TODAY'S GAME

The U.S. meets Germany in the bronze-medal game here at the 2021 IIHF Men's World Championship. All-time, the U.S. is 12-0-1-4-3 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) in 20 meetings against Germany. It is the second meeting between the two teams after a preliminary-round 2-0 win for Team USA on May 31. **Cal Petersen**, who earned U.S. Player of the Game honors, put forth a 33-save shutout performance while **Jason Robertson** converted on a U.S. powerplay and **Colin Blackwell** added an empty-netter tally to secure the win for the United States.

TEAM USA'S ALL-TIME MEN'S WORLD MEDALS

A win today would give the U.S. its 13th tournament medal after earning gold once (1933), silver four times (1950, 1939, 1934, 1931) and bronze seven times (2018, 2015, 2013, 2004, 1996, 1952, 1949). Of Team USA's seven bronze medals, five were claimed by winning bronze-medal games while two came via tournament standings and round-robin play.

U.S. BRONZE-MEDAL GAME APPEARANCES

The U.S. is 5-4 in nine previous bronze-medal games in the IIHF Men's World Championship. The IIHF has used various formats over its history, including round robin, double round robin and round-robin medal play among the most common. All-time, the United States has claimed seven bronze medals in the world championship. Of those six, two have come by virtue of the medal being determined by standings.

QUICK HITS

Defenseman **Matt Roy** (upper body) and forward **Matty Beniers** (lower body) are both listed as day-to-day ... The U.S. is 9-1-0-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L) on the second night of back-to-backs in IIHF Men's World Championship play dating back to 2016 ... Yesterday's 4-2 loss was the first this tournament in which the U.S. allowed more than two goals ... Team USA's eight goals allowed in the preliminary-round is the fewest by a U.S. entry in group play and tied for third-fewest by any team since the tournament format change in 2012 ... In attendance here today are USA Hockey representatives **Dave Ogrean** (former executive director), **Ron DeGregorio** (former president) and **Gavin Regan** (vice president, international) who are here in Latvia for IIHF meetings.

GARLAND, JONES AND PETERSEN TABBED TOP 3 U.S. PLAYERS

Following Team USA's semifinal loss to Canada, the IIHF announced that forward **Conor Garland** (Scituate, Mass.), defenseman **Zac Jones** (Glen Allen, Va.) and goaltender **Cal Petersen** (Waterloo, Iowa) were tabbed Team USA's top three players of the tournament, as named by the team's staff.

Through nine games, Garland leads the U.S. in goals (5), assists (5) and points (10). Following his two-goal effort against Italy in the preliminary-round, he was tabbed the U.S. Player of the Game. Jones registered three points -- all assists -- while lead the team in time-on-ice averaging 20:21 through nine games. Petersen ranks second in the tournament in save percentage (.949), goals-against-average (1.34) and is one of two goaltenders with two shutouts. In the preliminary-round, he registered two shutouts (3-0 vs. KAZ; 2-0 vs. GER) while accumulating a total of 51 shots between the two games, including 33 in the Germany win alone. He is currently 4-2 in his six starts.

TEAM USA IN RECENT BACK-TO-BACKS AT MEN'S WORLDS

Today closes the 12th set of back-to-backs in tournament play for Team USA dating back to 2016. Including last night's loss to Canada, the U.S. has accumulated a 15-2-0-5 (W-OTW-OTL-L) overall record in back-to-back series. Entering tonight, the U.S. is 9-1-0-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L) on the second night of back-to-backs.

Three of Team USA's back-to-backs has featured a game against Germany, including today's game. In the previous two meetings, the U.S. edged Germany, 3-1, in the 2019 IIHF Men's World Championship on the second-night and earlier this year, the U.S. topped Germany, 2-0, in the first night of a back-to-back.

BATTLING THROUGH INJURIES

In Team USA's quarterfinal win, both **Matt Roy** (upper body) and **Matty Beniers** (lower body) left the game due to injury. Listed as day-to-day, they become the fourth and fifth U.S. players to miss games due to injury after **Anthony Stolarz** (lower body suffered vs. Canada), **Tage Thompson** (upper body) and captain **Justin Abdelkader** (lower body suffered vs. Germany). Stolarz, who returned to the U.S. for additional treatment and evaluation, has missed seven games, Abdelkader will be missing his fourth-straight game and both Roy and Beniers are missing their first due to injury. also missed two games earlier in the tournament.

USA-GERMANY CONNECTIONS

Today's game will feature a few current/future teammate connections between the U.S. and Germany.

In addition to the above-mentioned connections, the four LA Kings players (**Trevor Moore, Cal Petersen, Matt Roy** and **Christian Wolanin**) skating for Team USA are coached during the season by **Marco Sturm**, assistant coach with the Kings. Sturm, a 14-year NHL veteran, served as head coach for Germany at the 2016 and 2017 IIHF Men's World Championships before serving in the same capacity for the German entry that claimed a surprising silver medal at the 2018 Winter Olympic Games.

Lastly, Team USA's massage therapist, **PeeWee Willmann**, is a native of Hanover, Germany. The 2021 IIHF Men's World Championship is the 11th time (2009-11, 2013-19, 2021) he is serving on a U.S. Men's National Team. In February of 2018, Willmann served as the massage therapist for the 2018 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team. Willmann was the massage therapist for the 2011 U.S. National Junior Team that captured the bronze medal on home ice in Buffalo, N.Y., as well as seven U.S. Men's Select Teams (2002-05, 2007, 2009, 2015, 2017) that have competed in the Deutschland Cup. Willmann has worked with the Hannover Scorpions Hockey Club since 2002 and runs a physical therapy center in Hannover, Germany, where he resides.

