

2021 U.S. MEN'S NATIONAL TEAM GAME NOTES

2021 IIHF Men's World Championship | Arena Riga | Riga, Latvia | May 21-June 6, 2021

Preliminary Round Game #6 • USA (4-0-0-1) vs. Germany (3-0-0-2) • Group B • Monday, May 31, 2021

TODAY'S GAME

For the second-straight year, the U.S. has a chance to not only win five-straight games in preliminary-round play, but secure a quarterfinal berth when it takes on Germany. Last year, the U.S. went 3-1-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) before defeating Germany, 3-1, off a **Dylan Larkin** game-winning goal. All-time, the U.S. is 11-0-1-4-3 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) in 19 meetings against Germany.

A win today would give the U.S. five preliminary-round regulation wins for just the third time after doing so in 2017 and 2013. In 2017, the U.S. lost its tournament-opener, 2-1, to Germany before claiming six-straight wins to close group play. Four of the last five IIHF Men's World Championships in which the U.S. has won five or more games in regulation, the U.S. has skated away with a bronze medal (2004, 2013, 2015, 2018). The only time the U.S. failed to medal with five or more regulation wins in tournament play was 2017 (Finland, 2-0 QF loss).

TEAM USA FOCUSED ON OWN BUSINESS

Team USA (4-0-0-1) enters today ranked second with 12 points. While other game results can help the U.S. secure a quarterfinal berth, the team's stance is to take care of their own business. A single point earned tonight or tomorrow (vs. Italy) will secure a quarterfinal berth as only Finland (15pts; 18 possible), Germany (9pts; 15 possible) and Kazakhstan (10pts; 13 possible) are capable of reaching 13 points or more in group play.

USA-GERMANY CONNECTIONS

Today's game will feature a few current/future teammate connections between the U.S. and Germany.

In addition to the above-mentioned connections, the four LA Kings players (**Trevor Moore**, **Cal Petersen**, **Matt Roy** and **Christian Wolanin**) skating for Team USA are coached during the season by **Marco Sturm**, assistant coach with the Kings. Sturm, a 14-year NHL veteran, served as head coach for Germany at the 2016 and 2017 IIHF Men's World Championships before serving in the same capacity for the German entry that claimed a surprising silver medal at the 2018 Winter Olympic Games.

FULL TEAM EFFORT

Through five games, 17 different players have contributed at least one point and nine players have tallied at least one goal. In addition, not a single player from Team USA ranks among the tournament leaders in time-on-ice, a credit to the defensive corp providing quality minutes as one full unit. As a team, the U.S. leads the tournament in save percentage (.949) and goals-against-average (1.21) while allowing a tournament-best six goals against (only one on the powerplay). In addition, the U.S. was the first team to win four-straight games and the only team to do so with all four coming in regulation.

PICTURE DAY

With two games left in Group B, the U.S. used yesterday's practice day as an opportunity to take its team photo, as well as a slew of other 'group' photos. In the midst of the group photos -- all of which featured players with connections, be that current club teammates or fellow college alums -- the line of Conor Garland (Arizona Coyotes), Trevor Moore (LA Kings) and Jason Robertson (Dallas Stars) got together for a quick photo, illustrating the trio's fast-growing bond on and off the ice.

LESS THAN A WEEK REMAINING

Six days from now, a new world champion will be crowned as the U.S. is now in Day 16 of being 'in the bubble'. Over the last 16 days, there's been one day of travel, two days of quarantine, six game-days and seen days of practice.

ROSTER'S NHL EXPERIENCE

In terms of NHL experience, the 27-player U.S. roster has a total 3,672 of NHL games. Of those games, **Brian Boyle** (805 GP) and Abdelkader (739 GP) account for 1,544 of those games. The next most experienced NHLer is **Kevin Labanc** (339 GP), followed by **Chris Wideman** (181 GP) and **Ryan Donato** (180 GP). Five players have yet to make their NHL debuts while another 10 have played in 90 or fewer NHL games. Full breakdown on page 2.

