2022 OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES

The U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team is one of 10 teams competing at the Beijing 2022 Olympic Winter Games from February 3-21, 2022.

The tournament features ten teams divided into two groups of five. Team USA is competing in Group A alongside, Canada, Finland, Olympic Athletes From Russia and Switzerland. Group B includes China, Czech Republic, Denmark, Japan and Sweden.

All five teams from Group A and the top three teams from Group B advance to the quarterfinals, with semifinals followed by the bronze and gold-medal games.

OLYMPIC RESIDENCY PROGRAM -

In October, USA Hockey launched a residency program in Blaine, Minn., for 28 of the top female athletes in preparation for the 2022 Olympic Winter Games. The centralized group trained together utilizing the Super Rink at the National Sports Center in Blaine and played games both domestically and abroad. The final 23-player Olympic roster was announced on January 1 at the NHL Winter Classic in Minnepolis.

MEDIA ACCESS

Team USA players and head coach Joel Johnson will be available for interviews in the mixed zone following games and non-gameday practices. The lockerroom is closed.

LAST TIME OUT

Team USA last took the ice on December 17 at the Centene Community Ice Center in Maryland Heights, Mo., against Canada, with Canada sneaking out a 3-2 OT victory. **Kendall Coyne Schofield** (Palos Heights, III.) and **Savannah Harmon** (Downers Grove, III.) scored for the U.S. Marie-Philip Poulin recorded the OT winner for Canada, as **Nicole Hensley** (Lakewood, Colo.) stopped 28 of 31 shots in net.

QUICK SHOTS

TONIGHT'S MATCHUP

The U.S. begins Olympic play against Finland tonight to mark a stretch of three games in four days. Team USA is 8-0-0 against Finland in the Olympic Winter Games (see game-by-game breakdown below) and the 2022 Olympics marks the third straight in which the two teams have opened Olympic play against one another. The U.S. and Finland last met in the 2021 IIHF Women's World Championship, with the U.S. winning both contests between the two squads by identical 3-0 counts.

STARTING STRONG

Team USA is 6-0-0-0 all time in the opening game of Olympic play. Tonight's contest marks the earliest in the calendar the U.S. women have ever played an Olympic hockey game.

DEFENDING THE GOLD

Team USA enters the Olympics as the defending gold medalists for the first time in 20 years. The U.S. topped Canada, 3-2, in a shootout to take home gold in PeyongChang in 2018. Outside the Olympics, the U.S. has won eight of the last 10 IIHF Women's World Championships.

OLYMPIC SUCCESS

The U.S. has medaled in every Olympics since the sport was added to the program in 1998. The team won gold in both 2018 and 1998, silver in 2014, 2010 and 2002, and bronze in 2006.

KNIGHT STARTS GAMES FIFTH IN U.S. OLYMPIC HISTORY IN POINTS

Forward **Hilary Knight** (Sun Valley, Idaho) has at least one point in each of the last four games the U.S. played heading into the Olympmics. A four-time Olympian, Knight is no stranger to the big stage with 17 Olympic points (six goals, 11 assists), fifth-most in U.S. Olympic women's hockey history.

SECRETARY OF DEFENSE

Goalie **Maddie Rooney** (Andover, Minn.) was dubbed 'Secretary of Defense' following her standout performance in goal for the U.S., making the gold-medal save to clinch the shootout victory for Team USA. Rooney currently has a 1.16 GAA at the Olympics, the second-best in U.S. Olympic women's hockey history.

MY WHY TOUR, PRESENTED BY TOYOTA

The U.S. played six games on the My Why Tour, presented by Toyota as preparation for the Olympic Winter Games. The U.S. went 2-4 in the series, all against Canada, winning both games in Canada and dropping each U.S.-based contest. The final three games against Canada (one in the U.S. and two in Canada) of the tour were canceled due to COVID-19.

TEAM USA AT A GLANCE

ROSTER BREAKDOWN

The 2022 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey roster includes 23 players, including 21 from the silver medal-winning team that competed at the 2021 IIHF Women's World Championship in Calgary in August. Fifteen players have Olympic experience, including 13 of who were on Team USA back in 2018 when the U.S. won gold at the 2018 PeyongChang Winter Olympic Games. Eight players on the team are Olympic newcomers.

