TOM ARMSTRONG, JR.
CHEQUAMEGON

Thomas Armstrong Jr. has been coaching baseball for 30 30 years, including 20 years as a Head Coach at Park Falls/Chequamegon High School. He has accumulated a record of 325-131 during that time. His teams have won eight Conference Championships, played in Sectionals 12 times, and reached State Tournament three times. They earned the Silver Ball twice. Armstrong has been named Conference Coach of the year seven times, and has twice served as a coach in the All-Star Classic. The Park Falls/Chequamegon baseball program has been under the leadership of the Armstrong Family for 45 consecutive years. Tom Sr. and Tom Jr. have combined for over 700 wins. Tom Jr. joins his father in the WBCA Hall of Fame. He continues to be the head coach at Chequamegon High.

TOM FARINA
NEW BERLIN WEST

Tom Farina has been the head coach of New Berlin West for nearly 20 years. During that time the Vikings have posted a 372-196 record. New Berlin West has won nine Conference titles under Farina's leadership. They appeared in Sectionals four times and reached the State Tournament twice. In 2013, the Vikings were crowned State Champions. Prior to being named the coach of New Berlin West, the Vikings had posted a record of 9-93 the previous three seasons. A former player in the Milwaukee Brewer's system, Farina began his high school coaching career as an assistant under Hall of Famer Tom O'Connell. Through the years, Farina has hosted youth clinics for players, as well as umpire clinics. Since 2001, he has had a scholarship program that gave out three \$500 scholarships to graduating seniors. He retired from New Berlin West in 2019.

PATRICK HANSEN
MENOMONEE FALLS

Patrick Hansen had a stellar coaching career at Brown Deer and Menomonee Falls High Schools. His career record was 492-201. His Menomonee Falls Indians won five Conference Championships in the tough Greater Metro Conference. His teams made 15 appearances at Sectionals, winning five Sectional Championships. In 2004, the Indians were State Runner-Ups. In 2015 and 2016, Menomonee Falls won back-to-back State Championships. Hansen had been named the Coach of the Year for the Greater Metro Conference four times, and in 2006, was the WBCA Summer Coach of the Year. Hansen had also been heavily involved in the WBCA, serving as a District Rep, and running the Summer All-State meetings for over a decade. Hansen's teams were not only known for their talent on the field, but for their strong character as well.

CHRIS KEMPF
ASHLAND



Chris Kempf has been the Head Coach at Ashland High School for 23 years. The Oredockers have a 410-155 record during that stretch. He has been named the Lumberjack Conference Coach of the Year three times, and the Lake Superior Conference Coach of the Year three times as well. The Oredockers have won nine Conference Championships behind Kempf. They made 10 Sectional appearances, and reached State Tournament four times. In 2005, Ashland earned a Silver Ball at the Summer State Tournament. Kempf has coached in the All-Star Classic two times, and has also been named District Coach of the Year twice. In 2001 Chris was named Coach of the Year by the WBCA. Not only committed to baseball in Ashland, Kempf rebuilt the baseball field in his home town of Glidden, helping keep school kids involved in baseball.

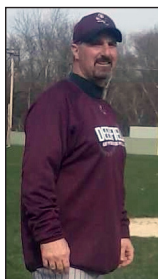


2019
BILL COKER
ATHENS

Bill Coker recorded a 361-130 record during his coaching career at Stratford and Athens. His teams have won nine Conference titles, as well as ten Regional Championships. Coker has been named Conference Coach of the Year eight times, and in 2017 he was named the WBCA Coach of the Year. Coker's teams reached State Tournament three times, resulting in two State Championships. He also served the WBCA as a district representative for 13 years, and has coached in the All-Star Classic twice. Coker has also been involved in coaching numerous youth league teams. He retired as head coach after the 2019 season.

TOM DAVEY
PALMYRA-EAGLE



Tom Davey has coached at Deerfield High School and Palmyra-Eagle High School since 1993. During that time his teams have won 11 Conference titles, six Regional titles, and reached State Tournament twice. Davey's Deerfield Legion Team made two trips to State, including a runner-up finish in 2002. Since 2007, Davey has led the Janesville Babe Ruth Team to ten State Titles, and three trips to the World Series, including two 3rd place finishes. Davey is a two time District Coach of the Year, and coached in the All-Star Classic in 2002. He currently has a high school coaching record of 420-160.

ARMANDO HERNANDEZ
UW-WHITewater

Armando Hernandez is a former All-Conference infielder at UW-Whitewater. He was a high school coach for 18 years, including eight years as Head Coach at Kettle Moraine High School, winning three Regional titles, as well as a State Runner-Up finish in 2008. Former UW-Whitewater coach Jim Miller noted, "Armando took over a program near the bottom, and left it near the top." Hernandez then became the lead assistant coach at UW-Whitewater, where he has been for 24 seasons. During that time UW-Whitewater has won 11 WIAC Titles, gone to the College World Series six times, and won two National Championships.

JEFF RYAN
PRESCOTT



Jeff Ryan began his coaching career as an assistant coach at Prescott High School, reaching State Tournament four times. Since becoming the head coach at Prescott Ryan's teams have recorded a 371-109 record. Under Ryan's reign the Cardinals have won 12 Conference titles, and reached State Tournament twice. In 2012 the Cardinals were State Champions. Ryan has been a District Rep since 2003, and has twice coached in the All-Star Classic.

STEVE WARREN
MARATHON

In 21 seasons as a head coach at Marathon High School, Steve Warren has a record of 351-127. The Red Raiders have won 11 Conference Championships during that stretch, and made four appearances at State Tournament. They were State Champions in both 2008 and 2010. In those 21 seasons, Warren has been named Conference Coach of the Year 10 times. In 2008 Warren was named by the WBCA as their Coach of the Year. He has also won over 400 games as Marathon's Legion Coach, which includes five State Tournament appearances. Warren coached in the All-Star Classic in 2007, and has coached three American Legion All-Star Games.

KEVIN DeBOER
WAUPUN



The late Kevin De Boer was a Waupun native, who grew up and starred in baseball and basketball for Waupun High School. After a successful college career at Carthage College, DeBoer became a teacher and coach in his hometown, Waupun. A fighter his entire life, DeBoer's determination helped Waupun become one of the top baseball programs in Wisconsin. DeBoer's record at Waupun was 250-137, which included four Conference Championships, as well as a State Championship in 2007. He also led the Waupun Legion Team to a State Championship in 2013. He passed away later that year at the age of 44.

CHAD MONTEZ
WAUKESHA WEST • WBCA

Since beginning his coaching career in 1994, Chad Montez has been a major figure in Waukesha baseball, as well as the WBCA. Montez has built an impressive 410-309 record since becoming the head coach at Waukesha West. He is a two time District Coach of the year, and has led the Wolverines to seven Conference Championships, ten Sectional appearances, and eight trips to State Tournament. In addition to his accomplishments on the baseball field, Montez has also been heavily involved in the WBCA. He is a former President, and still occupies a place on the Executive Board.