RECAPING GROUP B PLAY

Following its tournament-opening 2-1 defeat to Finland, the U.S. claimed six-straight regulation wins. It is the third time ever the U.S. has won six-straight in a Men's World Championship (1990, 2017). With overtimes and shootouts, the U.S. also won six preliminary-round games in 2015 and 2018. The most wins a U.S. team has ever earned in a single IIHF Men's World Championship is eight, when the U.S. squads did so in 2015 (7 regulation, 1 OT) and 2018 (6 regulation, 2 OT). Over the past nine tournaments, the U.S. has finished second or better in group play five times (1st - 2015, 2017, 2021; 2nd - 2012, 2014, 2018).

FROM PAST GAME NOTES (THROUGH JUNE 4)

On June 1, USA Hockey announced that U.S. captain **Justin Abdelkader** (Muskegon, Mich.) will miss the remainder of the tournament due to a lower-body injury sustained during the second period of Team USA's 2-0 win over Germany. In addition, forward **Brian Boyle** (Hingham, Mass.) has been tabbed captain of Team USA for the remainder of the tournament alongside alternate captains **Matt Roy** (Detroit, Mich.) and **Colin Blackwell** (North Andover, Mass.) ... In terms of NHL experience, the 27-player U.S. roster has a total 3,672 of NHL games while five players have yet to make their NHL debuts. Of those games, **Brian Boyle** (805 GP) and **Justin Abdelkader** (739 GP) account for 1,544 of those games ... Team USA's eight goals allowed in preliminary-round play establishes a new U.S. record for the current tournament format (set in 2012), besting the previous total of 14 (2015, 2017) ... June 1 marked the first tournament gameday with fans in the building as Arena Riga (2,660) and Olympic Sports Center (1,058) will be able to have limited fans ... On May 31, the U.S. took its team photo in their white jerseys ... Coincidentally, both **Cal Petersen** and **Jake Oettinger** wore letters in their final collegiate seasons, as Petersen captained Notre Dame while Oettinger served as an alternate captain for Boston University ... In addition to coaches **Jack Capuano**, **Nate Leaman** and **Adam Nightingale**, Team USA's staff on the bench include athletic trainers **Stan Wong** (USA Hockey) and **Piet VanZant** (Detroit Red Wings) and equipment managers **Dana Bryson** (LA Kings) and **Jamie Healy** (Columbus Blue Jackets). Off the bench are athletic trainer/compliance officer **Jason Hodges** (USA Hockey's NTDP), equipment/team leader **Scott Aldrich** (USA Hockey), massage therapist **PeeWee Willman** (USA Hockey) and team physician **Dr. Doug Weiss** (USA Hockey) ... The U.S. support staff features several members associated with USA Hockey on a recurring basis, including **Scott Aldrich**, **Jason Hodges**, team physician **Dr. Doug Weiss**, and **PeeWee Willman** ... **Jason Robertson** and **Sasha Chmelevski** are international teammates for the second time (2019 IIHF World Junior Championship; silver) after once playing together on youth hockey teams in both California and Michigan ... From Scituate, Mass., U.S. forwards **Conor Garland** and **Ryan Donato** once skated together before now doing so here again in Riga.

FROM PAST GAME NOTES (THROUGH MAY 25)

Brian Boyle (36) and **Matty Beniers** (18), the oldest and youngest players on Team USA, both hail from Hingham, Mass., and scored in the 4-2 over Latvia ... The U.S. has 12 sets of former/current club teammates who have reunited here in Latvia with Team USA, including three with Columbus Blue Jackets (3), University of Connecticut (2), Detroit Red Wings (3), Harvard (3), LA Kings (6), N.Y. Rangers (3), Ottawa Senators (3), San Jose Sharks (3), Tucson Roadrunners (2), Youth hockey (Mass.) (2), Youth hockey (Calif./Mich.) (2) ... Defenseman **Chris Wideman** and forward **Sasha Chmelevski** coincidentally use the exact same stick blade ... On May 24, Team USA took an IIHF-approved excursion to Jurmala Dune (White Dune) ... **Kevin Rooney** celebrated his 28th birthday on May 21 here in Riga ... In a team meeting on May 21, head coach **Jack Capuano** announced that **Justin Abdelkader** (Muskegon, Mich.) will captain Team USA while **Matt Roy** and **Colin Blackwell** (North Andover, Mass.) will serve as alternate captains ... Team USA has a 27-player roster (14 forwards, nine defenseman, four goaltenders). The roster features just 3 first-round selections, followed by 7 second-rounders, 1 third-round, 3 fourth-rounders, 2 fifth-rounders, 2 sixth-rounders, 3 seventh-rounders and 5 undrafted players. In addition, one player has yet to be drafted, but is expected to be a first-round selection in this year's NHL Draft ... Players on this year's team have accounted for 18 total medals in world championship play, including seven gold medals ... The roster has an average age of 26, making it the oldest U.S. entry in an IIHF Men's World Championship since 2004 and 2005, when Team USA's average age was 27.6 and 28.1, respectively ... At 18 years, 6 months, of age, **Matty Beniers** is the fourth-youngest player to dress for the U.S. in an IIHF Men's World Championship ... Over the last five world championships, the U.S. has registered a 27-5-1-13 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record while earning four top-five finishes (2019-7th, 2018-bronze, 2017-fifth, 2016-4th, 2015-bronze). Team USA's eight wins in 2018 tied for the best-ever by a U.S. team in a single world championship while the team's 12-2-0-2 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record between the 2017 and 2018 events was its best-ever stretch in tournament history ... Team USA's host here in Latvia, **Georgijs Pujacs**, is a three-time Olympian who skated for the Latvian National Ice Hockey Team in the 2006, 2010 and 2014 Olympic Winter Games.
