Doc Scheppler class of '72, has been coaching basketball for many years. His latest stint as coach finds him at the southern tip of the Peninsula in a small quiet town called Los Altos. Similar in many ways to Burlingame, both have populations of about 30k people, both are very affluent and diverse cities and both boast beautiful downtowns. Oh and both High Schools share the same mascot, "Panthers".

Doc has thrived as the Girls Head Basketball coach at Pinewood School, a 210-student private school in Los Altos Hills California. He has won (6) six state championships while the head coach at Pinewood and he was also recognized as State Coach of the Year in 2014.

This year Doc took his team to the State Championship again. And although they did not win their 7th Championship, this was one of those seasons where the journey *was* the reward.

Doc's girls rallied and drained their 3's, (reminiscent of the GS Warriors) hitting on 19 that night to prevail in a shocking 72-69 upset win at San Joaquin Delta College, prompting one

Cal-Hi Sports editor to comment, "it probably is the biggest upset in state history".

Congratulation's Doc. Job well done.

"Going to the Movies In Burlingame"

BHS Remembers

The Fox Theatre



This majestic theater opened on October 12, 1926. It was grand in style and grace. It was first known as the Peninsula Theater and lit up downtown Burlingame with a 3,500-bulb marquee. The ticket booth stood alone in the middle of the covered marquee reminiscent of the day. It was absolutely beautiful. The architecture outside was stunning. But the real beauty was found on the inside.



The majestic staircase drew you up to the balcony. It had a concession counter for it's time that made every kid envious with the smell of fresh popcorn emanating throughout the huge lobby entry summoning you to rush to see what other delights awaited your salivating mouth.

It was truly an event to go to the movies as a kid growing up in this town. It was renamed Fox Burlingame Theatre on August 16, 1954. It only had 1 screen and had a seating capacity of 1,808. It closed 20 years later in 1974 and was finally destroyed in 1975. It was replaced by a shopping mall called Crosby Commons.

Here's some shared memories from our alumni of their times at these theater's...



Shirley Morse, Class of '68 writes: "I have so many memories of the Fox Theater as well as the Drive-In. As young kids, the Fox had a summer movie series with films such as Francis the Talking Mule. All the kids in my neighborhood would walk uptown, stop at the Smoke Shop on the corner and buy candy, then go to the show. Great fun because it was during the day and we could all go without an adult along. Such freedom! I was so sad when they closed the Fox."

Derek Barton, Class of '70 writes: "I remember in grade school, walking up Burlingame Avenue with Bob Jacobson and Mike Morales going to the Fox Theatre. It was 50 cents to see a movie. I would throw a handful of those small red hot candies off the balcony and it sounded like hail on the back of those metal seats."

Dianne Ragozzino Class of '74 writes: "I Loved going to the Fox Theater when I was little! 50 cents to get in, 75 cents to sit in the Loges! I remember the dramatic staircase, everything decked out in what looked like red velvet! Buying charm suckers, sugar daddies and flicks at the snack bar, seeing 101 Dalmatians! I also remember senior year, sneaking in to see "The Way We Were" with Rusty".

Frank Holloran, Class of '68 writes: "My sister and I walked to the Fox Theatre on Burlingame Ave many Saturday afternoons. The movie I remember is "The Blob" because it scared me so much! We could get into the show and buy a box of candy for less than 50 cents. We were about 12 & 14 years old. In 1964!"


Patty Barrett-Mugge, Class of '82: "Balcony of The Fox, "1000 Leagues Under The Sea", and The Great Gatsby with Robert Redford thinking that was really a cool movie at The Hyatt"

Todd Fry, Class of '74 writes: "I was a crossing guard at McKinley School. Our reward was to go and see Robinson Caruso on Mars at the Fox. Kermit (the cop) worked the door."

Rick Sherrod, Class of '73 writes: "I remember seeing Clint Eastwood flicks and Bond movies with the Jacobson's"

Glenn Mendelson, Class of '73 writes: "I remember going to the Burlingame Fox Theater as often as I could. It was a treasure for us as kids. I really miss it."

