2019 WOMEN'S NOVEMBER TRAINING CAMP

On October 15, USA Hockey announced that the U.S. Women's National Team would host the Canadian Women's National Team in conjunction with the Pittsburgh Penguins for a week-long training camp Nov. 4-10 at UPMC Lemieux Sports Complex in Cranberry Township, Pennsylvania. The seven-day training camp and exhibition games are in place of the Four Nations Cup that the U.S. and Canada were scheduled to take part in at the same time in Sweden but was canceled.

TALKING POINTS -

AGAINST CANADA

The national teams from the United States and Canada most recently squared off at the 2019 IIHF Women's World Championship, when the U.S. defeated Canada, 3-2, in a preliminary round contest. The United States went on to claim its fifth consecutive gold medal the Women's Worlds, dating back to 2013. The U.S. is the reigning Olympic champion and has captured gold in eight of the last nine IIHF Women's World Championships, including five straight... The U.S. and Canada have battled in the gold-medal game of every IIHF Women's World Championship and Olympic Winter Games staged, with just two exceptions (2019 World Championship, 2006 Olympics).

A LOOK AHEAD

This week's exhibitions will serve as a preview for the five-game Rivalry Series between the U.S. and Canada, which begins next month and lasts through February. The series opens Dec. 14 with a 7. p.m. ET contest at XL Center in Hartford, Conn., and will feature three games in Canada before the series finale in Anaheim, California, on Feb. 8. The Rivalry Series was introduced by USA Hockey and Hockey Canada last season and comprised three games between the women's national teams of the two countries.

ABOUT THE TEAM

The roster features 18 members of the 2019 U.S. Women's National Team that won gold at the 2019 IIHF Women's World Championship ... Kali Flanagan (Hudson, N.H.), Jocelyne Lamoureux-Davidson (Grand Forks, N.D.) and Monique Lamoureux-Morando (Grand Forks, N.D.) – all three 2018 Olympic gold medalists -- return to the team for the camp, while 2015 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship gold medalist Sophia Shaver (Wayzata, Minn.) is set to make her U.S. Women's National Team debut.