ROSTER'S 'BLUE COLLAR' MENTALITY

Over the last few years, the U.S. roster has featured NHL All-Stars, first overall NHL Draft picks and Stanley Cup champions. While this year's roster has one Stanley Cup champion in **Justin Abdelkader**, its primarily built on late-round or undrafted players. Team USA's roster features just 3 first-round selections, followed by 7 second-rounders, 1 third-rounder, 3 fourth-rounders, 2 fifth-rounders, 2 sixth-rounders, 3 seventh-rounders and 5 undrafted players. In addition, one player has yet to be drafted, but is expected to be a first-round selection in this year's NHL Draft. With more than half of the roster (15) consisting of players taken in the fourth round or later (or undrafted), the team's character is driven by a blue-collar, earn it mentality.

"This team's ability to pick things up, implement system details, adjust to the opponent, all of it has been phenomenal, and that's a credit to the character within the room," head coach **Jack Capuano** said earlier this tournament. "Most NHL teams have a handful of guys who are late-rounders or undrafted guys who've had to earn their stripes, earn their spots. You walk into our room and our whole room is guys like that. Now add being able to wear the USA crest, a lot of them for the first time. It's a special group to be a part of, and as a staff we're very honored to be leading them in this year's world championship."

THINGS WORTH MENTIONING

On May 31, the U.S. took its team photo in their white jerseys ... Brian Boyle (36) and Matty Beniers (18), the oldest and youngest players on Team USA, both hail from Hingham, Mass., and scored in the 4-2 over Latvia ... The U.S. has 12 sets of former/current club teammates who have reunited here in Latvia with Team USA, including three with Columbus Blue Jackets (3), University of Connecticut (2), Detroit Red Wings (3), Harvard (3), LA Kings (6), N.Y. Rangers (3), Ottawa Senators (3), San Jose Sharks (3), Tucson Roadrunners (2), Youth hockey (Mass.) (2), Youth hockey (Calif./ Mich.) (2) ... Defenseman Chris Wideman and forward Sasha Chmelevski coincidentally use the exact same stick blade ... On May 24, Team USA took an IIHF-approved excursion to Jurmala Dune (White Dune). Having the space to themselves, the team took part in spike ball, throwing football around, and enjoying the sunshine ... Kevin Rooney celebrated his 28th birthday on May 21 here in Riga ... In a team meeting on May 21, head coach Jack Capuano announced that Justin Abdelkader (Muskegon, Mich.) will captain Team USA while Matt Roy and Colin Blackwell (North Andover, Mass.) will serve as alternate captains ... Team USA has a 27-player roster (14 forwards, nine defenseman, four goaltenders) ... Players on this year's team have accounted for 18 total medals in world championship play, including seven gold medals ... The roster has an average age of 26, making it the oldest U.S. entry in an IIHF Men's World Championship since 2004 and 2005, when Team USA's average age was 27.6 and 28.1, respectively ... At 18 years, 6 months, of age, Matty Beniers is the fourth-youngest player to dress for the U.S. in an IIHF Men's World Championship ... Team USA's journey to Riga, Latvia started on May 15 when players and staff convened in Newark, N.J., before boarding a charter the following day wtih Team Canada, among other players ... Over the last five world championships, the U.S. has registered a 27-5-1-13 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record while earning four top-five finishes (2019-7th, 2018-bronze, 2017-fifth, 2016-4th, **2015-bronze**). Team USA's eight wins in 2018 tied for the best-ever by a U.S. team in a single world championship while the team's 12-2-0-2 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record between the 2017 and 2018 events was its best-ever stretch in tournament history ... Team USA's host here in Latvia, Georgijs Pujacs, is a three-time Olympian who skated for the Latvian National Ice Hockey Team in the 2006, 2010 and 2014 Olympic Winter Games.

