# **U.S. IN QUARTERFINALS**

The U.S. is 11-0-0-8 (W-OTW-OTL-L) all-time in IIHF World Junior Championship quarterfinals, including a 4-1 record in its last five quarterfinal games. USA is 0-1 versus Slovakia in quarterfinals, with their lone matchup coming in the 2009 IIHF World Junior Championship. The U.S. enters the 2021 tournament having outscored opponents, 17-6, in its last five quarterfinals. In the team's most recent quarterfinal win, the U.S. won, 3-1, over the Czech Republic thanks to Cayden Primeau's 18-save performance. Last year's quarterfinal loss to Finland was a closely contested 1-0 game, as **Spencer Knight** stopped 28 of 29 shots.

# **STAYING DISCIPLINED**

The U.S. National Junior Team has taken six penalties totaling 12 minutes through four games of the tournament. The U.S. has yet to take back-to-back penalties in game action. Head coach **Nate Leaman** has emphasized staying disciplined since the October training camp at USA Hockey Arena. Prior to both the October and December camps, Leaman showed video clips breaking down proper stick positioning and body checking in order to emphasize discipline. Of the six penalties, the U.S. has been perfect on the penalty kill. The United States ranks first for top penalty killing honors in the tournament with a 100% rate.

# **DICTATING GAMES**

The U.S. has outshot all four of its opponents in preliminary play, including out-shooting its opponents in nine of the 12 periods. The offensive push is part of a team identity to "dictate games" through possession and power play opportunities. The U.S. ranks second in both shots on goal (168) and shots allowed (83) in tournament play.

# **ZEGRAS CHASING HISTORY**

**Trevor Zegras** is chasing down multiple high marks in the U.S. record books, full U.S. records on page 10:

# **CAUFIELD BIRTHDAY**

**Cole Caufield** is celebrating his 20th birthday today. **Sam Colangelo** celebrated his 19th birthday earlier in the tournament by scoring his first career World Juniors goal.

### **SHUTOUTS**

U.S. netminders **Dustin Wolf** and **Spencer Knight** recorded three straight shutouts against Austria, Czech Republic and Sweden. Knight became the first American goaltender to record back-to-back shutouts in World Juniors history. This is the first time since 2015 that two different U.S. netminders have recorded shutouts, when Thatcher Demko and Brandon Halverson accomplished the feat. The U.S. is currently riding the following shutout streaks:

- 3 consecutive games
- 180:21 team shutout streak
- 206:35 team shutout streak with a goalie in net
- 70 consecutive shots with a goalie in net
- Spencer Knight is T-1st with most shutouts (2) in U.S. World Juniors history

# TEAM USA AT THE WORLD JUNIORS

Entering the 2021 IIHF World Junior Championship, the United States holds a 142-10-6-118-11 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) all-time record in world junior championship play. Most recently, Team USA finished sixth at the 2020 IIHF World Junior Championship in Ostrava and Trinec, Czech Republic, after earning a silver in 2019 at Vancouver and Victoria, British Columbia. To date, Team USA has earned 12 podium finishes, including four gold medals (2004, 2010, 2013, 2017), two silver medals (1997, 2019) and six bronze medals (1986, 1992, 2007, 2011, 2016, 2018). The United States has medaled in six of the last 10 years, including a four year streak from 2016-19 that set a new U.S. record. The United States celebrated a successful decade from 2010-2020, collecting seven medals in 10 years. The three gold medals (2010, 2013, 2017) were only matched by Finland. The United States has featured four tournament Most Valuable Players, Zach Parise (2004), John Gibson (2013), Casey Mittelstadt (2018) and Ryan Poehling (2019).

**Trevor Zegras** ranks 1st in individual tournament scoring with 13 points in four games, while defenseman **Cam York** is 2nd in individual scoring by defensemen with six points. In total, four U.S. players are currently ranked in top-20 in individual scoring:

# **YOUTH CONNECTION**

Some players on the U.S. National Junior Team have notable youth hockey connections dating back more than 10 years. Linemates **Trevor Zegras** and **Arthur Kaliyev** played together in New York at about 10-years old, often facing Spencer Knight in games. Brendan Brisson and Dustin Wolf were teammates on the LA Jr. Kings, and would face the Anaheim Ducks frequently that featured **Ryan Johnson** and **Cam York**. Forward **Bobby Brink** and defenseman **Drew Helleson** grew up playing hockey together in Minnesota.

