofsky's** wife Annie is pregnant and due with the couple's second child on March 10. The Warsofsky's son, Dayne, is 18 months old ... Strauss Mann started playing the guitar in the past year. He took both an introductory and intermediate guitar class while at the University of Michigan ... Andy Miele and Steven Kamper grew up playing youth hockey together in Michigan ... Steven Kampfer and his wife Tara have a two-and-a-half year-old son, Teddy ... **Brij Singh**, who is serving as team leader of the U.S. Olympic Men's Hockey Team, is believed to be the first Turban Sikh to be part of any Winter Games official team delegation.

AVERAGE AGE OF U.S. OLYMPIC TEAMS

The 2022 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team has an average age of 25.1 and is the youngest since 1994. Matty Beniers, born Nov. 5, 2002, is one of five 19-year-olds on the team and is the youngest member of the squad. Pat Nagle, at 34, is the oldest. While there has not been a younger team on average since 1994, the 2022 squad is the ninth oldest of the 24 in U.S. men's hockey history.

Brian O'Neill (Yardley, Pa.) is the lone member of the 2022 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team with Olympic experience after playing for Team USA in the 2018 Games in PyeongChang, South Korea. O'Neill and his fiancé Anniina, celebrated the birth of their first child – son Declan on Sunday, Jan. 30. He currently plays for Jokerit in the KHL (based in Helsinki, Finland),



OPENING CEREMONIES

and Steven Kampfer, who were both in COVID protocol -- marched in the Opening Ceremonies of the Olympic Winter Games on the evening of Feb. 4. The team didn't get settled into the Olympic Village until 3:30 a.m. and had practice at 1:30 p.m., before marching that evening. Miele, despite not being able to march, was in the Olympic spirit, dressing in his full marching uniform and watching on television from his apartment in the Olympic Village.

TAFFY ABEL & ABBY ROQUE

The 1924 Olympic Winter Games featured a men's hockey player by the name of **Taffy Abel**, who is the only men's hockey player to ever serve as flag bearer for a U.S. Olympic Team for the Opening Ceremonies, and is also the first Native American to represent the U.S. in the Olympic Winter Games. The 2022 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team features **Abby Roque**, the first female indigenous member of a U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team.

50TH ANNIVERSARY

The 2022 Olympic Winter Games marks the 50th anniversary of the silver medal-winning 1972 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team. The squad, under coach Murray Williamson, was led offensively by **Craig Sarner** (4-5--9) and goaltender **Lefty Curran** (3.00, .928).

CAPTAINS

Forward Andy Miele (Grosse Pointe Woods, Mich.) is captain of the 2022 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team. Miele, who earned the Hobey Baker Memorial Award in 2011 playing college hockey at Miami University, is in his second season playing for Torpedo Nizhny Novgorod in the KHL. He is the first Michigander to serve as captain of a U.S. Olympic men's ice hockey (see list of all-time captains later in these notes). Defensemen Steven Kampfer (Jackson, Mich.) and Aaron Ness (Roseau, Minn.), along with forward Noah Cates (Stillwater, Minn.) are serving as alternate captains.

TWIST AND TURNS OF 2022 OLYMPIC TEAM

It's been a road of twists and turns for USA Hockey in building its 2022 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team, from initial plans involving NHL players and personnel, to a last-minute shift when the NHL opted out of the Olympics on Dec. 22. Below is a look at the timeline of how things have unfolded for Team USA.

In its first game of an Olympic tournament, the U.S. is 11-0-2-8-3 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T), including this year's 8-0 win over China to start Olympic play. The U.S. has won five of its last six Olympic-tournament opening games.

