
DANIEL AND CHELSEY HARTNETT

FOUNDATION HIGHLIGHTS

THE BRIANNA DECKER ENDOWMENT FUND

The Brianna Decker Endowment Fund for Girls Hockey was established in 2019 to benefit 8U and 10U girls hockey programs within Brianna's home state of Wisconsin. Due to the program's growth and popularity, the endowment was expanded nationwide during the 2021-22 season with four USA Hockey associations selected as recipients to help grow their girls hockey programs. Those associations include: Marshfield Youth Hockey Association (Marshfield, Mass.), Palouse Youth Hockey Association (Moscow, Idaho), San Jose Jr. Sharks (San Jose, Calif.) and Winthrop Youth Hockey Association (Winthrop, Mass.). Decker celebrated with two of the grant award winning associations at a special event at the Hobomock Rink in Pembroke, Mass., where she engaged the teams with a special meet and greet, autographs and a surprise visit from Blades the Bruin, the Boston Bruins' mascot.



GIRLS HOCKEY DAY

The Boston Bruins hosted Girls Hockey Day with Wasabi Technologies to promote growth, encourage participation and celebrate girls hockey. Alex Carpenter and Caroline Harvey from the 2022 U.S. Olympic Women's Hockey Team helped facilitate the day and through their efforts, \$10,000 was donated to the Brianna Decker Endowment Fund.

THE ASPENTECH FUND

The AspenTech Fund awards grants to youth hockey players residing in the eastern Massachusetts towns of Bedford, Billerica, Burlington, Chelmsford, Concord, Lawrence,

Lexington, Lowell and Woburn. During the 2021-22 season, \$4,500 was awarded to nine youth players in Massachusetts. The funding they received helped keep these youth players enjoying the sport they love.

DISABLED HOCKEY FUND

The USA Hockey Foundation launched a fundraiser to help raise funds for the Disabled Hockey Fund during the 2022 USA Hockey Disabled Festival held in April 2022 in Pittsburgh, Pa. USA Hockey-branded dog bandanas were distributed to the service dogs at the festival and those who donated to the Disabled Hockey Fund received a bandana for their furry friends.

HOCKEY HISPANA FUND

The Hockey Hispana Fund was established in 2021 by Jimmy Dawson and his family to benefit 8U and 10U Latina youth hockey players in Colorado. For the 2022 season, grant awards were distributed to two deserving grant recipients. The grants included covering hockey registration fees for the season, as well as assistance toward their hockey equipment.

JIM JOHANNSON LEGACY FUND

The Jim Johannson College Hockey Player of the Year Award winner, Minnesota State University's Dryden McKay, selected the Mankato Area Hockey Association as the recipient of a \$5,000 grant award from the Jim Johannson Legacy Fund to help enhance youth hockey. This is the fourth season the grant has been awarded.

U.S. HOCKEY HALL OF FAME

The U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Class of 2020: Dean Blais, Tony Granato, Jenny Potter and Jerry York; and Class of 2021: Stan Fischler, Paul Holmgren and Peter McNab were formally enshrined in a formal celebration at the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony held in Denver on December 9, 2021. In addition, Lynn Olson (2020) and Jack Barzee (2021) were honored with the Lester Patrick Trophy, presented by the NHL for outstanding service to hockey in the United States.



RAISE THE FLAG CAMPAIGN

Paving the way for our athletes' success at the highest level holds a special place in our hearts. With this goal in mind, The USA Hockey Foundation launched the Raise The Flag campaign in 2019. The campaign provided critical funds to the U.S. Men's, Women's, and Sled National Team programs in preparation for the 2022 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games and our USA Hockey Arena in Michigan.

Thanks to our generous donors over the past three years, The Foundation raised substantial funds that supported the costs of essential training camps, tournaments, travel, insurance, stipends, and maintaining the USA Hockey Arena.

