

2014 Berks County Chapter of the PA Hall of Fame Inductees



Dave Angstadt

Dave Angstadt was an All-Berks basketball player at Gov. Mifflin, graduating in 1972. He went on to play four years at Penn State, where he was the team captain and MVP.

He had a 14-year career in Europe as a player and coach in Spain, Belgium and Switzerland. He was the manager of the Swiss national girls team and has been the owner/operator of a Swiss basketball camp and a Jersey Shore summer league.

Angstadt, who was inducted into the Berks Basketball Hall of Fame in 2013, is a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania Wharton School of Business.



Allison Baver

Allison Baver is one of only two three-time Olympians from Berks County.

She participated in short-track speedskating in the 2002, 2006 and 2010 Winter Games, winning a bronze medal in the relay in 2010. She attempted to make the 2014 U.S. team in short-track and long-track, but did not qualify.

A graduate of Wilson and Penn State, she has been a U.S. record-holder and has won more World Cup medals than any other female skater in U.S. history.



Chris Breedy

Chris Breedy won numerous District 3 and PIAA titles and All-American honors while swimming for Gov. Mifflin.

She tied the national high school record in the 100 backstroke in 1976 and set the national record in '77.

Breedy, who competed worldwide as a member of the U.S. national team from 1976-80, helped Florida win the NCAA Division I team title in '79. She came out of retirement to help Cal State Northridge win the NCAA Division II championship in '88.



Rich DeLucia

Rich DeLucia was an All-Berks baseball player at Wyomissing who went on to pitch at the University of Tennessee on a full scholarship.

He was drafted by the Seattle Mariners in the sixth round in 1986 and made his major league debut in '90. He was a candidate for American League Rookie of the Year in '91 when he went 12-13.

He went on to pitch for the Cincinnati Reds, St. Louis Cardinals, San Francisco Giants, Anaheim Angels and Cleveland Indians, completing a 10-year career in '99 with a 38-51 record and 4.62 ERA.



Dan Langdon

Dan Langdon was a standout wrestler at Wilson and Lycoming College, where he graduated in 1973.

He has been one of Berks County's most respected wrestling officials for 43 years, working 39 sectional, 31 District 3 and five PIAA tournaments. He has served as interpreter and president of the Berks chapter of PIAA Wrestling Officials and is a member of the Berks Wrestling Hall of Fame.

He is the president of East Penn Manufacturing.



Judy Lawes

Judy Lawes opened her 27th season as head softball coach at Kutztown University this year with an overall record of 811-435-2, one of only 19 NCAA Division II coaches to reach 800 wins.

Last year she led KU to its first PSAC title, second straight regional championship and first appearance in the national title game.

She has been named PSAC coach of the year six times and has won the Dr. Dorothy Moyer Award as the top KU women's coach six times.

She was inducted into the Shippensburg University Hall of Fame in 2001.



Leroy Schannauer

Leroy Schannauer was the defensive anchor on Wilson's unbeaten football team in 1987. He was described by coach John Gurski as the toughest and strongest lineman he ever coached.

He was an All-State first-team selection and a Big 33 selection.

He also had a 33-2 record in wrestling as a senior and went on to Clarion University on a wrestling scholarship.

He is a member of the Berks Football Hall of Fame and Wilson Sports Hall of Fame.



Betty Wesner

Betty Wesner had a 344-257-15 record in 34 years as the head field hockey coach at Kutztown University, retiring in 2012. She was named PSAC coach of the year five times.

Her 2007 team was the first KU women's program to be ranked No. 1 in the nation and her '97 team the first to reach the NCAA Division II title game. Her teams won three PAIAW conference titles.

She also coached KU women's lacrosse from 1984-90 and won a Berks title in field hockey as the coach at Twin Valley.

Ron Fake

Ron Fake compiled a 266-44-1 record in 32 years as the head coach of track and field at Wyomissing.

His teams won numerous Berks titles and a District 3 championship.

He was named Berks coach of the year six times.