MARK PEDRETTI
PRAIRIE du CHIEN



In Southwest Wisconsin, one team has been synonymous with success. That is Prairie du Chien High School, under the guidance of Mark Pedretti. In 26 seasons as the head coach at Prairie du Chien, the Blackhawks have posted a record of 430-177. During those 28 seasons, Prairie du Chien has won 19 Conference Championships, and very seldom have they not been in the running for the crown. Coach Pedretti has also led the Blackhawks to nine Sectional appearances, as well as four trips to State Tournament. In 1993 Prairie du Chien reached the pinnacle of success, winning a State Championship under the direction of Mark Pedretti. He resigned as head coach in 2019 but stayed on to assist his son Ryan, who took over as head coach in 2020.

DENNIS RIDDLE
De PERE

Dennis Riddle had been involved with De Pere Baseball for more than 30 years. After stints as an assistant coach at Oconto and De Pere, Riddle became the head coach at De Pere High School. In 23 seasons as a head coach, Riddle's De Pere Redbirds posted a record of 331-162. Beginning in 1994, De Pere won nine Conference Championships in a 15 year stretch. Despite being a smaller Division I school, Riddle's teams won 18 Regional titles, and played in two State Tournaments.

DOUG GONRING
WEST BEND EAST • KEWASKUM



Gonring has achieved success as head coach of both West Bend East and Kewaskum High Schools. His career record of 418-200 includes seven Conference Championships at West Bend East and five at Kewaskum. His teams have reached State Tournament three times, winning two Summer State Championships in 1999 and 2002. He has also coached at the college level at Iowa State, Claremont College in California, and Concordia University. He has been named District Coach of the Year four times, and in 2002 he was the WBCA Summer High School Coach of the Year. Gonring retired after 2018.

MIKE GREGORY
EDGERTON



Coaching is in the Gregory blood. Mike Gregory, head coach of Edgerton High School for the past 29 years, follows in the footsteps of his father, Jack, who is a Hall of Fame football coach from the same school. His record is 415-237 to date. A member of the extremely tough Rock Valley Conference, Edgerton has won 12 Conference Championships under his reign. The Crimson Tide has made two trips to the State Tournament, winning a State Championship in 1990. Gregory is still active as head coach at Edgerton.

**BOB HEINKEL
MILWAUKEE LUTHERAN**



Heinkel has spent his entire coaching career while teaching at Milwaukee Lutheran High School. After serving five years as an assistant coach, he took over the varsity program in 1980, and coached through the 2015 season. He accumulated a record of 398-340 during his career. Milwaukee Lutheran made five State Tournament appearances under his reign, and won State titles in 2002, 2003, and 2015. He coached many amateur teams throughout the years, including two National Championship teams, in addition to coaching at Milwaukee Lutheran.

**CHUCK IHLE
WEST SALEM**

Ihle was the head coach at West Salem High School from 1985 to 2019. A long time power during the WIAA summer season, West Salem didn't miss a beat since joining the spring Coulee Conference and Spring baseball. His Panthers have won eight Conference Championships under his leadership. They have played eight times in the State Tournament, seven in the summer and the two past springs. He has been named WBCA Summer Coach of the Year twice. His involvement with several local baseball organizations has helped make West Salem a premier baseball city in Wisconsin. His career record finished at 540-314 after retiring following the 2019 season.

**BILL URBAN
PITTSVILLE**



Urban had been the head coach at Gresham, Columbus, and Pittsville High Schools. In 25 years as a head coach, he has compiled a career record of 339-165. Urban has also coached college baseball, serving as an assistant coach at UW-River Falls. He is a three-time District Coach of the Year award winner. His teams have won three Conference Championships, and have reached State Tournament four times. In 1992 Columbus earned a Division II State Runner-Up award. Urban may be the only Wisconsin baseball coach in history to lead teams to State Tournament in three different divisions, Division II, III, and IV. Urban retired after the 2017 season.

**GARRY BAHE
SUN PRAIRIE**



Bahe was the head coach at Sun Prairie High School for 14 years, after serving 16 seasons as an assistant coach. His record as a head coach was 161-115. During this time Sun Prairie won four conference titles, made eight Sectional appearances, and won two State Championships, 1994 and 1997. Bahe was the Big Eight Coach of the Year four times, and in 1994 he was named by the WBCA as the State Coach of the Year. During his reign, Sun Prairie became one of the top Division I high school teams in Wisconsin, a tradition that continues today. Bahe retired in 1999.

**CY BERG
EAU CLAIRE MEMORIAL**

Berg is perhaps the most successful baseball coach in Wisconsin from the late 50's thru the early 60's. In 12 seasons at Eau Claire Memorial he posted a 153-32 mark. Eau Claire Memorial made six trips to State Tournament during that time, finishing as a State Runner-Up once, and winning four State Championships: 1957, 1958, 1961, and 1962. In four seasons as a Legion coach, his record was 56-12. He is a member of both the Eau Claire Memorial Hall of Fame and the Eau Claire Baseball Hall of Fame. Berg passed away in 2008 at the age of 84.

**TONY GERHARZ
OSHKOSH WEST • WBCA**



Gerharz's contributions to baseball in Oshkosh and on behalf of the Wisconsin Baseball Coaches Association have been invaluable. Gerharz, the head coach at Oshkosh West High School for the past 28 years, has won 350 games. It's not just at West where he's influenced the game of baseball. He has been the president and general manager of the Oshkosh Giants that play in the Wisconsin State League for the past three decades. Commissioner of that league for over two decades, he is a member of the league's Hall of Fame. He's been an active participant and leader in Oshkosh's Snitz Club and Pepp Club, which promotes baseball at all levels city wide, for over 30 years. For the past several years, he has been the Chairman of the All-Star Classic. Gerharz is still active at Oshkosh West with 358 wins.

**ERNIE MILLARD
HOMESTEAD**



Millard is one of the most successful coaches in Wisconsin baseball history. His record of 539-310 at Homestead High School place him 6th all-time of WIAA Summer Coaches as of 2019. In 23 years as head coach at Homestead, Millard won two conference championships, made six trips to State Tournament, earned State Runner-Ups in 2003 and 2014, and in 1994 earned a State Championship. Millard was named North Shore Conference Coach of the Year four times. He retired after the 2018 season.

**BOB ZWEIFEL
JEFFERSON**

Zweifel was the head coach at Jefferson High School for 14 years, after serving as a JV assistant coach for 15 years. He has been coaching at some level since 1968. While Zweifel was head coach, Jefferson won six conference titles, and reached State Tournament three times. His record while a head coach was 170-102. Zweifel has also coached VFW and Junior Legion Baseball in Jefferson. His commitment and dedication to Jefferson High School baseball can be seen, as after his career as a head coach, he resumed his duties as an assistant coach, being named WBCA Assistant Coach of the Year in 2007.

**JOHN FELDNER
McFARLAND**



Feldner has been the head coach at McFarland High School for over 43 years, in which time his teams have accumulated over 394 wins. He has won Regional Championships in each of the last three decades, and was an inaugural winner of the WBCA Ethics in Coaching Award presented by the WBCA in 2016. He has served the WBCA as a district representative for many years and is a consistent worker at the All-Star Classic. Currently still active at McFarland.