AYE AYE CAPTAINS

Kendall Coyne Schofield (Palos Heights, III.) is the captain of Team USA for the 2022 Olympic Winter Games, after serving in the same capacity during both the My Why Tour, presented by Toyota, and the 2021 IIHF Women's World Championship. Hilary Knight (Sun Valley, Idaho), Brianna Decker (Dousman, Wis.) and Lee Stecklein (Roseville, Minn.) will wear the 'A' for Team USA after also serving as alternates during the My Why Tour and Women's World Championship.





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TEAM TIDBITS

GOOD KNIGHT

The Beijing Olympic Winter Games mark **Hilary Knight's** fourth (2010, 2014, 2018, 2022) Olympics. Knight is one of only four U.S. women (Jenny Potter, Angela Ruggiero and Julie Chu) to represent Team USA four times at an Olympics in the sport of ice hockey.

THIRD GO AROUND

Kendall Coyne Schofield, Brianna Decker, Amanda Kessel and Lee Stecklein are all suiting up for their third Olympics representing Team USA. All four were an integral part of the gold medal-winning team in 2018 and were also on the silver medal-winning squad in Sochi in 2014.

MEDAL WINNERS

Fifteen of the 23 players on the roster have previously won a medal at an Olympic Winter Games. Thirteen players were on the team in PeyongChang in 2018, seven were on the team in Sochi in 2014 and one was on the team in Vancouver in 2010.

Hannah Brandt, Cayla Barnes, Dani Cameranesi, Alex Cavallini, Kendall Coyne, Brianna Decker, Nicole Hensley, Megan Keller, Amanda Kessel, Hilary Knight, Kelly Pannek, Maddie Rooney and Lee Stecklein all wore the red, white and blue in 2018 when Team USA won its first gold in 20 years. The U.S. defeated Canada, 3-2, in a shootout to stand atop the podium.

Megan Bozek, Alex Carpenter, Kendall Coyne, Brianna Decker, Amanda Kessel, Hilary Knight, and Lee Stecklein were members of Team USA in 2014, when the U.S. dropped a close 3-2 overtime contest against Canada in the gold-medal game and took home silver.

Hilary Knight is the lone remaining member of the 2010 team that took home silver after a 2-0 loss to Canada in the gold-medal game.

A MIX OF YOUTH AND EXPERIENCE

The youngest players on the team are 19 (Caroline Harvey and Abbey Murphy), while the oldest is 32 (Hilary Knight). Knight is the oldest women's hockey player to represent the U.S. in the Olympics. The average age of the roster is 26 years old.

BLACKHAWKS CONNECTION

Kendall Coyne Schofield serves as a player development coach for the Chicago Blackhawks. In that role she helps evaluate, scout and develop prospects, including 2020 Blackhawks' second-round pick Drew Commesso, a member of the 2022 U.S. Men's Olympic Ice Hockey Team.

MAKING HISTORY

A member of the Wahnapitae First Nation, **Abby Roque** marks the first indigenous player to represent Team USA in the sport of women's hockey.

COLLEGE CONNECTION

All 23 athletes on the Team USA roster have competed, are currently competing or will compete as women's hockey student-athletes at a U.S. college or university. The University of Minnesota tops the list with eight athletes, the University of Wisconsin boasts five, while Boston College has three and Northeastern University has two. Boston University, Clarkson University, Lindenwood University, Ohio State University and University of Minnesota Duluth all have one athlete. Nine different schools have representation on the team.

PATTY KAZMAIER MEMORIAL AWARD HONOREES

Four members of the team have been honored with the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, bestowed annually to the best women's player in college hockey; **Kendall Coyne Schofield** (2016), **Alex Carpenter** (2015), **Amanda Kessel** (2013) and **Brianna Decker** (2012).

U18 WOMEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP ALUMNI

A total of 18 players have represented the U.S. at an IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship in their careers, including Cayla Barnes, Megan Bozek, Hannah Brandt, Dani Cameranesi, Alex Carpenter, Alex Cavallini, Jesse Compher, Kendall Coyne Schofield, Brianna Decker, Jincy Dunne, Caroline Harvey, Megan Keller, Amanda Kessel, Abbey Murphy, Abby Roque, Kelly Pannek, Lee Stecklein, and Grace Zumwinkle. Barnes, Compher, Dunne, Murphy, Roque and Zumwinkle all played for head coach Joel Johnson at some point during the four U.S. Under-18 Women's Natonal Teams he served as head coach (time he served as head coach for the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team U18 Women's World Championship Team (2015, 2016, 2017, 2018).