## **VIRTUAL FANS**

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic there will be no fans in attendance at this year's World Junior Championship. However, there will still be fans cheering on teams, albeit virtually, this year. Team USA has some special guests in its virtual crowd, including friends and family for some of the players. Matt Boldy's father, Todd, will be in attendance and says, "Go get the gold boys!" Dustin Wolf's mother, Michelle, will also be logging in from the Wolf's house in Washington. Trevor Zegras' cousin Billy will be logging in as, "Trevor's biggest fan!" John Farinacci's billet parents from Muskegon, Kim and Kevin Burke, will be cheering from Michigan. The Rocha family is from Maryland but are currently stationed in Germany. Brock Forrest typically travels to every North American World Junior Championship in order to cheer on Team USA. Jack Koslosky is a first-year 8U player and is excited to stay past his bed time. Gage Melvin has watched Miracle before every game, and joins the fan section tonight.

### **RETURN TO EDMONTON**

Five players on the U.S. National Junior Team competed in the Hlinka Gretzky Cup in 2018, hosted inside Rogers Place in Edmonton and Red Deer, Alberta. The team's captain, **John Farinacci**, has scored in three of four preliminary games heading into tonight. Farinacci also leads the U.S. with a 63.27% faceoff win percentage. The U.S. Hlinka team went on to finish 4th in the tournament after a semifinal loss to Canada.

Three American centers have a winning faceoff percentage, with **John Farinacci** leading the U.S. team through four games (minimum 50 faceoffs taken):

# GONE CAMPING OCTOBER CAMP

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, USA Hockey was unable to host its annual World Junior Summer Showcase, that would normally play host to games between the United States, Canada, Finland and Sweden. The United States did hold a National Junior Evaluation Camp in Plymouth, Mich. at USA Hockey Arena from Oct. 8-13 that included 42 players. The camp, featuring three days of intrasquad competition, allowed general manager **John Vanbiesbrouck** and his staff to review the talent pool of American players born in 2001 or later.

# **DECEMBER CAMP**

USA Hockey invited 29 players back to Plymouth, Mich., on Dec. 6, for a week-long camp in preparation for the World Junior Championship.

# **TEAM USA ON ZOOM**

During the four-day isolation quarantine, Team USA spent time on Zoom with notable U.S. National Junior Team alumni **Patrick Kane** (2007), **Charlie McAvoy** (2016, 2017) and **Dylan Larkin** (2015). Kane, who won a bronze medal in 2007, was named to the World Juniors All-Star Team. McAvoy, who won a gold and bronze medal, was named to the 2017 World Juniors All-Star Team. Larkin was tied for the tournament's lead in goals scored in 2015 with five goals in five games. Tampa Bay Lightning assistant coach **Derek LaLonde** also spoke to Team USA early in the isolation quarantine period, with emphasis on best tips for staying sharp in the bubble and how Tampa Bay overcame adversity to win the Stanley Cup.

# **SURFING USA**

California natives Brendan Brisson, Ryan Johnson, Dustin Wolf and Cam York have been featured as a shining examples of the growth of hockey in the United States. Both Jackson LaCombe and Drew Helleson spent time playing youth hockey in California growing up. Despite the long list of youth players from California, and the even longer list of California prospects drafted by the Anaheim Ducks and Los Angeles Kings, there are only two players that regularly surf on the west coast: Brisson and York. It's still unclear who the better surfer is between the two.

### **FAMILY TRADITION**

Three Team USA players have fathers who previously played on U.S. National Junior Teams:

Bobby Brink - Andy Brink (1994) Ryan Johnson - Craig Johnson (1991) Alex Turcotte - Alfie Turcotte (1984)

Craig Johnson played in four IIHF Men's World Championships (1993, 1996, 1999 and 2003), and served as an alternate captain in 2003. Johnson won a bronze medal in 1996, and also played on the Team USA Winter Olympic Team in 1994. Alfie Turcotte played in the 1986 IIHF Men's World Championship for USA Hockey.