OLYMPIC NEWS/NOTES

FROM EAU CLAIRE, WIS., TO BEIJING

Nate LaPoint, who is serving as one of two equipment managers for the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team, and Sis Paulsen, who is one of the two equipment managers for the U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team, are lifelong friends. They grew up in the same neighborhood in Eau Claire, Wis., skated on the same outdoor rink, attended the same high school and skated in the same boys' varsity program. They wore the same number. They played the same position. Their parents were friendly acquaintances. Their brothers were guide posts. Their paths crossed enough times growing up that they became good buds as adults. And their full-time jobs are both for the University of Wisconsin, LaPoint as equipment manager for the men's hockey team, while Paulsen is director of hockey operations and equipment manager for the women's hockey team. It's a fun story that esteemed journalist Andy Baggott describes in more detail here.

TIDBITS FROM PREVIOUS GAME NOTES

The U.S. had five practices together as a team before its first game, minus Jake Sanderson who arrived in Beijing at 12:30 a.m. on Feb. 11 ... Men's hockey players have been to speed skating, big air and women's hockey during their downtime here at the Olympic Winter Games ... A total of 20 of the 26 players have served in leadership roles -- as captain or alternate captain -- of their teams from the high school to professional level ... John Vanbiesbrouck, general manager of Team USA, is not with the team in Beijing due to COVID protocol but is in regular contact with Marc Boxer, who is in Beijing and serving as the team's assistant general manager The 2022 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team has an average age of 25, the youngest team the U.S. has fielded in the Games since 1994. Team USA is the youngest on average in the 12-team Olympic field, followed by Slovakia (26), China/ROC (27), Latvia (28), Canada/Germany/ Sweden (29) and Czechia/Switzerland/Denmark/Finland (30) ... The U.S. roster includes five 19-year-olds in Matty Beniers, Drew Commesso, Brock Faber, Matthew Knies, and Jake Sanderson ... Forward Noah Cates celebrated his 23rd birthday on Feb. 5 and he and his teammates enjoyed cake in the lockerroom to commemorate the occasion ... Team USA features three Nicks -- Nick Abruzzese, Nick Perbix and Nick Shore ... Nathan Smith from Minnesota State University in Mankato, Minn., was the leading scorer in the NCAA when he departed the Mavericks to play for the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team. Smith played youth hockey in Florida ... Matty Beniers lockerroom playlist prior to a recent pregame skate was celebrated by all, including coaches and support staff. It featured a wide array of music, including hits such as Summer of 69, Build Me Up Buttercup, Three Little Birds, Carry on Wayward Son, Rich Girl, Me and Julio Down By The Schoolyard and more ... Matt Knies had a conversation with a journalist in Slovak in the mixed zone earlier in the tournament. Knies' parents met in Bratislava, Slovakia, and moved to the U.S. prior to his birth. Knies' brother Phil was born in Slovakia ... Brian O'Neill is a fraternal twin ... Stan Wong, Hall of Fame athletic trainer for Team USA, is part of his fifth U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team. Wong has supported 53 U.S. hockey teams on the international stage starting in 2002. Wong's mother Barbara, who is 90 years old, is from Canton, China (today Guangzhou).

SUPERLATIVES AGAINST CHINA

Forward Sean Farrell, who plays at Harvard University, had three goals and two assists in Team USA's 8-0 victory over China on Feb. 10 marking the second most points in a single game for an American player in modern (1956-present) Olympic history. The record holder is another Harvard player in U.S. Hockey Hall of Famer **Bill Cleary**, who had six points, including four goals on Feb. 24, 1960, against Germany. Farrell's hat trick was the first for an American player in the Olympics since **Phil Kessel** had three goals vs. Slovenia on Feb. 16, 2014 ... **Drew Commesso**, who at 19-years-old is the youngest American netminder ever in the Olympics, had a 29-save shutout in Team USA's 8-0 win over China on Thursday (Feb. 10). It was the first shutout for an American goaltender in the Olympics since Ryan Miller made 19 saves in a 2-0 shutout of Switzerland on Feb. 24, 2010 ... A total of 14 players contributed points in the U.S. victory over China, including multiple point games from Farrell (3-2--5), Ben Meyers (1-2--3), and Nick Abruzzese (0-2--2) ... Defenseman Brock Faber played 23:25, the most of any U.S. player and nearly five minutes more than the next closest player in Matty Beniers (18:11) ... Matt Knies had six shots on goal to lead Team USA, while Brendan Brisson, who scored the game-winning goal, had five shots on net ... The U.S. recorded 55 shots on goal, the second most for Team USA in a game in the modern era of the Olympics. The record is 57 shots vs. Canada on Feb. 3, 1964.