The campaign's culmination was celebrated during a beautiful summer weekend in Boston at The USA Hockey Foundation's Boston Harbor Cruise and Golf Classic. The weekend kicked off aboard the Music City Queen

Riverboat with 167 hockey supporters to commemorate the campaign, connect with new and old friends, and celebrate our love for the game while enjoying a beautiful Boston Harbor sunset. The Raise The Flag campaign received one final hurrah at the Salem Country Club during the 2022 USA Hockey Foundation Golf Classic. We enjoyed a magnificent day of golf and wonderful dinner together celebrating our 2022 Olympic and Paralympic Teams. Both of these special events were made possible thanks in part to the generosity of Ray and Michelle Jacques and New England Schooner.

OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES

WITH MERV LAPIN



Merv Lapin, a long-time supporter of USA Hockey and the women's national team program, was the team leader for the 2022 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team in Beijing, China, and USA Hockey benefited from his immense knowledge of the Chinese culture and the Mandarin language. Merv, who is a long-time resident of Vail, Colorado, began visiting China in 1979 and lived there for three years, working for the Jilin Sport Committee. He has made more than 50 trips to China, coaching hockey and setting up youth programs. In addition, from 1985-2022, he has taken over 1,000 youth to play hockey in China, Russia, Czechia, Poland, Finland, Hungary, Sweden, Estonia and Slovakia. Below Merv shares thoughts from his experience at the 2022 Olympic Winter Games.

Being selected as team leader for the Olympics was the thrill of a lifetime, despite the challenges associated with COVID-19.

To enter China for the Games – everyone had to take four pass or fail COVID tests – three before leaving the U.S. and one when you arrived to the Beijing airport. After that, there were required daily tests – the kind where they stick a swab halfway down your throat. Needless to say, it's not the way you looked forward to starting every day for three straight weeks.

Although Beijing was not locked down itself – the Olympics were – with what was called a "closed loop system." The team and staff were not allowed to go outside of our venue, sleeping/eating quarters or transportation system. No touring, shopping, eating, in Beijing outside of our closed loop. No parents or fans from outside of Beijing were allowed. Because of that, my responsibilities as team leader were a lot less demanding and I mainly helped with translation, food, and transportation issues.

For me it was an exhilarating experience. I had the pleasure to be in and around the best athletes in the world as they chased the dream of Olympic gold. There's nothing like the Olympic Games, even in the midst of a pandemic.

The athletes and a few staff members stayed in the Olympic Village, but there wasn't room for everyone. So along with many other staff members, I stayed in a hotel during the Games. I must say, it was a really nice hotel on the outskirts of the city, and along with staff from our women's and men's Olympic Team, it was also home to the U.S. Olympic and Paralympic Committee staff that was managing the overall U.S. delegation at the Games, as well as staff from a few other countries.

Overall, the Chinese Olympic Committee did a first-class job of organizing and pulling off all the events in excellent facilities. The opening and closing ceremonies were terrific. There were 18,000 volunteers, enthusiastic to help an expected 500,000 spectators, but due to COVID restrictions, the number of fans was greatly reduced.

Over my lifetime, hockey in our country has continued to grow and get better, and today every time one of our teams competes internationally, we're in contention for the gold medal.

It was a privilege to watch both of our teams play and share in their Olympic journey. We have wonderful athletes and staff, and again, there is absolutely nothing like the Olympics. I was honored to play a small role as the team leader for the women's team and am most thankful for the wonderful opportunity.