### **MEET THE CAPTAINS**

(C) CAM YORK: One of eight returners from last year's National Junior Team, York is currently a sophomore at the University of Michigan (Big Ten). This is York's first time serving as a captain for Team USA, after playing in both the 2018 and 2019 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championships, where he earned a silver and bronze medal. In the 2019 tournament, York set tournament records for all-time tournament points by a defenseman (17) and all-time tournament assists by a defenseman (13). York is the lone returner from the 2020 IIHF World Junior Championship on the blue line for the Americans. The defenseman was teammates with Caufield and Turcotte from 2017-19 at the U.S. National Team Development Program. A native of Anaheim, Calif., York was drafted by the Philadelphia Flyers in the first round, 14th overall.

(A) COLE CAUFIELD: Caufield is competing in his fourth IIHF event, after previously collecting a silver and bronze medal at the IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship in 2018 and 2019. Additionally, the forward played for Team USA in the 2020 World Juniors. Caufield led the 2019 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship with 14 goals scored, tying Alex Ovechkin's individual tournament record, where he served as an alternate captain in 2019. The Stevens Points, Wis. native is currently playing in his second season for the University of Wisconsin (Big Ten), after being selected by the Montreal Canadiens in the first round of the 2019 NHL Draft, 15th overall.

(A) ALEX TURCOTTE: Turcotte is playing in his second IIHF World Junior Championship, after competing internationally in two IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championships, including in 2019 where he served as an alternate captain. The Chicago, Ill. forward most recently played at the University of Wisconsin (Big Ten) during the 2019-20 season prior to signing his entry-level contract with the Los Angeles Kings. Turcotte was selected by the Kings in the first round, fifth overall.

# **DOWN THE ROAD**

Jake Sanderson's grandparents live in Edmonton, Alberta. This year's World Juniors was going to be the first time in over two years seeing their grandson play in-person. Instead, they'll be cheering on Jake and Team USA from the comfort of their home this year.

### **RECORD SETTERS**

The U.S. National Junior Team features three record-setting NTDP players: a forward, defenseman and goaltender. Cole Caufield set the NTDP goal-scoring records for single season (72) in 2018-19 and career goals scored (126), 2017-19. Previous record holders were Auston Matthews (55) and Phil Kessel (104). Caufield is third all-time at the NTDP with 180 career points. At the 2019 Under-18 Men's World Championship, Caufield tied **Alex Ovechkin's** tournament record for most goals in single tournament (14). Cam York owns the NTDP record for points by a defenseman in a single season (65 in 2018-19) and is second all-time at the NTDP in career points by a defensemen (103), 2017-19. Additionally, York set all-time marks at the Under-18 Men's World Championship including career points by a defenseman (17) and career assists by a defenseman (13). Spencer Knight set the NTDP record for most wins in a career by a goaltender (59) from 2017-19, and was T-1st for most wins in a single season (32) after his 2018-19 campaign.

# **GOALIE VIRTUAL SUITE WITH USA HOCKEY**

USA Hockey hosted a pre-game virtual suite prior to the New Year's Eve matchup against Sweden with notable American goaltenders including: Ben Bishop, Brian Boucher, Steve Cash, Alex Cavallini, Jim Craig, Lefty Curran, Thatcher Demko, Pam Dreyer, Robert Esche, Jimmy Howard, Steve Janaszak, Jack McCartan, Ryan Miller, Jake Oettinger, Cayden Primeau, Mike Richter, Maddie Rooney, Cory Schneider and Joe Woll. The discussion will be led by ADM goaltending manager and long-time volunteer Ron DeGregorio, who still laces them up as a goaltender today after more than 40 years of service at USA Hockey. USA Hockey staff members Jim Smith, Pat Kelleher, Tami Tranter and Katie Million will also be in attendance.

The trio of goaltenders on the U.S. National Junior team were all born 10 days apart. Dustin Wolf was born on April 16, 2001 in Gilroy, Calif. Spencer Knight was born three days later on April 19, 2001 in Darien, Conn. Ten days after the Wolf family celebrated the arrival of Dustin, Logan Stein was born on April 26, 2001 in Suwanee, Ga. Stein is the second Georgia-born goaltender to be named to the U.S. National Junior Team, after goaltender Jean-Marc Pelletier was named to the roster in 1998. Pelletier was born in Atlanta, Ga.

