

ANNUAL BUDGET: \$13.2 million

2018 marked the third and final year of Ontario Soccer's 2016-2018 Strategic Plan that involved a number of key strategic initiatives moving to full implementation in 2019 and beyond.

Highlights from the strategic initiatives included such items as a new Member Management Registration System, completing the build-out of the LTPD led, two standards-based leagues, the Ontario Player Development League and League1



Ontario, and final testing and implementation of the Academy Soccer Stream under the Ontario Registered Academy initiative.

The Strategic Plan was driven by a need to modernize the leadership, management, and development of the game. Such areas as Board governance, player/coach/match official development and technology upgrading, all served as very important components in order to support Ontario Soccer's mandate to innovate and lead the management and development of the game in Canada.

This 2018 Annual Report provides an overall summary of core membership support programs and services that have taken place over the course of the year.

I wish to thank the Executive Committee and the Board of Directors for their support and patience as we all navigated through many new strategic activities. I also would like to acknowledge the support and collaboration of the District Associations, Leagues, Clubs and Academies that support the day-to-day operations of the game.

Last but not least, a sincere thanks and gratitude to the many volunteers that dedicated countless hours of work to serve on our various Operational Committees, as well as the full time staff of Ontario Soccer. Your passion and commitment to the game defines how we Play, Inspire and Unite.



In June 2018, Ontario Soccer modernized its governance structure when the membership approved a new skills-based board model and in October 2018, we elected our new board. I am very pleased to report that our Board has started making strides in considering new solutions for some age-old issues.

The most important thing to remember, is that

we who govern the game have a responsibility to hand it to our successors in better shape than we found it. This is not easy, there is much competition, how will we rise to the challenge on and off the pitch and in our communities to make it the game everyone wants to play.

Change is not easy, but it is simple. Things will always change. We don't have a choice, but we do have a choice on how we react to change and – as leaders – whether or not we create change. The choice really boils down to this: either we manage change, or it will manage us.

The truth is that change can be a wonderful gift, a key that unlocks the doors to growth and excitement, and as leaders, a big part of your success will be your ability to inspire your Districts, Clubs, Academies and Leagues to break out of their comfort zones, to assure them that even though we are on a new path, it's the right path, for the right reasons.

While the launch of our new registration system (OSCAR) started off a bit bumpy, we are making significant progress with your help to ensure its success. Thank you to everyone for providing feedback and to the District Presidents for your leadership in recommending solutions to move forward.

In 2019, we also launched our new Strategic Plan to guide us over the next three years and to focus our attention on four main themes; Organizational Stability, Membership Engagement, Participant Pathway, and Partnerships. We will seek to answer questions about matters that are negatively impacting us, such as player retention and recruitment, grassroots soccer, and governance within Districts. I encourage you to put up your hand and assist us as we chart a new course for Ontario Soccer, a made-in-Ontario solution to drive positive change for players, coaches, match officials and administrators.

Finding solutions requires all of us to work closely together and resisting what might appear to be the quick fix when we need to build a solid foundation for years to come. I know we will find a made-in-Ontario solution, one that will make the game better for players, coaches, match officials, parents and administrators.

Let's all continue to Play, Inspire and Unite!



In 2018, Ontario Soccer Coach Development continued to deliver clinics and training across the province at the local grassroots, Provincial and National level.

At the National B and C Level, Ontario Coaches attended three Canada Soccer National B Part 1 courses (66 Coaches), and eight Canada Soccer C License courses (260 Coaches). Courses took place in various Districts around the province, ranging from Ottawa to Waterloo.

Over the course of the year, 2,200 Community Coaches were certified in Ontario Soccer Coaching Courses.

NCCP Community Courses ran in 16 Districts around the Province:

- Active Start: 5 courses, 66 Coaches certified
- Fundamentals: 21 courses, 399 Coaches certified
- Learn to Train: 49 courses, 915 Coaches certified
- Soccer for Life: 43 courses, 817 Coaches certified

### **Learning Facilitator Performance**

The feedback from the course candidates about the Ontario Soccer Learning Facilitators (LF) has been overwhelmingly positive. 1957 coaches out of 2200 (89%) who attended, provided the following feedback.