**RANDY KREHBIEL
WESTOSHA CENTRAL**

Krehbiel retired from Westosha Central after putting together a 301-220 record. His teams there won five Conference Titles, ten Regional Titles, and four Sectional Titles. His 2002 team won a WIAA State Championship. He was twice a coach of the East team in the WBCA All-Star Classic, and was a Conference Rep.

**BILL MILLER
DENMARK**



The head coach of Denmark High School, Miller has led them to 429 wins and only 219 losses during his 28 years at the helm. He has been involved at all levels of baseball in the community, coaching Little League and being very involved in their youth board of directors. His teams have won seven Conference Titles, seven Regional Titles, and have two WIAA State appearances. He was a District Coach of the Year in 2005. Currently still active at Denmark.

**MIKE SIMEONS
BAY PORT**



After serving as the JV coach at Bayport, Simeons took over the varsity job in 1994. Success has followed as his teams have put together a record of 444-185. His teams won seven Conference Titles, 16 Regional Championships, and have appeared in ten WIAA State Tournaments. They won State Titles in 2009 and 2010 and finished runner-up in 2012. He was a State Coach of the Year in 2010. He has been active in the area Little League and Legion programs, helping bring about one of the strongest baseball areas in Wisconsin. He retired after the 2019 season.

**JOHN VODENLICH
UW-WHITEWATER**



Vodenlich has put together an impressive resume that has put him into the WBCA Hall of Fame. An All-American player at UW-Whitewater, where he played from 1989-1992, Vodenlich finished with a .397 career batting average, good for third all-time in school history. Following his collegiate career, Vodenlich went on to play professionally in Europe, winning the Slovenian National Championship in 1994. Vodenlich joined Jim Miller's UW-Whitewater coaching staff as an assistant coach in 1994 and stayed on the staff until 1998, when he was named the head coach at Edgewood College. Vodenlich needed just two seasons to change a losing program to a winning one, when Edgewood enjoyed its first winning season in the program's history. Following the 1999 season, Vodenlich returned to UW-W and rejoined Miller's staff as an assistant coach. He was named Miller's successor in 2004. Since then Vodenlich has won the WIAC Coach of the Year six times, been named the Wisconsin College Coach of the Year four times, been named the NCAA Division III Coach of the Year three times, and led the Warhawks to two NCAA DIII titles.

**KIP NORDSTROM
SPENCER • LODI**



Nordstrom is one of the few coaches in Wisconsin history to win State Championships with two teams, winning in 1994 at Spencer High School, and in 2013 at Lodi High School. He was a varsity head coach for 28 years, posting a 396-183 record. His teams won seven conference championships, nine Regional championships, and three Sectional championships. His lone State Tournament appearance that did not result in a State Championship was a runner-up finish. Retired from coaching at Lodi in 2015.

**BRIAN GILLOGLY
MARIAN UNIVERSITY**



Gillogly has enjoyed one of the most successful collegiate coaching careers in the country. In 22 seasons as head coach at both Marian College and Luther College, Gillogly's teams won 13 conference championships. He has been named Coach of the Year nine times. In his 12 years as head coach at Marian College, the Sabers won 11 conference championships. The Sabers had 11 seasons of 20 or more wins, including six straight seasons with 30 wins, never missing the postseason. Considered one of the top teachers of the game in the country, Gillogly had amassed over 550 victories during his tenures at Marian and Luther College. His honors include being named NAIA National Coach of the Year in 1995. Retired from coaching in 2014.

**JEFF HOGAN
MILWAUKEE HAMILTON**



Hogan coached baseball at Milwaukee Hamilton High School for 30 years, including 25 seasons as head coach. During that stretch he has accumulated a record of 359-201. The Wildcats won nine Conference Championships, and made 12 Sectional appearances. Hamilton played in two State Tournaments during his reign. Hogan has been named Conference Coach of the Year eight times, and has also been named District Coach of the Year once. He has been actively involved in the WBCA during his career and twice coached in the All-Star Classic. Retired from Hamilton in 2017.

**JACK BROOKS
ROSHOLT**



Brooks has been the head coach at Rosholt High School for the past 26 years and counting. He has accumulated a career record of 539-154, 7th all time. His teams won several conference championships, including the last four years in a row, and have gone to the State Tournament in 2008, 2010, and 2011. They were State Runner-up in 2008. Currently active at Rosholt.

**STEVE LEISTICO
WATERLOO**



Leistico continued the success that Art Westphal had started as head coach at Waterloo for 27 years. He finished his career with a record of 355-195. He was named WBCA Coach of the Year in 1999, after winning a DIII State Championship. He also led his team to State in 1985, 2003, and 2006, where they finished State Runner-Up. Leistico served as a Conference Rep for 20 years. Retired as coach at Waterloo after the 2012 season.

**JOE LOIZZO
BEAVER DAM LEGION**



Loizzo is best known for his work as Beaver Dam Legion coach, compiling a record of 591-185 (.761). His Legion teams won State Championships in 1982, 1984, and 2001. They were State Runners-up in 2004 and 2011. They won another title in 2013, his last year as coach for that team. Beaver Dam Legion had made a total of 14 State Tournament appearances. He took over as head coach at Beaver Dam High School in 2012 from Hall of Fame coach Charlie McDonald. He coached Legion until 2013 and retired as Beaver Dam High School head coach in 2017. He surpassed the 200 win mark as a high school coach was in coaching 40 years in 2017, the year he retired.

**JERRY RAETHER
CAMPBELLSPORT**



Raether successfully built and led the Campbellsport Cougars program for 21 years. He finished his career record with a 397-233. He guided his teams to the State Tournament in 1996, 1997, and 2000, finishing State Runner-up in 1997, which is impressive considering that Campbellsport has an enrollment under 500. Raether, one of the classiest men in Wisconsin baseball, served as a Conference Rep for the Eastern Wisconsin Conference for the past 20 years. Raether retired from coaching in 2012.

**AUGIE SCHMIDT
CARTHAGE COLLEGE**



Schmidt has compiled a 781-321 record in 25 years at Carthage College, a .708 career winning percentage. Under his tenure, Carthage has claimed eight outright CCIW divisional titles, one divisional-title tie, nine conference crowns, 16 NCAA regional berths, including nine straight from 1992-2000, six regional titles, third-place finishes in both the 1993 and 1994 NCAA Division III Baseball Championships and fourth place in both 1995 and 1997. Schmidt continues to coach at Carthage.

**JOHN GALEWSKI
SOUTH MILWAUKEE**



For 24 years, Galewski has been the coach of the South Milwaukee Rockets. At the time of his induction, he had accumulated 449 wins. His accomplishments include one Conference Championship, nine Sectional appearances, and in 1996, a State Championship. Galewski has coached over 70 seasons, including football and basketball, as well as baseball. He has run many clinics around the Milwaukee area, has twice coached in the Jim Gantner Classic, and the WBCA All-Star Classic. Galweski is South Milwaukee baseball. He continues to be the head coach at South Milwaukee. He retired after the 2018 season.