The Encore Theatre



Located on California Drive it was a wonderful quaint theater, seating 300 with red carpets, a mural of the daytime sky on the celling, and angels looking down from their perches high above the floor. The outside of this theater gave no indication of what was on the inside. It closed in 1972. For years this theater lay dormant while a man known as 'The Rev' worked inside restoring this old structure for church use. The Marquee would have messages posted by The Rev. The messages were always positive and upbeat and always inspirational.



Despite its adornments, one thing this theater lacked was luck. The city of Burlingame deemed it unsafe and condemned the Encore saying it would not survive an earthquake. Despite its supposedly flimsy construction, it took the city a full three days to demolish the bldg.

Terry Naylor, Class of '57 writes: "I recall going to the Encore on California near Broadway to watch the serials each Saturday in the 1950's. It cost a quarter to get in, and we brought our own snacks. There was always a cartoon first. The movie was usually a western or that pre-Star Wars thriller, Flash Gordon! Each episode left off with an exciting cliff-hanger, to assure that we would return the following Saturday to see what happened to our heroes."

Joan Russell, Class of '74 writes: "English class field trip to see Romeo and Juliet at the Encore"

The Hyatt Cinema



The Hyatt Music Theatre was built originally as a "live theatre in the round" venue. It became the Hyatt Cinema Theatre on March 29, 1966. It was an "Ultramodern" theater shaped like a big spiked salad bowl with a marquee out front. It screened the roadshow versions of movies in the mid-1960's. It later became a triplex and was closed in 2008.

Christine Colladay, Class of '75 writes: "My best memory was going to see JAWS at the Hyatt Theater in Burlingame. I went with the Crosby kids and we got the best seats in the house! That was cool!"

Patt Sheldon, Class of '66 writes: "I also remember seeing Ice Station Zebra on my birthday in 1968 at the Hyatt with my family. It had been a very warm Nov. 1 day, so I didn't even have a sweater and froze watching the movie."

Rusty Knudsen Class of '74 writes: "Who can forget the many times we'd sneak into the Hyatt. My friends and I would wait for my mom to open the back door and we would sneak in. Our record was 28 people for one showing"

Alan Lancendorfer, Class of '73 writes: "Going to see the movie "Grand Prix" in the 60's with my dad at the Hyatt. It was projected in "Cinerama" mode on the big curved screen there. It felt like you were right there at the races. Also, years later going to the drive inn and backing my

pickup truck up the ramp backwards so my girlfriend and I could lay in the back with sleeping bags and watch Joe Cocker in Mad Dogs and Englishmen. Didn't watch much of the movie though.

Dianne Ragozzino Knudsen, Class of '74 writes: "I remember going to the Hyatt with my sister to see the re-release of "Gone With The Wind" on that huge screen! My best friend (Rusty) would make it a challenge to see how many he could sneak into the Hyatt Cinema. I think he snuck in 14 of us in to see Jaws one time. I ended up marrying that crazy guy"

Nadine Panos, Class of '75 writes: "I had a tool kit in the trunk of my little BMW 2002 back in my high school days. On nights my friends & I were bored, we'd go down to the Hyatt theater, park around back & slyly wrench open the side door with a screwdriver, then run back to the car to: 1) return the screwdriver 2) make sure no one was on to us. Then, when the coast was clear, we would sneak in the door & nonchalantly walk right into the theater. We must've seen "Young Frankenstein" and "Tommy" ten times before quitting our prankster ways. We never got caught, though! And, I will always remember those movies, and that theater, fondly!

The Burlingame Drive-in Theater



A four-screen drive-in built around a central concession stand. It seemed more than likely that the reason the wallpaper in the concession booth was on upside down was because somebody had mis-installed it in the initial construction and no one had ever bothered to fix it. As of 1999-2000 it was in dire need of a paint job, and most of the ticket booths were falling apart. Sound was broadcast on a local station, which you picked up on your car's radio. Although lots of high school kids went to the drive-in, the general theme here is not too many actually watched the movies.

Derek Barton, Class of '70 writes: "In High School, One guy would drive through with 5 guys in the trunk. When we took our dates, everyone parked in the very back. Some cars were not even facing the screen; others didn't even have the speaker on the window."