- 99% of all coaches who attended the courses rated their Learning Facilitator as 'excellent' or 'good'
- 99% of coaches said they would return and do another course with their Ontario Soccer Learning Facilitator again if they were assigned

### Ontario Soccer Video Coach Evaluations

Coaches in Ontario are now able to be evaluated by video. Due to the advances in technology, the Ontario Soccer Coach Development team piloted this process on behalf of Canada Soccer with 17 coaches from Ontario. After the successful implementation, coaches who wish to be evaluated on C and B License courses can now film themselves in their with their Technical Director before submitting to our Coach Develop-



Coach Development offered several other courses / learning opportunities over the course of 2018:

- The Ontario Soccer Goalkeeper Coach Diploma Course (52 Coaches)
- The Ontario Soccer Technical Director Diploma Course (23 TD's)
- The Fitness Coach Course (10 instructors trained)
- Nearly 400 users accessed the Ontario Soccer on-line Coach Learn ing Platform, which will become the hub for development of coaches, players and high performance education in Ontario

### Female Coach Mentorship Workshops

The Female Coach Mentorship Program is designed to train female coaches, who in turn will act as educators and mentors to other female coaches, who wish to further develop and progress in their coaching careers.

The mentorship program is part of a holistic support system approach to enabling promising coaches across the province to reach their full coaching potential in the sport. To date, this program has held workshops with 92 female coaches across Ontario. In 2018, six (6) coaches were selected to receive personalized one-to-one mentorship from our Head Female Coach Mentor in order to accelerate their development in coaching.





In 2018, the Player Development Team continued to support implementation of Long Term Player Development (LTPD) across the province. Initiatives, such the expansion of the grassroots session plans, educational materials and workshops were intensified. Furthermore, the Player Development Team began to assess key components of grassroots programming setting the foundation for the grassroots focus outlined in the 2019-2021 Strategic Plan. Ontario Soccer continues to lead the country on the implementation and execution of player development programs. Continued creation of resources in a variety of media, the delivery of coaching workshops, and parent and board member education sessions were amplified, including:

- Additional Ontario Soccer Player Development Webinars provided via ontariosoccer.net
- OPDL License Holder Grassroots visits and workshops
- Additional stage-specific session plans created for coaches working with Active Start, Fundamentals, and Learn to Train development stage players
- Support to Coaching Development Department on delivery of Coach Courses

In collaboration with the 24 OPDL License Holders, Ontario Soccer conducted the 2018 Grassroots OPDL Assessments. Utilizing both onsite and off-site visits, each License Holder was assessed within two of the three Grassroots stages from the LTPD; Active Start, Fundamentals and Learn to Train.

During the assessment process, all 24 license holders developed an action plan within the grassroots program to further advance their 2018 results, with the goal of increasing the quality standard for each organization to reach and exceed the standards for 2019.





### **Program Management**

The OPDL Program continued to expand in size and scope. In 2018, following completion of the OPDL RFP, nine (9) License Holders joined the program.

The License Holders and the **25** affiliated organizations have enlarged the presence and collaboration across Ontario. Furthermore, the program introduced the "OPDL Festivals" at U12 to promote and intensify focus on grassroots programs.

Education and support to coaches and match officials was amplified with the OPDL Coach Certificate Level II for coaches working in the program and match official mentorship.

