EXECUTIVE CORNER

In my October article I like to take the opportunity to emphasize the value of participating in extracurricular activities and how relatively inexpensive it is for schools to provide these invaluable programs. I know quite a few of you have seen this information many times, however after looking through the Directory of Schools, we have several new administrators at our member schools this year. Hopefully this information can be shared again with the relevant groups by both our veteran and new administrators. Every day in Montana, thousands of high school students are practicing and competing in various high school activities. This fall we have students practicing/participating in football, volleyball, cross country, golf, speech and debate, music (band, orchestra and chorus, soccer and cheerleading/dance (spirit). We all realize the value of participating in these activities, however it wouldn't hurt to share the many specific positive reasons for participation with parents, school board members, community members, the media, etc. Comments are sometimes made that we are spending too much on high school sports/activities, but it is more important than ever to share the value of these activities for our students. In Montana, high school activities expenditures, on average, amount to about 2% of a high school budget. We continue to realize how important participation in high school activities is for the physical, mental and emotional wellbeing of our student activity participants.

The study referenced numerous other studies and the following is excellent information reinforcing the value of extracurricular activities in our schools.

Thousands of participants, their coaches, parents, and supporters are preparing for post season play in football, volleyball, cross country and soccer. I know our tournament managers and playoff/festival hosts will work very hard to assure great experiences for all those involved. Also, we hope the weather will cooperate, and with any luck, we will experience pleasant fall weather for the remainder of our post season tournaments and meets.

A few things I would like to mention before winter activities begin. Stockman Bank is our title sponsorship for the successful sportsmanship program that has been provided for our member schools and their communities. SUBMIT ANNUAL MEETING PROPOSALS

Remember that the deadlines are approaching for presenting proposed amendments to the MHSA By-Laws and/or Rules and Regulations.

- Proposed changes by member schools for any of the <u>Rules and Regulations</u> of the <u>MHSA Handbook</u>, must first be presented to the MHSA Executive Board at its November 23-24 meeting. Proposals must be received ten days prior to the meeting.
- Schools may submit proposed changes in the By-Laws (pages 7 - 20) to the Executive Director by December 1. By-Law changes do not need to be presented to the Executive Board for approval.

No proposal can be presented from the floor that has not been received by the deadline. Proposals must carry a fiscal note if there are financial implications to the Association and proposals will be separated by the Resolution Committee to be considered by affected classifications.

BASKETBALL

2023-24 MHSA BASKETBALL SEASON

Thursday, November 16, 2023, is the first date for basketball practice. Friday, December 1, 2023, is the first date a basketball game is permitted under the MHSA rules.

NEW REQUIRED PRACTICE RULE

Basketball Rules and Regulations, Item (5), page 56 of the current MHSA Handbook provides that: No individual shall play in any Association basketball contest until that **individual** has a minimum of eight (8) days of practice of at least one practice session per day on eight (8) different days (no practice permitted on Sunday), prior to the

date of the first allowable game. The initial eight (8) practices for each individual must be completed as a comprehensive, regularly scheduled team practice with the full coaching staff.

SHOT CLOCK AND BACKBOARD LIGHTS

LED lights located around the shot clock may be used, but the lights shall only be activated for a shot clock violation (2023-24 NFHS Basketball Rules Book, page 74). Red/LED lights on each backboard are permitted to signal that time has expired for a quarter or extra period (2023-24 NFHS Basketball Rule 1-14, page 16). Lights on the backboard are <u>not</u> to be used to indicate a shot clock violation.

VOLLEYBALL

2023 STATE ALL-CLASS VOLLEYBALL TOURNAMENT

The 2023 State All-Class Volleyball Tournament will be held at MSU-Bozeman's Brick Breeden Fieldhouse on November 9-11, 2023. The MHSA staff will be managing this tournament. The schedule for the tournament is as follows:

FOOTBALL

Reciprocity for officials

Any Montana High School Association varsity contest (including football games held in Grenora, ND) must be officiated by MOA certified officials or by a member of the North Dakota, South Dakota, Wyoming and/or Idaho officials' association who has paid reciprocity dues to the MOA. Also, each MOA or non-MOA official who works MHSA contests (varsity or sub varsity – including football games in Grenora, ND) must complete the NFHS Concussion in Sports course each year.

XII.RECIPROCAL MEMBERSHIP IN BORDERING STATES

Members of the MOA can join as members of the official's association in the bordering states of North Dakota, South Dakota, Wyoming and/or Idaho by paying dues per sport to that/those state's organization. Approval and dues for the MOA of \$20.00 must be paid to the MOA office before the official works a contest. This five-state agreement entitles members of each respective organization to officiate in any state(s) in which they maintain membership. Reciprocal arrangements with non-bordering states must be approved by the MOA office.

Sideline Management – Restricting the amount of sideline passes

As the playoffs approach, the MHSA office would like to remind schools that allowing unauthorized spectators close to the field of play is a safety risk to players and coaches and can become a huge liability issue for schools and a game management issue for officials.