U18 CONNECTION

Alternate captain Brianna Decker served as an assistant coach on the 2019 and 2020 U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team staff, where she coached now-Olympic teammates Caroline Harvey and Abbey Murphy.

MINNESOTA MADE

A total of nine players have ties to the state of Minnesota. Six grew up in the state, while eight played college hockey at the University of Minnesota and one played at University of Minnesota, Duluth. Head coach **Joel Johnson** (White Bear Lake, Minn.) is also the head coach of the University of St. Thomas' women's hockey program in St. Paul, Minn.

CHICAGO MADE

A total of five players have ties to the greater Chicago area making Illinois the second-most represented state on the roster. All five played at least one year of youth hockey with the Chicago Mission - **Kendall Coyne Schofield, Jesse Compher, Megan Bozek, Abbey Murphy and Savannah Harmon**.

AROUND USA HOCKEY

2022 U.S. OLYMPIC MEN'S ICE HOCKEY TEAM

USA Hockey announced the 25-player roster that will make up the 2022 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team and represent the red, white and blue at the 2022 Olympics. **David Quinn** will serve as the head coach. The roster boasts 15 current NCAA players, eight European pros and two players from the AHL. Brian O'Neill, who played on the 2018 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team, is the lone player with Olympic experience.

THE BRIANNA DECKER ENDOWMENT FOR GIRLS HOCKEY

The Brianna Decker Endowment For Girls Hockey is going national. Started in 2018 by two-time Olympian **Brianna Decker** (Dousman, Wis.), and in conjunction with the USA Hockey Foundation, the endowment aims to provide grants to girls hockey organizations to increase female youth participation in hockey by alleviating costs around ice and equipment, advertising and marketing, and overall development. Originally aimed at girls programs in Decker's home state of Wisconsin, the grant program will expand to organizations country-wide in 2021. For more information, visit usahockeyfoundation.com.

2022 U.S. PARALYMPIC SLED HOCKEY TEAM

USA Hockey announced the 17-player roster that will make up the 2022 U.S. Paralympic Sled Hockey Team and represent the red, white and blue at the 2022 Winter Paralympic Games, March 4-14, in Beijing, China. **David Hoff** will serve as head coach after serving as an assistant coach in 2018. The U.S. will look to four-peat after taking home gold in 2010, 2014 and 2018.

LET'S ROLL

On the 20th anniversary of the September 11th attacks, the U.S. Women's, Men's and Sled National teams have adopted the mantra 'Let's roll' as a way to commemorate and honor the victims. The mantra, used by Flight 93 passenger Todd Beamer, were the last known words heard spoken by him as he rallied fellow passengers as they planned to attack the hijackers in the cockpit and regain control of the aircraft. Flight 93 crashed in Shanksville, Pa. killing all on board. The U.S. Women's National Team visited the National September 11 Memorial and Museum in New York City on an off day in late October. The team also holds 2006 U.S. Olympian Kathleen Kauth in their thoughts as Kauth's father, Don Kauth, was killed in the attacks that day.

2022 U.S. COACHING STAFF -

JOEL JOHNSON, HEAD COACH

Joel Johnson is serving as head coach of the U.S. U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team for the first time.

His first involvement with USA Hockey dates back to working summer camps in 2000 and has been closely involved with the U.S. Women's National Team program since 2015, highlighted by leading Team USA to a silver medal at the 2021 IIHF Women's World Championship and to four straight gold medals (2015-18) in the IIHF U18 Women's World Championship.

Johnson has served as head coach of the U.S. Under-22 Women's Select Team on two occasions for the U22 Series against Canada, leading the U.S. to a three-game sweep in 2018 and a 2-1 series victory in 2019. He made his U.S. Women's National Team debut as an assistant coach in 2018-19 and helped guide the U.S. to the gold medal at the 2019 IIHF Women's World Championship in Espoo, Finland.

