TONIGHT'S GAME

The two superpowers in women's hockey resume their storied rivalry tonight when the U.S. takes on Canada in the third game of the 2019-20 Rivalry Series, a five-game competition between the women's national teams of the two nations. Opening faceoff is set for 7:30 p.m. PT at the Save-On-Foods Memorial Centre in Victoria, British Columbia. Tonight's game will be broadcast live in the U.S. on NHL Network. - LAST TIME OUT

The U.S. won the second game of the 2019-20 Rivalry Series by a 2-1 count Dec. 17 at the Avenir Centre in Moncton, New Brunswick. Team USA got goals from Alex Carpenter and Abby Roque along with a 27-save performance from Aerin Frankel in her U.S. Women's National Team debut on the way to victory. Two players also made their senior national team debuts in Natalie Buchbinder and Clair DeGeorge. Canada had a 28-21 shots-on-goal advantage.

-THINGS TO KNOW-

ABOUT THE RIVALRY SERIES

USA Hockey and Hockey Canada established the Rivalry Series last season to further showcase the women's national teams from the two hockey powerhouses. Canada won the inaugural series, 2-1. This season, the Rivalry Series includes five games. The U.S. won the first two games, and after tonight, the remaining contests are set for Rogers Arena in Vancouver on Wednesday (Feb. 5) and Honda Center in Anaheim, California, on Saturday (Feb. 8).

The Rivalry Series serves as a precursor to the 2020 International Ice Hockey Federation Women's World Championship, which will be held March 31-April 10 in Halifax & Truro, Nova Scotia.

RETURN TO THE SERIES

Fifteen of the 23 skaters on Team USA's roster competed in last year's inaugural Rivalry Series. **Hilary Knight** (Sun Valley, Idaho) led the U.S. in scoring with three points (1G, 2A), and **Alex Cavallini** (Delafield, Wis.) notched a 1.02 goals against average and a .960 save clip in two games. In addition, 13 of the 23 skaters competed in the first portion of the 2019-20 Rivalry Series.

TEAM LEADERSHIP

Kendall Coyne Schofield (Palos Heights, III.) is the captain of the U.S. team. She served in that capacity during the 2019 Rivalry Series and 2019 IIHF Women's World Championship. Kacey Bellamy (Westfield, Mass.) and Hilary Knight are serving as alternate captains.

TIME /I OCAL /ET\

Hilary Knight's next point will be her 200th as a member of the U.S. Women's National Team. Her first appearance on the squad was in 2006 in the Four Nations Cup. To date, she has played in 161 games as a member of the national team and has 112 goals and 87 assists for 199 points ... Nicole Hensley will start in goal for the U.S. tonight. Her last national team appearance came in the 2018 Olympic Winter Games where she played one game, that a 13-save effort in a 5-0 shutout of the Olympic Athletes from Russia ... Sophia Shaver, Kali Flanagan and Katie Burt will not dress tonight ... While at Great Park Ice and Fivepoint Arena in Irvine, California, for training camp, Team USA joined the NHL's Anaheim Ducks for a friendly scrimmage. The Ducks and the U.S. mixed teams for a quick five-on-five scrimmage before ending the skate-around with a shootout that closed with a bar-down shot from Hilary Knight ... The team bumped into figure skating duo Alexa and **Christopher Knierim** while in Irvine. The pair, who recently won gold in the free skate at the 2020 Toyota U.S. Figure Skating Championships in Greensboro, North Carolina, stopped to chat with players and take a photo before heading into the rink for their training ... U.S. soccer legends Julie Foudy, Mia Hamm and Tisha Venturini joined players and staff on the final day of camp in Irvine to share about their time as members of the U.S. Women's National Soccer Team and discuss the importance of camaraderie and teamwork ... The U.S. rounded out its training camp with a scrimmage against the 16U Jr. Ducks. Hannah Brandt (Vadnais Heights, Minn.) tallied two goals and Alex Carpenter, Kendall Coyne Schofield and Hayley Scamurra (Williamsville, N.Y.) added goals as the U.S. defeated the Jr. Ducks by a 5-3 count. All three goaltenders saw time in the net for the U.S., combining for 12 saves.