## **SEEING STARS**

The now infamous star-studded shirts were a Christmas gift from head coach Nate Neaman to all of the team staff and players. Players can be seen wearing the shirts under their Nike 80's inspired puffy jackets while walking into Rogers Place. Leaman also treated coaches prior to the tournament to matching red and blue shirts. Dustin Wolf came into the game 12 minutes into the middle frame, as the U.S. attack began to build momentum. John Farinacci put the Americans on the board before Trevor Zegras made the game 4-3 with his first career IIHF goal, assisted by York. In the games' final minute, the United States attempted to score a tying goal, but it was Russia who found the back of an empty net. Russia ended a five-game losing streak to the Americans.

# **ABOUT VANBIESBROUCK**

John Vanbiesbrouck is serving as general manager of the 2021 U.S. National Junior Team, marking his third straight season serving in the capacity including the 2019 silver-medal U.S. squad. The 2007 U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame inductee has previously represented the United States as a player on nine occasions, including one Olympic Winter Games (1998), two Canada Cups (1987, 1991), four men's world championships (1985, 1987, 1989, 1991) and two world junior championships (1982, 1983). A full-time employee of USA Hockey, Vanbiesbrouck began his duties as assistant executive director of hockey operations for USA Hockey on June 4, 2018. His responsibilities include oversight of all of USA Hockey's international efforts, including its men's, women's and sled programs as well as the National Junior Development Program.

### **ABOUT LEAMAN**

Learnan has been a part of two previous U.S. National Junior Team coaching staffs, including as an assistant coach for the bronze medal-winning 2007 squad that competed in Leksand and Mora, Sweden. He also served as an assistant coach for the 2009 team that played in Ottawa, Ontario. Leaman made his USA Hockey coaching debut as an assistant coach in 2005 at the IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship, where the U.S. won gold in Ceske Budejorke and Plzen, Czech Republic. The 2020-21 campaign is Leaman's ninth as head coach at Providence College, where his Friars have advanced to the Frozen Four on two occasions in the last five years. During his tenure at Providence, Leaman has coached 26 NHL Draft picks in addition to six undrafted players currently under NHL contract. He has also coached three players selected to play for the U.S. National Junior Team: Jon Gillies (2014, 2013), Erik Foley (2017), and Parker Ford (2020). Gillies and Foley were both part of gold-medal winning teams. Prior to Providence, Leaman spent eight seasons (2003-11) at the helm of the Union College men's ice hockey team.

# **BEST OF THE BEST**

Assistant coaches Ted Donato, Kris Mayotte and Steve Miller have an extensive NCAA resume, combining for more than 58 years of Division I coaching experience. The assistants have a combined nine international appearances with USA Hockey, including the 2017 gold-medal team in which Mayotte and Miller served as assistant coaches. Donato, making his USA Hockey coaching debut, was a member of Team USA in the 1992 Olympic Winter Games in Albertville, France. In addition, Donato played in three IIHF Men's World Championships, serving as captain in 1997 and also representing the U.S. at the event in 1999 and 2002. Ted's son Ryan Donato played on the bronze medal-winning 2016 U.S. National Junior Team, as well as the 2018 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team. Mayotte, Miller and Theresa Feaster all served on head coach Nate Leaman's staff when Providence won the 2015 NCAA championship.

# **2021 HOCKEY WEEK ACROSS AMERICA**

USA Hockey's yearly nationwide initiative Hockey Week Across America, now in its 14th year, will take place from Feb. 15-21, 2021. The daily themes will include salutes to players (Feb. 15), coaches (Feb. 16), officials (Feb. 17) and local rinks (Feb. 18) followed by the traditional themed days of Wear Your Favorite Hockey Jersey Day (Feb. 19), Try Hockey Day (Feb. 20) and Celebrate Local Hockey Heroes (Feb. 21). # 2020 U.S. HOCKEY HALL OF FAME INDUCTION