COLLEGE GOALIE CAPTAINS OETTINGER & PETERSEN

In the crease, both **Jake Oettinger** (Dallas Stars) and **Cal Petersen** (LA Kings) have seen promising starts to their NHL careers after successful collegiate careers. Oettinger skated three seasons with Boston University (2016-19) while Petersen played three seasons with Notre Dame (2015-17). Not only did both players skate collegiately, both were given the rare captains letter in their final collegiate seasons as Oettinger was tabbed an alternate captain while Petersen served as captain.

Among his numerous collegiate accolades from 2016-19, Oettinger was tabbed Hockey East Tournament MVP (2018) after leading the Terriers to the tournament title. Petersen, meanwhile, set an NCAA single-game record on March 6, 2015, when he made 87 saves for Notre Dame in a 4-3 five-overtime loss to Massachusetts in a Hockey East playoff game. That came at the end of his freshman season, when he had taken the starting job and begun a streak of 90 consecutive starts.

In the 2020 NHL Playoffs, **Jake Oettinger** became the first goalie in the expansion era (since 1967-68) to make his NHL debut in the round leading into the Stanley Cup Final when he played the third period for the Dallas Stars in a 3-0 loss to the Vegas Golden Knights in Game 2 of the Western Conference Final on Sept. 8, 2020. He made five saves without allowing a goal. In the Stanley Cup Final, Oettinger relieved Anton Khudobin and played the third period during a 5-2 loss to the Tampa Bay Lightning in Game 3 on Sept. 23, 2020. He made three saves and did not allow a goal. This season he went 11-8-7 with a 2.36 GAA and .911 SV%.

Originally drafted by Buffalo, Petersen elected to sign with the Kings as a free-agent following his time at Notre Dame. In the 2018-19 season, Petersen made his NHL debut in relief of Jonathan Quick, allowing one goal on 16 shots. Petersen's first NHL start then came against the Chicago Blackhawks on Nov. 16, 2018, where he made 34 saves in a 2-1 win. The Kings sent Petersen back to Ontario Reign (AHL) after he went 5-4-1 with a 2.61 goals-against average and .924 save percentage. He spent the rest of the 2018-19 season and began 2019-20 with Ontario, where he was selected to the 2020 AHL All-Star Game, before being recalled in February 2020. This past season, he split time with **Jonathan Quick**, registering a 9-18-5 record with 2.89 goals-against-average and .911 save percentage.

TEAM USA'S SUPPORT STAFF ON AND OFF THE BENCH

Team USA's support staff has split its duties for in-game duties, with several working on the bench while another few work off it in supporting roles. On the bench are athletic trainers **Stan Wong** (USA Hockey) and **Piet VanZant** (Detroit Red Wings) and equipment managers **Dana Bryson** (LA Kings) and **Jamie Healy** (Columbus Blue Jackets). Off the bench are athletic trainer/compliance officer **Jason Hodges** (USA Hockey's NTDP), equipment/team leader **Scott Aldrich** (USA Hockey), massage therapist **PeeWee Willman** (USA Hockey) and team physician **Dr. Doug Weiss** (USA Hockey).

VANZANT, HEALY RETURN FOR SECOND MEN'S WORLDS

Piet VanZant and Jamie Healy are both serving on their second U.S. Men's National Team staffs. VanZant, who fulfilled the same role with the 2019 U.S. team, recently finished his 14th season as head athletic trainer for the NHL's Detroit Red Wings and 22nd with the organization overall. He joined the Red Wings' staff for the 1999-2000 season after spending six years with Detroit's AHL franchise in Glens Falls, NY.

Healy, an assistant equipment manager for the Columbus Blue Jackets since the club's inaugural 2000-01 season, also fulfiled the same role on the bronze medal-winning 2015 team. Prior to Columbus, Healy spent the 1999-00 season as equipment manager for the ECHL champion, Peoria Rivermen, and also served as the equipment manager for the Alexandria Warthogs (WPHL, 1998-99) and Kalamazoo Wings (IHL, 1993-95).