### **Program Operations**

- The continued training of the OPDL venue staff to support game day operations. Overall in 2018, game day experience satisfaction rate increased to 86% from 82% in 2017
- 1400+ Games played across 85 different venues
- Marketing and promotion of the program enlarged to better support License Holders on "go-to-market" initiatives via opdl.ca, the new OPDL website
- Further development of key components of the OPDL in collaboration with the OPDL Technical Working Group and the OPDL Operational Working Group
- Enhanced competition for the "Train to Compete" Stage with the creation of the OPDL Cup for U15 and U17 age groups (85% satisfaction rate for the OPDL Cup)
- The OPDL Participation at Ontario Summer Games with a 94% approval rate. The event provides further scouting opportunities for players
- 10% reduction of non-compliance to the OPDL Game Day Standards
- 600 OPDL players recognized at the "ODPL Appreciation Day at BMO", presented by TFC
- Upwards of \$7,500 were raised for Ontario charities at the 2018 Charity Shield, including The Canadian Cancer Society, Kids Help Phone, the Canadian Liver Foundation and Ronald McDonald House
- Over 450 OPDL players across all age groups were identified for the Provincial Screening Competition in November - 80% of males selected and 93% of female players selected for the Provincial Team were from OPDL
- In 2018, Ontario Soccer increased collaboration with Canada Soccer, supporting initiatives such as the development of the Canada Soccer Club Licensing Program, National Player Development Program and Skill Centre Program

After 2018, the transition into the national program will begin and the Club Excellence program will be retired. Ontario Soccer will continue working with Canada Soccer to ensure the National Youth Club License Programs standards are reviewed and met.





The Ontario Registered Academy (ORA) program is designed for private academies in Ontario. Academies with ORA status are designated as either Tier 1 or Tier 2 Academies, having met specific technical and administrative standards set by Ontario Soccer. In 2018 there were 45 ORA Academies, 35 designated as Tier 1 Academies and 10 designated as Tier 2 Academies.


The Ontario Academy Soccer League (OASL) is a board-approved strategic initiative, wherein participating Academies receive full entitlements with Ontario Soccer. The OASL was approved by the Board in 2016 as a two-year Pilot Project for 2017-18. In 2018, Ontario Soccer partnered with Soccer Academy Alliance Canada (SAAC) to operate the OASL as the league management provider.


All 45 ORA Academies participated in the OASL in 2018, competing in one of two Tiers, depending on the organization's ORA status (Tier 1 or Tier 2). The OASL operated male divisions from U8 to U17, and for the first time, female-only divisions at U12, U14, and U17. In total, the 2018 OASL had 348 Academy teams, over 3,000 games, and over 5,000 players.

In 2018, we continued with our delivery of the Long Term Officials Development Program (LTOD) in addition to our regular programming.

Major activities in non-LTOD programming included the evaluation of over 300 Development Support Team Members, providing each member with a report on their evaluation score, and determining whether they were on the pathway to advance or required further development. This was the first time an evaluation process of this magnitude has ever been performed.

With the increase in the number of OASL games, the role of Chief Youth Assignor (CYA) was created. This role serves as the main overseer of all OASL and OPDL game assignments. The CYA is regularly provided with lists of Officials that are identified through a Talent ID process, or recommended by Districts or Scouts. This assisted in providing better Match Officials to the OPDL and OASL.

Ontario Soccer was invited to be a Member of the Canada Sport For Life LTOD Panel, with the LTOD program used as the base of the Canada Sport For Life Program.

Six (6) talent identification projects took place in 2018. This resulted in 47 aspiring match officials, Grade 7 and 8, being invited to one or all of the following: Ontario Summer Games, League 1 Ontario, OUA and OCAA.

Additionally, a Talented Pathway Development pool of 70 Match Officials was created, of which 52 accepted. These officials are Grades 5 and 6 and are aspiring to achieve higher grades. So far, four (4) District Associations (PHSA, EMSA, EODSA and SOSA) have also created their own Talented Pathway Development pools for Grade 5/6 officials.

# **Provincial Player Identification**

The Ontario Soccer High Performance Team identified over 900 players from the OPDL and Talent on Location Days for the Provincial Screening Competition (PSC) in November. From the 600 players identified at the PSC, approximately 300 players were selected for continued screening within the Provincial Projects program in 2019. This was across the U13, U14, and U15 age groups for girls and boys. In 2018, TFC Academy had selected eight (8) new male athletes across multiple age groups from OPDL Clubs.