Dean Blais, Tony Granato, Jenny Potter and Jerry York were enshrined into the United States Hockey Hall of Fame as the Class of 2020. Blais (International Falls, Minn.) cut a wide trail of lofty accomplishments through every level of the game. He is one of America's most accomplished coaches, with his 40year career behind the bench highlighted by leading teams to signature moments at the high school, junior and collegiate levels as well as on the international stage. Granato (Downers Grove, III.) not only had an exceptional playing career, but since his playing days has continued to make positive contributions to hockey as a coach at the NHL, collegiate and international levels. Following his college career, Granato spent the 1987-88 season with the U.S. Men's National Team and ultimately represented the U.S. in the 1988 Olympic Winter Games, one of seven times he donned the red, white and blue as a player on the international stage. Potter (Edina, Minn.), a 14-time medalist on the international stage whose U.S. Women's National Team career spanned 15 seasons, is one of the most decorated players in the history of women's ice hockey in the United States. Highlighting her career were four appearances in the Olympic Winter Games, including helping Team USA to a gold medal at the 1998 Games in Nagano, Japan. She is one of only three U.S. women's players to compete in four Olympics. York (Watertown, Mass.) continues today to leave an impact on American hockey that will positively affect the game for generations to come. He enters his 27th season as head coach of the Boston College men's ice hockey program in 2020-21, and has guided the Eagles to four NCAA championships (2001, 2008, 2010, 2012), four national runnerup finishes, and 12 NCAA Frozen Four appearances. He is the NCAA's all-time leader in NCAA Tournament wins. In addition, York's teams have seized 11 Hockey East regular-season titles and nine Hockey East Tournament titles. Over the course of his BC coaching career, York has guided his teams to winning records in 22 of 26 seasons to date, including in 22 of the past 23 campaigns. He has coached two Hobey Baker Award winners and 18 NHL first round draft picks.

### MEMBERSHIP RELIEF FUND

### **YOUTH NATIONALS**

For the first time since 1938, USA Hockey was forced to cancel USA Hockey National Championships in 2020, due to the COVID-19 pandemic. However, USA Hockey continues to plan for the 2021 Youth National Championships, presented by Chipotle. Notable championship alumni include U.S. National Junior Team forward Arthur Kaliyev, Cammi Granato, Phil and Amanda Kessel, Kendall Coyne Schofield, Joe Pavelski, Troy Terry, and many more. Youth Tier I age groups include 14U, 15O, 16U and 18U, in addition to Youth Tier II and High School. Many players on this year's roster have competed in district and national championships previously in their careers.

# PLAYER DEVELOPMENT CAMPS

USA Hockey continues to utilize Player Development Camps in order to evaluate top talent across the nation. District camps allow for a diverse representation, coast to coast, of hockey players around the country. 24 of the 25 players on this year's U.S. National Junior Team attended at least one USA Hockey Player Development camp, with many playing in the Select-15 camp. Many top players from the S-15 camp go on to play for the U.S. National Team Development Program. Select camps also assist USA Hockey staff to evaluate national talent for international competition, including the Hlinka Gretzky Memorial Cup. Five players on this year's National Junior Team previously played in the 2018 Hlinka Gretzky Cup, which was hosted at Rogers Place in Edmonton, Alberta, and Red Deer, Alberta.

# **USA HOCKEY'S NATIONAL TEAM DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM**

Founded in 1996, USA Hockey's National Team Development Program began operations in Ann Arbor, Mich., and remained there until the summer of 2015. The full-time program is composed of two squads, the U.S. National Under-18 Team and U.S. National Under-17 Team, who compete in the USHL as well as against international and collegiate competition.

The Under-17 Team competes in the United States Hockey League and also participates in three international events annually. The U.S. National Under-18 Team's schedule includes games against NCAA Division I and III opponents, USHL teams as well as competition in three international tournaments.

# **USA HOCKEY ARENA**

USA Hockey Arena is a two-sheet facility with regulation ice (85x200) in the main arena and Olympic-size ice (100x200) for the secondary sheet. Acquired by the USA Hockey Foundation on April 1, 2015, the facility has added 20,000 square feet to the property that includes a 9,800-square-foot workout facility, additional offices and a conference center. In total, the facility encompasses 170,000 square feet with the main rink providing 3,504 seats for hockey games and 4,500 seats for other performances and events.