We have a variety of football facilities across the state. Many times, a fence or a track separates the spectators from the field area, but regardless, MHSA Rules and Regulations requires that schools erect sideline barriers for all football contests. These barriers provide a clearly defined area where spectators must not enter. School administration should create sideline passes that only allow authorized school personnel or legitimate media members to be in the sideline area during games. Also, in order to manage the sideline easier, these people should be given a pass that is on a lanyard which is easily seen by game administration. It also provides the opportunity for game administration when distributing the pass to reinforce the areas they can be located during the game (see below).

These authorized personnel and media should never be allowed inside restraining lines (dotted line 2 yards around the perimeter of the field) or in the team box area (25-yard line to 25-yard line one all fields) and should not be watching in the end zones.

By cleaning up the sideline area, this will help everyone involved with managing the game.

Halftime Intermission - Homecoming and Parents Night

Remember, football coaches must be back on the field or be on their way to the field before the twelve-minute half-time is expired. It is important to communicate that game management should notify both teams when there are three minutes left in the intermission.

Schools, however, do have the option of using longer half-times because of homecoming or parent's night, and officials should encourage this option for homecoming and parent's night. By NFHS rule, half times can be extended up to **twenty minutes**, provided the opposing coaches have been notified five minutes prior to the game. Remember, the additional three-minute warm-up period is always mandatory.

Official Football of the MHSA - Wilson WTF1003B GST

The Montana High School Association has agreed to a new multi-year contract with Wilson to be the Official Football of the MHSA. Rawlings has been the MHSA official football for the Montana High School Association for many years but after reviewing coaches' and schools' input on product and after examining each proposal carefully, the MHSA has entered into a six-year contract with Wilson as the MHSA official football provider. Wilson will provide a game ball to be used for all post season football contests during the contract.

The Wilson WTF1003B GST will be the Official Football of the MHSA. This is one of the most highly rated footballs available on the market today. Per the contract, one of these footballs will be shipped to each post season football game.

Football Requirements – 2020-2024 - Beginning in 2020, a Wilson football will be required in all MHSA state playoffs and championship contests. Schools MUST use the Wilson WTF1003B GST Football or any other Wilson leather, composite leather or rubber football in all state playoffs and championships. Schools do not have to use the brand-new Wilson Football that is mailed to each site weekly. Game officials will only allow Wilson footballs during the 2023 postseason.

SOCCER

SOCCER SEASON - PREPARING FOR PLAYOFFS / STATE

The playoff structure for Class AA and A will be held this month with the championship games the last weekend in October. Specific information is listed by classification below:

Class AA Playoff Structure

- October 18 First Round
- October 22 Quarter-Final Round
- October 25 Semi-Final Round
- October 29 Championship Games

Class A Playoff Structure

- October 9-14 Play-in Game and First Round
- October 17-22 Semi-Final Round
- October 27-29 Championship Games

WRESTLING

2023-24 MHSA WRESTLING SEASON

The first allowable MHSA date for wrestling practice this year will be November 16th and the first date for competition is December 1st. A wrestling match or meet will be permitted on this day only if the contestants participated in the required number of practice sessions.

Electronic Weight Management for MHSA

Again, this school year, the MHSA will require that each school use the weight management portal through the National Wrestling Coaches Association (NWCA) to track the 50% rule. Emails from Track

Wrestling/Flo Sports will be sent to school contacts and coaches starting October 1st reminding schools to set up their accounts. Each school will enter their regular season schedule and then also the weights at each meet for all of the wrestlers that participated. If the school offers girls' wrestling, the school will be required to set up a separate boys and girls account.

At each divisional site, managers will be able to print a report detailing the weight that each wrestler qualified for based on the MHSA 50 % Rule.

We will be sending more information to all wrestling schools before the beginning of the season.

SPIRIT

SAFETY AWARENESS FOR SPIRIT

MHSA believes it is extremely important to reduce the risk of injury due to cheerleading participation by increasing safety awareness. Here are a few rules worth mentioning:

Practice sessions must be held in a location suitable for spirit activities, i.e., appropriate surface/area, reasonably free of obstructions and excessive noise.

The formation of "rally lines" or "player run throughs" by spectators, fans/ and or students on or near the playing field/floor during the introduction of players or at any other time before, during or after a game is prohibited. Cheerleaders are the only group that can hold a run through for the players to enter the floor and they must not stunt while holding the run through. (MHSA Handbook, page 122, #8).

Anyone associated with an Association contest (regular season or post season) is prohibited from throwing any type of object into or from the spectator section. We heard of several instances where this happened during the past sports season and in order to protect the cheerleaders as well as the spectators, this is not to be allowed. (MHSA Handbook, page 122, #5).

National Federation Spirit Rules Book states on page 15, Rule 2-1 Art.16 "Spirit participants shall stand outside the free-throw lane lines extended towards the sidelines throughout a basketball game. An Illustration is provided on page 51.

If your school fields only a winter cheer and/or dance team, and if your cheer and/or dance coach has NOT yet completed the mandatory Spirit Rules Clinic, they will need to do that before December 1st.
