The decal artwork includes stars floating towards the heavens with the Gaudreau name and the jersey numbers of Johnny (13) and Matthew (21).



RIVALRY SERIES, PRESENTED BY DISCOVER

One of the fiercest rivalries in all of sports returns as the U.S. Women's National Team and Canada face off in the 2024-25 Rivalry Series, presented by Discover. Slated for five games, the series opens up with three games in the United States in November, followed by the final two games of the series in February in Canada.

Established by USA Hockey and Hockey Canada during the 2018-2019 season, the Rivalry Series is an annual showcase of the highest level of women's hockey at varying locations in the United States and Canada.

LAST TIME OUT

Down 4-1 heading into the last six minutes of the game, Team USA tallied three unanswered goals, including the game-tying goal from Hilary Knight with just 1:26 remaining in regulation, to push the game to overtime tied 4-4. Despite a fast-paced overtime period, the game went to a shootout where Canada's Chloe Primerano recorded the game-winner in the fifth round to take the game 5-4. Gwyneth Philips made her USWNT debut in net recording six saves in one period of action for the U.S.

QUICK SHOTS

TONIGHT'S MATCH UP

Today's game marks the third game of the 2024-25 Rivalry Series, presented by Discover and is the third and final meeting of the November games of the series. The Rivalry Series will pick back up Feb. 6, 2025 for the final two games in Canada.

IN THE RIVALRY SERIES...

Started during the 2018-19 season by USA Hockey and Hockey Canada, the Rivalry Series is in its fifth season (2018-19, 2019-20, 2022-23, 2023-24), with the U.S. holding an all-time record of 9-3-4-7 (W-OTW-OTL-L) and a record of 5-1-1-0 in series games played in November. Friday's shootout loss marked the first U.S. loss in a Rivalry Series game played in the month of November.

THREE IN FIVE DAYS

Tonight's game marks the third game for the teams in five days. Game one was played on Wednesday (Nov. 6) in San Jose, California, while game two was played on Friday (Nov. 8) in Salt Lake City, Utah.

KNIGHT TALLIES TWO

Forward Hilary Knight scored two third-period goals, including the game-tying tally with 1:26 in regulation. While Knight is no stranger to the score sheet, it marked her first multi-goal game for the U.S. since recording a hat trick in a 6-3 victory over Canada in the gold medal game of the 2023 IIHF Women's World Championship.

TWO FOR ZUMWINKLE

Forward Grace Zumwinkle tallied two goals for Team USA in Friday's game in Salt Lake City. It marked Zumwinkle's first multi-goal game since tallying two goals in a 10-2 quarterfinals victory over Japan at the 2021 IIHF Women's World Championship on August 28, 2021.

RIVALRY SERIES LEADERS

Abbey Murphy (2G, 1A), Grace Zumwinkle (2G, 1A), Savannah Harmon (1G, 2A) and Tessa Janecke (3A) lead all Rivalry Series skaters with three points. Murphy, Zumwinkle, Hilary Knight and Lacey Eden also lead the series with two goals each.

WELCOME TO IDAHO

Tonight's game is taking place at Idaho Central Arena, home of the Idaho Steelheads, the ECHL affiliate of the Dallas Stars. The arena is in the heart of downtown Boise, Idaho, and first opened in 1997. The capacity for a hockey game is 5,002, which is what the anticipated attendance for game three will be as the game sold out when tickets went on sale in late summer.

CLOSE TO HOME

Forward Hilary Knight is from Sun Valley, Idaho, just 154 miles from Idaho Central Arena and just under a 2.5 hour drive. Her family and many supporters from her hometown are expected to be in attendance.

The 2024-25 U.S. Women's National Team features 27 players, 16 forwards, eight defenders and three goaltenders, and features 24 returners from the team that competed at the 2024 IIHF Women's World Championship. **Gabbie Hughes**, **Casey O'Brien** and **Ally Simpson** all return to the Team USA roster after competing for the U.S. during the 2023-24 Rivalry Series.

Hilary Knight (Sun Valley, Idaho) is the captain of Team USA for the 2024-25 Rivalry Series. **Alex Carpenter** (North Reading, Mass.) and **Megan Keller** (Farmington Hills, Mich.) are serving as alternate captains.

BEHIND THE BENCH

John Wroblewski is the head coach of the 2024-25 U.S. Women's National Team. **Shari Dickerman**, **Brent Hill** and **Josh Sciba** are serving as assistant coaches, while **Alli Altmann** is the team's goaltending coach.