**TERRY PETRIE
UW-STOUT**



When Petrie retired in 2000, he held the record for career wins in the WSUC, with 537 victories. He began coaching at UW-Stout in 1971. During that time, he was named the College Coach of the Year twice by the WBCA. He also earned two WSUC Coach of the Year awards, as well as being named by the NAIA as their Coach of the Year in 1989. He coached the Stout Blue Devils to seven Northern Championships, and two WSUC Championships. Fifteen of coach Petrie's players were named All-American, and four reached the professional ranks. Retired after the 2000 season.

**TOM WILSON
SEYMOUR • WBCA**



Wilson, coaching the Seymour Thunder, was not only one of the top coaches in Wisconsin, but is also one the most involved coaches in the WBCA. As a coach, Wilson's teams won six Conference Championships and made 11 Sectional appearances. During the 2011 campaign, Wilson earned his 300th career victory. He has coached Team Wisconsin in the Midwest Classic, twice coached in the Jim Gantner Classic, and in the WBCA All-Star Classic. Wilson served two years as WBCA President and has been the WBCA Treasurer since 2003. Wilson retired from Seymour in 2014 with 330 career victories in 31 years. He became an assistant coach at Saint Norbert in 2014 and continues to serve on the WBCA Executive Board as Treasurer.

**TOM BRANDON
RACINE CASE**



Over a 24 year coaching career at Racine Case High School, Brandon posted a 280-199 record. Under his leadership, the Eagles won six Conference titles, five Regional titles, and made one State appearance. In addition to coaching baseball, he also coached football, basketball, and track. For several years, he was an instructor at UW-River Falls Hitting Camp. He was also the coordinator of the Racine Youth Baseball Clinic for 15 years, as well as coaching Legion Baseball in Racine.

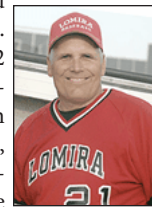
**BILL DETTMAN
SAUK PRAIRIE**



Dettman spent 33 years coaching the Sauk Prairie Eagles, racking up over 330 wins. One of the classiest coaches around, Dettman had been a proud member of the WBCA for years and served as a conference representative for many seasons. Dettman retired in 2011.

**PETE DREXLER
LOMIRA**



Drexler has been the head coach at Lomira since 1980. He had accumulated 302 wins at the time of his induction. His teams had won six Flyway Championships, made five Sectional appearances, and won a State Championship in 1991. His father-in-law, Harlan Quandt, was a charter member of the WBCA Hall of Fame. Drexler retired after the 2016 season.

**GEORGE SABOL
JOHNSON CREEK**



For 37 seasons, Sabol was the head coach at Johnson Creek. He earned his 400th career victory in 2010, and retired in 2011 with 420 career victories. His Blue Jays won the State Championship in 2007. He ranks 24th in career coaching victories and won Coach of the Year Awards in both the Eastern Suburban Conference and the Trailways Conference. He helped hundreds of players develop a love of the game, some of whom have become coaches themselves.

**JOE WAITE
CUMBERLAND • WBCA**



Waite is best known for his work with Baseball Wisconsin, which he continues to write and edit for 28 years and counting as well as the All Star Classic Program and the website. He was named WBCA Assistant Coach of the Year in 2000 and WBCA Man of the Year in 1995. Every copy of Baseball Wisconsin was accepted into the MLB Hall of Fame library in 2012. Now retired from teaching, Waite at times was coaching three sports yet still managed to complete the projects that he does for the WBCA. He was Mark Fuller's varsity assistant coach at Cumberland for 23 years, being part of eight Heart O'North Championships and two State appearances. The Beavers had only one losing season during that time. He was the head coach at Prairie Farm for four years before accepting the head coaching position at Cumberland in 2019. He led the Panthers to 49 wins and a conference championship and the Beavers to the Sectional Finals his first year there. He continues to serve as WBCA's Publications Director, in charge of baseballwisconsin.com, *Baseball Wisconsin*, and the *All-Star Classic Program*.

RIB LAKE

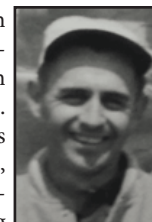

He is considered one of the top baseball clinicians in the country. After 59 years and a college baseball-best 1,893 coaching victories, Gillespie finally called it quits in 2011, at the age of 85. He died in 2015 at the age of 88.

For the past 20+ years, he has put together the Annual WBCA State Clinic, was a founding member and continues to work with the WBCA All-Star Classic, worked with State Rankings and helped found Baseball Wisconsin along with his long time assistant coach Joe Waite. His contributions to Wisconsin Baseball are immeasurable. He continues to procure the speakers for the WBCA State Clinic and chair the West Team for the All-Star Classic. Retired from Cumberland in 2013 but continues to volunteer with UW-Whitewater.

BOB SUTER
JANESVILLE CRAIG

Since 1965, Suter had been coaching Babe Ruth, Legion and High School ball in Janesville. His Craig teams had compiled a 323-139 record over that span, winning nine Conference crowns and traveling to the State Tournament eight times where they captured back-to-back titles in 1983 and 1984. He had been selected Coach of the Year eight times in his league and won the WBCA honor in 1984. For the past quarter-century, Suter had also coached football and basketball. His baseball teams have never finished lower than 4th place in their league. In 1968, he coached the Post 205 team to the State Championship and advanced to the Missouri regional before losing. He retired in 2004 with a career record of 468-215 during a 37 year span.

GREG WENDORF
STEVENS POINT PACELLI

Before becoming the current Athletic Director at Ashwaubenon High School in Green Bay, Wendorf led his Pacelli teams to a 205-114 record in his eighteen years of coaching at the High School. His charges won six Central Wisconsin Catholic Conference titles in that span advancing to the WISAA tournament ten times, winning it all in 1974. He was selected Conference Coach of the Year five times and was chosen coach in the first WBCA All-Star Classic in 1983. After four years of high school baseball, Wendorf played at UW- Stevens Point where he was named MVP before being drafted and playing two years in the Twins organization. During his tenure at Pacelli, he was also actively involved with the operations of the WISAA tournament held each year in Point. From 1979-1987 he assisted in the running of the affair and served in the leadership role from 1988 until moving to Ashwaubenon.

JIM HUGHES
FRANKLIN

Hughes began his coaching career at Milwaukee Washington High School where he also began his baseball coaching career twenty-two years ago at the time of his induction. In fact, he is one of the few coaches in Wisconsin who coached a spring league and a summer team during the same season, splitting duties between Washington and Franklin in the late 80's. Hughes coached in the Classic in 1989 and has been very active as a member of the Board of the Franklin Little League. Formerly a basketball assistant at Washington, he played his prep ball at Milwaukee West. He retired at Franklin after the 2019 season. He owns Wisconsin's record in most coaching victories with a record of 938-448 in 48 years.

DOC KOEHLER
REEDSBURG

After two years at Mellen High School, Koehler moved to Reedsburg, where he spent the past twenty-eight years. During this span his teams have won almost three hundred games and six Conference Championships and advanced to the WIAA Sectionals thirteen times. Koehler's charges had also been to State once. In 1987, he was given the honor of coaching the South team in the annual All-Star Classic. He has also served as a District Rep and as a volunteer at the Classic. He has been very helpful with the Little League programs in his area, running clinics and donating time for tournaments. Koehler had been also named as past recipient of District Coach of the Year award. Koehler died in 2006 at the age of 64.