2022 U.S. OLYMPIC MEN'S ICE HOCKEY TEAM STAFF

John Vanbiesbrouck, General Manager

John Vanbiesbrouck is serving as general manager of a U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team for the first time. He was named assistant executive director of hockey operations at USA Hockey in June of 2018 and has made a significant impact in a short time. Under his leadership overseeing the sled, women's and men's international programs, the U.S. has enhanced its standing as a world power in the sport.

David Quinn, Head Coach

David Quinn is serving as head coach of a U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team for the first time. The former head coach of the NHL's New York Rangers (2018-21), Quinn last coached for Team USA as an assistant coach at the 2016 IIHF Men's World Championship. He also held the same role at both the 2007 and 2012 events. Quinn's other assistant coaching roles with the U.S. include the 2005 U.S. National Junior Team and helping guide the U.S. Women's National Team to a pair of silver medals (2000, 1999) in the IIHF Women's World Championship.

Mike Hastings, Assistant Coach

Mike Hastings is serving as an Olympic assistant coach for the first time, and will be behind the bench of a U.S. team for the sixth time, with his last appearance as head coach of the silver medal-winning U.S. National Junior Team at the 2019 IIHF World Junior Championship. An assistant coach for the 2005 U.S. National Junior Team, Hastings filled the same role with the 2003 U.S. National Junior Team and twice served as head coach of the U.S. Junior Select Team, including in 2000 when Team USA won the Viking Cup.

Scott Young, Assistant Coach

Scott Young is serving as an assistant coach for a U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team for the second time after a similar role with the 2018 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team. Young, who was enshrined into the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame in 2017, is in his fifth year as the director of player development for the NHL's Pittsburgh Penguins. Prior to his role with the Penguins, he was an assistant coach for the men's ice hockey team at Boston University for two seasons (2015-17) after serving as the Terriers director of men's ice hockey operations in 2014-15.

Brett Larson, Assistant Coach

Brett Larson is making his Olympic coaching debut and will be on a Team USA bench for the third time. Previously, Larson served as an assistant coach for the U.S. National Junior Team in the 2020 IIHF World Junior Championship. In 2012, he was the head coach of the U.S. Junior Select Team that won the World Junior A Challenge. Larson is in his fourth campaign as head men's ice hockey coach at St. Cloud State University where he has led the Huskies to two NCAA tournament appearances in his first three years, including a national runner-up finish in 2020-21.

David Lassonde, Assistant Coach

David Lassonde is serving as goaltending coach for the 2022 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team, marking his first assignment as an Olympic assistant coach. USA Hockey's national goaltending coach, Lassonde has served as an assistant coach in support of U.S. teams on the international stage on multiple occasions, most recently with the U.S. National Under-18 Team at the 2021 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship. He has been part of the coaching staff of three U.S. National Junior Teams, including in 2020, for the silver medal-winning 2019 squad and also the gold medal-winning 2013 team.

The Under-17 Team competes in the United States Hockey League and also participates in three international events annually. The U.S. National Under-18 Team's schedule includes games against NCAA Division I and III opponents, contests versus USHL teams as well as competition in three international tournaments. A total of 10 players on the U.S. Olympic Team have played at least one game with the NTDP.

25TH ANNIVERSARY -- PATTY KAZMAIER MEMORIAL AWARD

The Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, presented annually by the USA Hockey Foundation to the top player in NCAA Division I women's ice hockey each year, celebrates its 25th anniversary in 2022. The winner this season will be unveiled on NHL Network on March 26 during an hour-long program with air time yet to be announced. The 2022 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team includes four Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award winners, including Kendall Coyne-Schofield (2016), Alex Carpenter, (2015) Brianna Decker (2012) and Amanda Kessel (2013).