USA HOCKEY SUPPORT STAFF REPRESENTED

The U.S. support staff features several members associated with USA Hockey on a recurring basis, including **Scott Aldrich**, **Jason Hodges**, team physician **Dr. Doug Weiss**, and **PeeWee Willman**.

Since 2003, Aldrich has served on numerous U.S. national teams at the men's, women's and sled hockey levels. His gold-medal accolades include three U.S. National Junior Teams (2013, 2017, 2021) and the 2018 U.S. Paralympic Sled Hockey Team. Hodges has been part of the USA Hockey family for 23 seasons, all with USA Hockey's National Team Development Program. Over that span, he's served on eight gold medal-winning rosters, five with the Under-18 Men's team (2005, 2009, 2011, 2015, 2017) and three with the National Junior Team (2013, 2017, 2021).

Weiss is representing the U.S. at the Men's World Championship for the second-straight year (2019). A member of multiple Under-18 and National Junior teams, Weiss has won four gold medals (2012, 2014, 2015, 2017), all at the Under-18 level. Willmann is serving as a massage therapist for the U.S. for the eighth consecutive year here in Riga, Latvia. In February of 2018, he served in the same capacity for the 2018 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team and was part of the bronze medal-winning U.S. Men's National Teams at the 2013, 2015 and 2018 events.

STAN WONG WORKING 46TH INTERNATIONAL EVENT

Stan Wong, one of Team USA's two athletic trainers and a beloved figure of players and staff alike, is working his 46th international event for a U.S. hockey team. This year marks his 13th straight men's world championship. He has also served as a trainer for four Olympic teams, 17 national junior squads, 10 Deutschland Cup teams and for Team USA at one Youth Olympic Games and one Winter World University Games. Wong was inducted into the Professional Hockey Athletic Trainers Hall of Fame in June 2015.

BRYSON HITS 1,500 NHL GAMES WITH THE LA KINGS

Dana Bryson (Medford, Mass.), longtime equipment manager for the LA Kings, is making his debut on a U.S. Men's National Team staff here in Riga, Latvia. He previously served on the U.S. staff at the 2015 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament and also spent time with the U.S. National Inline Team. A member of the LA Kings' 2012 and 2014 Stanley Cup championship teams, Bryson earlier this season worked his 1,500th NHL game in a 4-2 win over the Arizona Coyotes. Coincidentally, the very first NHL game he worked also came against the Coyotes in 2005-06, where Wayne Gretzky served as coach of the then 'Phoenix' Coyotes.

FROM YOUTH TEAMMATES TO INTERNATIONAL TEAMMATES

A pair of U.S. players on this year's roster are once again teammates after doing so as youth hockey players. From Scituate, Mass., U.S. forwards **Conor Garland** and **Ryan Donato** once skated together before now doing so here again in Riga. In addition, **Jason Robertson** and **Sasha Chmelevski** were teammates together on youth hockey teams in both California and Michigan. The duo previously skated together for the U.S. at the 2019 IIHF World Junior Championship where they helped the U.S. to a silver medal, with Chmelevski earning U.S. Player of the Game honors in the gold-medal game.

JASON ROBERTSON AND FINLAND BREAKAWAY GOALS

U.S. forward **Jason Robertson's** first goal in an IIHF World Junior Championship and IIHF Men's World Championship both coincidentally came against Finland. Even more ironic is the fact that both of his goals were eerily similar. At the 2019 IIHF World Junior Championship (silver), his first goal came with a five-hole tally off a breakaway in a 4-1 USA win. Not too differently, his goal in Team USA's opening game here in Latvia also came off a breakaway, this time off a nice, high-rising feed from **Christian Wolanin** that Robertson batted down before firing through the five-hole. Robertson was able to recall the coincidence during that game's postgame press conference.