Hal Ramsey Class of '73 writes: "Ha ha ha, I have many! But the best was going to drive in to see Animal House. Friends asked (if) I liked it. No I didn't, well why? I went with a date. She and I never saw the movie."

David Steil, Class of '74 writes: "One of many...sneaking friends into the Burlingame Drive In by hiding them in the trunk of the car, along with plenty of refreshments. And ahhh yes, forgetting to remove the speaker from the window as I pulled away and struggled to see through the steamy windows. Great Times!"

Anonymous, Class of '74 writes: "We were at the drive in and were so high we couldn't figure out why the speaker wasn't working until half way through the movie we realized it was the heater and it wasn't even attached. The movie was The In-Laws."

Lisa Hom Class of '77 writes: "It was always a treat to go to the drive-in. My parents would pile us in the station wagon with blankets, pillows and snacks. No seatbelts required! They took us to see all the James Bond movies and others that came out. These were fun family nights for me. We would pull out the newspaper to check the listings. I was sad when the billboard was destroyed in a big windstorm (don't remember the year) and not rebuilt. Always enjoyed being able to see what was playing when I drove by the sign when it was on 101".

Barbara O'Connor, Class of writes: "Grease was the movie I saw at the drive in. But I remember taking the truck with my friend Vince and putting lawn chairs in the back and sleeping bags to stay warm. I dishonestly remember hiding under blankets in my parents station wagon to get into the drive-in free"

Hanau Falcons, Class of '80 writes: "Family night with a round table pizza...can still remember my sister and I going in our footie PJs. Remember High School and hiding in the trunk to get in for free."

Siri Nelson writes: "Somehow my dad had passes to the Hyatt... we used to go there all the time. We were actually told to go to the drive in by a security guard that caught us parked out by Anza parking on a weekend night! He told us no one would bother us there. Then there was the night when several girls and I saw some really scary movie at the drive in on a fairly deserted Saturday night. We were so scared we wouldn't even leave the car to go to the bathroom. "Have you checked the children?" Still gives me chills."


The Mr. Umpleby we know taught English at Burlingame High School in 3 different decades, the 60s, 70s and 80s. **BDYK**, he later became the principal at Mills High School and joined the Millbrae Rotary Club where he was a member for many years.

The students of the 60's-70's still refer to their teacher's as Mr. Ms. or Mrs. **BDYK** Mr. Umpleby was also known as (Umps) by some of his students in the '80's.

After retirement he moved to Ashland, Oregon, where he has enjoyed the 3 season long Shakespeare festival. **BDYK** As part of the OLLI program of self-enrichment classes for seniors, he has taught Faulkner and his beloved Melville at Southern Oregon University.

Mr. Umpleby was a favorite among all generations of students, **BDYK** he also has published two books, On Falcon's Wings and Delayed Steal: Baseball Stories, both available at amazon.com.


On Falcon's Wings



On Falcon's Wings is the heart-breaking story of five teenagers in Prague, Czechoslovakia,

during World War II. In the tragic aftermath of an assassination of a Gestapo general, the boys are kidnapped by German soldiers and sent by troop train to the Eastern front. Realizing that they will most likely be killed some of the teenagers manage to escape. During their perilous trip home, the boys are rescued by partisans, aided by sympathetic Ukrainians, and brutalized by Nazis. Scarred and traumatized, the boys who survive the harrowing journey back to Czechoslovakia must search for their loved ones and rebuild their lives in war-ravaged Prague.

Delayed Steal



Baseball is life, or so the saying goes. In this book, a man's relationship with his father coincides with the twists, turns, and surprises experienced in the game of baseball. On his lifelong journey the man learns the lessons his dad tries to teach him on the diamond: discipline, obedience, loyalty, teamwork, curiosity, and respect. Steady and detailed as the game itself, Delayed Steal is a book for anyone who once sat in the stands as a kid, rooting for the home team.

Mr. Umpleby just celebrated his 80th birthday this past January. He and his wife Mimi celebrated their 55th wedding anniversary the end of March. They have two daughters, Sarah and Amy.