GARY PERKINS
WEST BEND EAST

A former secretary of the WBCA, from 1976-78, Perkins had become one of the winningest coaches in Wisconsin prep annals, compiling a 411-153 in his 23 years as the head coach at East. During this span, his team had won six Conference titles, advanced to the WIAA Sectionals twelve times, and appeared in the State Summer Tournament seven times. His involvement in baseball spans over forty years, since 1952, when he marched in a parade to welcome the Milwaukee Braves to town. As a player, he lettered for four years at Milwaukee Rufus King High School, was chosen to play in the Milwaukee Sentinel Sliver Sluggers All-Star game, and captained the UW-Milwaukee squad in 1965. At his final game as a coach last summer in Stevens Point, after his team won the State Championship, he literally took off his spikes for good and laid them on home plate.

1994
JOE ZOLECKI
SAINT THOMAS MORE

In 34 years of coaching, twenty of those in baseball, Zolecki has become a familiar figure in the Milwaukee Area and has distinguished himself among his colleagues. He had been a member of the WBCA since its formative years. He began the baseball program at Thomas More when the school, a merging of two small all-boys schools, Pio Nono and Don Bosco, was opened in the 70's. Originally the head football coach at Pio Nono and a collegiate star himself, Zolecki was left without a gridiron job after the merger and snatched the opportunity to build a baseball team from scratch. His teams reached the WISAA tourney thirteen times since, finishing as runners up in 1980, 1990, and 1993 and winning it all in 1991. His teams have also won six Metro Conference Crowns while amassing 270 wins. In the summer of 1983, Zolecki joined his friend Jim Hughes and took over another struggling program, this one South Milwaukee High School, taking a team that had not won a title in 17 years and building a highly respected program that eventually won a crown in 1987.

EARL GENGLER
BROWN DEER • WBCA

An original officer of the WBCA, Gengler began his career as an assistant coach to fellow Hall of Famer Murray Denmark of Milwaukee Custer before moving to Brown Deer in 1969. As a player, Gengler was a four-year starter, letterwinner, and co-captain at UWM where he was enshrined into the UWM Hall of Fame in 1980. At Brown Deer, his squads have won 349 games, including two WIAA State Titles in 1975 and 1977, and runners-up in 1982. He coached the East Squad in the first All-Star Classic in 1984 and also assisted with Wisconsin's National AAU Championship team in 1988.

RUSS LUND
GALE-ETRICK-TREMPEALEAU

Counting football, basketball, track, softball and baseball, when Lund finally hung up his well-worn spikes, he had spent an incredible 72 seasons as a head coach and 24 seasons as an assistant. Lund, who had also been inducted into both the Football and Basketball Coaches Hall of Fames, began his career at Tomah where he spent two years coaching baseball. After a short stint there, he moved to Markesan, where he coached baseball for six years and started their track program. He completed his career at Gale-Etrick-Trempealeau, where he coached another 22 years, 18 in baseball. His teams compiled a 343-108 record during his 25 year coaching career. His teams won 13 Conference titles and made seven trips to the State Tournament. They finished runner-up in 1984.

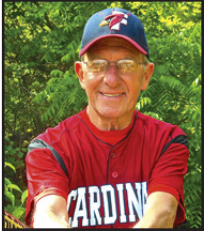

XAVIER • WBCA

In 15 years at Xavier, Nygaard distinguished himself as one of the hardest working coaches in the state. As a coach, he led his teams to the WISSA Tourney 11 times, twice capturing State titles. Nygaard was also very active with the WBCA. Chosen as Man of the Year in 1996 for his work in starting the All-Star Classic, he also served as President of the WBCA and later on as Treasurer. He authored two articles for Scholastic Coach and three times has been published in the ABCA Coaching Digest.

FOND DU LAC • WBCA**



Paulsen had been the head coach at Fond du Lac for 24 seasons at the time of his induction. His teams had made four WIAA Tournament appearances up to that point and won nine Regional titles.

His Cardinals won the FVA seven times in the first 12 years in the Conference. Paulsen has been active in the WBCA and currently serves as facilities director. He at times had chaired the All-State Selection Committee. He, along with his good friend Mark Fuller, have traveled across the United States and Canada presenting at baseball clinics. As of 2018, he entered his 50th year as head coach with a record of 586-401 putting him tied for 2nd on the All-Time list for career victories, spring coaches. He remains the WBCA's Secretary and 2020 marks his 52nd year as Fondy's head coach.

**LARRY SOMMERVILLE
HAYWARD**

Sommerville began his 31st year at the controls of the Hurricanes the season of his induction. Over the last three decades, his teams have won 325 games while losing only 169 and capturing nine Heart O'North conference championships. In 1968, Somerville guided his school to its only WIAA State Tournament appearance. Also the school's basketball coach, he was chosen in the 1991 All-Star Classic in Appleton. He retired in 2000 with a career record of 384-230 that spanned a 38 career.

**RAY SEIBEL
WINNEBAGO LUTHERAN**

Seibel was the Vikings' head baseball coach for 42 years, starting in the late 1950s to his retirement in 1996. He amassed more than 400 career victories, though the exact number is unknown. His teams won 12 conference championships and appeared in the WISSA State Tournament seven times, finishing runner-up in 1983 and 1989.

**DAN MADDEN
JANESVILLE PARKER**

Madden was the head coach at Janesville Parker from 1970-1979. During that time, his Vikings went to State three times and won it all in 1977.

**CHARLIE McDONALD
BEAVER DAM**

McDonald led the Golden Beavers for 36 years, 1967-2002, and had an overall record of 451-199. His teams won 17 Wisconsin Little Ten Championships, 23 Regional titles, and six Sectional titles. He was also named to the Wisconsin Football Coaches Hall of Fame.



1992

**GEORGE ROMAN
STEVENS POINT**

During his time at SPASH as head baseball coach, Roman had amassed a 420-110 record with several Conference and Tournament Championships, including the state baseball title in 1979, 1987, and 1989, as well as state runner-up in 1984. Overall career-wise, his teams won 60 championships: 17 Conference, 29 Regional, 11 Sectional, and the above mentioned SPASH State baseball championships. His teams made eleven trips to the Wisconsin State Baseball Tournament. He served as a West All-Star Summer Classic baseball coach in 1988 and again in 2003. Roman was a five-time nominee for Wisconsin Coach of the Year, named District II Coach of the Year in 1987, 1988, 1989 and was named Wisconsin State High School Coach of the Year in 1989. He was also involved with Legion and Stevens Point Youth Baseball (SPYBA) teams. Roman is considered the dean of Wisconsin baseball coaches with 526 wins and 180 losses; which until the spring of 2013, was the highest number of career wins for spring baseball in the state of Wisconsin. Roman died in 2014.