DID YOU KNOW

Rod Black (play-by-play) and Cheryl Pounder (color) will call tonight's game on NHL Network ... USA Hockey conducted its Women's National Team Training Camp in Irvine, California, last week. The team skated in practices and scrimmages Wednesday (Jan. 29) through Friday (Jan. 31) prior to traveling to Victoria, B.C. ... On Jan. 2, Brianna Decker became the first woman to win gold as both a player and a coach at the IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championships. After winning gold at both the 2008 and 2009 tournaments as a player, Decker served as an assistant coach for the gold-medal winning U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team at the 2020 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship in Bratislava, Slovakia. The team defeated Canada, 2-1, in overtime to earn its eighth gold medal at the event ... U.S. forward Annie Pankowski was right at home at last week's camp in Irvine. The Laguna Hills, Calif., native grew up just down the road and played youth hockey with the Lady Ducks program ... Goaltender Katie Burt celebrated her 23rd birthday two days before training camp on Jan. 26. ... The U.S. has won gold at eight of the last nine IIHF Women's World Championships ... The U.S. and Canada have battled in the gold-medal game of every IIHF Women's World Championship and Olympic Winter Games staged, with just two exceptions (2019 World Championship, 2006 Olympics).

NHL ALL-STAR WEEKEND

Kacey Bellamy, Alex Carpenter, Alex Cavallini, Kendall Coyne Schofield, Brianna Decker, Amanda Kessel, Hilary Knight, Jocelyne Lamoureux-Davidson, Annie Pankowski and Lee Stecklein faced a team comprised of the top women's players from Canada as part of a 3-on-3 game during the 2020 NHL All-Star Skills Competion at NHL All-Star Weekend in St. Louis, Mo.,in late January. The 3-on-3 game consisted of two 10-minute periods with a running clock and the U.S. team was coached by Olympic gold medalist and Hockey Hall of Famer Cammi Granato. Last year, Coyne Schofield became the first woman to compete in the NHL All-Star Skills Competition, posting a time of 14.346 in the fastest skater event.

A LOOK BACK AT 2018-19

The 2018-19 season included significant success for the U.S. Women's National Team. In November of 2018, Team USA won all four games it played to earn its fourth-straight championship at the at the Four Nations Cup. The U.S., which topped Canada 5-2 in the title game, outscored its opponents 17-5 in four games. At the 2019 Rivalry Series in London, Ontario, the U.S. won the opening game, 1-0, with Hilary Knight scoring the game-winning goal and Alex Cavallini recording a 33-save shutout to secure the win. Canada struck back in game two, claiming a 4-3 win over Team USA before claiming the series finale by a 2-0 count. Last April, following the Rivalry Series, the U.S. Women's National Team captured its fifth consecutive gold medal at the International Ice Hockey Federation Women's World Championship with a thrilling shootout win over Finland in the gold-medal game.

UPCOMING EVENTS

2020 HOCKEY WEEK ACROSS AMERICA

USA Hockey's yearly nationwide initiative Hockey Week Across America, now in its 13th year, will take place from Feb. 16-23, 2020. The festivities begin on Feb. 16 with NBC Sports Hockey Day in America. The daily themes will include salutes to players (Feb. 17), coaches (Feb. 18), officials (Feb. 19) and local rinks (Feb. 20) followed by the traditional themed days of Wear Your Favorite Hockey Jersey Day (Feb. 21), Try Hockey Day (Feb. 22) and Celebrate Local Hockey Heroes (Feb. 23). 2020 IIHF WOMEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

The 2020 International Ice Hockey Federation Women's World Championship will take place in Halifax and Truro, Nova Scotia, March 31-April 10, 2020. This year's tournament is the 20th Women's World Championship in history.

The U.S. Women's National Team will compete in Group A in Halifax alongside Canada, Finland, Russia and Switzerland. Group B will include the Czech Republic, Denmark, Germany, Hungary and Japan.

The U.S. enters the tournament having won the gold in five-straight IIHF Women's World Championships (2013, 2015, 2016, 2018, 2019). Additionally, the U.S. has captured the top-prize in eight of the last nine IIHF Women's World Championships.

2020 IIHF MEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

The 2020 International Ice Hockey Federation Men's World Championship will be held in Zurich & Lausanne, Switzerland, from May 8-24, 2020.

The U.S. finished seventh of 16 teams in the 83rd edition of the IIHF Men's World Championship in 2019 with wins in five of eight games (4-1-0-3/W-OTW-OTL-L) and has gone 19-7 over the last three world championships.

To date, the U.S. has earned 12 podium finishes, including one gold medal (1933), four silver medals(1950, 1939, 1934, 1931) and seven bronze medals (2018, 2015, 2013, 2004, 1996, 1952, 1949).

U.S. COACHING STAFF

BOB CORKUM, HEAD COACH

Bob Corkum is in his second season serving as head coach of the U.S. Women's National Team. Most recently, Corkum led the U.S. Women's National Team to its fifth consecutive goal medal at the IIHF Women's World Championship in 2019 in Espoo, Finland. The team went undefeated in the tournament, outscoring its opponents 41-5.