# **National Player Identification**

Ontario provided an improved average of 57% (up from 50% in 2017) of the athletes selected for Canadian National Men's & Women's programs for both Senior and Youth levels.



League1 Ontario is the only Pro-Am standards-based league in Ontario. Founded in 2014, the league began with a ten-team Men's division, which by the 2018 season had grown to 17 teams and included a separate 13-team Women's division. Over 110 men and women players had graduated from League1 Ontario to professional environments around the world by the end of 2018.

It was this kind of early success and growth that led to a historic announcement for League1 Ontario. In 2018, Canada Soccer Business acquired League1 Ontario from Ontario Soccer's high performance program. In late 2018, League1 Ontario was approved by Ontario Soccer membership as an Associate (non-voting) Member of Ontario Soccer.

The move created a deeper association between Ontario Soccer and the Canadian Premier League (CPL) and the new structure of the CPL puts a focus on young soccer players in the largest provincial soccer association in Canada. This transition established League1 Ontario as the Official Development League of the CPL.



Other highlights included **38** League 1 Ontario players representing Canada at the U17 to Senior Men's and Women's National teams as well as **15** male players being listed as top performers in the NCAA Division 1 and **20** female players being listed as top performers in the NCAA Division 1.

Vaughan Azzurri won the League1 Ontario men's division in 2018 and earned the right to advance to the Canadian Championship in 2019 by defeating the Woodbridge Strikers in a close affair.

Durham United FA returned to their winning ways in 2018, capturing the Women's division title by downing the Woodbridge Strikers on penalties in the final.



Ontario Soccer continues to work towards becoming a gold standard organization in the way that it communicates with the Districts, Clubs, Private Academies, the media and membership at large.

Building off of an already strong digital footprint, the Communications team has re-invested its efforts to deliver cutting edge content in showcasing the great work being done by Soccer Operations, by developing a robust analytics program to support that storytelling.

Using a number of different analytics programs to gain a better understanding of what the Ontario Soccer membership is interested in, Communications now maps and tracks things like online behaviour patterns, affinity interests and watch time, to create a clearer picture of when and why people are interacting with the Provincial Governing body.

That information is used to support everything from Business Operations in partner acquisition, to Soccer Operations in the timing and delivery of their programming, to the creation of new video content and online content.

### Media Impressions

Ontario Soccer ran 37 media campaigns over the course of 2018 in support of a number of major events and initiatives such as the Ontario Soccer Summit, OPDL Charity Shield, Ontario Cup as well as many other story-telling opportunities. Ontario Soccer achieved a potential media reach of 77.6 million impressions for 2018 based on these campaigns.

### **Bulletins**

Over the course of 2018, 73 bulletins, on topics ranging from by-law changes, competition updates, coaching clinics, corporate partnerships and many more were provided to the Districts, Clubs and Academies.

In addition, 28 direct Membership email marketing campaigns, surrounding events like Ontario Soccer Summit and other major events, were used to help keep the Ontario Soccer membership better informed of key dates and registration cut-off times.



### **Partner Acquistion**

2018 marked the final chapter for the Business Development efforts of Ontario Soccer concluding the 2016-18 Strategic Plan cycle. The engagement of prospective partners remained a core focus of the partnerships team.

Further expanding upon the previous year's success in terms of tangible results in alternative revenue generation, as well as budget relief through value-in-kind (VIK) contributions, the final three-year total came in at just over \$1.8 million:

- \$668,324 cash
- \$1,141,000 VIK
- \$1,809,324 Total

It is worth nothing that the 2018 total amount is more than 3.5 times the originally designated target of \$500,000 and a 90-fold increase from the 2014 sponsorship total of \$20,000.



The Ontario Indoor Cup serves as the provincial championship for small-sided soccer during the Indoor Season. The competition is offered in the Under 13, Under 14, Under 16 and Under 18 Boys and Girls age divisions. There was an increase of 22 teams over the 2017 edition, for a total of 125 teams.