**TOM KONOWALSKI
MILWAUKEE TECH**



Tom Konowski has been described as one of Milwaukee's greatest football and baseball coaches. He was stubborn, tough, and passionate about coaching. 'Kono' was one of the founding members of the

WBCA All-Star Classic and a past president of the WBCA. He was tough on kids but he cared about them and they knew it. He led Tech to the 1985 Division I State Championship. He coached from 1977 to 2008 and had a career record of 454-152. His teams were also state runners-up in 1982 and 1983. Tech went to State 13 times under Konowski, including a run of nine in a row. He, along with others, started a Saturday league for local prep players in the mid 1980's. Konowski was a graduate of Milwaukee Tech and played football at UW-Whitewater. Konowski passed away in December of 2017 at the age of 68.

**TOM GRAFENAUER
WHITNALL**

Grafenauer was an outstanding player at Milwaukee Don Bosco High School (now Thomas More) and UW-La Crosse. He was an extremely successful coach at St. Francis High School and Whitnall High School. Unsure of his career record, it would probably rank in the top five all time. His teams, before they joined the WIAA tournament, usually played 50+ games per year and won most of them.

Most importantly, he was one of the founding fathers of the WHSBCA along with Jim Martin, Tom Meyer, and Tex Belich. He was the first clinic director of our organization, conducting the clinic from 1970 until 1975. He passed away in December of 2017, shortly before fellow Hall of Famer Tom Konowski.

**TIM O'DRISCOLL
ARROWHEAD • WBCA**

O'Driscoll is 2nd among summer coaches in career victories with a record of 742-334 in a career that spanned from 1979 to 2009. O'Driscoll continues to be the official scorer for the Milwaukee Brewers. He chaired the East Team for the All-Star Classic for several years as well. He retired in 2011.

**GEORGE HUSBY
STURGEON BAY LEGION**

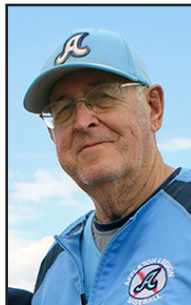


One of the American Legion baseball's most influential men, Husby was involved with the Sturgeon Bay Legion from 1966-2014. He was head coach from 1967-1970, again from 1981-2014, leading his team to 710 wins during his 38 years as head coach. Involved at all levels of youth baseball in Sturgeon Bay, Husby started and coached a Babe Ruth team there in addition to coaching Little League for three years. The opportunities he provided for Sturgeon Bay youth in baseball were endless.

**DON HAWKINS
APPLETON LEGION**

Hawkins coached his first Little League team at the age of 16 to a La Crosse City Championship. He took on the Appleton Legion Team in 1965, taking the head job in 1968 where he compiled a record of 526-253 over 30 years. He was instrumental in forming the Legion All-Star Game which has been played in either County Stadium or Miller Park since 1972. He not only led his team to a State Legion Championship in 1979, it was the first year Appleton Legion played on Don Hawkins Field, which it was renamed in 2000. He ran the Magic Mix company which built and repaired many fields throughout the Midwest. Still coaching into the year 2020, he has logged over 700 wins in over 55 years of coaching baseball for Appleton Youth Baseball.

**FRANK THORNTON
LA CROSSE CENTRAL**



For thirty years Thornton skippered the LaCrosse Central Red Raiders where he compiled a record of 459-131-1 which included seventeen trips to the State tournament, two State Championships in 1978 and 1986 and finishing runner up six times. Twice named WBCA Coach of the Year, 81 of his former players went on to play collegiate baseball.

BROOKFIELD CENTRAL • WBCA**

Past president of the WBCA from 1975-77, Graf was a coaches' coach. Beginning in 1966 and concluding in 2000, he coached baseball, football, boys basketball and girls softball and took his baseball teams to three State tournaments. His baseball team won it all in 1976. Graf also took the Brookfield Central boys basketball and girls softball teams to State tournaments. He is also a member of the Brookfield Central Hall of Fame and the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame.

SCOUT - WALWORTH**

McReynolds was a true baseball man. He wrote The Baseball Scout's Notebook which former Twins GM Terry Ryan, among many others, used as a foundation for work in scouting. His long career included work with the Royals, Reds, and Dodgers. He passed away in 1988 in his hometown of Walworth.

WBCA**

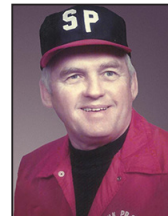


Meyer was the head coach at the University of Wisconsin from 1971-1983 compiling a record of 279-276-2 in his 12 seasons. While at the helm for UW, Meyer helped develop five players who went on to Major League Baseball careers. Meyer also coached at Northern Illinois University for a career record of 379-351. He was head coach at Riverside University High School in Milwaukee until 2017 and continues to assist there. He is one of the WBCA's Founding Fathers.

**TED BAUMGARTEN
SAUK PRAIRIE**

A Baraboo native, Baumgarten coached 20 seasons at Prairie du Sac (1956 - 1963) and Sauk Prairie (1964 - 1975) after Prairie du Sac and Sauk City consolidated. During that time, he was a part-time scout for the Baltimore Orioles. He had also served on the WIAA Board of Control. He was Superintendent of the Eleva-Strum school district before his retirement at the end of the 1985-1986 school year. Baumgarten played baseball for four years at the University of Wisconsin. In 1952, he finished 11th in the Big Ten with an average of .356. His teams won eight Conference Championships, four State appearances when there was only a single WIAA Division, and a career record of 202-77.

**TOM O'CONNELL
MILW. PULASKI - CATH. CENT.
WBCA**

Going into the 2014 season, O'Connell got his 500th victory, just the 7th spring coach in history to get 500 or more career victories. His record stands at 503-388 for a career that started in 1974. O'Connell, one of just 24 high school coaches to be inducted into the ABCA Hall of Fame, is a former WBCA and ABCA President. He has traveled the world promoting baseball and is considered one of Wisconsin's greatest baseball ambassadors. His Burlington Catholic Central teams won DIV State titles in 2004, 2005, 2008, 2010, and 2011. Currently active as co-head coach at Saint Francis with fellow Hall of Famer Richard Sykes.

**JACK TORRESANI
WAUSAU EAST**

Torresani was the baseball coach at Wausau High School, later Wausau East, from 1959-90 and led Wausau to five WIAA state tournament appearances. He also coached the alpine ski team from 1972-91 and led program to state championships in 1976 and '78. He coached the boys basketball team from 1961-64.

1986

**JAMES MASON
VIROQUA**

After an illustrious career as a high school athlete in La Crosse where he was picked as MVP in the 1951 Legion State Tournament and was named Athlete of the Year at Central High School in 1952, Mason attended UW-La Crosse where he won eight varsity letters in football and baseball. After college, he began teaching and coaching in Viroqua, where he compiled a 223-136 record in 30 years at the time of his induction. His teams won six Coulee Championships and were State Runners-Up twice. In 1957 as coach of the La Crosse Legion team, he led his players to a 2nd place finish in the State Finals. He coached in the WHSBCA All-Star series in 1975. He also served as Commissioner of the Southwest Athletic League and as an associate scout for the Royals. Mason died in 2011 at the age of 77.