Corkum's first international tournament as head coach with the U.S. Women's National Team was the 2018 Four Nations Cup in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, where the U.S. women went undefeated en route to its fourth straight tournament title.

Previously, Corkum served as an assistant coach for the U.S. Under-22 Women's Select Team for the U22 Series vs. Canada in Calgary in August and helped lead the U.S. to a three-game sweep. Corkum's appointment to the U-22 select team staff marked his first coaching assignment for a U.S. team since leading the U.S. men into the 2013 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament in Slovakia, where the team finished second.

Corkum previously served as an assistant coach for the New York Islanders from 2014-2017. A 12-year NHL veteran, Corkum joined the Islanders organization in July 2013 after spending five seasons as an associate coach at his alma mater, the University of Maine. Corkum helped the Black Bears qualify for the NCAA Tournament in 2012.

Corkum's NHL career began with the Buffalo Sabres in 1990 after being selected by the Sabres in the 3rd round, 47th overall in 1986. The Salisbury, Mass., native also spent time with the Mighty Ducks of Anaheim, Philadelphia Flyers, Phoenix Coyotes, Los Angeles Kings, New Jersey Devils and Atlanta Thrashers.

Prior to playing in the NHL, Corkum played four years at the University of Maine. As a senior in 1989, Corkum helped lead the Black Bears to a Hockey East Championship and a second-consecutive Frozen Four Appearance.

JOEL JOHNSON, ASSISTANT COACH

Johnson is serving as assistant coach of the U.S. Women's National Team. He served in the same role during the 2018-19 season, his first year in that capacity. Johnson made his debut at the 2018 Four Nations Cup in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, where the U.S. earned its fourth consecutive tournament championship, and also helped guide the U.S. to its fifth straight gold medal at the 2019 IIHF Women's World Championship in Espoo, Finland. Earlier last season, Johnson helped lead the U.S. Under-22 Women's Select Team to a three-game sweep of its northern rival at the 2018 U22 Series vs. Canada in Calgary. A long-time contributor to the U.S. women's program, he also previously served as head coach of the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team from 2015-2018, helping the U.S. capture four consecutive gold medals at the IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship. Entering in his 15th season on the University of Minnesota coaching staff, Johnson has helped the Golden Gophers claim six national titles (2000, 2004, 2012, 2013, 2015, and 2016). He previously spent six seasons coaching at Bethel University from 2004-10, including three years as the men's hockey head coach.

BRIANNE MCLAUGHLIN-BITTLE. GOALTENDING COACH

McLaughlin-Bittle is serving as goaltending coach for the U.S. Women's National Team. Most recently, she served as a goalie coach at the 2019 U.S. Women's National Festival in Lake Placid, New York. She also lent her expertise to USA Hockey's top goalie camp the past two years, plus the girls' Under-18 camp and the boys' Under-17 camp earlier this summer. As a player, McLaughlin-Bittle was part of Team USA for the U22 Series against Canada in 2008. A two-time Olympic silver medalist, McLaughlin-Bittle played goalie for the U.S. in the 2010 and 2014 Olympic Winter Games. McLaughlin-Bittle played four seasons (2005-09) of college hockey for Robert Morris University and finished her career with a .910 save percentage in 120 career games. Additionally, she finished with the most career saves in NCAA Division I history. She also served as an assistant coach at RMU from 2011-13. Following her time with the U.S. Women's National Team, McLaughlin-Bittle played two seasons for the Buffalo Beauts of the National Women's Hockey League, leading the team to the Isobel Cup league championship in 2016-17.

BRIAN POTHIER, ASSISTANT COACH

Brian Pothier is serving as assistant coach of the U.S. Women's National Team. He served in the same role for the first time at the 2018 Four Nations Cup in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, where the U.S. captured its fourth consecutive tournament championship. He also helped lead the team to its fifth consecutive gold medal in the 2019 IIHF Women's World Championship in Espoo, Finland. Pother served as a camp coach at both the 2018 and 2019 USA Hockey Women's National Festivals in Lake Placid, N.Y., and the 2018 U.S. Women's National Team Evaluation Camp in Biddeford, Maine. A former NHL defenseman and U.S. Men's National Team alumnus (2007 IIHF Men's World Championship), Pothier went undrafted in the NHL before signing with the Atlanta Thrashers in his senior year of college. He spent his first year in Orlando with Atlanta's farm team, the Orlando Solar Bears and went on to win both the Turner Cup and Rookie of the Year and American-born Rookie of the Year honors in 2000-2001. Pothier also spent time with the Ottawa Senators, Washington Capitals and Carolina Hurricanes organizations before retiring from hockey in 2012. Pothier now coaches all ages at Pothier Blueline Hockey in Rochester, Mass.