Mr. Umpleby was diagnosed with Myelodysplastic Syndrome (MDS), a precursor to leukemia, four years ago, and weathered the chemo treatments extremely well. On a brief trip to Seattle to investigate clinical trials for his leukemia,

An Alumni Update By Jeff Tateosian '74

Al Facchini Class of 1948

"Baseball been berry, berry good to me" the famous Saturday Night Live signature phrase by character Chico Escuela reminds me of my godfather, Al Facchini. Baseball was his life. He played professional ball with the Milwaukee Braves alongside the likes of Hank Aaron, Warren Spahn, and other Hall of Famers. Al's story is an inspiration to all past, present and future BHS athletes.

He was raised in Burlingame and attended Washington Elementary School. In 1946, Al entered Burlingame High School where he was a two-sport athlete and started for the BHS baseball and basketball varsity teams each of his four years. Baseball was always his love. During WWII, high school baseball was suspended. When it resumed in 1946, money was tight and the school district did not have enough money for new uniforms, so players had to use the uniforms from the 1939 team, the last organized team to play. Al vividly remembers "the moths and the smell" after opening the metal trunk where they were stored for seven years. The uniforms weren't in terrible shape, but because the fabric had deteriorated, they tore easily when sliding into a base. New uniforms were purchased in 1947, which brought a whole new vitality to the program.

Al was one of BHS's two starting pitchers. as well as its shortstop. He was chosen to the All-County team three consecutive He played in the Babe Ruth years. American Legion All Star game at Seals Stadium in 1947 with Babe Ruth in attendance. In 1948, Al was chosen the MVP of the Examiner All Star game and was awarded a trip to New York to play in a top prospect game at Yankee Stadium. While there, he got to personally meet the World Champion New York Yankees.

Upon graduating from BHS, Al signed with the Boston Braves (soon to be the Milwaukee Braves). He started out in the California League and led the league in stolen bases in 1951.

Baseball was going great until he was drafted into the Korean War in 1952. He served on the front lines with Fox Company until the branches of the military formed baseball teams for the benefit of soldiers' entertainment. Instead of fighting on the front lines, Al and his new teammates' responsibilities included loading ammunition onto transport trucks. and other "hands on" work. One day, Al got the heart wrenching news that his former unit was ordered to take an enemy hill and were all either wounded or killed in action. In fact, Hollywood made the movie, Pork Chop Hill, starring Gregory about the infamous battle. Incredibly, the game that he loved since he was a kid probably saved his life.

When the war ended in 1953, Al resumed his baseball career with the Milwaukee Braves. He eventually made the

Milwaukee Major League club, where he played with Brave greats, Hank Aaron, Warren Spahn, Eddie Matthews, Del Crandall, Lew Burdette, Don McMahon, Bobby Thomson and Frank Torre (brother of Joe Torre). Warren Spahn was Al's roommate. One of Al's memorable moments was being called to pinch hit in a spring training game and face the Brooklyn Dodgers Hall of Fame pitcher, Tommy Lasorda. It was the bottom of the ninth, and Al's pinch-hit single won the game for the Braves. He was the last cut that spring for the major league club but played seven more years on AAA teams.

In 1957, Al's baseball team went to Cuba to play against the Cuban national team. Tensions were high between both countries and the team was surrounded with armed guards at all times. Al led off their first game and singled. The next batter hit a ground ball and Al slid into second and took the second baseman out with a hard slide. The fans got riled up and Al was taken out of the game for his own safety. Because of the threats, he didn't get into the other two scheduled games. A few months later, a ballplayer was shot and that was the end of baseball in Cuba for the United States.

Al married JoAnne Hamilton in 1954 and had two sons. They have lived happily in Napa for the last thirty years. Al is still active in tennis and his community. He still keeps in touch with his three living teammates from his 1949 team - Al Stein. Al McClennan, and Gus Suhr.

Al had the privilege of being the first baseball player to be voted into the Burlingame High School Hall of Fame. Asked about his favorite teacher, without hesitation he mentioned Vic Mangini (yes, that Vic Mangini). Vic was a P.E. and math teacher in 1948. He took interest in Al and no doubt saw what a special player and person he would become. Yes my friends, Chico Escuela was definitely channeling Al Facchini when he repeated, "Baseball been berry, berry good to me."


Come on out and "PLAY BALL!"