1986

**BILL TERRY
UW-LA CROSSE**

Terry began his coaching career at Maxwell, Iowa before moving to Westby High School where he spent eight years. In 1968, he became the head coach at UW-La Crosse. During the next eleven seasons, his teams compiled a 113-39 record in WSUC games and were 199-146 overall. In 1979, his final season as coach, Terry guided the Indians to a fifth place finish in the NAIA World Series after winning the WSUC with a 12-1 mark. In all, his teams won seven WSUC titles. Terry was also known as a top clinician, appearing several times at WHSBCA clinics. He led a spirited effort that successfully saved UW-La Crosse baseball in 2010 and was named the La Crosse Tribune Sportsman of the Year that same year.

**KEN KIRBY
UMPIRE - DARLINGTON**

At one time, one of the most recognizable figures on the baseball scene in Wisconsin, Kirby was often quoted as saying, "When you're an umpire you only have to know seven words: ball, strike, fair, foul, safe, out, and time. That's it." If only it

were that easy to sum up his contributions to the game in Wisconsin. He had done it all. He umpired and officiated high school and collegiate games in football, basketball, and baseball; he umpired in the minor leagues and even had a brief stint in the Big Leagues. It is estimated that Kirby had officiated or umpired in over 13,000 games at all levels during his half-century of involvement. He had worked in the WIAC and the Big Ten, numerous WIAA and WISSA State Championships, and even State Semi-Pro games. He is the only umpire ever enshrined into the WBCA Hall of Fame and was honored by having the State Umpire Year of the Year Award renamed the Ken Kirby Umpire of the Year Award after his death.

**RED OBERBRUNER
UW-PARKSIDE**

UW-Parkside's baseball facility is known as Oberbruner Field, named after the late Ken "Red" Oberbruner, who coached the Rangers from 1970-1991. Oberbruner posted a 244-196 record at UW-Parkside to go with his 657-323 lifetime record. Prior to his time as a Ranger, Oberbruner coached for some 23 years at the former Milton College, in Milton, Wisconsin. From 1959-1980, he served as a scout for the Pittsburgh Pirates, signing 24 players to major league contracts. As an athlete, Oberbruner played in both the NBA (Fort Wayne Pistons) and in professional baseball (St. Louis Browns). He graduated from Notre Dame in 1940, where he excelled in both basketball and baseball. Oberbruner, who resided in Burlington, Wisconsin, passed away in September of 1991. On February 23, 1997, Oberbruner was inducted into the UW-Parkside Athletic Hall of Fame. His jersey "No. 1" was subsequently retired and is commemorated with a sign on the outfield wall of the facility which bears his name. *UW-Parkside, parksiderangers.com*

**JIM PRICE
WAUNAKEE**

Over his 36-year teaching career, Price devoted 35 years as a high school head coach in three different sports: baseball, basketball and football. However, his true calling came as a baseball coach. In his 25 years as head baseball coach at Waunakee (21 years), Brillion, Elroy and Blanchardville high schools, Price amassed a total of 237 wins, against only 94 losses, and a winning percentage of .716. Along the way his teams won 12 Conference championships and made four State tournament appearances. Price also spent eight years as a basketball coach, including three in Waunakee, and two years as a football coach.

**FRED PETERSON
OCONTO FALLS**

Fred Peterson spent 25 years as the Oconto Falls High School head baseball coach, from 1967 - 1991. With a record of 232-152 (.642), his teams won eight conference titles and appeared in four State Championship tournaments, winning two of them: 1973, prior to the Class divisions and 1978 as the first Class B winner. His team also finished second in 1997. His team still holds the record for the longest game played at the State Tournament - a 16 inning win against Eau Claire Memorial in the 1973 semi-final game. He was selected the WBCA Coach of the Year in 1979.

**JIM BROWN
WAUSAU WEST**



Throughout his life, Jim had an incredible passion and love for sports with a special fondness for baseball and hockey.

There wasn't a moment where Jim wasn't involved with baseball. As a player, he began in the All-star Babe Ruth and Little Bigger League and continued

to play in high school, three years Legion, and two years in the US Air Force. Jim found great success as a baseball coach. He was the first baseball coach at Wausau West High School and also coached for the Wausau American Legion, Wausau Babe Ruth and Wausau Little League, and was on the Board of Directors of the Wausau Little League. Jim served as the director of WIAA state high school tournaments from 1973 to 1997 and brought the WIAA state high school tournament to Wausau in 1974. Jim also served as the General Manager of the Wausau Mets in the Midwest League, and was a scout for several Major League teams. He was inducted into the Wisconsin Old Time Ball Players Association Hall of Fame.

**RICHARD HRLEVICH
MILWAUKEE HAMILTON**



Richard Hrlevich was Milwaukee Hamilton's first varsity baseball coach from 1967 through 1990. During Hrlevich's 24 years of coaching, he had 356 wins, 143 losses, nine ties with a .713 winning percentage. Hamilton teams won nine Conference titles (three of them in the Big Nine Conference with the Racine and Kenosha schools) five Division titles, six second-place finishes, and one State appearance. He was the head coach of the East team All-Star Classic in 1985. He served as WHSBCA Secretary for one term. He played baseball, football, basketball and ran track at West Allis Nathan Hale, graduating in 1953. He also played American Legion ball and was on the Milwaukee Classic League for the Highway Beer Depot. He was a three-year letterman at the University Wisconsin - Madison, earning an All-Big Ten 3rd Team selection at third base in 1956.

1983

**RICHARD HUXTABLE
NICOLET**



Dick Huxtable coached at Nicolet High School for 29 years and left as one of the school's most successful coaches ever. "Hux" coached football for the Knights for 15 years, with six of those years as the freshman coach. He also coached 17 years for the High School track and field program. He was the very first President of the Wisconsin High School Track Association and the originator of the Individual Event Coaching Clinics in Wisconsin, but his most successful coaching endeavors came on the baseball diamond. Huxtable coached high school baseball for 31 years with 23 of those years as the Nicolet Knights Head Baseball Coach. He coached his Knights to five conference championships (1980, 1983, 1984, 1988, 1989) and five State Tournament appearances (1976, 1980, 1983, 1984, 1985). Dick also led the Knights to their first Wisconsin State Summer Baseball Championship in 1985, where he coached Major League pitcher and fellow Nicolet Athletic Hall of Fame inductee Lance Painter. Dick was a proud World War II Veteran and was very proud to have been a mathematics teacher at Nicolet High School for 27 years.

**BILL MARTIN
OCONOMOWOC**

1983

**RUSTY TIEDEMANN
UW-OSHKOSH**



Tiedemann coached the UW-O from 1968-69 and 1971-88, building the program into a national power. He was at the helm for one National Championship, 15 Conference titles and more than 500 victories. Tiedemann led UW Oshkosh to 10 straight WIAC championships from 1979-88. He also guided the Titans to eight NCAA Division III World Series appearances and three NAIA World Series visits. In 1985, UW-Oshkosh became the first school from Wisconsin to win the NCAA Division III Baseball World Series. UW-Oshkosh concluded the 1985 season with a 37-3 record. Tiedemann, who recorded his 400th and 401st coaching victories at the World Series, was named NCAA Division III Coach of the Year following his team's performance. He also was selected as the NAIA Coach of the Year in 1974. Tiedemann concluded his 20 year baseball-coaching career at UW Oshkosh with a 501-165 record. His win total and .748 winning percentage both rank third in history. UW-Oshkosh named its baseball field after Tiedemann in 1989. He passed away in 2015.