Donna Lotzer has been a hockey fan for her entire life. She was born into a hockey family and grew up going to University of Wisconsin men's hockey games with her dad, uncles, and cousins. When women's hockey began at Wisconsin, she went to those games too and it was there she decided that she enjoyed the women's enthusiasm and attitude of playing for the sake of the game, most. Her next love for the game began in 2014 when she watched the U.S. Sled Hockey Team defeat the Russians in the Paralympic Games to win a gold medal for the U.S. From there, she was able to witness the sport in person when they came to play in Madison. Donna was blown away with how well the sled team played. Once she discovered there was a U.S. Women's Sled Development Team, her passion and enthusiasm ignited even higher. Upon learning the women are currently a development program, her mission has become helping the

program evolve to a National Team that one day has the

opportunity to participate in the Paralympics. Her current gifts are made through recurring monthly donations where she simply wants to be able help support these ladies who are inspired to play this sport. Through Donna's compassionate intentions, she has listed The USA Hockey Foundation as the sole beneficiary of an annuity that will provide our women's sled development team important additional resources. Donna hopes sharing her story will provide awareness and inspire others to provide support through making a planned gift.

JIMMY DAWSON

Jimmy Dawson loves the game of hockey and wants to see more people get a chance to play. Jimmy grew up near Chicago and played hockey as a child. He spent time in Texas before later moving his family and business to Pueblo, Colorado, in 2005. He rediscovered his love for hockey at a small rink in downtown Pueblo some 40 years after playing as a kid. To this day he still plays pick-up games at the small local rink, which has since undergone renovations, including new boards, glass and locker rooms,

among other upgrades. He also served as an assistant coach on his daughter's 19U Colorado Springs team during the 2016-17 season. "There's a special spot in my heart for girls' hockey," Dawson said. "I love the camaraderie of the players in the room." His daughter's team was a history-making group that still carries significance for Dawson, as the group won the Colorado state championship and also the regional title.

That earned Dawson's group a trip to the national championships in Michigan that year. "The biggest joy I ever had was helping to coach those girls to a state championship, and then a regional championship, and then on to nationals," Dawson said. "We watched them emerge as a team and my daughter still plays. Her love for the game has never waned. Once you play hockey, it's in your blood."

Dawson wanted to establish a legacy for years to come, so he helped create The USA Hockey Foundation's Hockey Hispana Fund. The fund was started in 2021 to make the sport of hockey more inclusive for Latina youth hockey players. The USA Hockey Foundation helps facilitate the Hockey Hispana Fund, which provides grant awards to 8U and 10U girls hockey players who are registered with USA Hockey associations in Colorado.

"Hockey is the greatest sport on earth, but it can be pretty expensive, so I wanted to set aside a trust," Dawson said. "It's worth investing in and is a great cause."

The USA Hockey Foundation is fortunate to have legacy donors like Donna Lotzer and Jimmy Dawson who choose to make an impact on our sport for generations to come.

THE USA HOCKEY FOUNDATION BOARD ROOM

The USA Hockey Foundation is excited to introduce three new independent members to its board of directors. Stan E. Hubbard, Ellen Weinberg-Hughes and Bryant McBride offer plenty of talent to The Foundation. While bringing unique backgrounds and perspectives to the table, the three new members of The USA Hockey Foundation Board of Directors share one thing for certain — their undying love for the game.

Stan E. Hubbard is CEO of REELZ, a leading independent cable and satellite general entertainment network. He is also chairman and CEO of Hubbard Media Group, a subsidiary of Hubbard Broadcasting, Inc. A

Minneapolis-St. Paul native, Hubbard played hockey from youth through juniors. He is a University of Minnesota graduate.

"I've been involved with hockey my whole life, and certainly all my adult life I've tried to give back to the game,"
Hubbard said. "This is another opportunity to give back a little more."

He and his family own and operate the Outpost Ice Arena and the New Mexico Ice Wolves NAHL and NA3HL hockey teams.

"I'm hoping I can bring a little perspective and think I can bring additional business sense [to the Board]."

"It's really two different views of the hockey world, and I'm hoping I can bring a little perspective and think I can bring additional business sense," Hubbard said.

Hubbard's children continue to play hockey. "I have a son playing juniors in the NA3HL, and I have a son that plays sled hockey, and I have a first-year bantam," he said. "I'm still involved as a pretty active hockey parent, too."