2024 WOMEN'S WORLDS RETURNEES

The November Rivalry Series roster returns 24 players from the 2024 edition of the team that took home silver at the IIHF Women's World Championship in April 2024. Returners include Cayla Barnes, Hannah Bilka, Alex Carpenter, Kendall Coyne Schofield, Britta Curl-Salemme, Joy Dunne, Lacey Eden, Laila Edwards, Aerin Frankel, Rory Guilday, Savannah Harmon, Caroline Harvey, Taylor Heise, Nicole Hensley, Tessa Janecke, Megan Keller, Hilary Knight, Abbey Murphy, Kelly Pannek, Gwyneth Philips, Hayley Scamurra, Kirsten Simms, Haley Winn and Grace Zumwinkle.

2022 U.S. OLYMPIC TEAM RETURNEES

In total, 12 players on the November roster of the Rivalry Series were members of the 2022 U.S. Olympic Team that took home silver in Beijing in February 2022. Olympians include, Cayla Barnes, Alex Carpenter, Kendall Coyne Schofield, Savannah Harmon, Caroline Harvey, Nicole Hensley, Megan Keller, Hilary Knight, Abbey Murphy, Kelly Pannek, Hayley Scamurra and Grace Zumwinkle.

PATTY KAZMAIER MEMORIAL AWARD HONOREES

Four members of the team have been honored with the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, bestowed annually to the best women's player in NCAA Division I college hockey: **Taylor Heise** (2022), **Aerin Frankel** (2021), **Kendall Coyne Schofield** (2016) and **Alex Carpenter** (2015).

COLLEGE CONNECTION

All 27 athletes on the Team USA roster are competing or have competed as women's hockey student-athletes at a U.S. college or university. The University of Wisconsin leads the way with seven players, while Northeastern University and the University of Minnesota have four players. Ohio State boasts three players and Clarkson and Colgate have two, while Cornell, Lindenwood, Penn State and the University of Minnesota Duluth all have one.

U18 WOMEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP ALUMNI

All but six of the 27 players on the roster represented the U.S. at an IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship. Most recently, Joy Dunne was the captain of the 2023 team that took home bronze. Six players - Caroline Harvey, Rory Guilday, Haley Winn, Lacey Eden, Kirsten Simms and Abbey Murphy - from the 2020 gold medal-winning team are on the current U.S. Women's National Team roster.

PWHL REPRESENTATION

Of the 27 players representing Team USA, 17 play professionally for the Professional Women's Hockey League. Heading into its second season, the U.S. Women's National Team has players representing five teams, with six players on the Minnesota Frost, four players on the Boston Fleet and Ottawa Charge, two players on the New York Sirens and one player on the Montreal Victorie. Team USA assistant coach Josh Sciba is also in his first season as an assistant coach for the New York Sirens.

LIFE UPDATES FROM THE U.S. WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM

Forward Britta Curl-Salemme got married in September to Andrew Salemme. The pair met in 2020 on the campus of the University of Wisconsin where Andrew was a wrestling student-athlete... Defender Savannah Harmon got engaged in May to fiancée Devin Brosseau. The pair met at Clarkson University, where both played hockey in college... Forward Taylor Heise purchased her first house in St. Paul, Minnesota this summer. Word on the street is that Heise is an expert interior decorator... Forward Hilary Knight also purchased a house in Salt Lake City, where she will now spend her offseason training... Lacey Eden and her mother went to see Taylor Swift during the Eras Tour shows in Paris in May at La Defense Arena, where the Olympic swimming competition took place just a month later.

U.S. WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM ALUMNI EARN HALL OF FAME NODS

Three of the most prolific players in Team USA history will be honored with the highest honor in the sport this winter. Three-time Olympian Natalie Darwitz and two-time Olympian Krissy Wendell-Pohl are being inducted into the Hockey Hall of Fame in Toronto in mid-November, while three-time Olympian Brianna Decker will be inducted into the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame in December.

AROUND USA HOCKEY

GIRLS AND WOMEN'S HOCKEY CONTINUES GROWTH IN U.S.

Girls and women's hockey continues to grow in the United States, with 93,610 registered girls and women's players during the 2023-24 season. This marks a 39 percent increase from a decade ago in 2013-14 (67,230). Additionally, 73,083 youth girls players laced up the skates last season, a 47 percent increase from ten years prior (49,587).