**KEN TROTT
WESTBY**

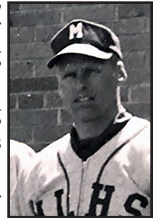

**GEORGE HOLLAND
NEKOOSA**

George Holland lettered in baseball at UW-River Falls from 1956-58. He has an excellent coaching record at the high school level. He coached at Nekoosa High School from 1959-83 and had a 276-100 record. His teams won 12 Conference titles and three straight State class B titles (1980-82). His teams put together a 64-game winning streak from 1980-83. He was selected the Wisconsin High School Baseball Coach of the Year three times and is a member of the state's High School Baseball Coaches Hall of Fame.

**JIM MARTIN
MILWAUKEE LUTHERAN • WBCA**



One of the WBCA's founding fathers, Martin, who played for Carthage, began his teaching and coaching career at Milwaukee Lutheran in 1957. During his 12 years as head coach, his teams won seven conference titles. He became the co-founder of the WBCA along with Tom Meyer, and was elected the WBCA's first president in 1969.

**JAMES NIRSCHL
KIMBERLY**

Kimberly Athletics Department and Kimberly High School officials honored Nirschl by naming John R. Gerrits Junior High campus baseball diamond after him. The players on his teams called him 'the Ol' Fox', the name which is displayed on the marquee at the baseball diamond on Kennedy Avenue in Kimberly. His records while coaching at the smallest school in the Mid-Eastern Conference, later becoming the Fox Valley Association Conference, brought a football Championship in 1955 and baseball championships in 1954 through 1959 and again in 1984.

WEST ALLIS HALE • WBCA

Belich was one of the founding fathers of the WBCA and our organization's first Vice President.

JOHN POLSCZYNSKI

MILWAUKEE JU-NEAU • WBCA

Polczynski was one of the founding fathers of the WBCA. During his coaching career, he was the first coach in the state of Wisconsin to achieve 300 victories.

ANDY SMITH

KENOSHA TREMPER

In 1954, Smith, a Wausau native and UW graduate, fielded Kenosha High School's first baseball team and success was instantaneous. The inaugural KHS team finished 2nd at State. Eight years later, Smith guided KHS to another runner-up finish. A year later, KHS and Smith finally reached the top and captured a State title, a feat he would repeat in 1969 after moving to Tremper. During a ten-year span, he won 82 percent of his games. In his 21 years as a baseball coach in Kenosha, Smith put together 18 winning seasons. Smith guided Kenosha and Tremper high schools to six State Tournament appearances between 1953 and 1973. He died in 2003.

JOHN BARTELT

MARION

Bartelt's records speak for themselves. His teams won twenty-five Central Wisconsin Conference championships from 1954 to 1994. He coached eight teams to undefeated Conference seasons;

he made six appearances at the WIAA State Baseball Tournaments; he won fifteen championships in the Central Wisconsin Boys Baseball League; he won eight league championships in American Legion Baseball, including three State tournament appearances. The baseball field in Marion was named John Bartelt Field in his honor in 2010.

Bilek was one of the founding fathers of the WBCA.

**RODNEY BILLERBECK
RIPON**

Billerbeck first coached baseball in Cassville, where his teams won four conference titles in five years. In 1955, he moved to Gibraltar HS in Fish Creek, where he would coach for the next 41 years. His teams won numerous Conference championships and coached the 1979 State champions, which were undefeated, the same year he was inducted into the first class of the WBCA Hall of Fame. Billerbeck enlisted in the Navy at the age of 17. He died in 2009 at the age of 84.

Grantiz taught and coached at Lincoln High School for over 30 years, after serving in the US Army Air Corp from 1942-1945. During his years at Lincoln, he was dubbed 'Fundamental Frank' for his constant stressing of the sport he was teaching or coaching. Grantiz passed away in 2009 at the age of 89.

**WALT HEIN
SHAWANO**

Hein was the first baseball coach in Shawano High School history. He began his career in 1942 and served until 1981. During his tenure Shawano won five consecutive Conference Championships from 1967-1973 and led his baseball team to a sstate appearance in 1964.

**DYNIE MANSFIELD
UW-MADISON**

A native of Cleveland, Ohio, Mansfield enrolled at Wisconsin in 1925 and would spend the next 45 years on the Madison campus. He lettered in baseball three times and was also the All-University boxing heavy-weight champion in 1928 and 1929. He played baseball in the New York Giants organization and semi-pro football with the Madison Blues in the early 1930s before joining the Madison physical education faculty in 1936. In 1940, Mansfield became the Badger's baseball coach, a post he would hold through 1970, compiling a record of 441-339 and winning Big Ten titles in 1946 and 1950. He also coached Wisconsin's 1947 and 1948 150 pound football teams. He was a member of the 1956 US Olympic baseball committee and was elected to the ABCA Hall of Fame in 1970. He was inducted into the UW Athletic Hall of Fame in 1998.

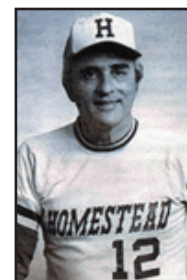
**HARLAND QUANDT
OSHKOSH NORTH**

Quandt was Oshkosh baseball for over three decades. Quandt, who had 324 career victories at Oshkosh High School from 1950 to 1972, and then at Oshkosh North from 1972 to 1987, had teams appear in six State Tournaments, two of which they won in 1954 and 1956. He was the founding member of the Snitz Club, the main fundraising machine for Oshkosh baseball, and was instrumental in building Peppler Field and EJ Schneider Field. He organized the Babe Ruth program in Oshkosh and directed 13 junior baseball clinics for three different age groups. A pitcher and letter winner at the University of Wisconsin, Quandt was a member of the Badgers 1950 Big Ten Championship team, a team that finished fourth nationally. Quandt served in the 85th Regiment during the Korean War and was a retired Colonel in the US Army Reserve. Quandt passed away in 2011 at the age of 82.

**DON RENNICKE
HOMESTEAD • WBCA**



Renniecke was a varsity baseball coach for 26 years at South Milwaukee (three years), Granville (eight years) and Homestead High School (15 years). While at Homestead, he set the standard for every coach who would follow in his footsteps. He led the High-

landers to six Braveland Conference Titles, seven Regional Titles, three Sectional Titles, and two (1974, 1978) State Titles during his tenure. He was Wisconsin State Coach of the Year in 1974, and accumulated 321 victories in his career. He also served as secretary for the Wisconsin Baseball Coaches Association for one year. The Homestead High School baseball field was named after him in 1979. He was one of the founding fathers of the WBCA.

**JOHN WILSON
DODGEVILLE**

John "Winnie" Wilson coached the Dodger Baseball Teams from 1947 to 1968. The teams amassed a record of 166-42, ten Conference Championships, and three State appearances during that time. Wilson also played one year of minor league baseball in 1937 for the Williamson Colts of the Mountain State League in West Virginia. Wilson is also a member of both the Wisconsin football and basketball Halls of fame.