Johnson was tapped to be head coach of the women's ice hockey team at the University of St. Thomas in 2021 as the Tommies transitioned to playing Division I hockey. Prior to UST, he spent 16 years (1999-2004 and 2010-21) as assistant or associate coach for the University of Minnesota women's hockey team, helping the Gophers to six national titles (2000, 2004, 2012, 2013, 2015 and 2016.)

Johnson coached at his alma mater, Bethel University, for six seasons (2004-10), including three as the head men's ice hockey coach. Along with his hockey responsibilities, he

was the men's and women's golf coach, and prior to that, coached soccer, where he earned MIAC Coach of the Year honors. In 2010, Johnson returned to Minnesota and helped the Gophers to five straight NCAA national championship game appearances from 2012 to 2016, winning back-to-back national titles in 2012 and 2013 and again in 2015 and 2016, along with recording a perfect 41-0-0 season in 2012-13.

COURTNEY KENNEDY, ASSISTANT COACH

A two-time Olympic medalist for Team USA, Kennedy is serving as an assistant coach for the 2022 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team after making her U.S. Women's National Team debut on the coaching staff of the silver medal-winning 2021 IIHF Women's World Championship team. Kennedy served as an assistant coach of the U.S. Under-18 National Team for the 2016-17 and 2017-18 seasons, helping lead the team to its third- and fourth-straight gold medal at the IIHF U18 World Championships and at the 2013 and 2014 IIHF U18 World Championships, helping lead the squad to silver medals at both tournaments. She also served as an assistant coach of the U22 team at the 2019 Women's National Festival. Kennedy, who has coached 15 seasons on the Boston College women's hockey staff, serves as the associate head coach for the Eagles. As a player, Kennedy was a two-time All-American defender at Minnesota in 1999 and 2001 and helped lead Minnesota to its first national title in 2000. As a senior, the blueliner earned Western Collegiate Hockey Association Player of the Year and Defensive Player of the Year honors. She was also a top-three finalist for the Patty Kazmaier Award. Kennedy earned a silver medal at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games in Salt Lake City, Utah, and a bronze medal at the 2006 Games in Torino, Italy. She also helped the U.S. capture its first gold medal at the IIHF Women's World Championship in 2005.

BRIAN POTHIER. ASSISTANT COACH

Pothier is serving as an assistant coach for the 2022 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team, his fifth coaching assignment with Team USA after serving as an assistant coach during the 2021 IIHF Women's World Championships. Pothier helped lead the U.S. to a gold medal at the 2019 IIHF Women's World Championship, in addition to serving on the staff at the 2019 Rivalry Series and the 2018 Four Nations Cup. Pothier has served as a camp coach at the 2018 USA Hockey Women's Winter Training Camp, the U.S. Women's National Team Evaluation Camp and the USA Hockey Women's National Festival. A former NHL defenseman and U.S. Men's National Team alumnus (2007 IIHF Men's World Championship). Pothier signed with the Atlanta Thrashers before spending his first year with the Orlando Solar Bears. He went on to win both the Turner Cup and Rookie of the Year and American-born Rookie of the Year honors in 2000-2001. Pothier played on the Ottawa Senators, Washington Capitals and Carolina Hurricanes organizations before retiring from hockey in 2012. Pothier now coaches all ages at Pothier Blueline Hockey in Rochester, Mass.

STEVE THOMPSON, GOALTENDING COACH

Thompson is making his first appearance on an Olympic coaching staff and is serving as the goaltending coach for the 2022 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team. Thompson made his international coaching debut during the 2018-19 season, serving on Team USA's staff during its gold medal-run at the 2019 IIHF Women's World Championship and the Four Nations Cup. Additionally, Thompson served as the goaltending coach for the 2021 U17 Men's Select Team that took home the Five Nations Tournament title and for the last eight years, has served as a goaltending coach and evaluator at USA Hockey's district and select camps. He began his professional career on the coaching staff at the University of Alaska Anchorage, spending time as the director of hockey operations, strength and conditioning coach and goaltending coach over three seasons. He played four seasons of college hockey (2009-13) as a goaltender for the University of Alaska Fairbanks. Currently, Thompson is the ADM manager of goaltending for USA Hockey, where he is responsible for the development and management of the American goaltending program.