2025 U.S. UNDER-18 WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM

A selection camp was held October 29-31 in Blaine, Minnesota to help select the 25-player roster that will compete at the 2025 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship being held in Vantaa, Finland from January 4-12, 2025. The full roster is slated to be announced on November 13.

TEAM USA SLATED TO COMPETE AT 6 NATIONS TOURNAMENT

Team USA is preparing to compete in the 6 National Tournament in Tampere, Finland from December 11-15, 2024. The U.S. will bring a roster comprised of college-aged players to face off against teams from Canada, Finland, Sweden, Czechia and Switzerland.

2024-25 U.S. WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM STAFF



JOHN WROBLEWSKI, HEAD COACH

John Wroblewski is serving as the head coach of the U.S. Women's National Team for the 2024-25 season after leading Team USA to a gold medal at the 2023 IIHF Women's World Championship and silver at the 2022 WWC and 2024 WWC.

Wroblewski joined the U.S. Women's National Team following two years (2020-22) as the head coach of the Ontario (Calif.) Reign, the AHL affiliate of the LA Kings, and four seasons (2016-20) as the bench boss of the USA Hockey National Team Development Program.

Over his four years with the NTDP, the program reached its first USHL playoff berth since 2012 and finished top-three in all 12 international tournaments played. He led his team to 33-consecutive international victories from 2016-18, and also oversaw the development of 29 NHL Draft picks, including Jack Hughes, who was selected first overall by the New Jersey Devils in 2019.

At the IIHF level, Wroblewski guided the U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team twice, resulting in a gold in 2017 and bronze in 2019.

The Neenah, Wisconsin, native began his coaching career as an intern assistant coach with the NTDP and was promoted to a full-time assistant coach the following season, a position he held from 2008-10.

Wroblewski, a player on the inaugural NTDP roster in 1997, skated four years with the University of Notre Dame (1999-2003). He went on to play four years (2003-07) professionally with the ECHL's Fresno Falcons, recording 125 points (65-60) in 273 career games.

ASSISTANT COACHES

SHARI DICKERMAN, ASSISTANT COACH

Shari Dickerman is returning as an assistant coach for the U.S. Women's National Team during the 2024-25 season, after serving in the same capacity since the 2022-23 season.

Dickerman, who is in her first season as head coach at Minnesota State University, previously served as assistant coach of the 2022 U.S. Collegiate Women's Select Team, that competed at the 2022 Collegiate Series against Canada in August. Prior to her appointment to the USA Hockey staff, Dickerman served as an evaluator at numerous USA Hockey camps.

A member of the Mavericks staff since 2009, Dickerman has helped lead Minnesota State for the last 15 seasons and was named head coach in March 2024.

As a player, Dickerman was an All-American goaltender for the Mavericks.

BRENT HILL, ASSISTANT COACH

Brent Hill is returning as an assistant coach for the U.S. Women's National Team during the 2023-24 season, after serving in the same capacity since the 2022-23 season.

Hill is currently serving as an assistant coach of the Quinnipiac Women's Ice Hockey team, a role he's held for the last two seasons.

Hill was on the bench as an assistant coach for the 2015 U.S. Under-18 Women's World Championship, leading the squad to a gold medal at the 2015 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship.

Prior to Quinnipiac, Hill spent four seasons at the helm of Bishop Kearny Selects Academy, following a season as an assistant coach at Merrimack University and four seasons as an assistant coach at RPI.

JOSH SCIBA, ASSISTANT COACH

Josh Sciba is reprising his role on the U.S. Women's National Team staff during the 2023-24 season, after serving in the same capacity since the 2022-23 season.

As an assistant coach, Sciba helped lead the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team to a gold medal at the 2022 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship, after serving in the same capacity for the 2019 U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team.

Sciba is in his first season as assistant coach for the New York Sirens, following a six-year stint as head coach of Union College.

As a player, Sciba was a member of the USA Hockey National Team Development Program from 2001-03, prior to playing four years at the University of Notre Dame.

ALLI ALTMANN, GOALTENDING COACH

Alli Altmann returns as the goaltending coach of the U.S. Women's National Team after serving on the U.S. Women's National Team staff for the last four seasons (2021-2024).

Altmann also guided the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team for four seasons, having served in the goaltending coach role from 2017-22. She guided the U.S. to two golds and two silvers during that time.

Altmann is currently the co-owner and vice president of DEVENIR Goaltenders. She played four seasons for Minnesota State University, recording a career .901 save percentage.