### **Ontario Futsal Cup 2018**





The Ontario Futsal Cup is the provincial championship for futsal in the Futsal/Indoor season. This competition began in 2006 with **12** teams. Over the last 12 years, the number of teams has varied, but recently, the sport has seen more growth and interest and the Ontario Futsal Cup is seeing higher levels of competition within the sport. Similar to the Ontario Indoor Cup, the Futsal Cup Final Round consists of a round robin tournament format with top teams advancing to the Cup Finals. The Ontario Futsal Cup in 2018 operated in the Under 13, Under 14 and Under 16 Boys and the U13/14 Girls and Under 16 Girls divisions as well as the Men's division.

Preliminary round games were required to advance teams to the Final Round in some divisions and were played at Seneca College in North York in early February. The Ontario Futsal Cup Final Round for the youth divisions was held at Durham College in Oshawa at the end of February.

In the Men's Ontario Futsal Cup, the champions advanced to the Futsal Canadian Championships, which was in its fourth year in 2018. A Tournament Round was held in mid-March at Seneca College in North York with the Semi-Finals and Final being held at the end of March at Durham College in Oshawa.

There was an increase of **20** teams over last year's numbers in the Ontario Futsal Cup, with a total of **105** games played.

### **Futsal Canadian Championships**

In 2018, Canada Soccer hosted the Futsal Canadian Championships. The event was held at Queen's University in Kingston, April 19-22, 2018. Seven provinces participated in the competition. Toronto Idolo, representing Ontario collected the Gold Medal, finishing in first place.

### **Ontario Cup**

The purpose of the Ontario Cup is to maximize participation and competition in the "competitive" Soccer For Life stream of LTPD, identifying provincial representatives for National Championships in specific age divisions, engagement of grassroots soccer in various categories - age, gender, special needs, and providing opportunity for teams to participate in a prestigious competition with a rich history. The Ontario Cup for soccer is one of Canada's oldest amateur sport tournaments.

In 2018, the format for the Under 13 to Under 17 age division was changed to a single knock-out preliminary round followed by a Tournament Round. The winners of the Tournament Round advance to Quarter-Finals or Semi-Finals which are a single knock-out format.

In 2018, **493** teams participated in the Ontario Cup which was an increase of one team over the year before.














# **Ethics and Complaints**

In March 2016, the Ontario Government passed into law, Bill 132 addressing sexual violence and harassment in the workplace. In the same year, the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport required that all Provincial Sports Organizations comply with a new Code of Conduct and ethics. As a result of this requirement, a new Code of Conduct was designed by Ontario Soccer to comply with general harassment and conduct requirements and a separate policy was designed to comply with the protection of employees.

In March of 2018 the Ontario Soccer Board of Directors approved the new Code of Conduct and Ethics Policy that replaced the previous Harassment Policy.

The visibility and use of this Code of Conduct and Ethics policy since its approval in March 2018 has been exceptionally high, with over 95% increased volume of incidents reported for review, in comparison to the previous Harassment Policy and the associated files reviewed under its associated jurisdiction. This increased visibility and use translates into a trusted and visible process and policy to serve our soccer community.

# Discipline, Appeals & Certified Chairs

Ontario Soccer provides tailored certification courses in the area of Discipline & Appeals for membership. This program service has led to the certification of 74 new certified Discipline & Appeals chairs within Ontario in 2018. A total of nine (9) courses were held over the course of 2018. The addition of these 74 new certified chairs has brought the total number of certified chairs in Ontario to nearly 600 members.

These certified Chairs provide an educated and informed contribution to all Ontario Soccer Discipline & Appeal hearings as each hearing is required to have a certified person chairing the session.

One of the most significant reasons why there must be continued efforts to increase Ontario Soccer's number of certified chairs is that Ontario Soccer has seen a substantial increase in the number of Discipline & Appeal hearings from 2017 to 2018.