Ellen Weinberg-Hughes brings significant hockey experience from multiple angles, including as a top-level player, as a coach, through her work in the media, as a consultant, and as a parent of three sons, all high-level hockey players.

Weinberg-Hughes helped the U.S. to the silver medal as an alternate captain on the U.S. Women's National Team at the 1992 IIHF Women's World Championship after an outstanding collegiate career at the University of New Hampshire where she helped the Wildcats to three ECAC championships.

While pursuing a graduate degree at UNH, she served as assistant coach for the women's hockey team and she was also an advisor to the Norway women's hockey team in 1994.

Weinberg-Hughes then went on to a successful sports broadcasting career that included covering women's hockey for the CBC at the Olympic Winter Games Nagano 1998.

Weinberg-Hughes is married to Jim Hughes, who played hockey at Providence College and coached in the college and professional ranks. Their three sons are all exceptional players: Quinn is with the Vancouver Canucks; Jack, the No. 1 pick in the 2019 NHL Draft, plays for the New Jersey Devils; and Luke skates with the University of Michigan and was selected fourth overall in the 2021 NHL Draft by the Devils.

"Two generations of my family have benefited from USA Hockey," Weinberg-Hughes said. "I am honored to join an organization that has accomplished so much and am excited to give back to an organization that has given so much to me and my family."

Weinberg-Hughes said she hopes to apply her ability to connect with people.

"I think, through this great game, I've met so many interesting people from all walks of life," she said. "I'd like to think that by being part of the Board, I can reach out to them and use my connections to continue to grow this great game and support everybody's efforts."

Bryant McBride said he was excited to join the board and be part of the sport's growth. "I'm very excited about it because there's so much opportunity to be had. The game is evolving," McBride said. "The game is becoming more inclusive

and more diverse, and I'm excited to play a part in that. As much as it is growing, I think there is amazing potential for upside, for further growth," he said. "I'm just so bullish on what this game does for kids and families. To contribute to that a little bit is a real honor."

A successful entrepreneur throughout his career, McBride is currently cofounder and CEO of Burst.com. He became the NHL's first Black executive when he served as the league's vice president of business development from 1991-2000.

McBride helped create the NHL/USA Hockey Diversity Task Force, now known as Hockey is for Everyone. In 2019, he produced the award-winning documentary "Willie" about Willie O'Ree, the NHL's first Black player.

An all-conference hockey player at Trinity College, McBride has maintained close ties to the game. "I hope to bring a lot of experience, a lot of lived experience, first and foremost as a player, now as a [hockey] dad, as an administrator in USA Hockey for many, many years," McBride said, "and as someone who cares deeply about the game, who wants to see the game flourish and get to the next level and include everyone."

"I'm all about inclusion. It really matters. The majority of people in North America by 2044 will be visible minorities. It is our duty to get ahead of that for the growth and well-being of this sport. We have to make everyone feel welcome. It's imperative," McBride said.

With the Olympic and Paralympic Games taking place during the 2021-22 season, three NHL clubs further solidified their support of USA Hockey in preparation for the Games. The Florida Panthers, Minnesota Wild and Tampa Bay Lightning each contributed to the 'Raise the Flag' campaign, which provided the necessary support for the U.S. Men's, Women's and Sled National Teams as they prepared and worked towards bringing home gold medals from Beijing.

Minnesota Wild Owner/Governor, Craig Leipold, a champion for USA Hockey, currently sits on The USA Hockey Foundation's Board of Directors.

GRANT PROGRAM

The USA Hockey Foundation supports numerous efforts each year to help advance programs and initiatives connected with USA Hockey as well as support USA Hockey's Affiliate organizations around the country.

AFFILIATE BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM

The Affiliate Block Grant program was established to return a percentage of the player registration fees back to our local affiliates in order to help them advance the game in their respective areas. The grant funds are used for a wide variety of initiatives, but specifically 25% of the funds are used for growth initiatives and 15% for diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives to positively grow and affect the sport of hockey.
